New Law Permits Monthly Payments Formerly Denied

Did the breadwinner of your family die after June 30, 1940, and before September 1950?

R. R. Tuley, Jr., Manager of the Abilene District Office of the Social Security Administration, states that the 1954 Amendments now provide monthly payments to many people who previously were not eligible to receive Social Security Insurance benefits, if the deceased worked at least 6 quarters of coverage (1½ years of work covered by the law.)

This new insurance provision applies only in death cases, where the worker or a World War II veteran died before September 1950 and did not have sufficient social security credits under the law at that time for payments to be made to his survivors at the time of death. Tuley believes there are several hundred such families in the area.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT LEADERS ARE ACTIVE FARMERS

Five men, all elected for five year terms, form the governing body of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District. The members of the governing board must be land owners and operators. The five present members are W. J. Fritts, chairman; H. W. Turney, secretary and J. D. Gardner, Bernal Hickman and F. M. Spurlen.

Their primary objective is to get conservation on the land. Mr. Fritts owns and operates a 355 acre bottom land farm in the Van Dyke Community near Comanche. He has applied some type of conservation to each acre on this farm. Some of these practices include eradication of 150 acres of brush from his pasture; seeded and sodded 130 acres of pasture grasses; planted Madrid clover in his Johnson grass meadows; plants vetch with small grain for grazing and cover crops; plants Italian rye for winter grazing and fences his pasture in blocks to control grazing.

H. W. Turney lives in the Purves Community south of Dublin. He owns a livestock farm and operates the Vickers Estate. Turney is a former Soil Conservation Service employee, regarded as an outstanding authority on range land and range management. Turney has applied a complete conservation plan on both farm units. He has seeded many acres of land to native grasses with good success. He plants his cropland to small grain and vetch and clover and grazes these crops with livestock during winter and early Spring.

Mr. Gardner owns and operates a sandy land peanut farm in the Round Grove Community near De Leon. Mr. Gardner has preached conservation farming for a decade or more. He was one of the first farmers in his community to plant winter cover crops on his deep coarse textured sandy farm. In addition to the other practices he has done lots of pasture improvements such as brush eradication, providing temporary pasture consisting of vetch, winter peas, and rye. He has

If the breadwinner of your family died before September 1950 and you are not receiving monthly social security benefits, you should contact your Social Security Office immediately if you are:

1. A widow, age 65, or older, or
2. A widow under age 65 with unmarried children under the age of 18 or
3. A child under the age of 18 and unmarried, or
4. A parent, who was chiefly dependent upon the wage earner at the time of his death, provided the wage earner was not survived by a widow or minor children.

planted weeping love and King Ranch Bluestem grasses for permanent pasture.

Mr. Hickman commonly known as "Hairy Vetch" is a progressive young farmer and rancher reared near Rising Star. In '51 Bernal Hickman was voted the most outstanding farmer conservationist in the state. He operated a 2,463 acre livestock farm. He has applied 100% of his conservation program on his land.

Mr. Spurlen lives east of Eastland on a 63 acre farm, which he owns, and he leases 500 additional acres and practices conservation on both places. Spurlen has planted vetch and winter peas over twenty years. He has carried out a good program of brush control and seeded 20 acres of land to native grass this year.

The supervisors meet the second Friday of each month at the De Leon Work Unit headquarters. They welcome anyone interested in any phase of Soil and Water Conservation.

County Notaries To Be Renamed By Secretary State

Secretary of State A. M. Muldrow has announced that he will reappoint all persons who now hold Notary Public Commissions and that all such persons must qualify by filing an oath and bond with the county clerk of their residence between June 1, 1955, and June 10, 1955. The law specifically requires county clerks to approve notary bonds and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State. All notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the county clerk acts thereon. Johnson Smith is county clerk of Eastland County.

Any person who has not heretofore been a notary public should apply to his county clerk between May 1, 1955 and May 23, 1955, if he desires to have this application given prompt attention in the State Department, as the rush of reappointing all old notaries may slow up the ordinary process of making new appointments and issuing commissions, it was pointed out.

Secretary of State Muldrow said, "Each person applying for a commission as a notary public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed; exact names and permanent addresses should be given to the county clerk in applying for a commission, as location of the notary may be necessary long after he has notarized a particular instrument."

Manual Training Is Seen As Cure For Delinquency

A recent study has shown that young people who are busy learning to work with their hands are least likely to become involved with the law and become juvenile delinquents, the Rev. Lawrence Bryan, pastor of Wesley Methodist Church, told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk last Tuesday. W. W. Meglasson was in charge of the program.
 The study of youthful law breakers showed that an answer to the problem is to teach manual courses — welding, brick laying, carpentry work, and the like. Technical schools in Dallas and elsewhere have been brought into the effort to solve delinquent problems, Rev. Bryan said.
 "Children treated well by parents are seldom delinquency problems," Rev. Bryan said. "Too often our children are models of the type of home they live in."
 Recently developed tests enable technicians to determine the likelihood of first graders in becoming delinquents, he added. The FBI has determined from a study of 500 young law breakers that only 3% suffer from a neurosis.

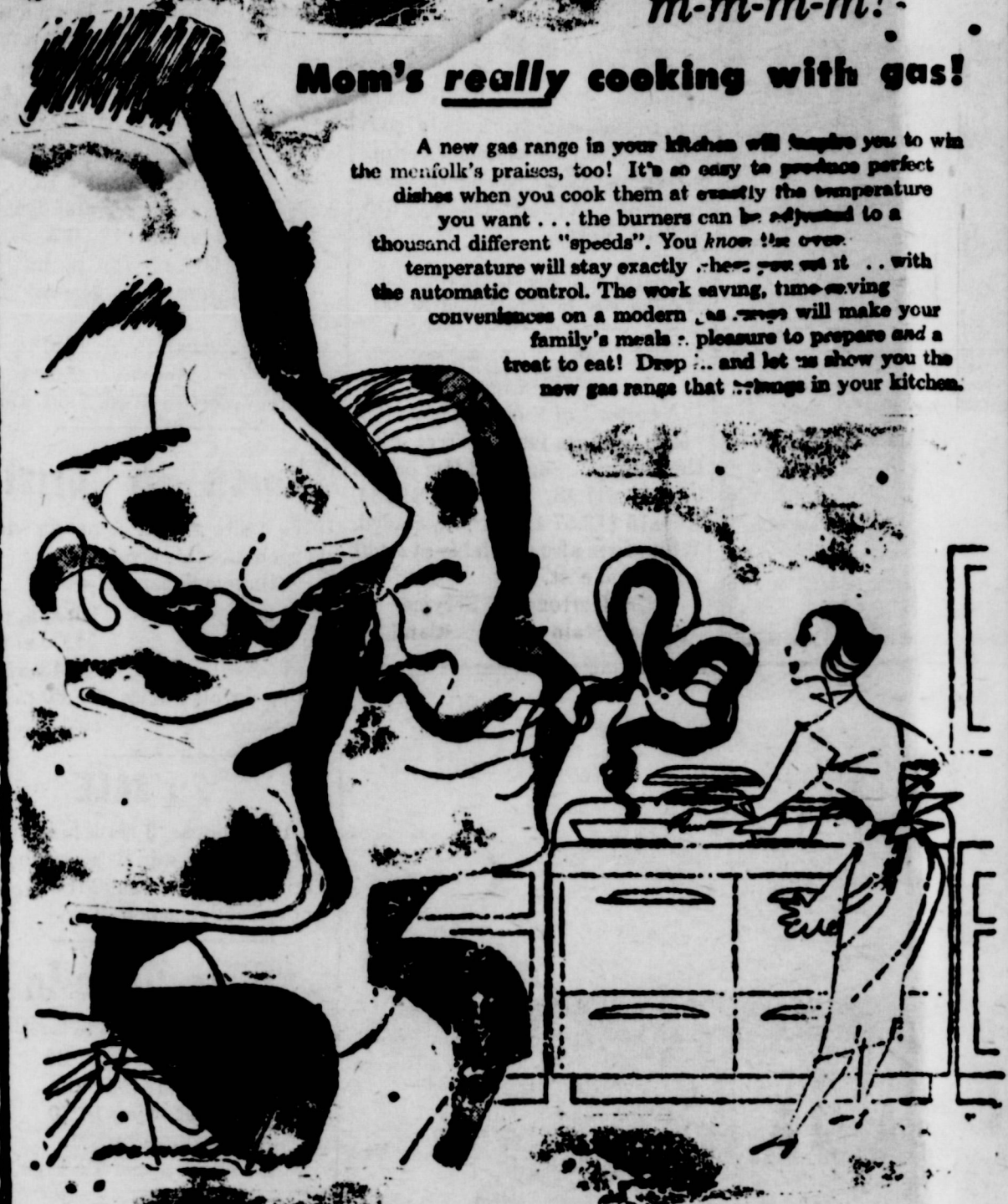
