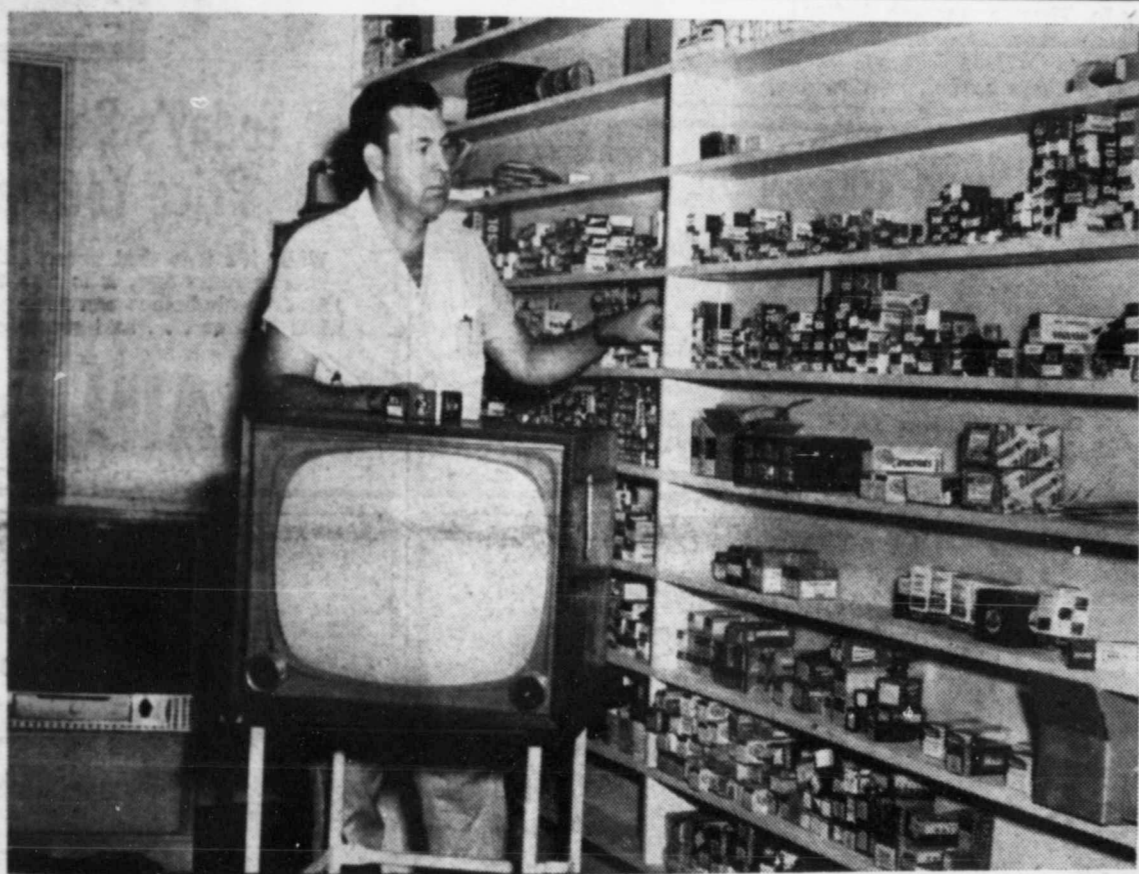

Winters Firemen Attend School At A. and M.

Three members of the Winters Volunteer Fire Department attended the 33rd annual Texas Firemen's Training School on the Texas A. and M. College campus from July 21 through the 27th.

Marvin Bedford, chief of the Winters department, attended the Advanced Fire Marshal course; Bobby Hatcher, Basic Fire Fighting course; and W. D. Waggoner, Fireman Instructor course.

Texas towns sending firemen to the school receive key rate credit for those participating firemen. Towns having one qualified fireman (not fire marshal) to complete the work receive 3 percent credit; one fireman and the fire marshal or officially appointed assistant fire marshal, 4 percent; and two or more firemen and fire marshal, 5 percent. Reduced fire losses through use of efficient firefighting methods is an even greater benefit gained from the school, the chief of the training program, said. The program is conducted by the Engineering Extension Service, Texas A. and M. College.

More than 1,700 firemen from 20 states representing municipalities, industries and armed services in about 450 cities, attended the course.

Included in the courses offered were Peacetime Radiation Hazards, which was added to the list this year. Also, courses include basic firefighting, advanced firefighting, firemen instructor training, fire department officer training, fire department pump maintenance, fire department pump operations, industrial fire protection, Armed Services fire protection, specialized fire courses and the fire marshal courses.

In the fire marshal courses, highly trained specialists in the field of fire engineering instructed in such topics as burning characteristics of materials, evaluating performance of construction materials, atomic weapons and fire, human relations for supervision and many other subjects related to fire prevention and control.

Liquefied petroleum gas dealers had top LPG officials on hand to conduct specialized training in supervisory developments, driving emergency vehicles, LPG licensing regulations, and technical discussions of recent LPG fires and accidents.

Main Radio Will Hold Formal Opening Today

Main Radio-Television will hold their Grand Opening and open house in their new quarters on West Dale today (Friday), from 2 until 5 p.m. The business recently completed the move from their Main Street location to the new place on Dale.

Features of the afternoon open house will be refreshments for all visitors, and at 5 o'clock, a drawing will be held, at which time

a 19-inch portable television set will be given away. No purchase is necessary, registration is the only requirement to be eligible for the prize, it was announced.

The new home for Main Radio-TV is in the building formerly occupied by Farm Supply, in the 100 block of West Dale. The building has been completely remodeled, with a new glass front and natural wood trim. Inside, the ceiling has been lowered, covering up the old mezzanine. A partition was built across the main floor, toward the back. The rear area of the building will be used for service and storage. The mezzanine will be used for storage.

A radio and television repair department has been built in the rear right hand corner of the main display floor. Here are performed the maintenance and repair of radios, television sets; in this section, also is shelved one of the biggest stocks of electronic parts in this area.

The entire building is air conditioned. In the area reserved for radio-record players, television sets and high fidelity and stereophonic record players, the floor has been covered with deep carpet. Merchandise has been placed in a pleasing, eye-arresting arrangement.

Small appliances are displayed on shelves and on island in the center of the floor.

White appliances — refrigerators, freezers, washers, dryers and electric ranges are displayed and conveniently located on the west side of the show floor.

Ralph and Raymond Lloyd, owners of Main Radio-TV, said the need for more room to properly display their merchandise, and the requirement for larger stocks of merchandise, necessitated the move to the new location. The new building affords more than four times the floor space available at the old location on Main Street, and the maintenance and service department is much larger and roomier than previously.

Jimmy Jones is the technician in the television and radio service department. Kenneth O'Dell is in sales and service, and Floyd Allen is in the washer service department. Kathy Shaw has been working on the sales floor and in the office during the summer months.

The service departments offer service for all makes and models of radios, television and record players.

Main Radio-TV is the local franchised outlet for Zenith radios, television, and stereophonic record players. They also handle the GE line of washers, dryers, refrigerators, freezers, electric ranges and other appliances.

This move is the third for the business, which was first started in the rear of the Main Drug Co. in a building on the west side of Main Street in 1935. The Lloyd brothers also own the Main Drug Co.

In 1940, the drug store was moved to its present location on the east side of Main Street, cornering on East Dale. The radio department also was moved at that time. In 1945, the radio department was separated entirely from the drug store, and moved to the building it has since occupied on South Main. The advent of television caused much change in the operation of the business, and finally, a move to more favorable and roomier quarters was necessitated.

Homecoming Set For Sunday, Aug. 5, At Wingate School

An estimated 500 ex-students, present students, and their families, are expected to attend the second homecoming of the Wingate Independent School district, Sunday, Aug. 5.

The Wingate school had its beginning in the fall of 1891, when the first building was built.

The one-day get-together will begin with registration at 11 a.m., followed with the noon meal at 12:30. The afternoon program will get underway in the school auditorium at 2:30 with a sing-song.

Principal speaker of the day will be Ernest Caskey, superintendent of schools at Ballinger, who along with Mrs. Caskey, were former teachers at Wingate.

A reading of the school's history, recognition of past and present teachers, and school board members, will be included in the afternoon program. Also, the oldest and youngest students and ex-students will be recognized, with special recognition to the largest class in attendance.

Election of officers for the coming year will conclude the day's activities.

Families attending are requested to bring only their choice of desert, salad, or vegetable plates, or potato chips, for the noon meal.

A small charge will be made for the barbecue which will be served. The rest of the noon menu will be furnished by the school, it was announced.

Harvest of Milo Will Begin In Week or Ten Days

Although a few loads of milo from the 1962 crop have been brought in to Winters elevators, the big harvest season will not get underway for another week or ten days.

Local elevators have received upwards of four carloads thus far, but most cuttings have been for tests on moisture and ripeness. Rains of a week ago postponed to some extent entry into the grain fields; however, most of the milo was not ready for the combine, rain or no rain. With a few days of sunshine, and a little more time, the grain should mature rapidly.

According to informed sources, production of grain per acre in this area should exceed that of last year. Cutback in number of acres planted to milo will hold volume production lower, it was thought. This should be one of the best years for milo, quality wise, according to some.

Coaches Will Go To Coaching School in Lubbock

Members of the Winters High School coaching staff will attend a coaching school in Lubbock next week, according to L. G. Wilson, head coach. This is an annual affair, preceding the high school football season each fall.

Coaches from high schools all over the State will be in attendance, and will hear talks by several outstanding coaches and high school sports leaders. They also will witness an all-star basketball game Friday night, and an all-star football game Saturday night. All-star teams are made up of outstanding players from high schools in the State.

Attending the coaches school from Winters will be Wilson, Robert James and Jerry English.

Work Never Ceases For Summer Holidays At Winters' School District Plant

Although students and teachers receive a three-months holiday during the summer, activities never cease at Winters schools. In fact, the tempo of maintenance, repair, construction and planning, increases with the closing of the doors for the summer.

The three summer holiday months are the only time when major repair and maintenance work can be done on the school plant. Floors in all buildings are refinished, desks repaired, buildings and rooms painted.

In addition, many windows in the high school building are being replaced this summer. This project was begun last summer, and will be completed this year, it was said. All windows in the building are being replaced with steel frames.

Inside of the Alder Elementary School received a new coat of paint this summer, along with other repair and maintenance work. Also, new bleachers have been built at the football stadium this

summer. Seating capacity on the east side of the field has been increased by about 360 seats. The new bleachers were built onto each end of the old bleacher construction, with ramps dividing the new sections from the old. No additional seats were installed on the west—or visitors'—side of the field.

The reserve seat section in the east bleachers has been enlarged, also. About 150 additional reserved seats will be available for the first time this year. All reserved seats will be between the 40-yard lines, it was announced.

All the old bleacher section has been repainted this summer, with other repair work done. A new public address system is being installed, and there will be two speakers for the east stands, and one speaker for the west stands.

Johnny Bob Smith, business manager for the Winters schools, said that the entire school plant will be ready for the start of the 1962-63 school year early in September.

Football Prospects To Receive Physical Exams August 17th

L. G. Wilson, head of the coaching staff of Winters High School, announced this week that prospective members of the 1962 football teams will receive physical examinations on Friday, Aug. 17.

All boys who will attend Winters High School this year, and expect to play football, are asked to meet at the field house at 6:30 p.m. Aug. 17 to take the examinations.

Included in the physical examinations will be prospective members of the A, B and Freshman football teams, Wilson said.

The annual summer football camp will begin Monday, Aug. 20, Wilson said. The camp this year will be only a day camp, with two workouts each day. Team members will not sleep at the field, as has been the practice in some past seasons, but will take their noon meals at the cafeteria.

Two pre-season scrimmages have been scheduled for the second week of the football camp. Names of schools which will participate in these scrimmages have not been announced.

Water Over Dam At Winters Lake

Heavy rains last week in the watershed area feeding the Winters City Lake filled the lake to capacity, and sent water over the spillway.

Prior to last week's rains, W. D. Waggoner, city water superintendent, said that there was enough water in the lake to last "at least until the first of the year."

The additional catch of water will add many more month's supply, it was noted.

More Cattle Are Moved Into Local Feeding Pens

During the past two weeks many more cattle have been moved into the new feeding pens of Commercial Feeders, Inc., located west of Winters.

By Tuesday of this week, more than 300 head of feeder cattle had been put on feed in the pens, and additional numbers are expected within the next few days.

Construction of feeding pen facilities is progressing, and as pens are made ready and available, cattle are brought in. Workmen are this week installing scale facilities at the pens.

Plans, according to Raymond Walston, operator of the pens and president of the corporation, call for facilities to handle several thousand head of cattle on feed.

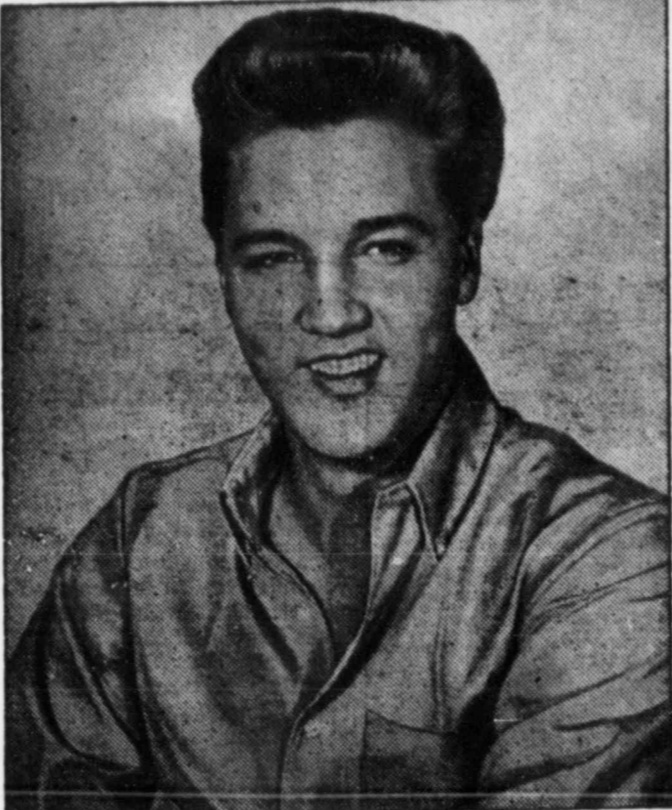

"It Happened In Athens"
Although a true-life story of "epic" heroism would typically receive a heavy "dramatic" motion picture treatment, such is not the case with 20th Century-Fox's upcoming "It Happened In Athens," scheduled to show Thursday, Friday and Saturday at the Fiesta Drive-In Theatre.

The CinemaScope-DeLuxe Color comedy-adventure, which stars Jayne Mansfield, Trax Colton, Nico Minardos, Maria Xenia and Bob Mathias, describes with light-hearted candor—and a refreshingly uninhibited sense of fun—the dramatic rise-to-fame of the first modern-day hero of the Olympic Games.

porarily suffer, even though they will ultimately rebound. Mutual funds in the long run must go up and down as the general market goes up and down. If we are now in a bear market, mutual funds will decline in price also. It therefore is important when buying new mutual funds in a bear market to be sure that the price is adjusted to the Dow-Jones Average.

Importance of Careful Selection

In a bear market it is very difficult to select stocks for both profit and income,—and especially for profit. On the other hand, any sound, long-established investment advisory service should be able to select good stocks which will pay 5 percent-6 per cent. Stocks which would fit this category are the equities of the big transcontinental railroads such as the Union Pacific, the Northern Pacific, the Canadian Pacific, the Southern Pacific, and the Atchison.

If an investor wants to be ultra-conservative, he might divide his money amongst these five railroads. He would then be able to secure safety with a good yield. Some readers will say to themselves that they want no railroad securities. But, these railroads own valuable oil and mineral assets which go a long way toward paying their dividends irrespective of the railroad's traffic. Certainly, they can all give up their passenger business and be an attractive investment.

Many of the tornado and underground vegetable cellars in Texas can be made into good fallout shelters, says W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer.

Storm Cellars Can Be Converted To Fallout Shelters

However, there are several points that must be kept in mind when remodeling these shelters to provide adequate fallout protection. They are: (a) adequate shielding, (b) a protected entrance, (c) positive ventilation, (d) storage facilities for supplies, (e) and installation of a radio antenna for radio reception.

The most economical means of providing the additional shielding needed is with a layer of soil to a depth of about 3 feet over the entire cellar roof. Most cellars will require additional reinforcing in roof in order to hold this extra weight. A steel reinforced, six inch thick concrete slab cast over the soil cover. A local contractor can tell you the amount of steel necessary for your situation, but for most cellars 1-2 inch steel bars laid on 12 inch centers in both directions will be sufficient.

A right angle entrance into the cellar, essential to protection from fallout, may be made by building a partial wall inside the existing cellar. If the cellar is not large enough to permit this wall inside, then a new entrance should be constructed with the necessary right angle in it.

A mechanical blower should be installed to provide positive air exhaust in time of disaster, and an inlet and outlet vent provided. The blower should provide a minimum of 5 cubic feet per minute per person. A filter is not necessary for the average home shelter. There should be enough shelves and storage space to hold the recommended amount of supplies and a radio antenna should be installed to receive CONELRAD broadcasts. Be sure that your battery powered radio will work in the shelter and will connect to the antenna.

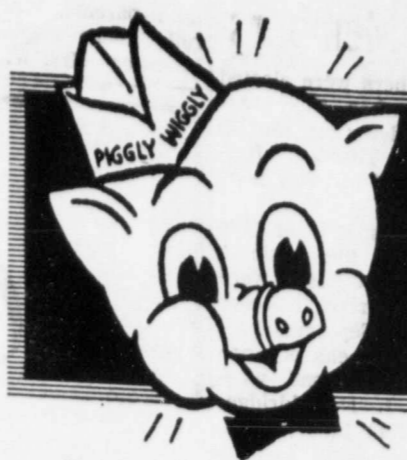

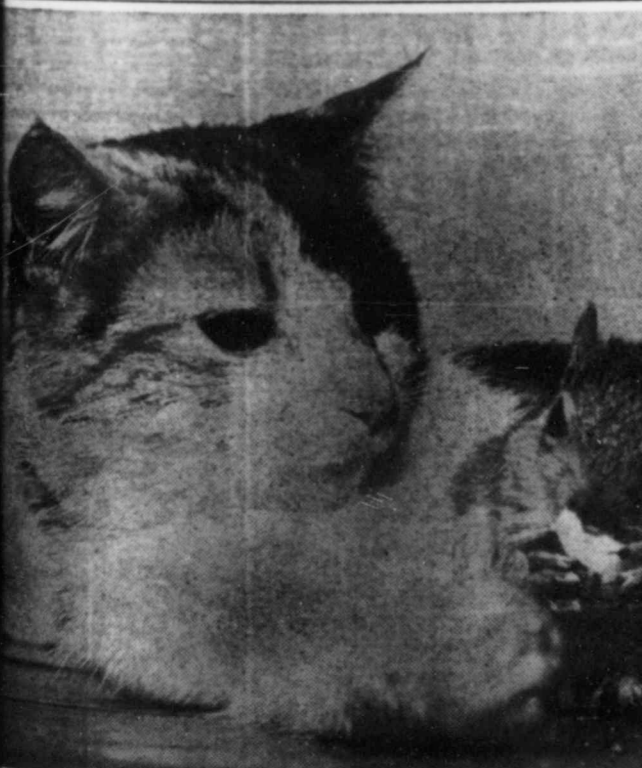

IT'S THE LAW—IN TEXAS

Jury duty is an experience everybody ought to have.

In a criminal case twelve jurors have a duty to do justice as each one sees it, and yet be unanimous. In most trials both sides have much to say, and the evidence is conflicting. The twelve jurors vary in their ability, temperament, character, education, and their experience in the world, and in the question at stake.

Yet a jury made up of both sexes, with wide age and educational differences, jobs and origins must all come up with the same verdict. Upon their verdict much depends—the life or liberty of others, and the public good. So it may take them days of talking among themselves, all to agree.

Jury duty calls for insight, common sense, courage, tact, fairness, patience, (especially toward the jurors who disagree with you), good humor, tolerance, balance, willingness to hear others out and change one's mind, readiness to go over and over the facts to find something to bring agreement. In short, jury duty demands a "decent respect to the opinions" of others.

More and more women share civic duties, especially as jurors. Time was in Texas when women could not serve on juries. They still cannot in four states. A jury finds facts. It hears and weighs evidence and then comes to a verdict. It does not make the law—the legislature does; and the judge "charges" or instructs the jury concerning the law applicable to the particular case it is considering.

The judge will tell you not to find the accused guilty until he is proved so under strict rules of evidence. If you have any "reasonable doubt"—not imaginary or far-fetched—acquit the accused. Civil cases do not demand a moral certainty, merely the "preponderance" of what you regard as reliable and believable evidence.

Politics must be peculiar—one politician can't tell what another politician means by what he says.

Dates, Limits Are Announced By Game Commission

The Texas Game and Fish Commission at their quarterly meeting in Austin, July 20, established a number of seasons and bag limits for the regulatory counties of the state.

Deer and Antelope Seasons Extended Probably the most important changes occurred in the Panhandle and Trans-Pecos districts where the prong-horned antelope season was increased two days over last year and the mule deer season was extended to Dec. 15. Biologists suggested the deer increase because of a surplus which needed to be removed. The Trans-Pecos deer season will run from Dec. 1 through Dec. 15. Antelope may be taken from Sept. 29 through Oct. 7.

The antelope hunt in the Panhandle will run the same from Sept. 29 through Oct. 7. Both doe and buck pronghorns may be taken in the Panhandle this year, but only one antelope per season. A special antelope permit is required. Landowners in areas designated by the Commission for antelope hunting will issue these permits.

All counties under regulatory authority in the Panhandle where approved by the Commission, will have antlerless deer hunting by special permit. Two bucks will be the limit in counties of the Southeast District, except that antlerless deer may be taken by permit, and a person may not kill or possess more than three deer in the aggregate.

Sept. 29 through Oct. 7 has been set for the Antelope hunt in the Possum Kingdom District. The deer season in the district for Borden, Nolan and Taylor counties will be Nov. 16 through Dec. 5. Bosque, Brown, Ellis and Mitchell season will be Nov. 16 through Dec. 31. All others will be from Nov. 16 through Dec. 15.

The deer bag limit in Possum Kingdom District has been increased to two bucks in all counties except Borden, Nolan and Taylor. For the next season, antlerless deer in the Southeast District will be those with no hardened antler protruding through the skin. The bag limit in this district will be two bucks, except that antlerless deer may be taken by special permit, but a person may not kill or possess more than three deer in the aggregate.

The bag limit on deer was increased to three in Bell, Colorado, Coryell and Williamson counties in the Trinity-Brazos District. The third or bonus deer must be a doe and can be taken by permit only. Falls, Milam, and McLennan counties will have a limit of one buck only.

Hunters will not have to worry about the metal antlerless deer tag this year. The Commission agreed with biologists that the metal tags were no longer necessary since an adequate harvest control can be accomplished through the use of hunting license tags and antlerless deer permits. Bonus deer tags must be used on antlerless deer only. Hunting antlerless and-or doe deer shall be by special permit only and only in those areas designated by the Commission. Landowners will know where these areas are.

Any person having an antlerless deer in his possession must have a special GFC authorized permit on which appears the hunter's name and the landowner's or his authorized agent's signature. Landowners are instructed to keep the stubs from used permits which will be returned to the issuing officer not later than Feb. 1, 1963.

For complete information about the regulations in your area, check with a warden or contact the district office nearest you. A complete law digest and supplement will be available at the place where you purchase your license as soon as all dates and limits are available. Pick one up.

Pheasant Season Changes The wild pheasant season for the Panhandle District has been changed from two weekends to seven consecutive days. This year the season will run from Dec. 1 through Dec. 7 with two cock pheasants the daily limit and four cocks the possession limit.

Turkey Dates and Limits Altered Frio will be the only county in the South Central District to have a three-gobbler limit per season. Other counties in the district will have a two-gobbler limit because the populations in these counties do not justify a greater bag limit.

In the Possum Kingdom district, most counties will have a turkey season to conform with their deer seasons. Nolan and Taylor counties will be open to turkey hunting Nov. 16 through Dec. 5. Borden County will not have an open season. All other counties in the district will have a season from Nov. 16 through Dec. 15. The bag limit for the season will remain one gobbler.

Fish Regulations Changed In Some Counties The limit on channel, blue and flathead catfish in the Edwards Plateau District will be 25 per day, with no possession limit. Lake Travis, in Burnet County, will have a 25 per day limit on crappie. All lakes in the district, including Travis, will have no possession limit on crappie. The limits on black bass will be 15 per day and no possession limit except on Lake Travis where the daily bag limit is set for 15 a day, none of which can be under seven inches, and not more than 10 over 11 inches long.

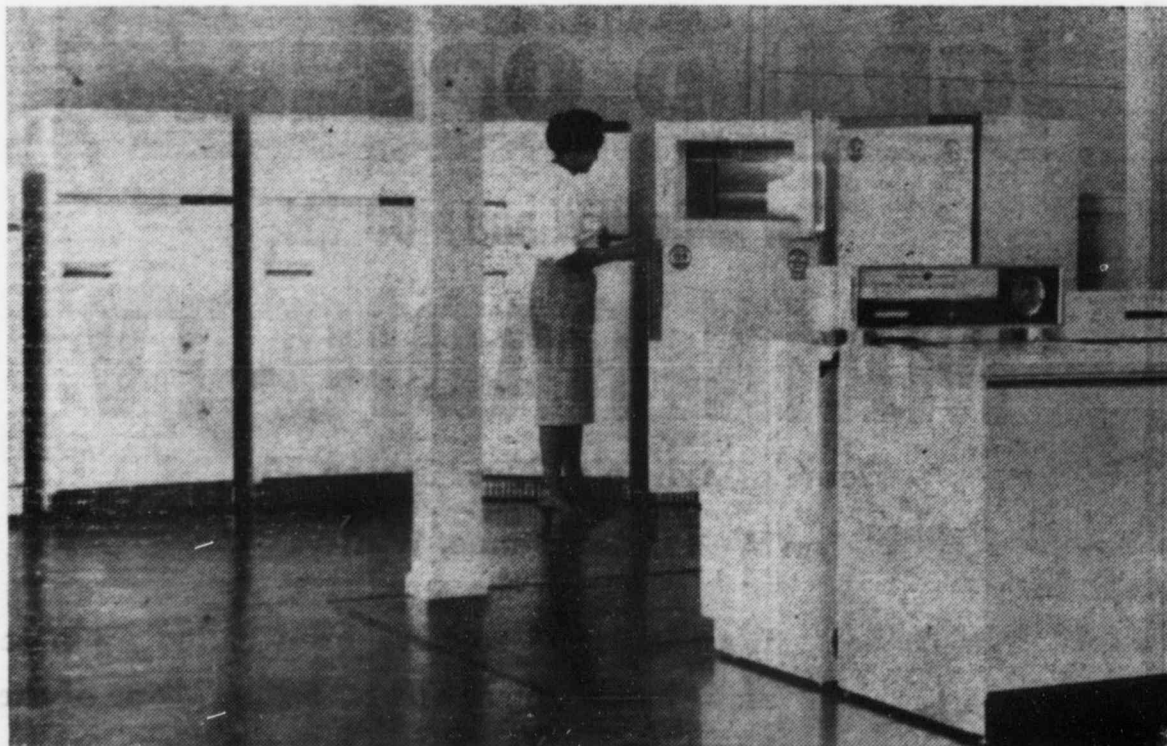

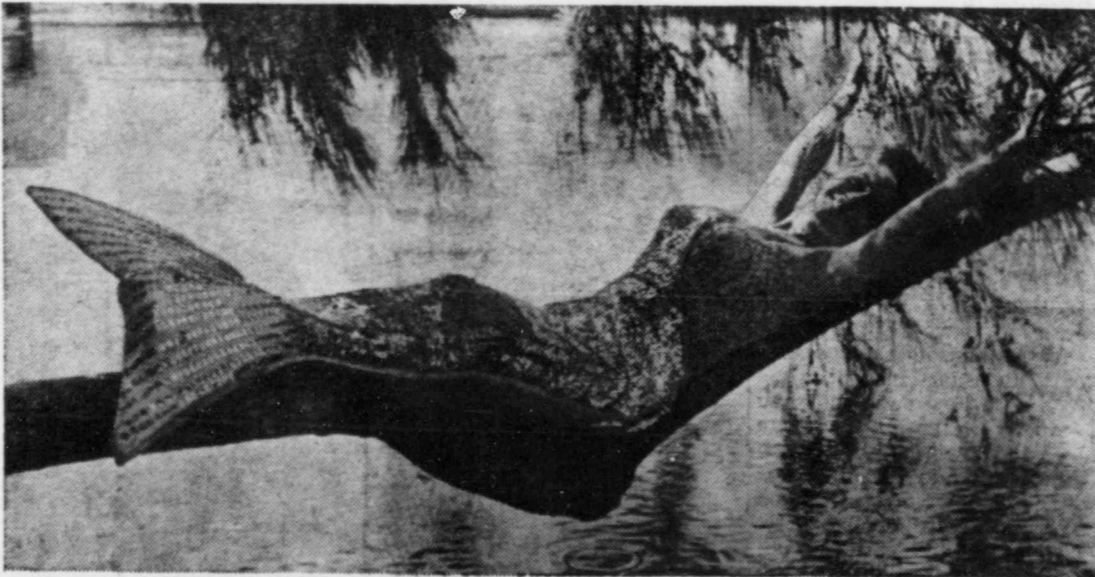

IT'S THE LAW—IN TEXAS

The colorful pirate of old captured your imagination but not that of the shipowners or the governments that lost their cargoes and treasures.

Pirates were "enemies of mankind." Their acts became crimes against that government as well as against the "law of nations." A government would try to catch and to punish them no matter how and where the piracy took place.

From these early days, a rule of international law called "the piracy principle" came into being, as to crimes against mankind. Any nation might seize and punish such a person. He did not need to be one of its citizens. The crimes could be committed inside or outside its territory. Jurisdiction is worldwide.

Nations often punish their own people for crimes beyond its borders. Nations can punish aliens for crime within their borders. They can punish aliens for crimes committed against that country when they later come into that country. A nation can also punish an alien for piracy under international law.

What about war crimes done on orders of superiors? The World War II allies have declared that certain Nazi leaders committed punishable crimes against nations.

Now and then some nations may allow a court to try a person "in absentia." Such trials without the accused present were once popular, but little comes from such trials, and they are not as highly regarded as trials in which a person has a fair chance to defend himself.

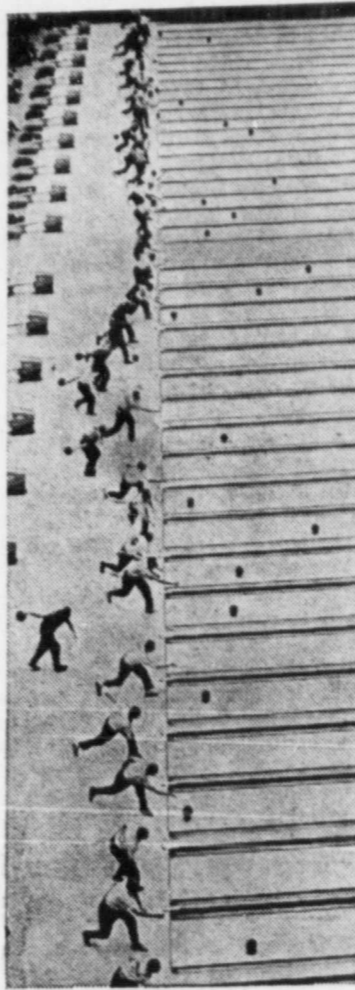

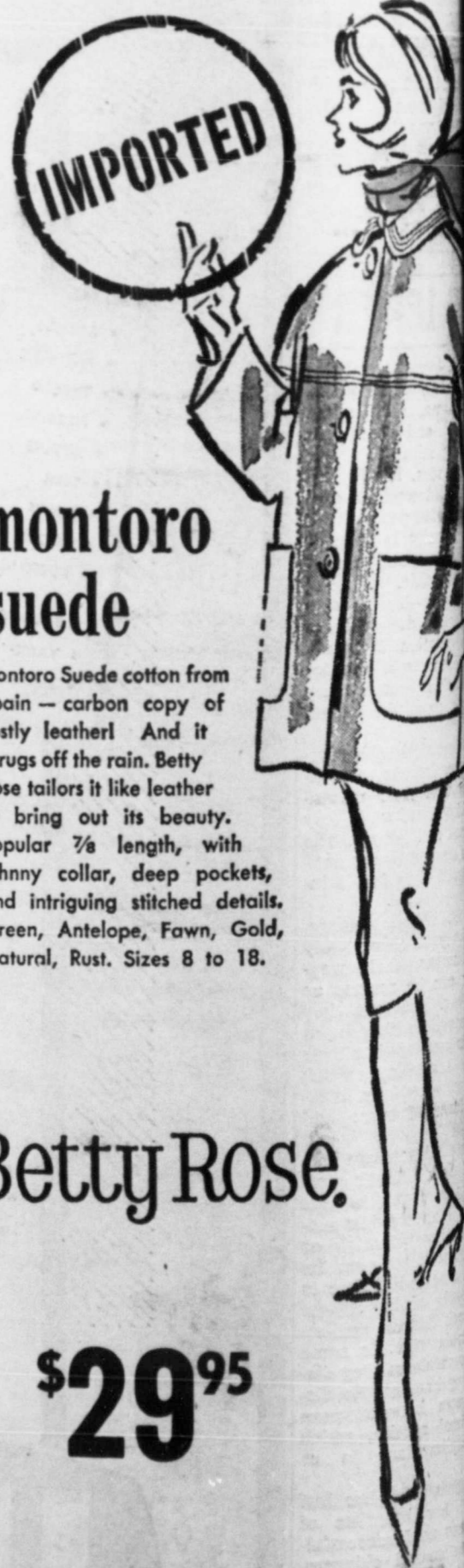
