HOME TOWN Talk

C. T. Parker, Runnels County Agent, probably could be classified as one of the foremost authorities on Indian lore in these parts.

For several years Parker has made an active hobby of collecting Indian artifacts, and now has a collection which would be the envy of some museums. Arrowheads, flint knives, axes, hoes, scalping knives, skinning knives, fish scalers, and stone awls used by the Indians.

Parker's great-grandfather was a Comanche brave, so it is more or less natural that he has a great interest in these things. When he told us of his Indian ancestry, we immediately thought of Quannah Parker. But the county agent said he was not a relation of that great Comanche chieftain. His great-grandfather was just one of the braves of the tribe, he said.

Hand-in-hand with the collection of Indian relics goes the study of Indian history. Parker has made quite an extensive study. He knows many facts about the many tribes who inhabited the Southwest before the coming of the white man. Runnels County, he said, appears to have been the headquarters for the Comanche, and there is evidence that as many as 5,000 had been camped at one time on the streams of this county. He said the young men would leave the women and children and old men in this area while they were hunting buffalo on the Plains, always returning to the then running waters of the Colorado, Elm Creek, Bluff Creek, and other streams of what is now Runnels.

Parker says that with a map he can point out probable sites of Indian camps, because they always seemed to settle near the junctions of streams of water. He has, uncovered camp fire sites which have long been covered with the dust and dirt of the ages. From one such camp fire he obtained a piece of charcoal which he forwarded to the Smithsonian Institute for their study. They informed him that testing indicated the fire had been built 25,000 years before the time of Christ.

One peculiarity of the Indians, which we had never heard discussed, is that about 75 percent of them were left-handed. Parker said this is indicated by the fact that so many of their stone hand tools were made for left-handed persons.

In his collection, Parker has a many pieces of flint, which to the unlearned appear to be merely chunks of rock. Close examination, however, reveals the handiwork of the Indian. And arrowheads, and knives and spear heads identify the tribe of the maker, by their shape and the way they were made. The different tribes apparently had a standard which they followed, until it became a trademark of their works.

In displaying his collection, the County Agent explains that the very small arrowheads, many of which he has found, were not, as customarily believed, used to kill birds and rabbits and other small animals. He said that these small arrowheads were "works of art," examples of the craftsmanship of men who had a desire to show their skill in making something.

Parker is adept at making arrowheads, himself. With a piece of leather to protect his hand, a nail in a stick, he says he can produce a flint arrowhead in a few minutes. The Indians used green deer horn to chip the flint, not having the nail.

Using his skill in making arrowheads, Parker was once one of the perpetrators of a huge joke on another arrowhead hunter. They made a giant arrowhead, and buried it in the side of a dirt bank with only the point in view. You can imagine the joy displayed by the discoverer, who knew he had uncovered a very rare specimen.

Because arrowheads and other tools are so easy to make, the authenticity of many collections and specimens offered for sale as "Indian relics" is questionable, he said.

Examining Parker's collection, the thought occurred to us that if and when World War III comes, with the resulting devastation of which we have been warned, that supply of arrowheads and flint knives and the art of producing them might come in right handy.

Flags will be placed on the graves of all departed veterans of this area for Memorial Day by members of the VFW and Auxiliary.

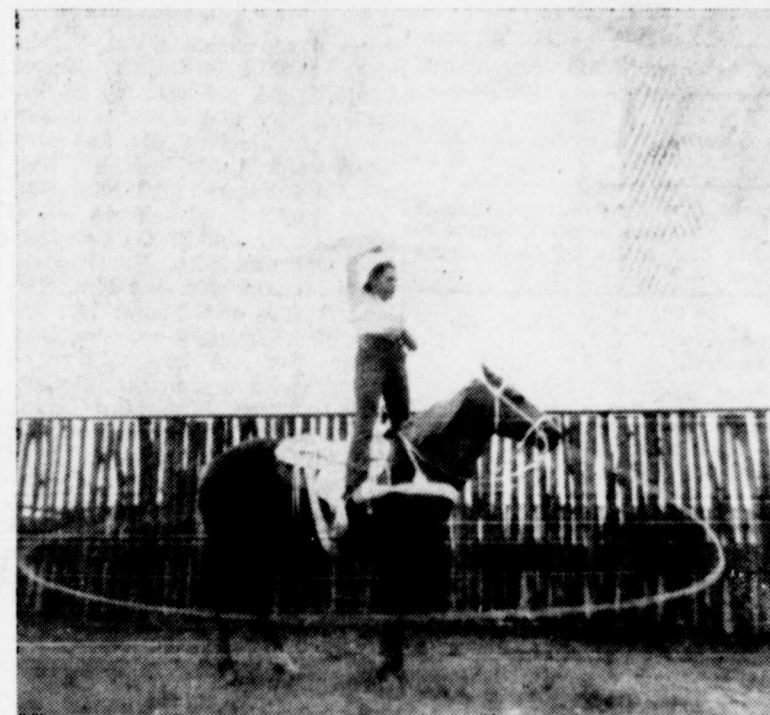
Winters merchants are urged to display flags on Memorial Day and if any assistance is needed please contact Ted Meyer, Commander of VFW Post 9193.

Plans Being Made For 14th Rodeo

Only a few more weeks remain until the Fourteenth Annual Winters Rodeo, and plans for the three rip-roaring days of wild west activity are getting underway. The annual rodeo will be held in Blizzard Field June 23, 24 and 25.

Several specialty acts have been obtained for this year's rodeo, according to John W. Norman, president of the Winters Annual Round-Up, Inc., sponsors and producers of the event. One special attraction will be a 14-year-old trick roper, Miss Wharton, from San Saba. Another special act will be presented by Levi Garrett of Sterling City, who will bring his two educated horses, Platonio, a palomino, and Thunder Jr., a black thoroughbred and quarter horse.

On the first night of the rodeo, Thursday, June 23, the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse from Baird will again present their mounted Quadrille in the rodeo arena.

Lloyd Woodley of Lampasas, who has provided stock for rodeos here in former years, will furnish the wild stock and produce the rodeo.

Rex Felker, well-known rodeo announcer, will call the time for each event, and will do the general announcing. He is now manager of the Colorado City Chamber of Commerce, and has been working rodeos for some 27 years.

Two parades have been scheduled for the three-day celebration. The first will be held on Thursday afternoon, and the other on Saturday, the final day. Taking part in the parades will be riding clubs from many surrounding towns, cowboys and cowgirls from all over this part of West Texas, and many beautiful and unusual types of floats. Prizes will be awarded the best floats in the parade. To be eligible for parade prize money floats must participate in both parades, it was announced. Floyd Grant is chairman of the parade committee.

Ballinger Junior Rodeo Set For June 2, 3, 4

Final plans for the second Annual World's Champion Junior Rodeo to be held at Runnels Field on the Bronte Highway one mile west of Ballinger on June 2, 3 and 4, have been completed.

Some of the highlights of the 1960 rodeo will be the June 2 rodeo parade with visiting riding clubs, local riders, and floats. The parade will be followed with a free barbecue to all visiting riders in the parade.

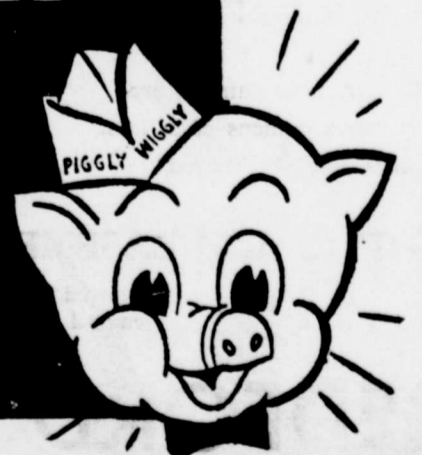

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

U-2 Incident Sheds Light On Soviet Spy Network

By Congressman O. C. Fisher

That U-2 incident has served to throw fresh light on the worldwide network of Soviet espionage activities. Because domestic communists in all countries owe their first loyalty to the Soviet Union, the Kremlin has a built-in spy system. In addition, Soviet agents by the thousands operate out of Embassies and Red Consulates everywhere.

The West, on the other hand, cannot compete with the Muscovites in that field. The police state with its secrecy makes it extremely difficult for western intelligence to get through.

Yet, in this missile age, when perhaps the only defense against the ICBMs is to destroy the launching sites, the necessity for knowledge about the location of such sites is self-evident. Hence, the risks that are taken.

Khrushchev showing outrage over the U-2 incident would be about like Frank Costello being outraged over a bingo game!

Speculation over what happened to Mr. K. in Paris continues. One line of thought, shared by many, is that when the Soviet leader went to Paris he thought there would be a summit conference. But after his arrival in France the word was flashed to him from the powerful Politburo in Moscow to keep away from it, turn his venom on the U. S. and Eisenhower.

Others point out that things have not been going too smoothly between the Chinese commies and the Moscow Reds, and Peking, which has all along opposed the summit deal, turned the heat on Khrushchev and Co. to heed their demands following the U-2 crash. That may have helped the Soviet Bosses make up their minds to sabotage the meeting.

All seem to agree that even if there had never been a U-2 incident the summit conference was

State Capitol Highlights

Next Year's Tax Battles Will Be Fought On Familiar Ground; Need \$193 Million

Gov. Price Daniel's money raising proposals indicate that many of next year's tax battles will be fought on familiar terrain.

Basic program submitted by the Governor to the State Finance Advisory Commission is the same as the one he submitted in 1959. Even the total goal is nearly the same.

In 1959 the Legislature passed a bill aimed at raising \$185,000,000 in new money. Governor Daniel estimates 1961 new-money - needs at \$193,000,000. This is to cover an expected deficit of about \$68,800,000 and increased annual spending of about \$62,527,000.

To raise this money, the governor suggests revising the corporation franchise tax formula and increasing the liquor tax, gross receipts tax on utilities and the auto sales tax. He also suggests passing the abandoned-property act (allowing the state to take over unclaimed bank accounts, property, etc.) and putting a tax on beer and cigarettes sold on military bases.

Governor Daniel also told the Commission of four other tax ideas which he said had been suggested by others.

These include:
1. A 10 percent increase on all items in the Omnibus Tax Bill except cigarettes, tobacco and franchises.

2. A 1-cent-a-gallon increase in the gasoline tax.

3. A tax of 1 cent per thousand cubic feet on the processing of natural gas.

4. A 3 percent tax on gross receipts of gas pipeline companies.

Governor Daniel said he knew his proposal would be criticized as "riding the same old horses." But he said the affected tax sources would not be taxed any heavier than those in neighboring and competing states.

Finance Commission is to begin committee work this month and hold another joint session of its 34 members—all leaders in their fields—in June.

TAX EXEMPT SALES JUMP

Texas apparently is losing some tax revenue through sale of tax-exempt cigarettes on military posts, reports State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert.

Calvert told the State Finance Commission that since the state tax increased to eight cents a pack last year, cigarette sales at federal installations have jumped almost a million packs a month.

He said sale of tax-exempt cigarettes in March 1960, was up by 1,500,000 packs over what it was in March 1959. Military officials denied that non-taxed cigarette-selling-privileges had been abused.

DEMO HOUSING PROBLEM

Austin hotel and motel facilities will be stretched beyond capacity when an estimated 5,000 come here June 14 for the State Democratic Convention.

It's more people than Austin can accommodate. To ease the problem a little, the State Democratic Executive Committee has ruled that no room reservations will be made for persons living within 75 miles of the Capital City.

Also in preparation for the big day, SDEC has named a credentials committee whose job will be to decide which delegates shall be admitted.

Four counties had "rump" conventions and will send two rival delegations to Austin. Governor Daniel, pooh-poohing the "rump" groups, said they were all too small to be a threat to the official delegations.

"There is more harmony in the Texas Democratic Party now than ever before," said the governor.

BEAUTIFUL MAPS READY

Texas' new 1960 official highway map, illustrated with 11 dramatic full-color pictures, now is available for the asking.

It's not only handsome, but informative. It shows the 1,933 miles of multi-lane divided highways not completed. Also, 26,378 miles of state and U. S. highways and 20,000 miles of farm-to-market roads.

Lakes, state parks and roadside parks are indicated. Texas' history, geography and present opportunities are summarized.

In line with the state's tourist-seeking policy, it is headed, "All of Texas Welcomes You."

To get the map, write the Texas Highway Department, Austin 14, or drop by a highway district office and travel bureau. County tax offices have cards on hand to request maps.

OIL ALLOWABLE UP

Texas Railroad Commission retained the eight-day producing pattern for the Texas oil industry for June, but because June has one day less than May, daily permissible production will be slightly higher.

Statewide allowable for June will be 2,643,516 barrels a day, a 47,108 barrel a day increase from May.

Several major oil companies asked the Commission to set nine preceding days in June, indicat-

A new money request awaiting the Legislature next year will be that of the University of Texas for \$100,000 for the planning of a new medical branch in San Antonio.

UT Regents said the money would be used to get specialists in medical center planning to estimate what would be required. With this information the board could draw up plans and a request for funds for the center itself from a later Legislature.
