Council Votes 3-2 Against Utilities Franchise Extension

Mayor Gives Views On Utilities Franchise Vote

I must say that the Council's action on denying the extension of the West Texas Utilities Franchise came as a great disappointment to me. I have in the past recommended the extension and I again recommended it to this council. In my opinion the people and the voters of the City in this past city election gave overwhelming approval to the extension of the franchise. This was a direct and square issue of the campaign and the voters turned out in unprecedented number. In addition the "Richie Poll" showed an overwhelming decision on the part of the people of Winters. Regardless of my personal feelings, I believe as an elected representative of the people I was obligated to support what was shown to be the people's choice.

In my opinion the right and fair thing would be to give the West Texas Utilities the right to operate their business in Winters. I believe that by denying this right we hurt the future of Winters at a time when we sorely need all of the outside industry we can encourage. I have done what I felt was right in recommending the extension of the franchise and also what I believe the people of Winters wanted done. It is now for each Councilman who voted on the issue to state to the voters his opinion as everyone is entitled to their own opinion in the matter. The vote was two for the extension by Richie and Brown and three against the extension by Raper, Smith, and Lloyd. I had no vote but had I voted I would have voted for the extension. I only trust that the majority was right and that we have no cause to regret the action.

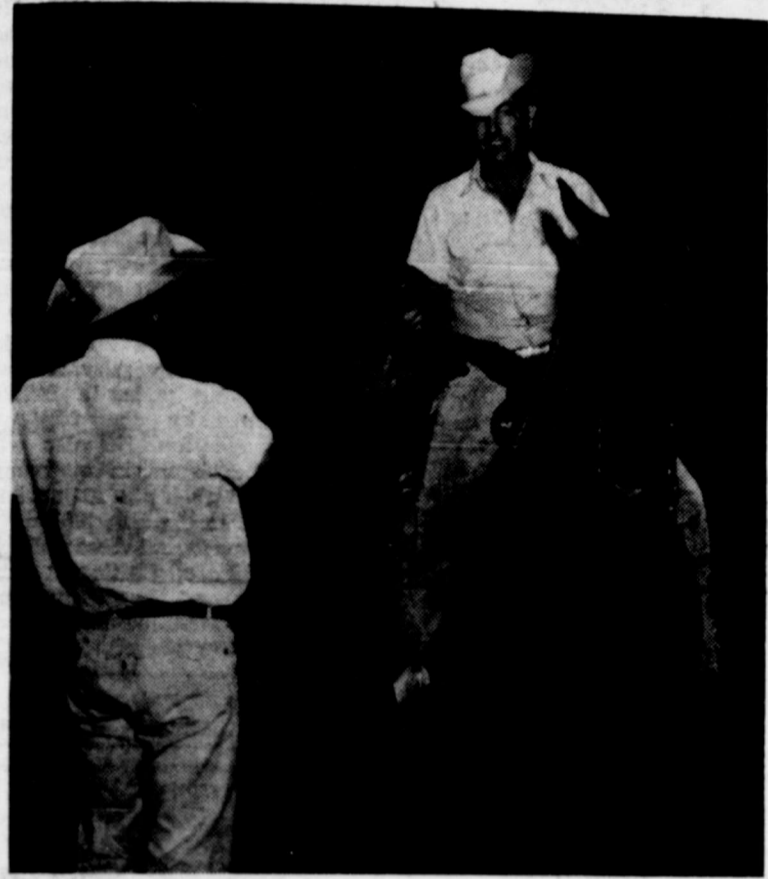
The Winters City Council Monday night turned down by a vote of 3 to 2 a 15-year extension of the West Texas Utilities Co. franchise.

Councilmen O. B. Raper, Ralph Lloyd and J. E. (Buck) Smith voted against extension of the franchise, while Councilmen J. Griff Brown and J. F. Richie voted in favor of the measure. The motion to extend the franchise was made by Richie and seconded by Brown.

Prior to the vote, the council discussed the franchise and also the possibility of the West Texas Utilities Co. leasing or purchasing the city-owned light facilities with Cal Young, president of the utility company. Young had been invited to attend the meeting.

In his talk to the council, Young said that with only five years remaining on the present operating franchise, "We are on the way out at the present time." He explained that with only the short time remaining it would be unprofitable for the company to make any capital improvements to their equipment and lines in Winters. In order for any improvements to pay out, he explained, it would be necessary for the company to receive the city's permission to do business here for "quite a few years."

Young was asked by members of the council if there was any chance that the West Texas Utilities Co. might be interested in purchasing or leasing the city-owned light facilities. "There is nothing we'd rather do than lease or buy," Young commented. However, he made it emphatic that his company would not think of beginning any kind of negotiation toward that end without first being granted a franchise to operate in Winters. "The attempt to lease or purchase without a franchise would be futile," Young said. He indicated that further discussion would be useless "if you feel we are not an asset to Winters." He said that a franchise of less than 20 years would be unsatisfactory. (Continued on page 7)

Grain Storage Tank Capacity Increased At Alderman-Cave

Construction started this week on two more big grain storage tanks at Alderman-Cave Milling and Grain Co. The new tanks will have a capacity of 73,000 bushels, Ray Alderman, manager of the company, said.

Two giant storage tanks and new elevator and scale facilities were added just prior to the small grain harvest.

The first improvement added at the milling and grain company now offers a total space for 131,400 bushels of grain. This does not include the holding capacity in the mill proper, where several thousand bushels can be handled.

Workmen have begun installation of new milling equipment, and extensions of present buildings have been made. Alderman said that when the mill is finished they will have one of the most modern push-button mills in the country. Completion of the mill is expected sometime in the late summer.

We Think the City Council Should Reconsider

The Winters City Council, by a vote of 3 to 2, Monday night refused to grant a renewal or extension of the West Texas Utilities Co. franchise.

The Enterprise believes that the council should reconsider its action, and do so immediately, and we present the following as a basis for our call for a reconsideration:

The capacity of the City-owned light plant is not sufficient to handle the total demand for electricity in the city of Winters, if the West Texas Utilities Co. removes its facilities.

Item: The Glenn Gin, which in the past has been powered by a gas engine, has changed to electricity for power. James Glenn, owner of the gin, told The Enterprise that in the recent past he had requested electricity

from the municipal power plant to furnish the electricity. Mr. Glenn said he was told by the City that it would not be profitable for the City to furnish them with electricity.

We believe that the voters of Winters, in the April 4 city election, clearly stated their minds on the franchise measure. A record number of voters, 688, citizens of Winters, went to the polls on that date and re-elected Mayor Harvey D. Jones, who had stated in his campaign he was in favor of granting a franchise to WTU. A candidate for Councilman, J. Griff Brown, in a published statement prior to the election, said he would work toward granting the franchise. He led the ticket in the number of votes, receiving 339 votes to defeat T. A. Smith, who was mayor at the

time the municipal light plant was built. Smith received only 266 votes. These election results clearly show the desires of the people, and should not be taken lightly.

In addition, the "Richie Poll," a postcard poll conducted prior to the election, which asked the question, "Do you favor extension of the WTU franchise?" without a doubt showed the thinking of the people of Winters. More than 90 percent of the citizens said they were in favor of the extension.

At a time when Winters, along with every town in the country, is trying to build and grow, seeking new business, new industry and additional families, it would seem ill advised to take action which would curtail such work

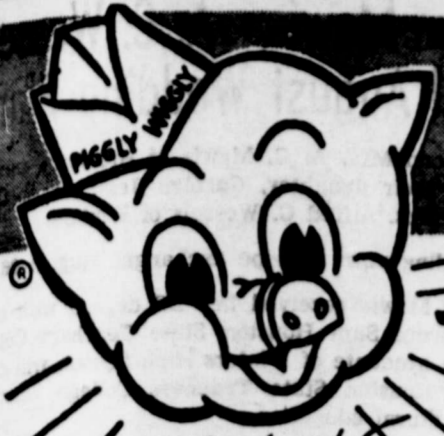

Fisher Voted Against Huge Housing Bill

By Congressman O. C. Fisher

A Mother Hubbard housing bill breezed through the House last week, by far the largest measure of its kind in history. Including "back door spending" provisions, such as Treasury withdrawals or contract commitments without future specific Congressional approval, the total amount involved is about \$9 billion.

With something for everybody included, the bill includes a loan purchase provision, allowing 3 per cent down payments on homes costing up to \$15,000, with 35 years to pay. This provision was generally acceptable to critics of the omnibus measure.

The measure commits the government to a mammoth public

cedented scale. Although nearly 100,000 such units are already authorized and in the pipe line, the current bill increases that by 100,000. The financing of this program is done by a "back door" device, and will cost the taxpayers in excess of \$2 billion for the 100,000 units, over a 40-year period. We already have some 600,000 such units completed.

Often referred to as "socialized housing," because public housing is government-owned and rented to low and middle-income families for about one-half of what they would rent for in free enterprise. Translated into simple language, this means that taxpayers chip in and help pay about half of the rent bills for public housing tenants each month.

Many such projects are filled mostly by city firemen, policemen, etc., earning from four to six thousand dollars annually.

The following Texans voted against the bill: Fisher, Burleson, Casey, Dowdy, Alger, Kilgore, Mahon, Rogers and Teague.
