The Buddy Poppy Sale, spon-sored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, will be held in Winters Saturday, May 28, according to Ted Meyer, commander of Winters VFW Post 9193.

A. N. Crowley is chairman for the local VFW Buddy Poppy Sale. Aiding the local post again this year will be the VFW Ladies Auxiiary. Mrs. Hal Dry is chairman of the committee and Mrs. Monroe Dodd is co-chairman.

"These ladies are the backbone of our entire Buddy Poppy Program," the post commander said. 'They have done a consistently outstanding job of going out on the streets with the symbolic little red flowers. All of the people of this community can help them to do a better job by buying and wearing a Buddy Poppy."

Approximately two thirds of the proceeds from the Poppy Sale will be used to give direct aid to all disabled and needy veterans, the commander said. The money also aids the dependents and survivors of veterans who need funds to meet emergencies. On the national scale the Poppy proceeds are used to help maintain the VFW National Service Rehabilation and in part to maintain the VFW National Home for War Orphans at Eaton Rapids, Mich.

These red flowers are made by the disabled veterans in Government hospitals.



Only a few more weeks remain until the Fourteenth Annual Winters Rodeo, and plans for the three rip-roaring days of wild west activity are getting underway. The annual rodeo will be held in Blizzard Field June 23, 24 and 25.

Several specialty acts have been obtained for this year's rodeo, according to John W. Norman, president of the Winters Annual Round-Up, Inc., sponsors and producers of the event. One special attraction in the three day celebration will be a 14-year-old trick roper, Miss Wharton, from San Saba. Another special act will be presented by Levi Garrett of Sterling City, who will bring his two educated horses, Platonio, a palimino, and Thunder Jr., a black thoroughbred and quarter horse. On the first night of the rodeo, Thursday, June 23, the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse from Baird will again present their mounted Quadrille in the rodeo arena

braves of the tribe, he said. Hand-in-hand with the collection of Indian relics goes the study of Indian history. Parker has made quite an extensive study. He knows many facts about the many tribes who inhabited the Southwest before the coming of the white man. Runnels County, he said, appears to have been the headquarters for the Comanche, and there is evidence that as many as 5,000 had been camped at one time on the streams of this county. He said the young men would leave the women and children and old men in this area while they were hunting buffalo on the Plains, always returning to the then running waters of the Colorado, Elm Creek, Bluff Creek, and other streams of what is now Runnels.

Parker says that with a map he can point out probable sites of Indian camps, because they always seemed to settle near the junctions of streams of water. He has, uncovered camp fire sites which have long been covered with the dust and dirt of the ages. From one such camp fire he obtained a piece of charcoal which he forwarded to the Smithsonian Institute for their study. They informed him that testing indicated the fire had been built 25,000 years before the time of Christ.







If we observe Memorial Day with the reverence and reflection it deserves, we will be justly proud of our nation's past-and fully confident for the future.



State Capitol Highlights Next Year's Tax Battles Will Be Fought **On Familiar Ground; Need \$193 Million**

This is to cover an expected deficit of about \$68,800,-000 and increased annual spending of about \$62,527,000.

To raise this money, the governor suggests revising the corporation franchise tax formula and increasing the liquor tax, gross recepts tax on utilities and the auto sales tax. He also suggests passing the abandoned-property act (allowing the state to take over unclaimed bank accounts, property, etc.) and putting a tax on beer and cigarettes sold on military bases.

Governor Daniel also told the Commission of four other tax ideas which he said had been suggested by others.

These include:

1. A 10 percent increase on all items in the Omnibus Tax Bill except cigarettes, tobacco and franchises

2. A 1-cent-a-gallon increase in the gasoline tax.

3. A tax of 1 cent per thousand · cubic feet on the processing of natural gas.

4. A 3 percent tax on gross re-· ceipts of gas pipeline companies. Governor Daniel said he knew his proposal would be criticized as "riding the same old horses." But he said the affected tax sources would not be taxed any heavier than those in neighboring and competing states.

Finance Commission is to begin committee work this month and hold another joint session of its 34 members-all leaders in their fields-in June.

TAX EXEMPT SALES JUMP

Texas apparently is losing some tax revenue through sale of taxempt cigarettes on military posts, reports State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert.

Calvert told the State Finance Commission that since the state tax increased to eight cents a pack last year, cigarette sales at federal installations have jumped almost a million packs a month. He said sale of tax-exempt cigarettes in March 1960, was up by 1,500,000 packs over what it was in March 1959. Military officials denied that non-taxed cigaretteselling-priviliges had been abused.






