## Polio Vaccine Date For Winters Is Sept. 30

been set for administration of the Sabin Oral polio vaccine to residents of Winters and Rains County.

Dr. H. H. McCreight and Dr. C. T. Rives, who will administer the vaccine for Winters and the area, announced that the two separate dates, one for school children and the other for adults, will help to prevent congestion and to assure that everyone receives the vaccination.

All minors receiving the vaccine will need a consent form signed by their parents or guardians, it was announced. This form will be published in subsequent issues of The Enterprise, and copies also will be sent home to parents from school. In addition, there probably will be consent forms available at the place where the vaccinations are given.

There are three types of polio virus, it was pointed out, and three types of vaccine which must be given separately. Type III will be given on the first day, with Type I on the second date, and Type II given in January. All people are urged to take the vaccine.

It is stressed that those people who have received the Sabin injections should take the Sabin oral vaccination. The Salk injections do not prevent polio, and were not designed to do so, it was pointed out.

Doctors also said that it must be remembered that all three types of the vaccine must be taken by each person in order to prevent the disease.

Results of the world-wide administration of the vaccine indicate that we have an excellent opportunity to completely wipe out poliomyelitis. However, Drs. Rives and McCreight point out, attainment of this goal depends on every individual's personal cooperation.

### City's Streets Receiving Seal Coating, Gravel

About 15 blocks of Winters' streets this week are receiving an asphalt seal coating and additional gravel in a summer street repair program planned several weeks ago.

Some of the streets are receiving double coating, while a single coating of asphalt and gravel is being laid on others.

Approximately \$2500 is being spent on the project, the City Council announced. Although many other streets are in need of repair, it was felt that money would be saved in the overall program if the streets which were in the worst condition were repaired first, the Council said.

Some of the streets which are being repaired this week would have been entirely lost by spring, without the seal coating. The City asked the paving contractor to make a survey of all paved streets in town and make recommendations as to which should be repaired first.

Members of the Council expressed a hope that the project can be continued next year, when warm weather begins, until all paved streets are returned to a satisfactory state of repair. A continuing and planned program of street maintenance will save money for the taxpayers, they pointed out.

Meanwhile, Council has asked the cooperation of all in taking care of the streets. The practice of burning leaves and trash in the gutters is detrimental to asphalt paving, they pointed out.

## School Opens Here Tuesday Morning

Winters Independent Schools will open for the 1962-63 school term Tuesday, Sept. 4, James B. Nevins, Superintendent of Schools, has announced.

Pre-school faculty meetings will begin today (Friday), at 9 a.m. in the school cafeteria, and continue through Saturday, Monday, Sept. 3, Labor Day, will be observed as a holiday.

The first day of school will be a full school day, with buses running the usual time on new approved routes. Buses will arrive at school in time for classes to begin at 8:25, with the school day ending at 3:57 in the afternoon.

Primary grades, 1, 2 and 3, will be dismissed daily at 3 o'clock. Noon meals will be served in the cafeteria beginning Tuesday. Prices will be 30 cents per meal for pupils in grades 1 through 6, and 35 cents per meal for all students in grades above 6. These prices are the same as in the past.

PRIMARY SCHOOL  
Mrs. R. K. Russell, principal of the primary school, said that all pupils who will be in the first grade for the first time should have received post cards stating time for enrollment and a conference scheduled in the principal's office.

Parents are reminded that all pupils entering the first grade for the first time are required to have a birth certificate and evidence of a smallpox vaccination at the time of enrollment.

Pupils attending the Winters schools last year in grades 1, 2 and 3 will not report to school until Tuesday, and will find their names listed on room doors for room assignments. Pupils who did not attend these grades in the Winters school last year should have received instructions by this time, it was explained.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL  
Elementary pupils who attend

ed Winters schools last year in grades 4 to 8 will report for classes Tuesday, and will find their names on classroom doors and learn assignments. This is the same procedure used in the past.

Pupils who did not attend the local schools last year have been enrolled this week, and received assignments.

George Beard is principal of the Elementary School.

HIGH SCHOOL  
High school students who attended the Winters school last year have received registration cards, listing schedules. Schedules were prepared from pre-registration information furnished last spring.

New students in the high school have already been processed and received information regarding scheduling and assignments.

Supt. Nevins said that the faculty is about completed, with several teachers new to the Winters system. Other preparations have been made for the beginning of the school terms, with plant facilities brought to a tip-top condition.

New windows have been installed in the high school building, and other much needed work done in the whole system. In addition, new street lights have been installed in the vicinity of the school buildings.

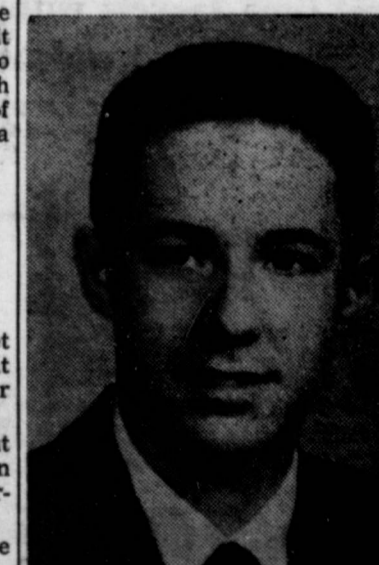

 trade newspaper in which the writer suggested that to cut expenses, the Post Office should eliminate the "Saturday mail delivery." Because, he says, "most businesses are closed on Saturdays anyway. Any mail delivered to a firm usually just lies where it was deposited by the postman until Monday morning."  
 This pattern of thinking seems to be prevalent among many of those who formulate policy or would attempt to influence the making of policy in some of the departments of our federal government. It's simply a case of not being able to "see the forest for the trees." They're so used to their own little world of 9 to 5, with no work on Saturdays, they have come to the conclusion that the whole country lives the same way. Far from it! A big part of the retail business, and much of the industrial business and work, is done on Saturday, by the so-called "small businesses," who would find it hard indeed to exist without that extra day of production or selling.  
 Stopping of mail delivery on Saturday would place a hardship on all these "small businesses" throughout the country, because the efficient conduct of business in a great respect is dependent upon the mails.  
 It would seem that it is about time that some of these people be made to realize that their own secluded part of the world is not the whole.

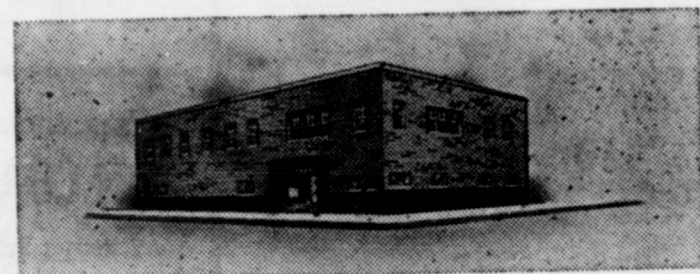

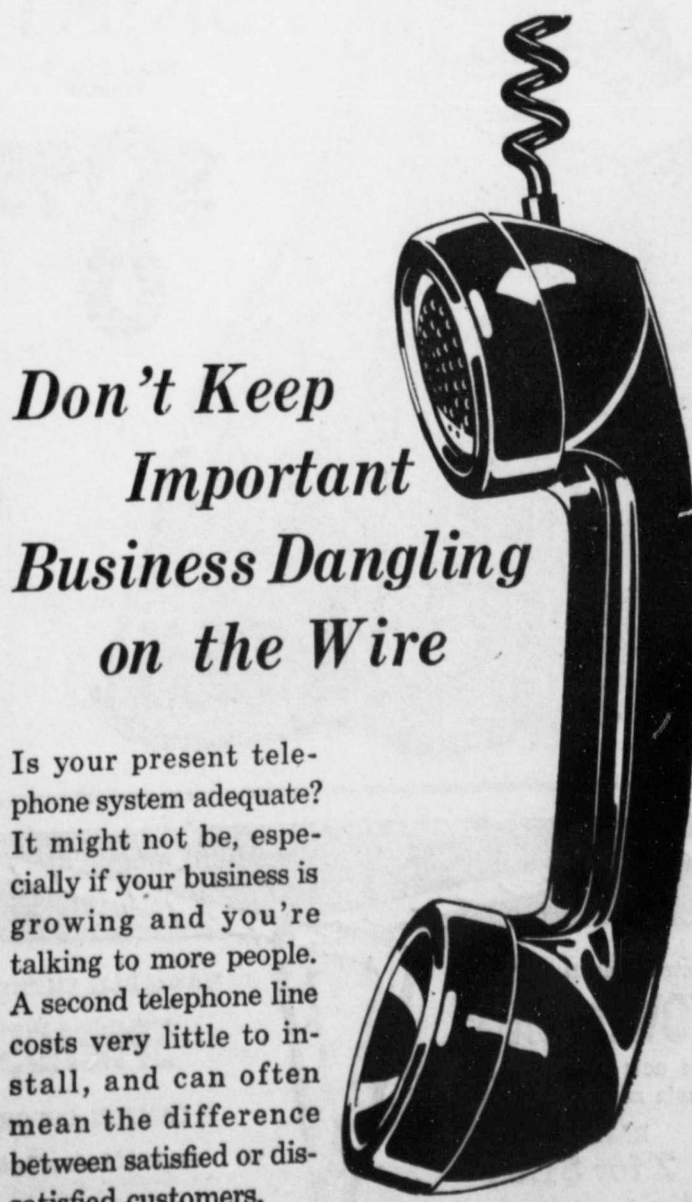
