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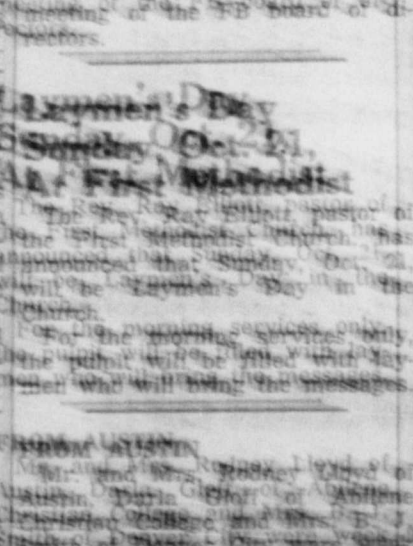
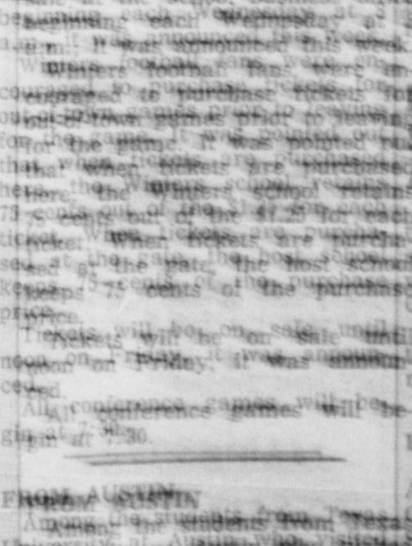

There are many wonders to Granite Shoals. From its banks came the granite of which the Capitol of Texas and many of the State's new office buildings were constructed. Granite from its shores provide the facade and even the walls of public buildings all over the United States. In many places the bed of the lake is solid granite. There are outcroppings of granite all along the north and east shore among acres of solid rock. Its western shores are mostly rolling hills, gravel, or undulating meadows, covered with alluvial soil washed in and deposited by floods on the Colorado for perhaps hundreds of years.

Wildlife of all kinds abounds near Lake Granite Shoals. Area surrounding the lake provides some of the best white-tailed-deer hunting in the United States. Currently there are many lake-shore developments in progress around Granite Shoals Lake. All these developments have water, electricity and most of them telephone service. It is a lake of many homes, with just enough commercial development to take care of everyday needs.

Fishing is good every month of the year in Granite Shoals. A bountiful supply of bass, crappie, bream and catfish is available—thanks to frequent stocking by the Game and Fish Commission. While it has its share of rough fish, there is a constant fight against them. So far they have not been too much of a problem.

Granite Shoals Lake also is on the watershed of the Llano River and the Big Sandy. Its total watershed covers perhaps a thousand square miles. But it also catches and holds some of the floodwaters that come down the Colorado from its far reaches.

This year Granite Shoals has produced many of the largest black bass taken in Texas, with a number of them going more than eight pounds.

Granite Shoals Lake can be reached from Llano, Burnet and Marble Falls, over paved highways from every direction. It is a long lake, with plenty of wonderful coves, sandy beaches and open water to carry every type of outdoor activity.

If you've never been to Lake Granite Shoals it is a worthwhile week end trip. If you've never fished it, then you've missed a chance to land some real lunkers.

**Undefended Boundaries of Canada And The U. S. Example of Friendship**

This is a touchy subject. Canadians are often inclined to look upon the people of the United States more or less as upstarts, and in some ways I don't blame them. For many years I have had an office in Toronto, Ontario, and all of my employees there are loyal native Canadians.

**Canadian Resources**

We must first realize that Canada has an area of about 3,850,000 square miles compared with an area of 3,020,000 square miles for the United States,—not including Alaska or Hawaii. The mineral assets of Canada are very great, including oil, natural gas, even gold and uranium, and about every other mineral. Moreover, these natural resources are all underground, and hence might not be disturbed by a nuclear world war.

The character of the Canadian people has always interested me. They are politically alert. Studying the politics of Canadian people, you would assume they are quite socialist. This is especially true of the political parties in the western part of Canada. On the other hand, they are fair; when taking over private property they usually pay a fair price. This is evident now as the government is moving to take possession of some of the largest developed water-power companies.

**Will Canada Join The "Common Market"?**

I have already discussed the Common Market of Europe in a column which was published a few weeks ago. England, of course, must join the Common Market before Canada could hope to do so. Furthermore, the original charter of the Common Market demanded that all countries belonging thereto should be adjoining. England expects to get this stipulation revoked.

Recently Prime Minister Macmillan brought the heads of the British Commonwealth countries to London to see if they could agree to England's joining the European Common Market. After ten days of haggling in London, the fifteen Prime Ministers of the Commonwealth Countries issued, on September 19th, a communique which was rather bland as well as bland. The communique said: The final decision must be left to Britain alone; we, however, withhold final judgment until the full terms of entry are known. One fact is certain, namely, that even if England is accepted, there is no hope for Canada to also be accepted. In the meantime, Russia fears the European Common Market, and will be much concerned if England is accepted.

**My Own Forecast As To Canada, Great Britain, And The United States**

Canada and Great Britain are gradually working apart politically as well as economically. Although the English Prime Minister now nominates a governor general for Canada for appointment by the Queen and continues to supervise or approve certain military and fiscal legislation, yet Canada is rapidly drifting away from the mother country. This, moreover, is true of Australia, New Zealand, and others of the fifteen Commonwealth nations. My forecast is that if Great Britain heartily joins the European Common Market, it will push Canada and the United States closer together as one nation. Although a boundary line now nearly 4,000 miles long separates Canada from the United States, yet it contains no defenses on either side and is one of the greatest examples of world peace.

A joining of the United States and Canada should be of advantage to both countries. It would give the United States a great new body of natural resources, and would help Canada industrially and give much additional employment to Canadian people. The two countries would supplement each other well from an economic as well as a political point of view. This would enable the two nations to balance up their population and climatic changes. Canadians who could afford it would drive to Florida winters while our own people would drive to Canada summers and enjoy the wonderful lakes and mountains of the Canadian Northwest.

**Vents Will Remove Moisture From Homes In Winter**

The approach of cool weather means harvest time, hunting season, and warm glowing fires and heaters. And heaters and open flames mean the return of the annual problem of sweating walls and windows, according to W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer, Texas A & M College.

A considerable amount of moisture is given off when open flame heaters are burned, he says. When this moisture contacts a cold surface it condenses to a liquid state, the sweating you see.

To solve this problem all gas stoves, floor furnaces, central heating systems, gas refrigerators, dry-

ers and water heaters vented. Allen says. To be done in a new home is built or when an old one is remodeled, but it is possible to vent space through a closet or a window. But some condensation will occur if the open flame heater is used.

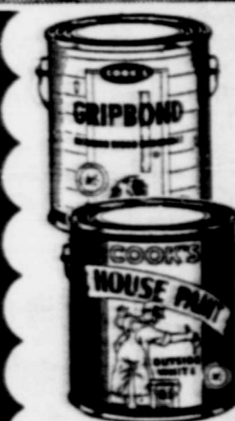
