### City's Streets **Receiving Seal** Coating, Gravel

About 15 blocks of Winters' streets this week are receiving an asphalt seal coating and additional gravel in a summer street repair program planned several weeks ago.

Some of the streets are receiving double coating, while a single coating of asphalt and gravel is being laid on others.

Approximately \$2500 is being spent on the project, the City Council announced. Although many other streets are in need of repair, it was felt that money would be saved in the overall program if the streets which were in the worst condition were repaired first, the Council said.

Some of the streets which are being repaired this week would have been entirely lost by spring, without the seal coating. The City asked the paving contractor to make a survey of all paved streets in town and make recommendations as to which should be rea list of the streets needing repair, and assigned a priority number to each.
