Quarter Final Tilt At Midland Tonite

The Winters High School Blizzards will go to Midland on a horse hunt Friday night.

Moving into the quarter finals of the State AA playoffs, the Blizzards are out to duplicate their record of 1960, when they took the state AA crown. Easily the champions of District 4-AA, the Mustangs scored 427 points in 10 games before moving out of their district.

Not until the Dalhart regional game had any team scored more than 12 points against Denver City. Their opponents have scored 76.

Winters and Denver City are two of the three remaining AA teams in the state without a defeat all season. Jacksboro is the other. These three teams have long held the No. 1, 2, 3 spots in the state ratings, with perfect records all season.

Winters has chalked up a formidable record this season, coming out on top in the scrap for the championship of what has been termed the toughest AA district in the state, 6-AA. They have marked up 239 points all season, holding their opponents to 61.

The Blizzards have been called primarily a defensive team, but smooth ball handling in the backfield has been cause for alarm among opposing teams. They mix up their action, passing the honors around to Denny Aldridge, Tommy Alfrey, Steve Grissom, Tommy Young, working off tackle, around the ends, down the middle, and sprinkling in a good layer of ground-gaining passes. They work to get out front, and hold opponents to no gain.

The Hosses, with their fourth straight league title, have a running team, making yardage down the middle. Their big gun is Don Kinder, a 139-pound halfback, who scored 108 points and gained 1,038 yards on 103 carries prior to the Dalhart game, in which he also got notices. Their opponents this season have been hard put to pull more than one teedee out of the hat, with only Spur and Dalhart allowed that honor. The Mustangs' scoring record for the season has been three touchdowns per game, or more.

Friday night's game probably will be the most publicized conflict in this post-season playoff series, with two undefeated teams battling for the semi-final position. Winner of the Winters-Denver City game Friday night will play the winner of the Jacksboro-Mineola game, sometime next week end.

From the Files of the Winters Enterprise

30 YEARS AGO

December 9, 1932

The committee in charge of distributing the money from the Federal Government had used \$228.75 for labor as of that date. The men were paid \$1.50 per day. Second annual Charity Carnival sponsored by the American Legion opened that day. It was said to have been bigger and better than ever before. Admission free and it was open two days and nights. Proceeds were used to buy free milk and provide wholesome lunches at reasonable rates, to all school children in the American Legion Luncheon.

The United States government predicted that the total cotton crop for the year 1932 to be 12,757,000. Governor Ross S. Sterling requested all Texans to buy Texas goods for Christmas so as to be a benefit to all in our state. The Kennedy Sisters Stock Co., a well-known tent show, was to be in Winters that week. They offered modern plays, polite vaudeville and music for entertainment in 1932. R. V. Pierce and Fred Young became managers of the Service Dry Cleaners that week in 1932.

25 YEARS AGO

December 10, 1937
 Band Sweetheart of 1937 was to be announced that night at a high school play. The high school choral club was to present a Christmas Cantata that week at the Methodist Church. Mrs. C. S. Jackson was director of the club. Lions Club announced that they would start work on the Spring Livestock Show soon. Santa was coming to Winters again that week. He was to bring candy and would be led by the High School band. A new dentist was coming to Winters. He was Dr. Harry Smith of Sulphur Springs. He purchased Dr. F. J. Brophy's office and equipment here. Two pool halls were closed here that week by county officers.

20 YEARS AGO

December 11, 1942
 Twenty-three reservists from Runnels County were to report for duty the following week in 1942. Lt. C. T. Rives received a promotion to Captain in the Medical Detachment of the Coast Artillery that week. An article in the 1942 paper stated that 3-4 of the farms in Texas were without electricity that year. Bond drive for the bomber got off to a good start that week. Winters lead the county in buying bonds on Pearl Harbor Memorial Day. The Diversity Club sponsored a Christmas Home Lighting Contest that year. No money was given as prizes because of the War. Farmers were to vote on the cotton quota the next day. Ballot boxes were placed in all towns in the county. All slaughtered animals had to be reported to the regional OPA officials in 1942. The school reported a large number of kids on the 2nd six weeks honor roll that week.

Land Bank Reduces Interest Cost To Borrowers

The Federal Land Bank of Houston has announced that effective on January 1, 1963, it will reduce temporarily to 5 percent the interest rate on all outstanding loans which presently bear a rate in excess of 5 percent. The contract rate on new loans will continue to be 5 1-2 percent but interest on loans closed on and after December 1, 1962, will be billed temporarily at 5 percent until further notice by the bank. In making the announcement, Hal Weatherford, President of the bank, said that of its \$260 million of loans outstanding more than \$100 million bear contract rates in excess of 5 percent and that the savings to Texas farmers and ranchers by this action will be more than a half million dollars in the year of 1963 alone. Weatherford said this is the fourth time the Bank has voluntarily reduced the interest on its outstanding loans. The Houston bank makes long-term farm and ranch loans through 73 Federal Land Bank Associations located throughout Texas. The one serving Runnels County is the Federal Land Bank Association of Ballinger. R. H. Emery is the Manager and the other officers and directors are J. E. Blackwell, Pres.; Miles; B. M. \$327 Million In GI Insurance Dividends Paid In Record Time

More than \$327 million in 1963 GI insurance dividends—including a special dividend of \$90 million—will be paid in record time, according to John S. Gleason, Jr., Administrator of Veterans Affairs. Plans for payment of both regular and special 1963 dividends were announced by White House November 22, 1962. Under a greatly speeded-up timetable, the entire payment of both regular and special dividend payments is expected to be completed during the month of January 1963. About \$222 million of the \$327 million total is the regular 1963 dividend that will go to nearly five million World War II veterans holding National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) policies. More than \$15 million will go to 250,000 World War I veterans who hold U. S. Government Life Insurance (USGLI) policies. Regular dividends, which are distributed annually, have regularly been paid on the anniversary date of the original issuance of the policy. On this occasion, the payments will be speeded up to be completed within the month of January. An accelerated method was used once before by the Veterans Administration when the regular dividends during 1961 were paid by mid-March of that year. In addition to the regular dividend, the VA will pay a special dividend of \$90 million during 1963 to all World War II NSLI policyholders. A previous special dividend was paid to World War II policy holders during 1961. The regular dividends which are paid to both World War I and World War II policyholders are primarily a return to the policyholders of part of their premium payments since the death rate among GI policyholders continues to be lower than the rate upon which the payments were established by law. The special dividend will be paid from the contingency reserve fund due to the fact that study and current experience indicate that

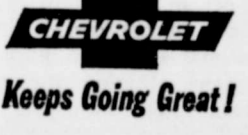

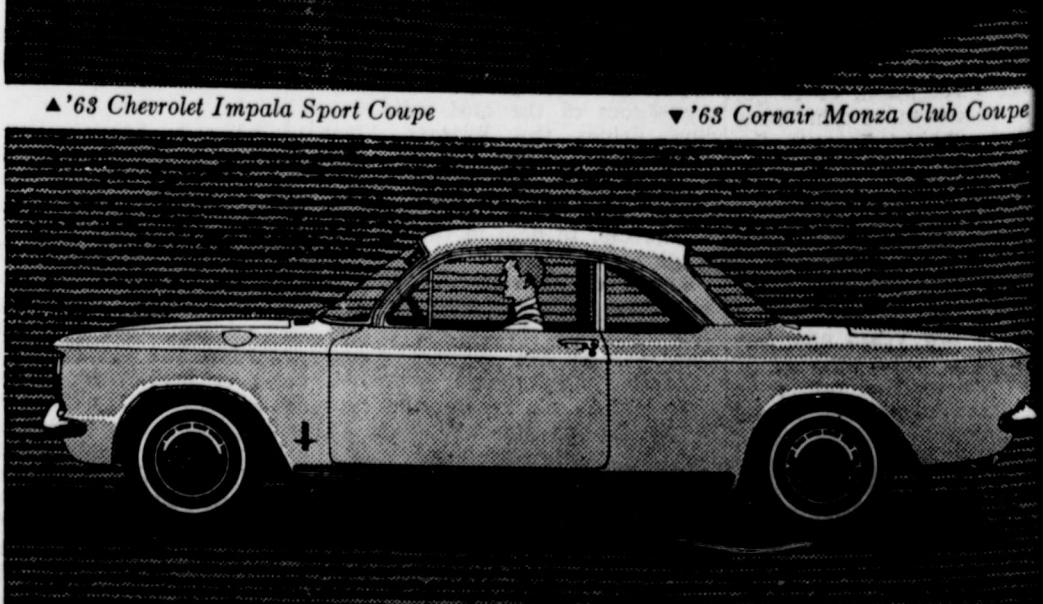

Blizzards Hit Crane for Regional Title, 14-12

For the second time in a row, the Cranes came back strong, and headed for the end zone. From their own 32, with several passes, the longest of which was seven yards, the Cranes moved to the 1 yard line. Kirkham on a keeper made the TD. With a chance for a tie game staring them in the face, the Big Blue broke up the pass try for extra points and maintained their precious two-point lead, thanks to Alvis Jackson.

It looked as though the Blizzards would score again as they moved from their own 39 to the Crane 2 yard line before stopping. With 1:30 left in the game, the Cranes took over on their own two, and desperately tried to move out. Three passes by Kirkham fell incomplete however, and they were forced to kick out with 1:03 left in the game.

Alfrey kept the ball for the two last downs of the game. Had the Cranes tied the score, the Blizzards would have been defeated on penetrations which stood 3-4 in favor of the Cranes.

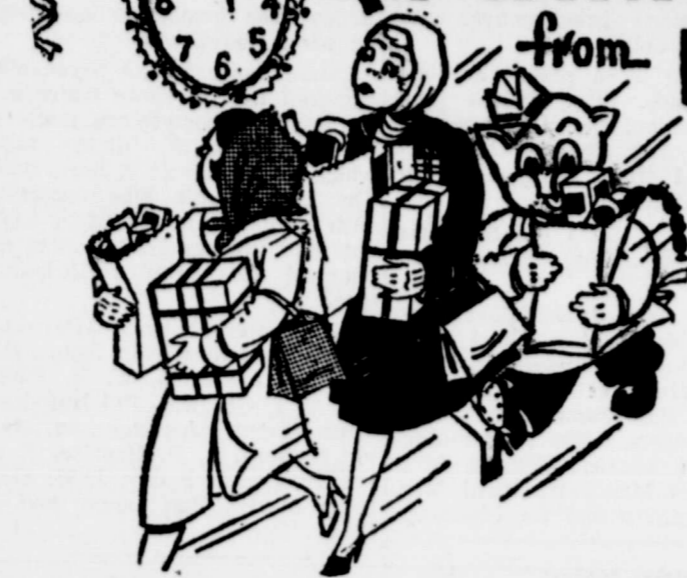

Cotton Quota Voting Set for December 11

The 1963 Cotton Marketing Quota Referendum will be held Tuesday, Dec. 11, according to an announcement by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Balloting places for eligible voters in this referendum will be: Winters, Chamber of Commerce Office; Wingate, Security State Bank; Norton, Carl Lewis Store; Crews, Community House; Ballinger, court house; Miles, City Hall; Rowena, Bank.

According to the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, if two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum favor quotas, they will be in effect on the 1963 upland cotton crop and marketing penalties will apply to any excess cotton produced on a farm and price support at a level within the range of 65 to 90 percent of parity will be available to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allotments.

On the other hand, if more than a third of the voting growers oppose the quotas, then there will be no quotas and no penalties applicable to the 1963 cotton crop, and price support to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allotments will be available at 50 percent of parity, as directed by law.

Allotments are not affected by the referendum. They will remain in effect—whether or not quotas are approved—as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support, the committee said.

The Secretary of Agriculture is directed by law to proclaim quotas for the next crop when the cotton supply exceeds normal, but growers themselves decide whether or not quotas will be used, it was explained. Previous votes on quotas have been favorable.

The committee pointed out that the Administration plans to recommend new cotton legislation early in 1963. It is anticipated, however, that such legislation would supplement rather than substantially change the basic program choices to be presented for growers' determination in the Dec. 11 referendum.

All farmers who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1962 are eligible to vote in the referendum.

Christmas Shoppers Advised To Buy Toys Which Are Safe

The Texas Safety Association today advised Christmas shoppers to keep safety in mind when selecting toys for children.

J. O. Musick, General Manager of TSA, advised selecting toys that are sturdy and well-made. "Cheaply constructed or breakable toys may come apart or be broken under strenuous child play," Musick said. "Broken or jagged edges from toys can cause cuts and infection."

He advised testing the strength of a toy to see how much bending it will take and whether it will last past Christmas Day.

"Choose the toy which is suitable to the strength of the child. A toy which is too heavy for a youngster to handle easily could cause an accident to that child," Musick explained.

He further advised shoppers to beware of toys manufactured with sharp edges or pointed ends, and to check all playthings to make sure there are no parts which may become loose and find their way into the mouth.

"Babies and toddlers invariably follow the 'hand to mouth' rule for everything they touch. See that they do not play with small toys, marbles, coins, beads or other tiny objects," Musick said.

Other things such as stuffed animals with button eyes which may become loose, whistles with removable mouth pieces and pull-toys with small removable parts also are dangerous for small children.

The safety director reported that nearly 600 children under age five die each year in the U.S. as a result of suffocation from ingestion of small objects.

Last year in Texas, 16 children under age five died from ingestion of objects other than food.

He said shoppers should keep in mind the age, interest, and physical and mental abilities of a child in selecting toys.

"An archery set, dart game or chemistry set may become dangerous if a child does not know how to use them or is too young for such games," Musick said.

"It is sometimes necessary for parents to supervise the use of such toys, but children should not be overburdened with toys that require constant adult supervision."

He said electrical toys of any type are unsafe for the very young and that such toys for older children should be carefully selected.

"Inspect electrical toys for frayed cords or any defect which may cause shock. Teach your child how to handle electrical toys and warn him not to play with electrical equipment with wet hands or when wearing damp clothing," he added.

Musick reminded parents that even is a toy is safe, it may not stay that way.

"Inspection of toys and play equipment periodically is important. Check wooden toys for splinters, wagons for loose wheels and baby's rattler for cracks which may free the little stones inside. If satisfactory repairs can't be made, discard toy immediately."

He noted that toys can be hazards not only for children at play, but also for adults.

"Serious falls may result from toys left on steps, stairways, walks or in the yard. Have a place for toys and teach children to put them away," he concluded.
