DO YOU REMEMBER?

From the Files of the Winters Enterprise

30 YEARS AGO

December 16, 1932

The High School Glee Club composed of all girls, presented a concert that night at the Methodist Church. Mrs. C. S. Jackson was the leader.

Winters Volunteer Firemen planned to hold their annual Christmas Banquet December 20 of that year. Also, they decided to donate \$25 to the Christmas fund of the Lions Club for needy children in Winters.

There were seven gins operating in Winters in 1932 and they turned out 17,230 bales of cotton as of that date. The County had ginned 69,767 bales.

New 1933 Chevrolets boasted of

eliminating the starter button and replacing it with a "startarator."

Football letters were awarded to 20 Blizzards that week in Winters High School. Fourteen of the lettermen were to graduate that spring.

Local Scout Workers were seeking new members for their troops in 1932.

A new Chevrolet Sedan in 1932 would have cost you \$565.

25 YEARS AGO

December 17, 1937

Shooting fireworks in Winters was prohibited that year by law announced Mayor J. W. Copeland that week. Anyone doing so would be arrested and fined.

Winters stores and streets were beautifully decorated for the 1937 Christmas season. Merchants and Manufacturers were announcing new gift ideas for the 1937 holiday season.

"Men! Buy a top coat for only \$15!" was announced in an Higginbotham ad in 1937. Ladies dresses sold for only 49 cents and the very finest silk hosiery sold for 50 cents a pair. Their ad contained lists of suggestions for holiday gift buying.

The new and modern 1937 Santa Claus had replaced the old reindeer with an airplane. At least that's what our paper said! A Christmas special announced by Joe Baker's Beauty Shop in 1937 were Duart Oil Waves for only \$3 and other oil waves for \$1.95.

20 YEARS AGO

December 18, 1942

Contest for Home Christmas decorations was to be judged that Sunday. Anyone was eligible to enter. It was sponsored by the Winters Diversity Club.

Bond Sales for the bomber campaign totaled \$90,000 as of that date in 1942. Quota for the month was set at \$175,000. Winters total was \$30,130.75.

The Bradshaw Bank consolidated with the Winters State Bank that week. Deposits in the Winters State Bank were boosted to nearly two million dollars.

Everyone was warned again of hazards during Christmas holidays such as fire caused by faulty wiring of tree lights on dry trees. Many hints were given to help avoid accidents. Winters Citizens were urged to use caution during the holidays.

People buying bonds to purchase the B-25 bomber were told that week that their names would be placed on a plaque in the plane. All youths, 18 or over, were to register for the Armed Forces during that month in 1942.

Winters Chamber of Commerce office announced that their Santa Claus suit was missing. They asked whoever borrowed it to please return it as soon as possible.

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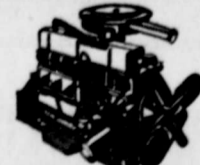
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Blizzards Stop Mustangs Quarter-Final Contest

Lime For Texas Soil Can Increase Crops

The value of limestone in crop production has been known for many years. It can correct soil acidity, supply calcium, promote desirable bacterial activity, make other plant nutrients more available, and improve the effectiveness of fertilizers and manure.

And yet with all its value and effectiveness, farmers of Texas, and particularly those of the East Texas Timberlands and the Coastal Prairie, use only about one-twentieth the amount they should. This is according to a new bulletin published by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service entitled "Lime for Texas Soils."

The bulletin says that with proper management liming results in increased yields and better quality crops. The areas of the state that

have acid soils are discussed in the bulletin and the affected pH of soils is explained. Different forms of lime that are available for liming soils are listed. According to the bulletin, the best means of liming is if lime is needed, soil. It warns that regular should be made because nitrogen fertilizers add to the acidity of soils.

Methods of applying lime are explained and it is pointed out that the lime should be worked into the soil where possible. It should be applied 3 to 6 weeks before planting time and frequency of application depends on your soil, according to the bulletin. There is no need to overliming on Texas soil, it says. Most of them need an excess has no ill effects on crops.

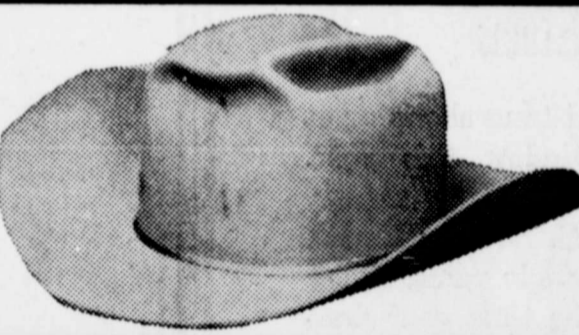
