tions, were passed unanimously by the Council in a special meeting. Present for the meeting were all members of the City's governing body, Mayor Harvey D. Jones, and Councilmen O. B. Raper, Ralph Lloyd, J. E. Smith, J. G. Brown, and W. M. Hays.

In the ordinance concerning collection of garbage and refuse within the city limits, the Council drew up specifications for containers and made regulations for their placement. They also placed a penalty of discontinuance of collection service and water service furnished by the City upon those who would not comply with the provisions of the ordinance.

The ordinance specifies that containers for "kitchen garbage" must be portable barbage cans "constructed of galvanized iron, tin or other suitable metal, with a tight fitting cover." Capacity of garbage cans was set at not less than five gallons nor over 32 gallons. The ordinance also specifies that all trash and rubbish shall be placed in boxes, sacks or barrels or other suitable receptacles of reasonable size, provided that gross weight does not exceed 50 pounds.



Bell County set up a chest clinic in 1954. Persons who had contacts with known TB patients were asked to come in for free check-ups. But if they did not come, warrants were issued to bring them in. After 3,162 clinic visits, the pro-

gram has located 64 new cases of TB over the years. But it has worked so well at checking spread of the disease that last year only one case was found when tuberculin tests were given extensively.






