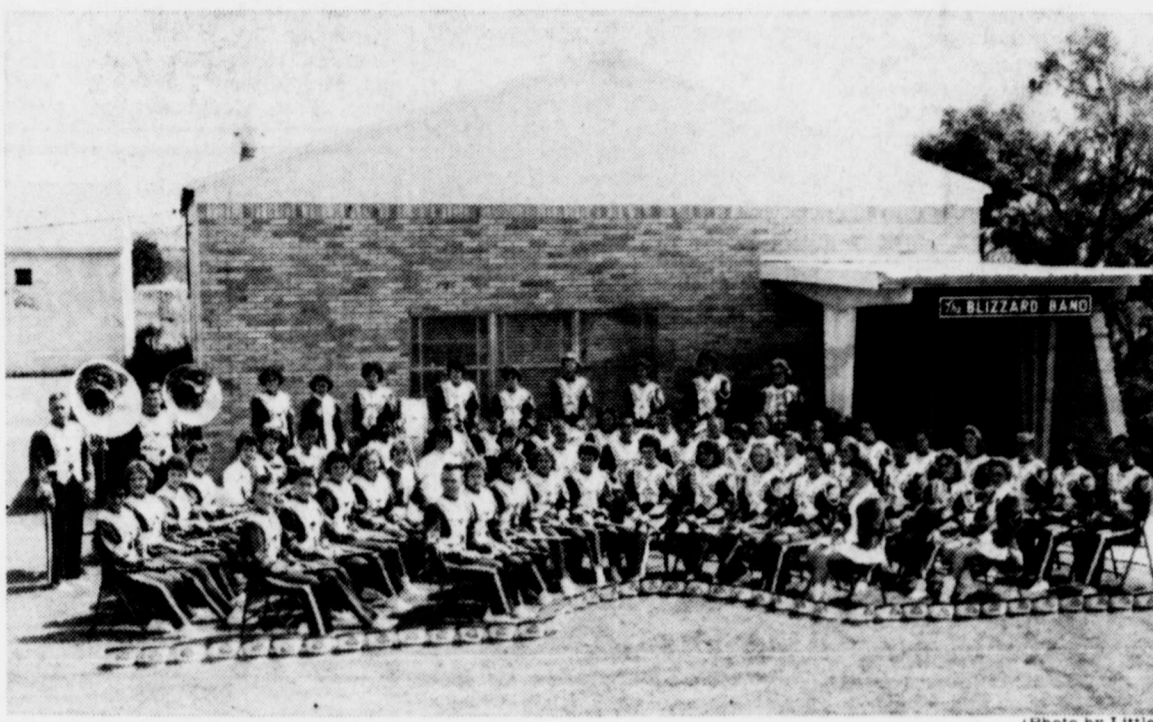

Lawn Man Killed In One-Car Wreck North of Winters

Leonard Reed Nicholson, 34, of Lawn, was killed when his car crashed into a bridge railing and literally tore itself to bits. A companion, Elbert Ray Mackey, 26, of Abilene sustained serious injuries and is in the Winters Municipal Hospital.

Mackey was thrown from the automobile.

The accident happened 7 1/2 miles north of Winters on Highway 83 at about 4 p. m. as a fine snow fell on the Winters area.

Deputy Sheriff Johnny Wilson said that the northbound car evidently smashed into the right hand bridge railing, then started cartwheeling. It tore into railings on both sides of the 50-foot long bridge and came to rest — ripped into many pieces—about 30 feet from the north end of the bridge.

Nicholson's body was pinned in the wreckage, and had to be removed with crowbars.

Those who arrived at the scene first thought the car had been blown to bits. Pieces of the car were scattered from where it first struck the bridge railing all along the bridge to the point it came to rest. The engine ripped from its mountings.

Mackey received severe head injuries, multiple cuts and bruises and a broken right leg and possible internal injuries.

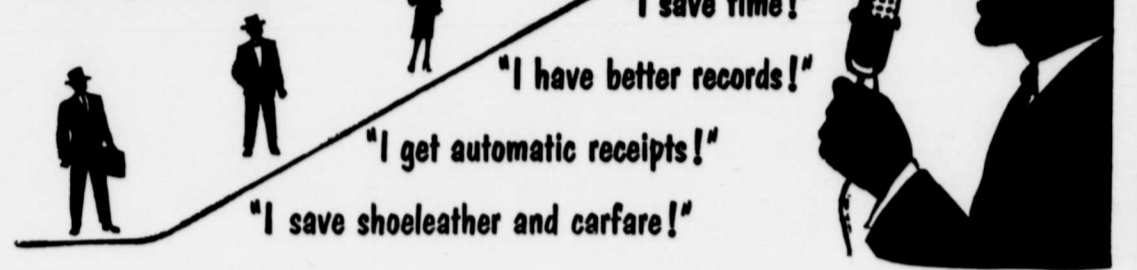

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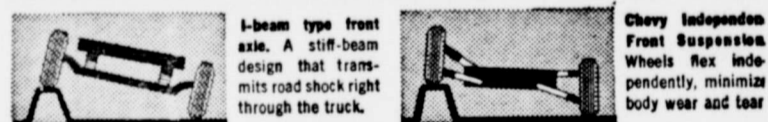

Make This A 'Safety' Christmas

Parents setting out for a Merry Christmas should take steps to see that they don't fall flat on their faces in an effort to make it a happy occasion for their children.

J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, cautioned that because falls account for 45 per cent of home accident deaths, the Christmas season requires that a special effort be made to avoid this all too frequent occurrence.

"Don't obscure your view by carrying too many packages. If you find it necessary to hide them away in hard-to-reach places, be sure you use a sturdy ladder when it comes time to get them down."

"Decorating the Christmas tree in high places should be done by a person tall enough to reach those areas rather than letting smaller children try to reach the high spots from a chair—a doll helps, but it doesn't comfort a little girl with a broken arm."

"If you should move presents around in a dark room, make certain you have clear space in which you can maneuver before turning out the lights," Musick cautioned.

The safety enthusiast went on to caution against use of combustible materials as Christmas tree decorations.

"We also find more than the usual number of empty light-bulb sockets in the home at Christmas time," Musick observed.

"All the usual hazards of falls in the bathroom and the usual kitchen hazards are present in addition to increased trouble spots due to the holiday season," he said.
