## Texas Lutheran Concert Band Here March 10

Texas Lutheran College concert band, under the direction of M. A. Nyquist, will appear in a concert Saturday, March 10, at the Winters High School Auditorium under the sponsorship of St. John's Lutheran Church.

Time of the concert is 7:30 p.m. The concert in Winters is one of 15 appearances the band will make on its annual tour through West Texas, Oklahoma and Colorado, lasting 10 days.

Nyquist, a transplanted Nebraskan, has been the director of the Texas Lutheran band for five years and has earned an enviable reputation for the fine work he has done at the only senior Lutheran college in the great Southwest.

Prior to coming to Texas Lutheran College, Nyquist was the band director at Huron College in South Dakota. Before that, he spent over 20 years as a band director with public schools in Nebraska and Wyoming.

His degrees are from the University of Wyoming. The easy-going Swede is also well known for his composing, having had over 50 published compositions, arrangements and transcriptions which include band, choral ensemble and instrumental solos.

Nyquist is a firm believer in presenting concerts which appeal to all types of music listeners.

As a result, a varied program is in store for Winters citizens.

Don't be surprised, then, if the band breaks out with a toe-tapping polka—which Nyquist himself composed—or a stirring march, since the TLC director believes in a concert which pleases the young and the old.

## "Knowledge Will Govern and Overcome Ignorance," Teachers Told Monday Night

Ed Kirk, Abilene Christian College assistant professor of education, told Runnels County teachers Monday night that "Knowledge will govern and overcome ignorance and the ability to govern ourselves is the end result of a good substantial public education."

Kirk spoke at the spring banquet for the Runnels County Chapter of the Texas State Teachers Association in the school cafeteria. The talk by Kirk, titled, "Some Battles We Are Losing and How to Win Them," has won a \$500 award from the Freedoms Foundation. The ACC professor said that through public education "We have obtained the knowledge so that we may govern ourselves."

About 185 teachers and their guests from seven area towns and communities attended the banquet Monday night.

## County ASC Office Lists Important Dates For Farmers

The Runnels County office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, USDA, has released a newsletter to farmers of the area listing several dates which are important in the operation of their businesses. W. R. Gray Jr., is office manager of the Runnels County ASCS.

The newsletter pointed out that March 31 is the final date to redeem 1961 grain sorghum and wheat under CCC loan. March 30 is the final date to sign application to participate in the 1962 feed grain program.

March 30, 1962, is the deadline date for several other applications, Gray pointed out in the newsletter. That date is the final date for release of cotton allotments; the final date to make application for premeasured acreage; and final date to make application for premeasured acreage.

Farmers were reminded that they must plant 75 percent of their allotment one out of three years in order to keep their allotment and retain their history acreage. If they do not intend to plant their allotment this year, they are reminded that it is necessary to surrender the allotments in order to be able to retain their history.

April 30 is also important as a "final" date, the newsletter reminded. It is the final date to file application for incentive payment on wool and unshorn lambs; final date to redeem 1961 oat and barley under CCC loan; and final date to secure loan on 1961 cotton.

The ASCS newsletter also listed some information on the "shape of areas for diverted areas." It stated that designated areas under the Wheat Stabilization and Feed Grain Program shall be regular in shape with not more than four sides. These restrictions may be disregarded when a whole field or sub-divisor of the designated diverted acreage or when the field boundary, terrace, permanent field road, or ditch forms the perimeter of the designated diverted acreage.

## WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

### Congress Turned Down Urban Affairs Dep't.

By a decisive majority of 114 votes the House last week put the controversial Presidential move to create a new Department of Urban Affairs. I joined with 18 other Texans in voting against the proposal. Two Texans—Albert Thomas of Houston and Henry Gonzales of San Antonio—voted for it.

Many valid objections were raised to the new agency. Designed to accelerate the flow of federal funds to the cities to be used in solving their housing, transportation, welfare and other local problems, its approval would undoubtedly have been a tough break for the American taxpayers.

A new questionnaire, covering a variety of current issues, is being sent to all residents of the 21st Congressional district. Twenty-four questions are included, ranging from foreign aid to unemployment benefits. Based upon prior experience, it is believed the results of this test will provide a fairly accurate barometer of public opinion in our district, on the issues covered. Your cooperation is earnestly solicited.

The questionnaire technique for finding out what the people are thinking is now employed by many Congressmen and Senators. I initiated the practice in the House several years ago, and others picked it up. The results provide a valuable source of information regarding public interest

and public reaction pending before the tests generate and useful information. It costs me, out of my pocket, close to \$1000 questionnaires each. It is worth every cent of some, to thus encourage affairs of government, suiting benefits.



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

## Voters Get Chance To Meet Candidates For Legislature

Farmers and ranchers in Runnels County will be given the opportunity to meet the candidates running for the Texas Legislature, during a meeting planned for March 15, Hugo Vogelsang, president of the Runnels County Farm Bureau, announced this week.

A "Measure the Candidates" meeting, which will be open to the general public, has been planned for Thursday, March 15, in the office of the Farm Bureau in Ballinger, Vogelsang said. The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. The FB president has urged farmers and ranchers and others interested in the state's political field to attend the meeting.

During the meeting, Vogelsang said, each candidate will be given an opportunity to state his position and opinion on a number of legislative issues. Information on how each candidate stands on each issue will be released to the press, he said.

All of the local and area candidates will be asked to state their positions on taxes, welfare programs, state budget, school problems, right-to-work laws, farm labor and other issues, the farm organization president said. He emphasized that the Farm Bureau

does not endorse any candidate for any political office. Rather, he indicated, the meeting is being held only for the purpose of permitting the voter to learn more about all candidates.

Vogelsang said that "strict ground rules would govern the conduct of the meeting to avoid discriminated against any candidate. A state Farm Bureau field representative will act as moderator for the meeting, and tally clerks or secretaries will be named by the county organization to record the candidates' answers which will later be made public."

Each candidate will be given five minutes to state any personal qualifications, Vogelsang said. The moderator will then direct questions to each candidate, who will be given one minute for answering. Candidates will be given two minutes each for a closing statement.

After specified issues have been considered, the FB president said, the meeting will be open for a brief question and answer session to be participated in by members of the audience.

## Pest Eradication Program Reality, More Work Needed

The program to eradicate the screwworm among Texas livestock is off to a good start, in effect a reality, but its complete success will be dependent upon individual livestock producers accepting their responsibility, County Agent C. T. Parker said this week.

The program is being financed by voluntary contributions by farmers and ranchers, with the money to be spent toward eradication of the screwworm fly. More than \$10,000 has already been contributed by Runnels County stock producers, the county agent said.

At this stage of the program, Parker said, it is "extremely important that producers inspect their animals frequently for possible screwworm cases, and if found, to treat the animal promptly with a recommended chemical." After treatment of the animal, Parker said, producers are asked to "collect ten worms from the wound, put them in either alcohol or water in a small vial, and bring them to the County agent's office." From there the specimens will be sent to the Animal Disease Eradication Laboratory for identification.

mal Disease Eradication Laboratory for identification. If the specimens are worms, field inspectors where they were found further cases. Specimens will be destroyed if we have more.

The county agent stressed the importance of collecting specimens in a suitable case so that properly identified action taken immediately.

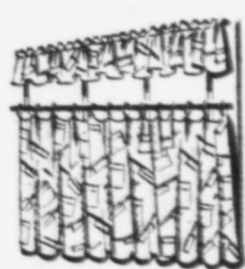
