Health Hints For Back-To-Schoolers

School for most Texas children begins today or next Tuesday. Back-to-school means more than pencils, paper and new-smelling blue jeans.

The September issue of the 'Texas Health Bulletin," a monthly publication of the Texas State Department of Health, is devoted to matters of school health.

All articles in the Bulletin were written by persons with wide experience in their respective fields including school nurses, environmental engineers, teachers and a physician.

There are many hints that will come in handy for parents as

well as school personnel.

A common problem is estimating the ideal weight for a child. The solution suggested in the September Bulletin says multiply the child's age in years by seven, and add one-half pound for each month

This will hold true from ages six through 12.

For example, boys and girls who are eight years and eight months old will average close to 60 pounds. Eight times seven is 56-add a half-pound for each of eight months and it totals 60 pounds.



Farmers who hire workers for harvesting fall crops were reminded today that the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act sets a 16year age minimum for the employment of children in agriculture during school hours.

The reminder came from Regional Director William J. Rogers of the U.S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Division here, the agency which administers this law.

"Today and in the foreseeable future, the need for youngsters to even higher educational standards is beyond question," he said. "The child's chance for success in later years can depend on whether he enrolls in school

Mr. Rogers pointed out that chil-dren may lawfully work on farms before and after school hours or on weekends, but that their place is in the classroom when school is in session in the school district where the child is currently living.

"The law protects the children of migratory workers as well as local children," he said. "The only exception to the law is the child working exclusively for his parents or guardian.'

An age certificate showing that the youngster is at least 16 is the best protection the farmer can have against inadvertent violation. In Texas, these certificates are available, as a public service, from local Texas Employment Commission offices.

He added that the Federal child labor law applies to farmers who engage in interstate commerce or ship their products in interstate commerce, either directly or to firms who ship them across state lines in their original form or as an ingredient of another product.

dren attending Texas schools this September, motorists were being urged to adjust their driving habits accordingly by J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association.

"Give a brake to our youngsters when nearing a school," he urged. "It is very appropriate for us to pause at this time of the year when children begin their training to prepare themselves for life, that we prepare ourselves through better driving habits to make it possible for them to live," Musick

Almost 200,000 youngsters full of anxiety will be going to school for the first time and will be a particular hazard from a safety standpoint. Although there is a tendency to think in terms of youngsters entering school for the first time, each age level has its particular safety hazards.

"While we have 200,000 starting school, there is another 115,000 reaching driving age. Congestion around Junior High Schools and High Schools is presenting greater traffic hazards each year," Musick pointed out.

Elementary schools will show a total enrollment of approximately 1,598,000. Children on bicycles present a particular hazard around these schools.

Parents were urged not to send children to school without going over basic safety precautions such as cross streets only at intersections and on direction of the Safety Patrol, ride bicycles on the right hand side of the road and move in the same manner direction as automobiles, use hand signals when riding bicycles, walk facing (or on the left hand side) traffic; and above all else, "Don't turn your youngster loose behind a ton of steel and bolts unless you can depend on him to obey traffic laws, exercise reasonable judgment and has in his possession a valid driver's license,"Musick cautioned.

While parents are cautioning children about traffic problems, they owe it to the children to examine their own driving habits. 'One of the best safety devices we know of is a child who watches the speedometer while his parents drive," Musick declared. "Whenever you have a child in the car with you, drive as if you were teaching him to drive because you are," he said.

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
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
