Parsons of Haskell; two step-sons, Henry Hall of Carbon and Bill Hall of Fritch; one step-daughter, Mrs. Myrtle Johnson of Cisco; and 10 grandchildren.

COUNTY SCHOOL CHILDREN MAY RECEIVE SALK POLIO VACCINE

Seven hundred and seventy-three Eastland County first and second grade children will be eligible to receive the Salk polio vaccine in April if the evaluation report on the vaccine, which is due next month, shows success. Dr. L. C. Brown, county health officer, revealed Tuesday.

Dr. Brown said that the report from the Vaccine Evaluation Center, where records of 1,830,000 school children who participated in the nationwide field trial sponsored by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis last year were checked, will show if the vaccinated children escaped paralytic polio attack. If the tests prove successful, Eastland County's 773 students will be eligible for immediate vaccines.

Dr. Brown said hopes are high that the tests will prove successful. He said he was going ahead with plans to vaccinate Eastland students, and would begin immediately if the tests do prove to have helped prevent polio. A meeting will be held Thursday night at 7:30 at the Texas Electric Conference Room in Eastland of all parents, P-TA members and others interested.

If the report shows the vaccine does work and is licensed by the Federal Government, the vaccine can be applied before school is out. Dr. Brown pointed out that it takes five weeks to complete the test. The first dose is given and then a waiting period of a week is required before the second dose.

Four more weeks must go by before the final dose. Hopes are that the vaccine can be given before the polio season begins.

Dr. Brown stressed that "this projected vaccine program will not be another test." In the past half the children have been given the real vaccine, and the other half water, in order to test the vaccine. "This will be the real thing if it is given," he said.

Dr. Brown said that first and second grade students were selected because of high polio incidence in their age group, and because of their accessibility at schools. He said parents of the children must request the vaccine be given to their children before it can be given.

The vaccine will be supplied free by the State Health Department.

Dr. Brown said, "The vaccine, which will be furnished by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, is the same vaccine that was given 440,000 children last spring. We do not know yet whether it really prevents paralytic polio. Until April, when we will learn the results of the evaluation study now being conducted at the University of Michigan, we cannot know if the vaccine is effective."

"But we cannot wait until then for planning for the protection of as many of our children as possible. Vaccinating large numbers of children is a big and important job, entailing many procedural tasks that can't be performed overnight. If the license is granted in April, we must be ready to start vaccinating at once, so that, if possible, we can finish before our schools close and the polio season starts."

Ramsey farm south of Carbon and the family is now occupying the place.

Former sheriff of Eastland County, J. Frank Tucker, and family have moved from Eastland to the Joe Barnett place in the south part of town and he is in the wholesale and retail gasoline business here.

We welcome these new families to our town. Mr. and Mrs. Tucker are affiliated with the Baptist Church. Mr. and Mrs. Ramsey are Methodists.

Feed Dealers Are Urged To Turn In Feed Certificates

Holders of dealers' certificates under the emergency feed program in this area were urged to use them before they expire.

Expiration date is 120 days from the date they are issued, C. H. Hoesley, director, Dallas Commodity Stabilization Service, pointed out.

After the deadline date, the certificates will be worthless, he added.

These are the certificates issued to feed dealers who have supplied grain to farmers and ranchers under the emergency program. They are used to help purchase replacement grain from Commodity Credit Corporation.

"The 120-day limit has already slipped up on some feed dealers," Hoesley explained.

Home Dem. News

To most of us spring is an inspiration. A time when we want to improve, to make different, or give our surroundings a "face-lifting".

One thing that most of us like in other people. Learn to be dependable, and to depend on others when needed. Try to help other people in ways they want to be helped. One important thing most of us need is to learn to control the way we express our feelings about things and people. Good grooming, good manners, learning to take part, taking the lead, and planning good work habits are other personality improvements. Last, but not least, we need to learn to use divine help and guidance and to express gratitude and reverence.

In grandmother's day there were sullen and molasses, sassafras tea, and "store bought" tonic to tone up the blood each spring. Today this toning up is done the year around by including a variety of vegetables in the diet.

Green vegetables are important in the diet mainly because of their Vitamin A and C content. The intensity of the vegetables green color and the part of the plant from which it comes are clues to the food value. In general, the greener the vegetable, the richer it is in minerals and vitamins. The fresher the green vegetable, the better. Flavor and crispness, and perhaps some food value too, are lost when vegetables wilt or are stored.

Homemakers are asking questions about cotton rugs. Pleased with the lovely colors and variety of weaves, now available, families are eager to include them in decorating schemes and home furnishing budgets. Common questions are "How much wear will it take?"; "How much will it shrink?"; and "Will it fade?". Tests conducted show that they will last through an abundance of hard wear, have little shrinkage, clean easily, and most of them hold their original color with practically no change. For more information on these tests, if you are in doubt, please come by our office.

We have a recipe that we would like to pass on to you, hoping you will find a use for it.

French Peas

1 1/2 tablespoon butter or margarine
2 tablespoons water
1/2 cup thinly sliced mushrooms
1 1/2 cups fresh peas, or 10 oz. package frozen peas
1 small onion, thinly sliced
1/2 teaspoon salt
Melt butter or margarine and add other ingredients. Cover the pan tightly and cook over moderate heat until the peas are tender, shaking the pan occasionally to prevent sticking. Cook fresh peas until tender, 8 to 20 minutes. For frozen peas, begin gins to escape. Cook 5 to 10 minutes. Make 4 servings, about 1/2 cup each.

For quick cooking of vegetables, use a pan with straight sides, flat bottom, and tight fitting lid. Quick cooking is a good practice because it conserves more of the food nutrients which are so vital.

Many times homemakers find they have a lot of scraps left when they put new linoleum on the floor. These scraps can be used for room brighteners. Recently we made an attractive waste basket by using a large pail and pasting linoleum around it. Other uses of scrap linoleum

are to cover shelves, make card table covers, make wall hangings by painting resins on the plain colored linoleum, make cube shaped book ends, and table mats. There are numbers of things which you might think of to use your scrap linoleum. Think twice before you throw yours away.

As we close our chat with you let us leave you with a thought. "A smile goes a long way, but you are the one who must start it on its journey."

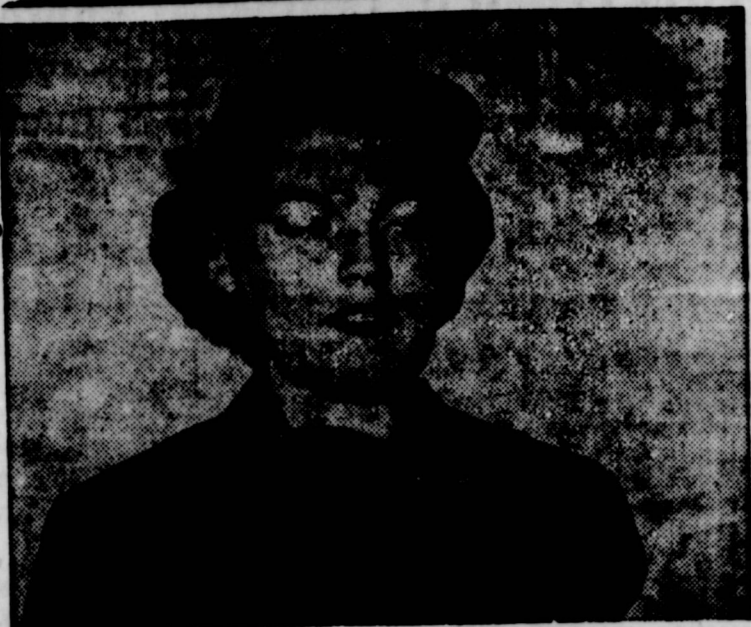

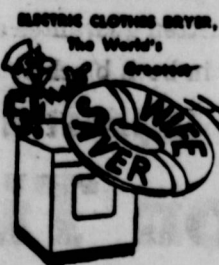

Under the emergency feed program, eligible ranchers and farmers are issued purchase orders for the supplemental grain they need, up to a 60-day supply. These purchase orders are worth \$1 per hundredweight for the amount of grain involved. They carry a 120-day expiration date.

When stockmen buy grain they turn over the orders to their feed dealers, who must convert them into dealers' certificates within 120 days of issue. This is done in the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in the county where issued.

These dealers' certificates, also good for 120 days, carry the dollar value of the purchase orders. They are turned over to regular suppliers or CCC when dealers buy replacement grain.

Issuance of purchase orders ended Feb. 15. Dealers who ac-

cept approved purchase orders after that date will have the 120-day period to convert them into dealers' certificates.

"Feed dealers who wait too close to any of the 120-day expiration dates to transfer certificates may not have time to make the transfer. This means they may lose out on the dollar value of the certificates when they buy replacement grain from CCC," Moseley emphasized.

Dallas CSS office has sold about 7,382,068 bushels of grain to southwest and southeast feed dealers since last summer when the program got underway. These sales included 5,200,529 bushels grain sorghum, 2,065,408 bushels oats and 96,131 bushels corn.

States taking part in the program in this area are Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, and Tennessee.

Schools Costs; Etc.

Taxes are a relative thing. One thousand dollars may look big, but seventy or eighty cents increase in an individual taxpayer's bill can be made to look small.

Six billion dollars spent on education nationally may look large, but it looks small in comparison to ten billion spent on crime because too little was spent on education.

A \$240.00 per year expenditure per school child may look large, but it looks small when the voter is informed that one adolescent in 43 is a delinquent in spite of the best schools the world has ever known.

The \$2880 cost of a 12-year public school education of a child looks like a sizeable bill, but is small in comparison to the increased life income of that educated boy or girl.

School taxes may loom large in the mind's eye of a childless property owner, but when he considers the increased productivity of an educated employee or the added purchasing power from educated minds and hands that he has made in school taxes pays his greatest dividends.

Our tax rate at the present time is \$1.40 on the \$100 valuation. By increasing our school tax to \$1.50 will mean an increased income to our school of \$1,064. This amount will cost the average property owner an average of 60c to \$1.00 a year more.

This tax issue will be voted on Saturday April 2, at the Hammer Building in Carbon.

Further plans were made concerning the delegates to attend the District THDA meeting in Temple. Those who will go from this county are Mrs. Bill Tucker, Mrs. John Love, Mrs. Ernest Schaefer, Mrs. Jess Flippen, Minnie Mae Billingsley, home demonstration agent, and the assistant agent, Julia LaFaye Mason.

All clubs reported having at least two meetings since the last council meeting. Some of the programs consisted of "Safety and Fire Prevention in the Living Room," "Frame Gardens," "Cultivating, Pruning, Insect Control, and Transplanting Tomatoes," "Braided Rugs," "Eat and Grow Slim," "Aprons," and "Poultry."

Several clubs reported all day meetings, recreation, community or family recreation projects, visitors attending club meetings and quilting and selling quilts. All clubs are participating in the Red Cross Drive. Also some of the clubs are helping with the 4-H Clubs in the county. Spiritual emphasis is being added to the clubs this year through the use of devotional at each meeting.
