1962 Football Schedule Has Been Released

The 1961 Winters High School Blizzard football team will meet several new opponents when they take to the gridiron next season, according to the schedule which was released this week.

Winters, which has been in District 7-AA, has been moved to District 6-AA, and will drop all but one of their old conference opponents next year. Ballinger is the only team to go with Winters into the new district, formed recently.

Teams composing District 6-AA next year include Winters, Haskell, Hamlin, Stamford, Anson and Ballinger.

The Blizzards will again meet one of their old 7-AA foes next year, but that game will be pre-conference. Coleman is now in a separate conference.

Non-conference games for 1962 will be: Colorado City, there, September 7; Mason, here, September 14; Brady, here, Sept. 21; Albany there, September 28; Coleman, there, Oct. 5.

Conference games next year will be: Haskell, there, October 19; Hamlin, here, Oct. 26; Stamford, there, November 2; Anson, here, Nov. 9; Ballinger, here, Nov. 16.

This schedule is set up for the next two years, with only location of games changed.

FFA Team Will Go To Area Contests December Second

This team won first place in the Coleman district contests Tuesday, November 14, to qualify for the Stephenville area meet.

They included the Greenhand chapter conducting team, second place; junior farm skills team, second place; senior farm skills team, third place; junior FFA quiz team, fourth; and farm radio team, fourth. Only first place teams in the district were qualified for the area contests at Stephenville.

Winters High School Blizzard Band Won First Division Rating At Angelo

The Winters High School Blizzard Marching Band received the coveted first division rating in one of the hardest contests ever to be held in Region 2, in the University Interscholastic League competition at San Angelo Saturday.

In addition, the Winters High School Majorettes received first division ratings in the twirling contest.

Bands were judged on marching and the twirlers were graded on proficiency. Bands and twirlers did not compete against each other but against standards. A rating of 1 is the best given.

The Blizzard Band received the top rating in the inspection block, which means every student was dressed perfectly, instruments spotlessly clean, and every command executed perfectly.

The band began marching at 2:28 in the afternoon, finishing their drill within 7 minutes and 40 seconds. Maximum time allowed on the field without penalty is eight minutes.

Kenneth Lloyd Joins Staff of Decorator Firm

Kenneth R. Lloyd, formerly of Winters and now living in Columbia, S. C., has joined the staff of Dora Gray Studios, an interior decorating firm in Columbia.

Lloyd is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymon Lloyd of Winters, and is a graduate of Winters High School.

He has been in Columbia since July 1. He is a graduate of the University of Cincinnati, having taken a five-year course in cooperative education, majoring in design.

The University of Cincinnati was the first school in the United States to establish the 12-month cooperative course, where students can go to school and work, alternating seven weeks study with seven weeks in a business firm. In the 53 years since the idea was introduced, many schools have adopted it. Cincinnati is the only one whose school of design offers the cooperative course, and it ranks among the top three in the nation in that field.

The interior design major includes specifically such related courses as furniture design (traditional as well as the most contemporary), layout perspective, drawing and painting, physics of color, professional practice, history of art literature and history of civilization. A knowledge of architectural elements and materials for construction is part of the training. An interior designer considers it essential that a house be designed from the inside out.

To quote Lloyd, "We live on the inside and it should be workable." In the event that problems do arise, the designer is equipped to draw up blue prints to fit the furniture to the space. He also has the training to re-design architecture, move or place walls, draw up specifications for construction and total costs for everything.

At the University, Lloyd was able to form the first student affiliate chapter of the American Institute of Interior Designers, and served as its president for one year. This organization made it possible for students to work directly with professional designers in the field during their years of study, and to attend seminars and tours sponsored by them.

At Cincinnati he was honored to have his paintings on exhibition. He was president of Sigma Chi Fraternity for two years and was named the most outstanding senior graduate. He has served in the U. S. Army as a corporal in the field artillery station at Battalion Headquarters in Korea for one and one-half years. While there, on his own, he visited Japan, Okinawa, Formosa, Hong Kong, and Bangkok. He works in cooperation with architects, building contractors, landscape gardeners and nurserymen.

At Dora Gray Studios Lloyd will be working with people considered pioneers in the field in South Carolina. Some of his co-workers have worked and studied at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and at Tiffany's, and under Horace Moran, an interior designer known especially for his churches.

Kiddies' Parade December Sixth

The home decoration contest is expected to draw a lot of attention from residents. Big cash prizes will be offered for the best decorated homes, with \$50 for first prize. Second and third prizes will be \$35 and \$15. Decorated homes will be judged Dec. 18. Residents who wish to enter this contest must register with the Chamber of Commerce office so that names and street addresses will be known to the judges. Deadline for entry in this contest is Dec. 18.

Five mail carriers in the Winters post office have been presented Safe Driver Awards by Postmaster Rankin Pace. The five drivers have piled up a total of 67 years safe driving.

Receiving the awards were W. E. Little, for 26 years safe driving; Ray L. Hollingshead, 19 years; M. T. Bridwell, 11 years; W. S. Cooke, 10 years; and Dennis Rodgers, 1 year.

The Safe Driver Award emblem which these men have earned is the badge which guarantees proof of safe driving and expert performance, Pace said. It recognizes outstanding safe driving, and is evidence of courtesy on the part of the drivers.

The Post Office Department is placing ever-increasing emphasis on a continuing safety and accident prevention program, Pace said. During the past 12-month period, 756 postal drivers completed 31 years of safe driving performance, and 10,167 drivers completed one year of safe driving. There are a lot of miles between 1 and 26 years safe driving, it was pointed out, but it simply proves that safe driving is a skill which can be learned, and when practiced, will prevent accidents.

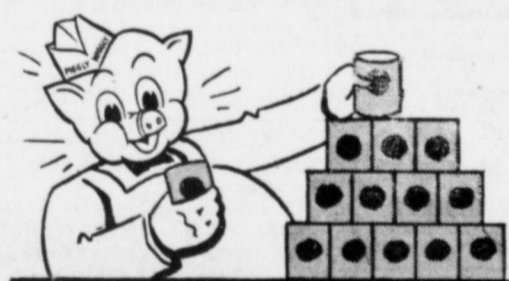

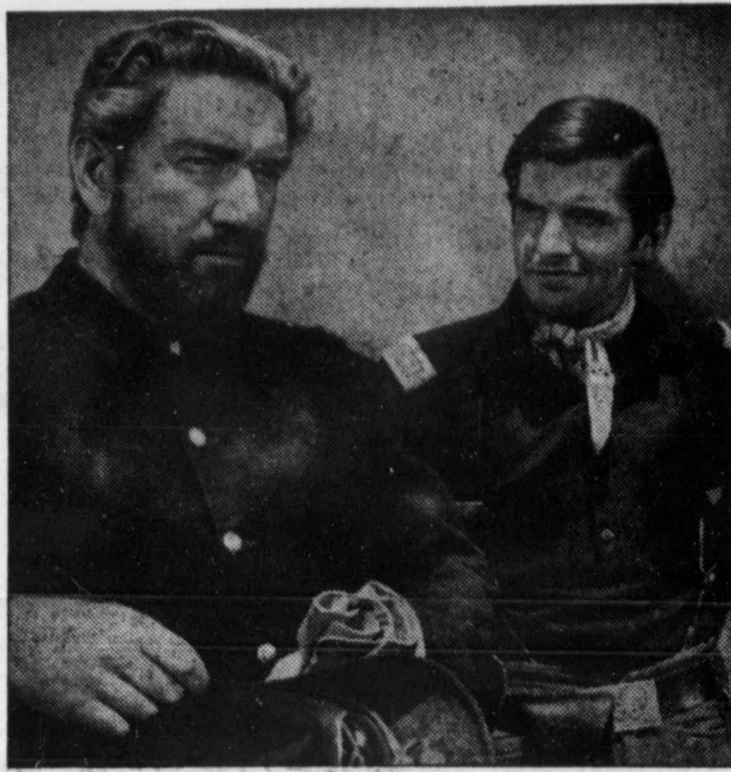

Cooking, baking and festive eating get into high gear in December. It's a month for entertaining lavishly, at times, and informally on many occasions.

Thirteen versatile foods suited to either big dinners or quick snacks are listed on the U. S. Department of Agriculture's December list of plentiful foods. By using them extensively, Texas homemakers can serve tasty, attractive meals that reflect joys of the season, suggests the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A perfect Yuletide trio—turkey, cranberries and broiler-fryers—share top billing on the December list. Also to be available all month in abundance are pork, apples, fresh grapefruit, pecans, honey, almonds, vegetable fats and oils, peanuts and peanut products, pinot beans and rice.

The supply of each exceeds normal needs. Producers, processors and distributors will do everything they can to encourage full use of the abundance. Plentiful foods usually are more economical than items in tight supply.

Take turkeys and broiler-fryers for example. This year's turkey crop of 107 million birds is the largest on record—26 percent more than a year ago. And prices on live turkeys have been at near-record lows. The same is true with

broiler-fryers. Marketings are running 7 percent more than a year ago. Storage holdings in September were 40 percent higher. And prices paid to producers in mid-September hit a record low.

They are: (1) For his own sake. (2) For his children's sake. (3) For the sake of his community and nation. (4) For the sake of the Church itself, which needs his moral and material support. Plan to go to church regularly and read your Bible daily.
