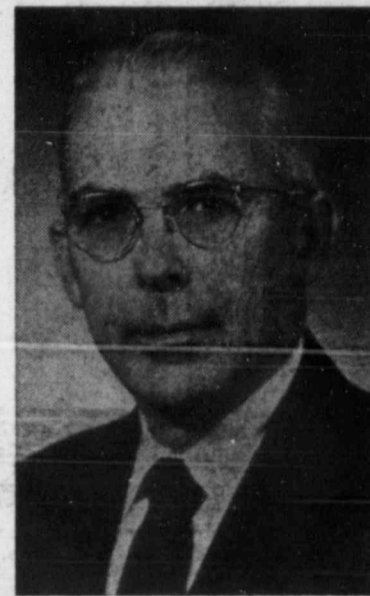
## Clean-Up Drive Ends Saturday

Only two days remain of the annual spring clean-up week in Winters. The week of April 16-21 had been designated by the Winters Chamber of Commerce for clean-up week.

The first three days, Monday through Wednesday, were picked for residents to gather rubbish and place it in accessible places for pick-up by trucks.

Thursday, Friday and Saturday, City and County trucks were scheduled to pick up the trash and haul it to the dump grounds. Residents who have extra large loads of rubbish have been asked to call the Chamber of Commerce or the City Hall so that special arrangements can be made. If trucks fail to pick up accumulated trash, residents are asked to call so that pick-up may be made.

Residents also were reminded by city officials that only authorized persons may unload rubbish and trash at the city dump. Special authorization must be obtained if private citizens wish to haul their own trash to the dump.

## ROGER BABSON SAYS

### Many Companies Shown On Depressed Stocks List; Mergers Are Expected

A book has recently been prepared by Mr. H. G. Olson of my organization, giving charts, earnings, prices, etc., for the common stocks of 100 well-known companies. In view of the high level of the Dow-Jones Industrial Average (up from 265 ten years ago to around 700 today), I have made a partial analysis of these 100 stocks. The book should interest every investor.

#### Railroads And Airlines

Of course the principal railroads are in this list, with the Pennsylvania & New York Central included. No wonder they are trying to merge today as their only salvation. Among the other railroad stocks which have had a hectic record are the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul & Pacific; the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific; the Reading Co.; and the Erie-Lackawanna.

The stocks which have suffered the most are the airplane stocks. Trans-World Airlines, one of the largest, sold at \$80 per share in 1946 and is selling around \$10 today. When we consider the aircraft manufacturers, we find that Douglas Aircraft Co., which I consider one of the best, sold at \$98 in 1956; but sells for less than \$40 today. Eastern Air Lines sold at nearly \$60 in 1955; but sells today at less than half that price.

#### Automobiles And Footwear

Among the active high-grade automobile stocks is that of the Chrysler Corporation, which comes next, in my opinion, to General Motors and Ford as the best three. Chrysler stock has dropped from about \$100 in 1952 and 1955 to around \$50 today. The Ford stock was brought out at about \$70 a share in 1956, but soon slumped below \$40 due to sales by "free riders" looking for a quick profit. Ford climbed above \$90 in 1959; again fell to \$60, but is now near \$100!

Whether or not the increase in automobile riding has raised havoc with the shoe industry, I leave to you readers. The stocks of two large shoe manufacturers—International Shoe Co. and Endicott Johnson Corp.—have had an unfortunate record. The International Shoe stock has dropped from about \$50 to less than \$30; while Endicott Johnson has declined from \$50 to \$20 today. This same trend applies to men's and

women's clothing as shown by the record of Bond Stores, Inc.—and to floor covering companies such as Congoleum-Nairn.

#### Farm and Other Machinery Stocks

I am sorry to see that J. I. Case's stock has declined from nearly \$40 in 1951 to less than \$10 today. It has paid no dividends since 1955 but manufactures a full line of good farm and earth-moving machinery. With the farmers prosperous and the great roadbuilding campaign ahead, it seems to me this company should do better or else change its management. I think it is now taking needed action. Let us hope so.

Another machine company which is being honestly operated, at Waterbury, Conn., is the Scovill Manufacturing Co. The stock of this company sold at nearly \$50 per share in 1945-46; has had "downs and ups" since then and now sells at about \$25 per share. The Rheem Manufacturing Co.'s stock sold at \$45 in 1953, dropped to \$10 in 1957, and now sells around \$15. Foote Mineral's stock sold at \$60 in 1957 and now sells around \$20 per share. I have faith in this company.

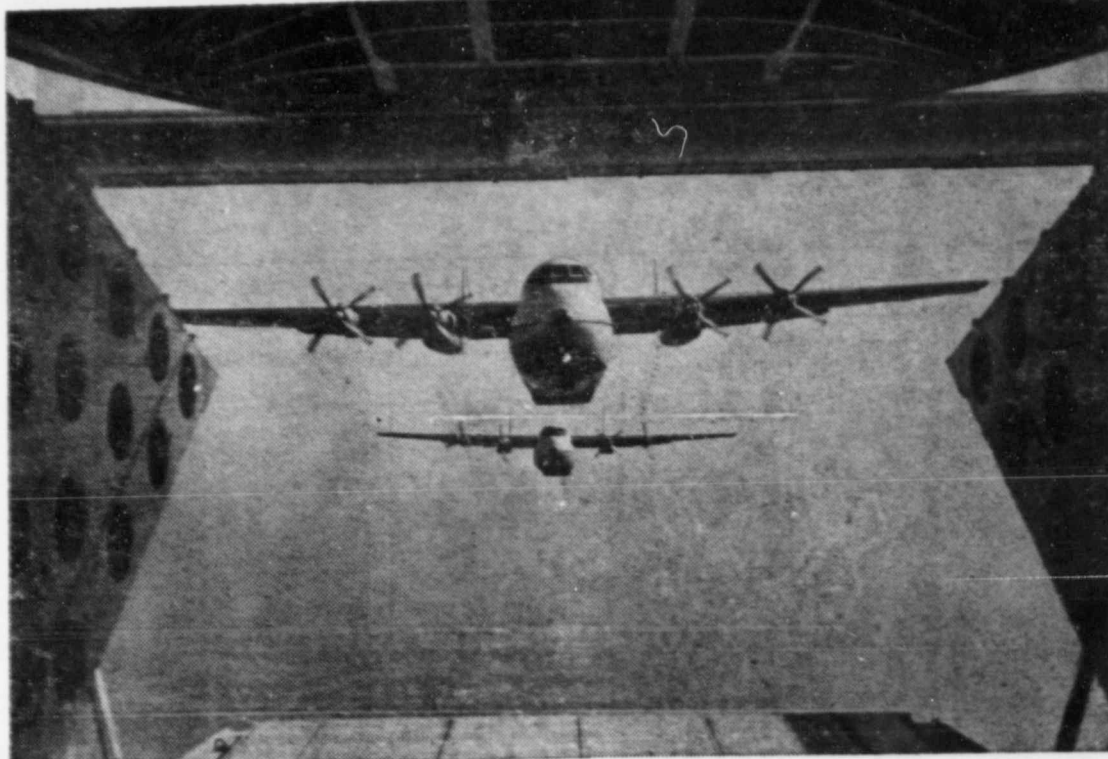
#### New Mining Companies

One of the most interesting mining stocks is that of the U. S. Smelting, Refining, & Mining Co. This sold at over \$80 per share in 1946 and again in 1952. It has sold at \$40 or lower since 1957. New Jersey Zinc sold at over \$80 per share in 1951 but now sells for less than half this. Island Creek Coal sold at over \$50 per share in 1956 and now sells for about one half this. Hudson Bay Mining & Smelting sold around \$100 in 1956; now sells for \$55. Consolidated Mining & Smelting showed a similar trend. Most of the steel companies are doing well; but the stock of the Pittsburgh Steel Co., which sold above \$35 in 1956-57 has recently sold at \$10.

#### Merchandising Stocks

Of all these stocks Montgomery Ward shows one of the widest fluctuations. It sold at \$50 per share in 1946; then declined to \$25 in 1948, again hit a high of over \$50 per share in 1955 and 1959; but is now again about \$35. Of the variety stores, S. S. Kresge Co., operating nearly 800 stores, sold at \$45 in 1950 and is now selling around \$30. Let me close by saying that the stock of the United Fruit Co. sold above \$70 in 1951; is now about \$25.

In the above review I have mentioned only about twenty-five or so of the one hundred depressed stocks which Mr. Olson has selected. Of the remaining issues, there are many which are probably more attractive than those described above. An investor should study all in order to realize these two facts: (1) Just because the Dow-Jones Average has been going up almost constantly during the past ten years, this does not mean that all stocks have been going up in price. (2) There must be some great bargains in the popular listed stocks which have money-making possibilities for those who will search for them.

#### Arouse 'Em With Noise

In hot weather when the big bass are too lazy to rise to your lures, try buzzing over the good spots in your motor boat for 10 or 15 minutes to "wake" 'em up and start 'em moving about. This often works.

#### To Keep Line Out of Prop

Fishing lines often foul in the propeller's blade or the shaft when you're trolling.

Do away with this aggravation by running the motor in reverse and trolling with the line trailing over the bow of the boat.

#### When Crickets Begin To Die

Hot weather often takes the life out of live crickets.

Whip this dilemma by once in a while dipping the sack or bucket over the side of the boat for a moment.

Drain off the water, and you will find the crickets take on new life.

#### Keep Worms From Drying Out

Hot sun is hard on fishing worms. Keep them from drying out by placing a piece of wet sponge rubber in the top of the can, over the dirt.

Sponge is easy to remove to rebait, but it keeps the dirt and worms cool and moist.

#### Winter Tip On Worm Care

Instead of using can containers for worms when fishing on a cold winter day, try putting dirt and worms in a plastic bag of the sort used to wrap food products. You will find this keeps the worms warm and squirming.

#### Fresh Butter In Camp

Butter can be a problem in camp. Refrigeration isn't always possible. To keep butter fresh without refrigeration place butter in a glass jar with a strong solution of salt brine, then tighten the lid. Butter will keep fresh and sweet until used.

#### Camp Fire Deflector

To deflect campfire heat in the direction of your choosing, cover a large cooking grill with aluminum foil and use it as a reflector. This also will direct heat from the campfire into the tent opening when added warmth is needed at night.

#### Pencils For Fly Fishermen

A smart fly fisherman will carry a pencil stub in his tackle box at all times.

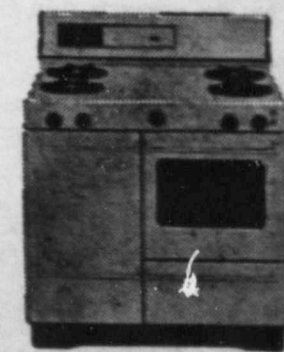

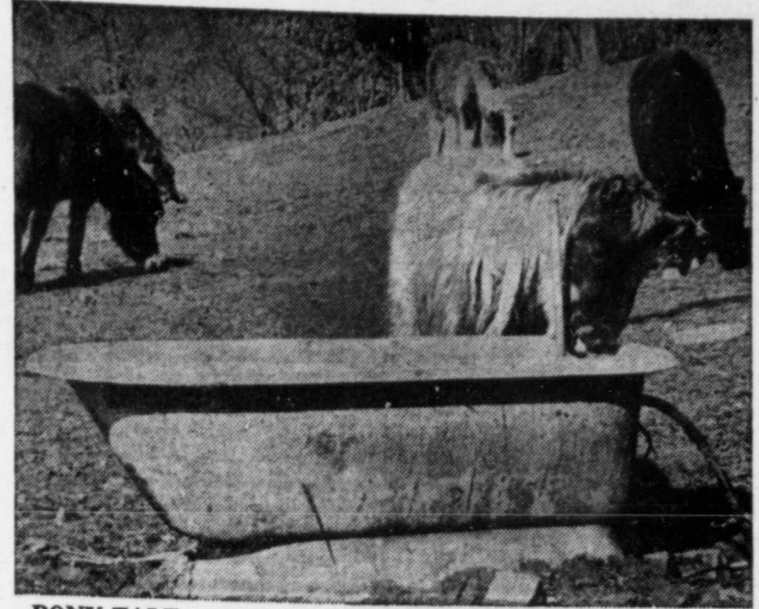

**Good Minnow Holders**  
When wade fishing you can make good use of your wife's old nylon stockings. They make great minnow holders.

Fasten the sock to your waders and cut a hole near the top of the stockings so you can reach in after the bait.

**Prevent Boat From Corroding**  
When you take your boat out of the water, for storage, turn it bottom side up and clean it thoroughly.

Let the boat dry, then sponge a wet coat of liquid floor wax over it to prevent darkening and corrosion.

**To Remove Spark Plugs**  
You probably know the trick of opening stubborn jars by heating the top.

Try the reverse when spark plugs in your outboard motor stick and can't be removed.

Fashion a cone of tough paper around the plug—small end snug around the bottom. Then fill the cone with cracked ice.

Ice will contract the metal just enough so that plug can easily be unscrewed, thus preventing damaged cylinder head.

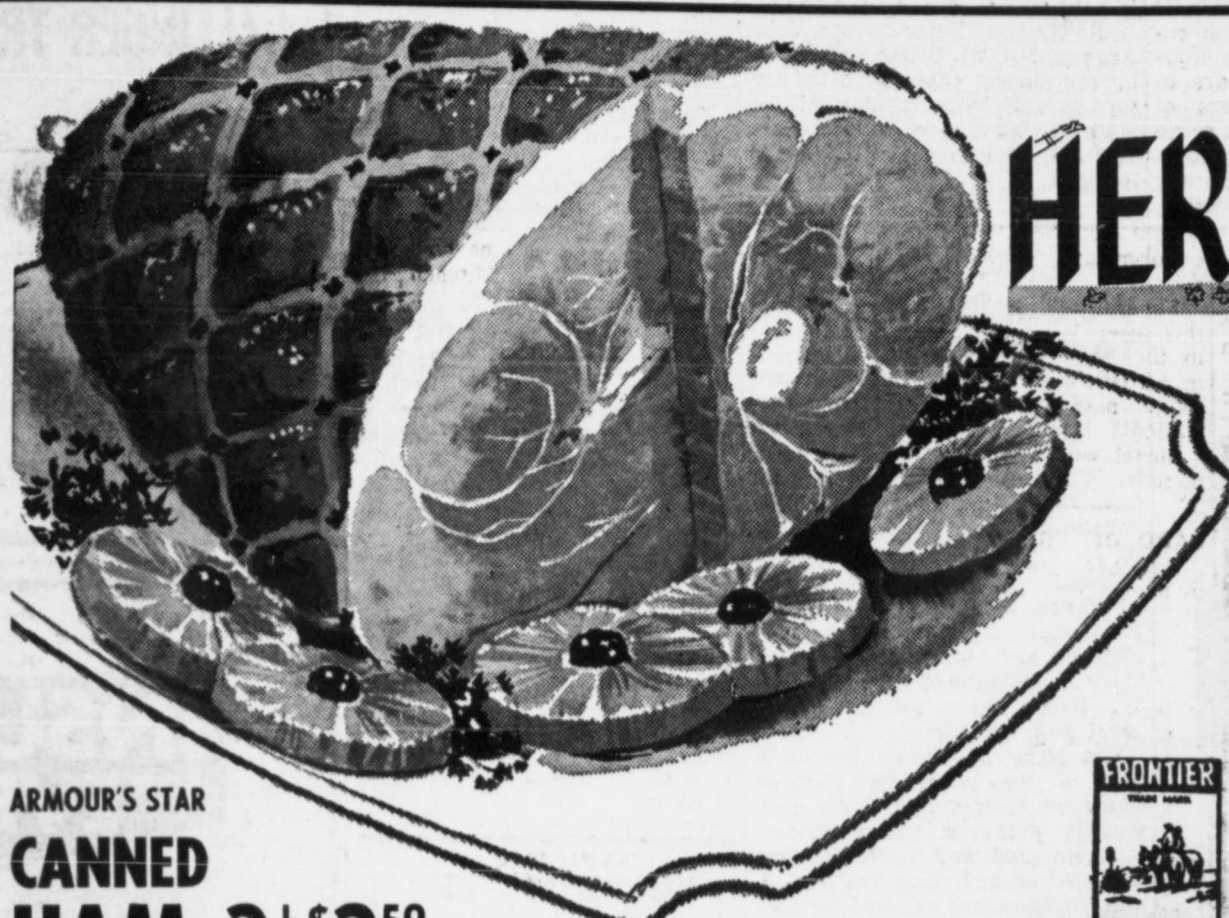

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**Fishing School Integration**  
Black and white crappie often are found in integrated schools. Some anglers contend that they do not school together. However, black and white crappie are rather difficult to tell apart. Also they take the same lures—small spinners, fly combos, etc.

Best method of taking both varieties is still fishing with cork, line and hook, using either worms or minnows as bait. Use number 3, 5, or 6 hook and fish near the bottom.

Count the dorsal spines on your catch to determine black from white. The white crappie has six; the black crappie has seven.

The more you know, the more you can make it, the more you can do for them.

Candidates Will Have Big At Austin: Where To Park?

COLLEGE FUNDS SHORT

Presidents and business managers of Texas' 19 state-supported colleges and universities were stunned this week when Texas Commission on Higher Education reported they will get only 54 per cent of the funds they requested...

Administrators had set their future needs at \$2,770,951. But the Legislature only appropriated \$1,500,000 to supplement teaching salaries for enrollment increases.

Dr. F. L. McDonald, president of Lamar State College of Technology in Beaumont, didn't take the news quietly. "This is one of the reasons why we are never able to raise salaries," he protested.

While the 19 presidents are trying to balance their budgets, Commission on Higher Education will be studying requests from three more colleges which want to join the state system: Odessa, San Antonio and Laredo junior colleges.

NEW SHELL GAME

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler predicts that Texas never will yield control over any part of Padre Island to the federal government.

He said the U. S. Senate did not approve a park, but a "National Seashore Area."

"This status," says Sadler, "would keep Padre Island and Laguna Madre in an undeveloped state."

Sadler urged Attorney General Will Wilson to push recovery of Laguna Madre acreage from private owners before they convey their rights to the U. S. Department of the Interior.

Meanwhile, U. S. Congressman Joe Kilgore of McAllen said the House National Parks Subcommittee will make an on-the-ground survey of the island from May 11 through May 13.

READING PUBLIC GROWS

Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, State librarian, announced an increase of 13 public libraries in Texas and more than a quarter of a million books on library shelves throughout the state.

He said library service has improved to the point where there are now 106 branch libraries, in comparison to 97 in 1960. More than \$4,400,000 was spent for library service Division of the Texas State Library.

But many of the achievements can be claimed by communities—like Taylor, Rockdale, Navasota, and Alvin—where citizens get out and raise the money for library building funds.

HIGHEST HIGHWAY LETTING SET

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said the highway department's April bid letting will be the biggest this year. Low bids are expected to total some \$28,600,000.

The April 24-25 letting will involve 952 miles of Texas highways and cover contracts for 422 miles of U. S. and State highways; 148 miles of farm-to-market roads and 382 miles of seal-coat work.

"We are leading the nation in miles of interstate, primary and secondary highways," Greer stated, "and we want to keep that lead."

Cobwebs, dirt and trash should be removed from around lights or switches, especially in hay barns, cribs and feed rooms. Heat from bulbs can set off an explosion or cause fire where dust or cobwebs accumulate.

You should also replace faulty-wall switches or convenient outlets that have bad contacts or do not work properly, continues Allen. Repair frayed or damaged cords on any portable equipment such as irons, heaters, lamps or small appliances, and replace outside wires that have lost their insulation.

Make sure that no clothes line poles, antennas or other such pos-

sible contacts can be made with your system of wires around the farmstead. Allen points out that the appearance and safety of the farm is vastly improved by a neat outside electrical distribution system.

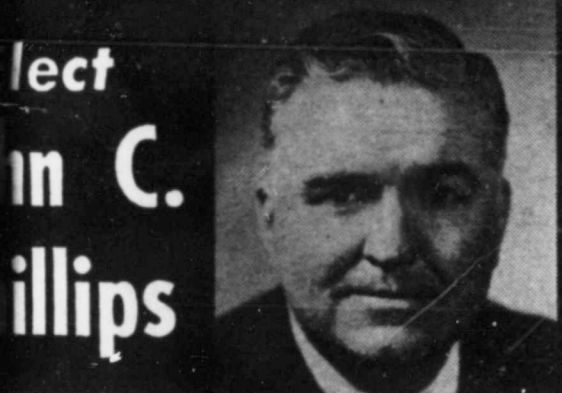
