



Billy Pumphrey, junior journalism student at the University of Texas, was one of a group of twenty students which was in Dallas November 29-30 on a public relations field trip. Dr. Alan Scott, associate professor of journalism, accompanied the group.

The class arrived in Dallas Thursday where they attended an afternoon conference with Horace Aimesworth at the Dallas Market center. Mr. Aimesworth showed the group through the \$18 million Dallas Trade Mart. The Trade Mart is the center of market activity for an eleven state area for gift shop merchandise, housewares, appliances, hardware, jewel-

ry, and other related merchandise. The group also visited Market Hall which is currently under construction and which will have 193,-500 square feet of display space on one floor and will be the largest single market building in the Southwest when it is finished in early 1963. Market Hall will be the site of the Seventh Annual Great Southwest Boat Show which will be held March 1-10. 


