More Streets May Be Paved In Near Future

Several blocks of Winters streets which presently are dirt and gravel may be paved within the near future, if enough property owners agree to such action.

A group of residents appeared before the City Council in its regular meeting Tuesday night to re-

quest information on starting a paving project in their respective neighborhoods. Spokesman for the group, representing property owners on Cryer Street, said they had talked to several residents in their section of town and in most instances agreed to go along with such a project.

On new paving projects, property owners pay the costs of paving the streets, and the City pays the costs of paving the intersections.

Representatives of the Cryer Street group said it was understood there was some interest among property owners on Vancil Street regarding a paving project in that section of town.

It had been expected that a representative of a street paving company would be on hand for Tuesday night's meeting to answer questions and quote costs, but he did not attend. Mayor Harvey D. Jones told the citizens group that the City would contact the company immediately and that a special meeting would be called to enable property owners to get cost information. It was understood that if a paving project is started that costs would be lowered substantially in proportion to the number of blocks which might be paved.

Mayor Jones told the property owner group that the City will cooperate "to the fullest extent," and urged them to make further contacts and to push for a street paving project in their neighborhoods.

In line with the possible street paving project, the City Council is studying plans to start a street improvement campaign. Plans will be to begin extensive repairs of streets which are badly in need of repair, and continue the project "as far as the money goes this year." It was explained that such a project would of necessity be a long-term affair, and that all repair work which is needed at the present time would not be done this year. Councilmen pointed out that the first work would have to be done on the streets which are in the poorest state of repair, and that some blocks would have to be skipped until a later date.

The City Council also announced Tuesday night that a water line will be laid to Westview Cemetery. This is made possible, the council said, by the recent installation of a water line to the feed lot operation west of the city. Work will begin on the cemetery line as soon as possible, it was announced.

Council also announced that another employee would be hired for the Municipal Light Plant. For several months, it was reported, three employees have been working seven days a week, taking time off only when one of them works a double shift. Plans are to employ a man who would work part time in the power plant, and part time on the distribution system.

The City Council also instructed the police department to issue warrants for arrest of those persons who have ignored traffic tickets which have been issued and have also ignored warning citations. This should not be termed a "crack-down," city officials said, but merely action to serve notice on those few who would ignore traffic and parking laws within the city. The Police Department said that they have issued tickets and citations to several persons who have refused to acknowledge them in any way.

Since returning from Italy, Hecker has preached in Denver City, and is presently working with the Central Church of Christ in Pasadena.

City Council Accepts For Study Second Rate Raise Proposal By Phone Company

The Winters City Council last Thursday night accepted for study a second proposal made by officials of the Southwestern States Telephone Co. for a general increase of telephone rates in Winters.

The first proposal made by the company for an increase was turned down by the City Council, and the company asked to meet with the Winters body to discuss the propositions.

This was the first meeting of the Council with telephone company representatives for the purposes of discussing the rates. The company had previously met with the Council, but only for the presentation of the request for the rate increase, to be studied by the city officials.

Representing the telephone company at Thursday night's meeting were A. J. Lacy, manager of the Brownwood district, Mr. Allen, Mr. Fields, and J. E. Johnson, general attorney for the company.

The first proposal made by the company would have increased the rates on some classes of service as much as 37.5 percent, it was reported. They asked for an increase to \$11.00 per month for a business, one party telephone. The present rate is \$8.00 per month.

Other classes of service would have been increased proportionately, under the first request.

After a long discussion last Thursday night, the telephone company made a second proposal. Their second proposal suggested a base rate of \$10.00 for the business, one party, class, and \$1.25 per extension for a residence extension. Present rate for such an extension is \$1.00; first proposal was for \$1.15.
