Pony Express Race Drew Big Applause

The Pony Express Race Friday afternoon, with three teams of six riders each riding the 15.2 miles from the old Blue Gap post office east of Winters, to the rodeo grounds, proved such a success and created so much interest that the event probably will be staged again next year during the annual rodeo.

Cars lined the Winters-Novice road all along the race route, with a large crowd on hand at each relay point to witness the riders exchange mail pouches they had been given at the starting point by Winters Postmaster Rankin Pace.

This is the opinion of many of the promoters of the race, the first such event here.

The Lawn Riding Club team won first place in the race, with riders for Winters and San Angelo taking second and third places.

Riders from three teams raced in relays from the old post office site, the oldest post office in Runnels County, with the winning rider coming in, in 46 minutes.

Riding anchor for the Lawn team was Miss Jacinta Carter of Abilene. Her horse, Satan, is primarily a jumper, she said.

Bill Howard, last relay rider for the Winters team, rode to the finish line two minutes after Miss Carter came in, for a total of 48 minutes for the six Winters riders. Tommy Moyer of the San Angelo team was the final rider for his team.

Other members of the winning team were Mr. Mansell, Buzzy Mitchell, Jay Denton, C. B. Pentecost, Lewis Sansen.

The winning team was presented a trophy during the Friday evening performance of the three-day rodeo celebration.

Promoters of the special event said they will work to make the Pony Express Race an annual race in conjunction with the annual rodeo. Because the plans to have the race were not made until a few days prior to the rodeo, only three teams were entered this first time. However, promoters said, given publicity, and because of the reception by the public, it is expected that several teams will enter next year's race. Members of the winning Lawn team said they would "definitely return next year to defend our title."

The race was promoted by several local men, among whom were James West, Rankin Pace and Ralph Lloyd. The idea to have the race originated shortly after the old Blue Gap post office east of Winters was awarded a historical plaque by the County Historical Committee. Postmaster Pace was a sponsor for this project.

Runnels FB Queen Contest Will Be Held August 8

The contest sponsored by the Runnels County Farm Bureau to choose the County FB Queen will be held on the night of the annual FB barbecue planned for August 8, it has been announced. The event will be held in the Ballinger City Park.

According to Thelma Vancil, county FB secretary, the girls will be judged on appearance, poise and personality. Each contestant will be required to answer questions asked by the master of ceremonies in the county and district contest, and also will be required to speak for approximately one minute on "Why are you glad your family belongs to Farm Bureau."

To be eligible, a contestant must be the daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member actively engaged in agricultural production. Membership should be in county of participation. Contestants also must be single and at least 16 years old by Sept. 1, 1963, and not more than 22 years old on that date.

Appropriate awards will be made in the queen contest, it was announced. County winners will compete in the district contest, and each district winner and contestant will receive expense paid trips to the Texas Farm Bureau State convention in Fort Worth Nov. 10-14.

Each district queen will receive as a gift a wrist watch. Those girls wishing to participate in this county FB contest are asked to fill in application blanks at the Farm Bureau Office as soon as possible.

315 More Seats Added To "Home Side" At Stadium

An additional 315 seats will be added to the east, or "home side" grandstand at Blizzard Stadium, it was announced this week.

The board of trustees of Winters Independent Schools has authorized an addition of 32 feet to the south end of the east grandstand. The addition will seat approximately 315 adults or 360 students, and will, when added to the present student section, be set aside for the Blizzard band and student body. This will make possible the sale of more reserved seats in the original east stand, it was pointed out.

Most of the steel beams and columns to be used in construction of the new addition of the grandstand will be obtained from the Texas Surplus Property Agency, Lubbock, it was stated.

C. C. Stephens, local contractor, started work on the project June 23.

At the present time the total seating capacity of all stands at Blizzard Stadium is approximately 2400. The new addition will increase seating capacity to well over 2700. Most of the seats are on the east side of the stadium; the visitors' side has one stand with a capacity of 980.

New Bank For Winters Has Been Denied

Information was received Tuesday afternoon that application for a charter for a national bank to be established in Winters had been denied.

It was understood that a telegram had been received Tuesday by one of the eight men who had made application for the charter, and that a letter containing more information was being forwarded from the Comptroller of Currency, James Saxon.

The eight men, seven of them Winters area residents, had asked for a charter for a bank that would have had a capital stock of \$125,000, a surplus of \$125,000, and a reserve of \$75,000.

Included in the group of men seeking the bank charter are Floyd Sims, M. E. Mathis, O. B. Raper, J. P. Davidson, Earl Burnes, George W. Poe and Walter Adams, all of Winters, and Bobby Bush of Abilene.

The group made application for the new bank on March 25. A routine field survey, made by representatives of the comptroller's department, was made during the past few weeks.

Gary Harter Gets Scholarship For Medical Research

Twenty-two-year old Gary Harter, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Harter of 505 North Rogers in Winters, has received a partial support research grant of \$170.00 from the Medical Research Foundation of Texas as chief investigator of basic medical research being conducted at Baylor University College of Medicine in Houston.

Harter, a sophomore at Baylor, is carrying on research in physiology under the auspices of a unique program which enables medical students to isolate and investigate original problems concerning man's illnesses.

During eleven weeks of experimentation, Harter will try to determine the best places on the chest to measure heart impulses, so that better methods of calculating the heart's output volume can be developed.

Each year the Medical Research Foundation of Texas provides a grant of about \$12,000 to promising young medical scientists through this special program at Baylor.

A 1959 graduate of Winters High School, Harter attended the University of Texas from 1959 until 1962.

Meer-Bergsmas, a widow, a daughter, Klesien, age 16, a son, Wybe Zander, age 23, attending agriculture college in Wageningen, and another daughter, Janny, age 25, a commercial teacher in a girl's school. Miss Kerr will return to the States approximately September 9, 1963.

Gaylene is a junior honor student at Fort LeBoeuf High School, Summit Township, Erie. Her mother will be remembered here as Lois Pruette, who was reared in Winters.

Mord Tucker Was Installed As Lions Club President

Mord Tucker Sr., long time member of the Winters Lions Club, was installed as president of the organization Tuesday noon. Presiding officer was E. V. Grindstaff, Lions Zone chairman and Deputy District Governor-elect of District 2A1.

Robert Christian, Winters High School principal, was installed as first vice president, with Walker Tatum of Piggly Wiggly second vice president. Dr. Z. I. Hale, Winters optometrist, was installed third vice president.

Other officers for the year, installed Tuesday, are Lee Harrison, secretary-treasurer; lion tamer, Homer Hodge; tail twister, Dr. Tommy Russell; hold-over directors, George Beard and Gene Wheat; new directors, Bill Armstrong and Harry Herman.

Russell Bedford, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Bedford, is the Lions Club Sweetheart for the 1963-64 year.

The new Lions Club president is a long time resident of Runnels County, and has been a member of the local club for many years. His twin daughters, Jannette, now Mrs. Bob Duncan of Arlington, and Annette, now Mrs. Gilmore Sanders of Smyrna, Tenn., gained a great deal of fame in Texas a few years ago as the "sweethearts of Texas Lions Clubs." They were quite popular with a musical program which they presented in a great many towns at the time, and attended an International convention of Lions Clubs in Cuba one year.

Tucker moved to Ballinger with his family in 1906 when a small child, but in 1912 moved to Hatchel where he and the former Miss Lovie Bales were married in 1921. The Dodgers have a .600 average, followed by the Indians with a 50-50 split for their season record. Wingate has won 3 of 10, and Lawn still trails without a win this season.

More Paving In Sight For Streets In Winters

In addition to the project now underway, there is a possibility that more streets in Winters will be paved before the end of summer.

Negotiations are now going on to pave at least one block on East Dale, from Cryer Street, west. This should be resolved within a few days, according to J. W. Bahlman, mayor pro tem.

Also, several individuals on East Pierce Street have expressed an interest in promoting a paving project for that street. Residents on North Rogers also are studying the possibilities of paving that street.

City officials have announced that all possible cooperation will be given to getting more streets in Winters paved. In answer to inquiries on how residents can get a paving project started, members of the City Council have pointed out that the residents should get together and present a bonafide request for a paving project. The City would then call for bids on the particular project, and negotiate contracts.

The Council Monday night discussed application of a seal-coat on some of the streets which are already paved.

Necessary plans should be completed within a few days, so that work can be completed while a contractor is in town.

Gov. Connally Says Budget Was Not Studied Before Passage of Money Bill

Former Railroad Commissioner Bill Murray has been accused by the Texas County grand jury of an unusual wrong-doing in his personal business relations with the oil industry while a member of the Commission.

Murray's name as one of the commissioners accused the grand jury that its personal investments in the oil business had in a way influenced its decisions as a commissioner.

Gov. John Connally previously had released a report, presented to him by Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, to the effect that an investigation of Murray's personal income tax returns had revealed that he had made more than \$1,000,000 from his oil investments while serving in the commission. This report was turned to the grand jury.

Murray resigned from the commission several weeks ago when the conflict of interest provision was admitted in the constitution. It has been thought that investment had substantially increased that in a way influenced his decisions.

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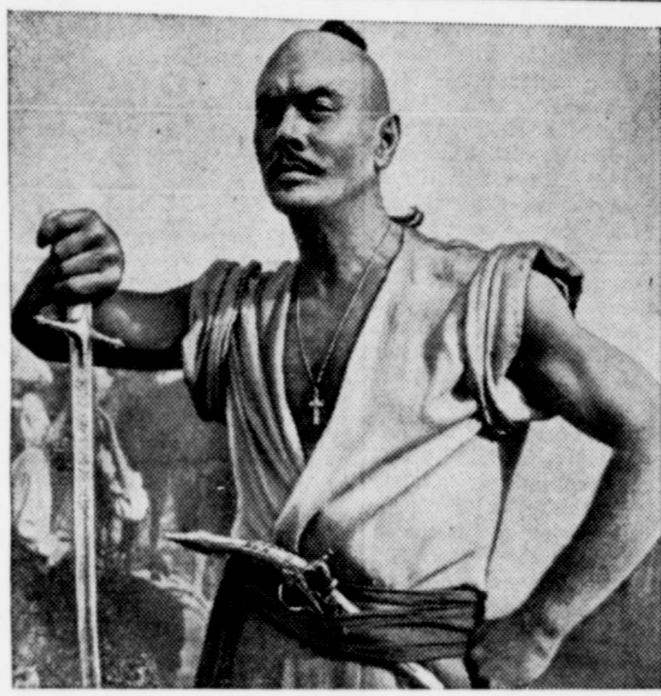
