## Public Hearing Set On Colorado River Basin Area

A public hearing has been scheduled in the district courtroom in Ballinger for Tuesday, May 22, to study the problems and needs of the Colorado River Basin.

The District Engineer, U. S. Army Engineer Corps, has been directed to prepare a comprehensive review of reports on the Colorado River and tributaries in order to develop a multiple-purpose plan of improvement in the area. It is contemplated that the presentations at the hearing will be largely confined to discussions of the needs of local interests, it was announced. The region to be studied encompasses all areas tributary to the Colorado River at and above Austin.

All interested parties have been invited to be present at the hearing, and will be given opportunity to express their views concerning the character and extent of improvements desired and the need and advisability of carrying out those improvements.

Interested parties are urged to prepare and present all possible factual material and supporting data concerning plans of improvements desired. Army Engineers said. Factual data which will strongly affect conclusions resulting from a study of this nature include specific information concerning flood damages and flood heights and frequency with which such damage is sustained; specific material concerning benefits attributable to protection from floods; information about the present development of water resources in the area; data demonstrating the need for additional water supply and other water control features; and the effect of the desired improvements on recreation, fish and wildlife conservation, and upon the general economy of the area, is invited.

It was pointed out that statements will be made of accuracy of records, facts and arguments submitted in writing.

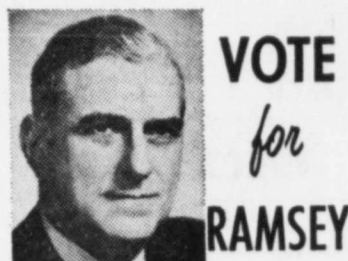
### Airman J. H. Bryan To Newfoundland

### Communist Cuba Poses Threat To United States

Fidel Castro's latest defiance of civilized decency was his ransom demand for the release of the 1176 men captured last April 17 at the Bay of Pigs. Castro has conducted a propaganda trial and sentenced each of the patriots to 30 years at hard labor. But if \$62 million can be raised, the prisoners will be exchanged for that amount.

Here is a brand of trafficking in human beings that belongs to the dark ages. The incident serves to remind us that Castro is after all nothing but a common bandit. This Havana tyrant was let out of prison within 15 months after he had sought to overthrow the Batista regime. But now, with the shoe on the other foot, he metes out 30-year sentences to rebel patriots, and then seeks to extort money for their liberation.

If the United Nations is interested in such repulsive conduct, then here would be a chance for it to at least condemn such debauchery, and let the world know that the UN is interested in human rights and does not condone international banditry. UN silence in the face of such conduct is another evidence of its weakness and ineptness.

Then the cricket begins to relate the wonderful adventures of "Pinocchio." However, as the story begins to unfold, the narration drops, and the audience sees the story as it really happened. Then, from time to time, Mr. Jiminy Cricket picks up his narration and the film ends as it begins—with Jiminy. He is now admiring his new 18 karat gold badge which reads, "Official Conscience."

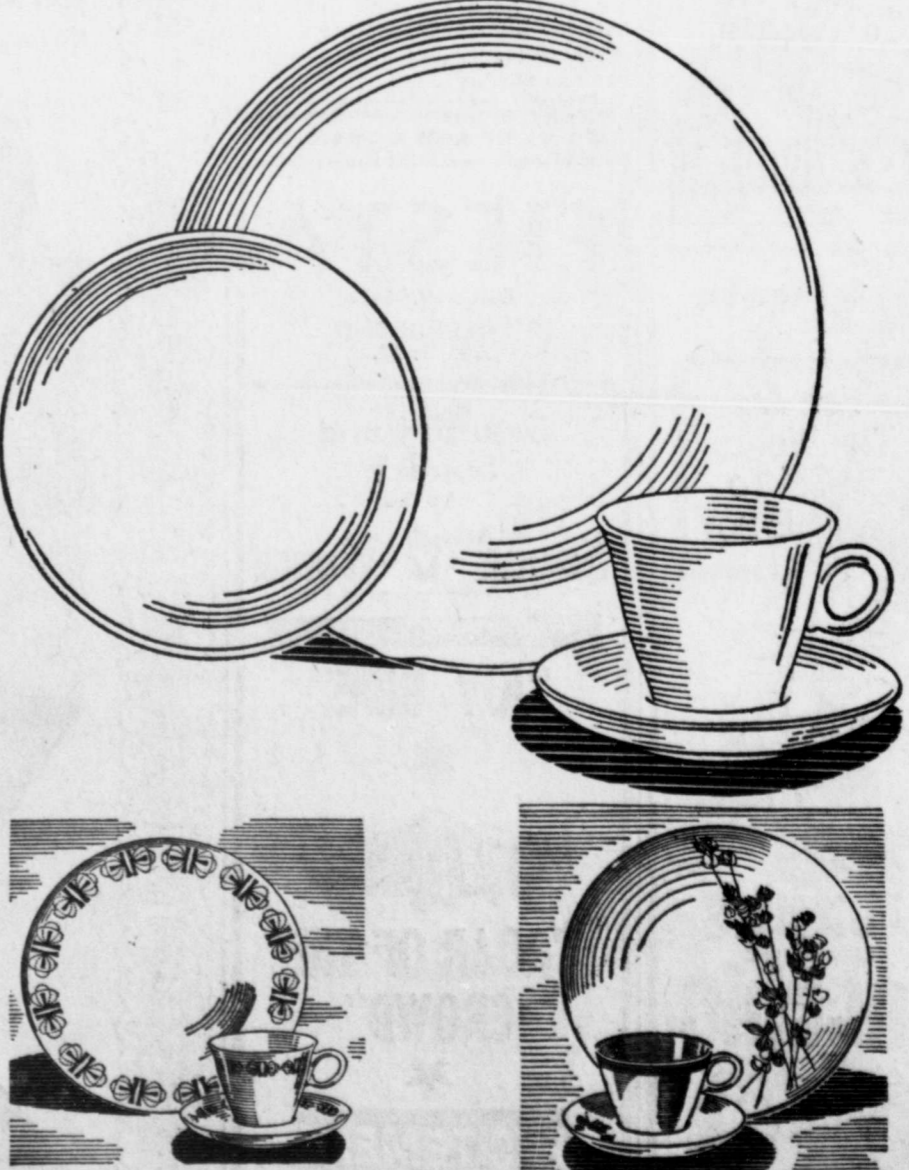

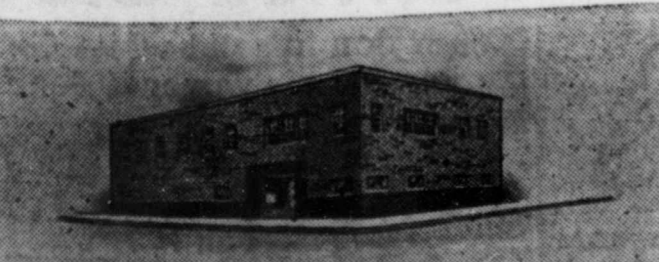

### Imported Birds Being Studied In Lamar County

Some 400 French redlegged partridges have been released in the prairie grass and meadows of Lamar County in recent weeks, according to W. J. Cutbirth, Jr., assistant executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

This is a European import, native to France, and the birds have been successfully transplanted to England. Brood stock was obtained from England about four years ago, through the cooperation and recommendation of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The purpose of the releases is to make a study of the exotic game bird, to determine if it is adaptable to the Texas environment, and if it will be a suitable game bird. The release site in Lamar County was selected because con-

ditions appear to be the native habitat in England. To date, 700 have been released in the area.

The redlegged partridge is a game bird which is reported to eat a variety of green foods, and range with a minimum cover, they are not to be fed directly with available food.

A check of the birds remained within the limited number of birds raised at the farm for this study, them will be available for release until such study has accomplished its purpose.
