More Streets Will Receive Seal Coating

Several blocks of Winters streets will receive a seal coating in a summer street improvement program approved by the City Council Tuesday night. The streets, which are already paved but in a bad state of repair, will receive a course of gravel and asphalt.

The entire project will cost \$2614.92, or 15 cents per square yard, it was announced. Newman Brothers Co. of Sweetwater has been contracted to do the work, which should begin within the next few days.

Runnels Co. Agent Will Test Water

C. T. Parker Jr., Runnels County agricultural agent, announced this week that his office has completed installation of a water testing laboratory, for the convenience of county ranchers, farmers and others who wish to have water tested for saline content.

Parker said that residents may bring samples of their water to his office, where tests will be run immediately, and results announced within a few minutes. He said only a small amount of water is needed to make the saline tests, and no appointment is necessary.

A small charge—from 50 cents to \$1.00—will be made, he said, to cover costs of making the tests. The county agent said that by offering this service to the public, his office hopes to obtain continuing records of water conditions in the county. Tests can be made periodically, he said, and if a high saline content becomes apparent corrective action can be taken immediately. He hopes to have a complete record of water sources and conditions in the county.

Parker said also that residents who wish to have purity tests made of their water, his office will be glad to take the samples and forward them to Austin. His office laboratory will make only saline tests, not purity tests, he pointed out. No charge will be made for purity tests which are made in Austin, he said.

32-Bed Nursing Home Will Be Erected Here

Ground will be broken at 10 a. m. Saturday for a new 32-bed nursing home in Winters, being built by Mrs. L. L. Merrill. Mrs. Merrill presently is operating a nursing home here.

Mayor Harvey D. Jones will speak at the groundbreaking. The new nursing home will be located on Van Ness Street.

The new home will be the result of local enterprise, it was announced. No federal aid was sought or needed.

After the new nursing home is completed, technicians will be on duty 24 hours a day so that every resident will be under constant capable observation, it was announced.

The building for the nursing home will be a brick veneer, equipped with year-round air conditioning and temperature controls. Kitchens and equipment will compare favorably with many small hospitals, it was said.

The structure has been designed to provide for expansion when needed.

Construction Is Progressing On Grain Warehouse

Construction of the new grain storage building being erected by Alderman-Cave Milling & Grain Co. was progressing this week, with the steel framework already in place and steel siding ready to go on. The structure should be completed within a few more days, ready to receive what looks like "one of the best milo crops," company representatives said.

Built entirely of steel, on a heavy concrete foundation and floor, the new grain storage building will be one of the most modern in this area. It will be connected to the main elevator building located across the railroad tracks from the new building site. A conveyor system will be built to move the grain from the elevator to the storage, and also to move the grain back to the elevator and to any other building of the mill.

Designed as a "flexible" storage building will have a capacity of 13,000 bushels. It will hold 50 carloads of cottonseed hulls, it was stated. Dimensions of the building are 50 feet by 100 feet, with outside walls 24 feet. It will peak to 36 feet in the center. Pitch of the roof is engineered to the natural peak or flow of wheat or milo, it was said.

Ray Alderman, manager of the company, said that construction of the new grain storage is another step in the planned growth and progress of the operation. It will increase the company's grain storage capacity to 260,000 bushels he said, and will add to the grain handling capabilities of the company. Alderman said that the storage capacity will be used primarily for the grain bank program in which the company cooperates with grain growers, stock feeders and others. After this demand is filled, it was stated, the company will use the space for storage of their own grains.

Telephone Co. In Improvement Program Here

A program of improvement of long distance telephone circuits is being carried out here by Southwestern States Telephone.

A. J. Lacy, division manager for the company, said the project provides for transposing of carrier circuits from Winters to the point of contact with Bell System lines at Bradshaw. The work should provide improved long distance circuits, Lacy said.

Construction on the project will consist of the placement of about 33 poles and 40 crossarms. Work is expected to be completed about August 1.

Crop Prospects Among Best In Years In County

Condition of cotton and grain sorghum crops in Runnels County indicate that 1963 will be a bountiful year, according to reports of agricultural agencies and farmers.

Crops in this area are "generally better" than ever, reports said, and continuing favorable weather conditions point to record yields in milo and cotton. However, here is the ever-present danger that insects can put a damper on yield prospects if they are not watched closely.

C. T. Parker, Runnels County agricultural agent, said that farmers are keeping a close eye on the cotton, and are taking steps to prevent an upsurge in the boll weevil population. Proper inspection and preventive measures can mean the difference between a very good yield and a poor one, he said. He said that his office will be glad to work with farmers on any problems concerning insects.

The county agent said that some of the 1963 grain crop may begin coming out of the fields within two or three weeks. There are an estimated 100,000 acres planted to milo in the county, it was reported.

Mike Patterson, 16, and Johnny Hopper, 19, who were injured in an explosion while cleaning an oil tank near Norton Tuesday morning, were taken to John Sealy Hospital Tuesday night for treatment.

Reports received Wednesday night said that the two youths still are listed on the critical list, following the ambulance trip from Abilene to Galveston Tuesday night.

According to information received, the two young men will begin receiving treatment immediately, with no estimate of time required for hospitalization.

A third person involved in the accident, Ralph Teten, about 60, remains in the Winters Municipal Hospital, with less serious burns.

The three men were employed by Winters Construction Co. and were cleaning out a tank, when a motor used in the cleaning operation ignited an accumulation of explosive residue in the tank, according to reports. The explosion ignited Patterson's clothing, and Hopper tackled him and extinguished the flames with his hands. They were brought to the Winters Hospital by an employee of the Humble Pipe Line Co., and were later taken to Abilene.

Winters Fire Department extinguished the fire in the tank battery. Patterson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Patterson, was a member of the Winters High School football team last year.

Hopper, also a former Winters High School football player, makes his home with Mr. and Mrs. Pyburn Brown.

Accompanying the ambulances to Galveston were Mr. and Mrs. Patterson, and Bill Bean of the Winters Construction Co., and Mr. and Mrs. Pyburn Brown.

INSURANCE UP
Recommendations for higher auto insurance rates have been made to the State Board of Insurance, by insurance companies, and the Board's own staff.

Losses under current rates prompt a general statewide increase averaging 8.6 per cent. But there are variations.

Farmers and ranchers, who have chalked up a good non-accident record, will get substantial cuts. They will range from 20 to 30 per cent, in various parts of the state.

City drivers will face higher rates for their public liability insurance. Statistics show that where there are more cars there are more accidents.

State is divided into 26 rating territories. Drivers living in safer areas will pay less for their insurance.

Board will announce its decision soon, and new rates will take effect on August 1.

SEWER AID

State Health Department has compiled a list of 37 cities awaiting work that Congress has appropriated money to continue the federal-aid program for construction of sewage treatment facilities. These cities have applied for \$4,067,626 worth of grants to help them build \$15,980,384 worth of projects.

Expected Texas allocation is about \$3,200,000. So some will have to do without federal aid—or wait for next year.

ETHICS

Three representatives who piloted a tough code of ethics bill through the House of Representatives still are trying.

Reps. James E. Nugent of Kerrville, Robert C. Eckhardt of Houston and Travis Peeler of Corpus Christi presently are seeking help from the Attorney General in drafting a new version for the next session in the Legislature. Later on they hope to talk with Governor Connally about it.

Their bill zoomed through the House. But it was killed in the Senate.

It would prohibit state officials (and legislators) from having extensive business holdings in areas they regulate—or legislate.

SWEDES CELEBRATE

Some 1,300 Texans of Swedish descent gathered in Austin to observe the 125th anniversary of the arrival of the first Swede in Texas.

He was S. M. Swenson, who became quite a power in Texas affairs, and then brought hundreds of other Swedish immigrants to Texas.

Swenson family still operates a large ranch in Throckmorton and Jones Counties.

A program in two languages marked the observance.

CLERKS

Folks who keep the official records in the 254 courthouses of Texas had a convention in Austin. County Clerk Val D. Hugar of Victoria County wound up as the new president of the County and District Clerks' Association of Texas.

Runnels County Clerk Frankie Berryman was named first vice president, and will move up to president in 1964.

SALES UP

Retail sales in Texas improved a bit in May, after a slump in April.

May sales were 4 per cent above April and 4 percent above May, 1962.

RAINS ON THE RANGE

Ranchers got some breaks in some parts of the state, reports the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Summer range and pasture feed prospects continued on the upgrade in the northwest part of Texas. Prospects also were improved by rains in the central and southeastern parts of the state. These ranchers had been culling herds, and sales had been heavy until the rains came.

BED-ROCK RULING

Securities Commissioner William M. King issued an order prohibiting further sales of stock in the Roka-Bed Corporation of Lubbock.

Firm was organized to make children's furniture, including a baby bed which would rock baby to sleep when he cries. Advertising said Roka-Bed had been tested on 5,000 babies.

What About Pasture Land?
I have been successful in buying pasture land in Kansas where grass grows which is excellent for raising of Texas buy a railroad ticket to ship their steers to the stockyards in Kansas City or Chicago to be slaughtered and sold for beef. When Texas cattle are pasturing on your land it is customary to pay a professional caretaker so much a head for watching the cattle. All of this information you can get from many sources; but my business I have handled through the office of Carl C. Chase of Eureka, Kansas.

Trustees Have Their Advantages
Many readers of this column have put money in the hands of trustees of banks or other trustees in favor of their children and grandchildren. These trustees have their advantages; they are careful, honest, and reasonable in their charges. On the other hand, they naturally do not like to buy forest or pasture land if it pays no income, as their fees depend upon the income from the estate. Therefore, although there are times when certain non-dividend-paying stocks are really safer than Dow-Jones gilt-edge stocks, yet trustees refrain from buying them because they yield no income to the trustees.

The trustees' fees, however, can be so arranged that both the principal involved and the income received will be recognized. This is both fairer, and often safer in the long run, for the beneficiaries. Never hesitate to be liberal with the trustees upon whom your children and grandchildren are depending. Therefore, whether you are pending. Therefore, whether you are taking care of your own fund or employing a trustee, I urge you to have some of the money invested in forest or pasture land. Next week I will discuss real estate; but this is something entirely different from what I am writing about this week.

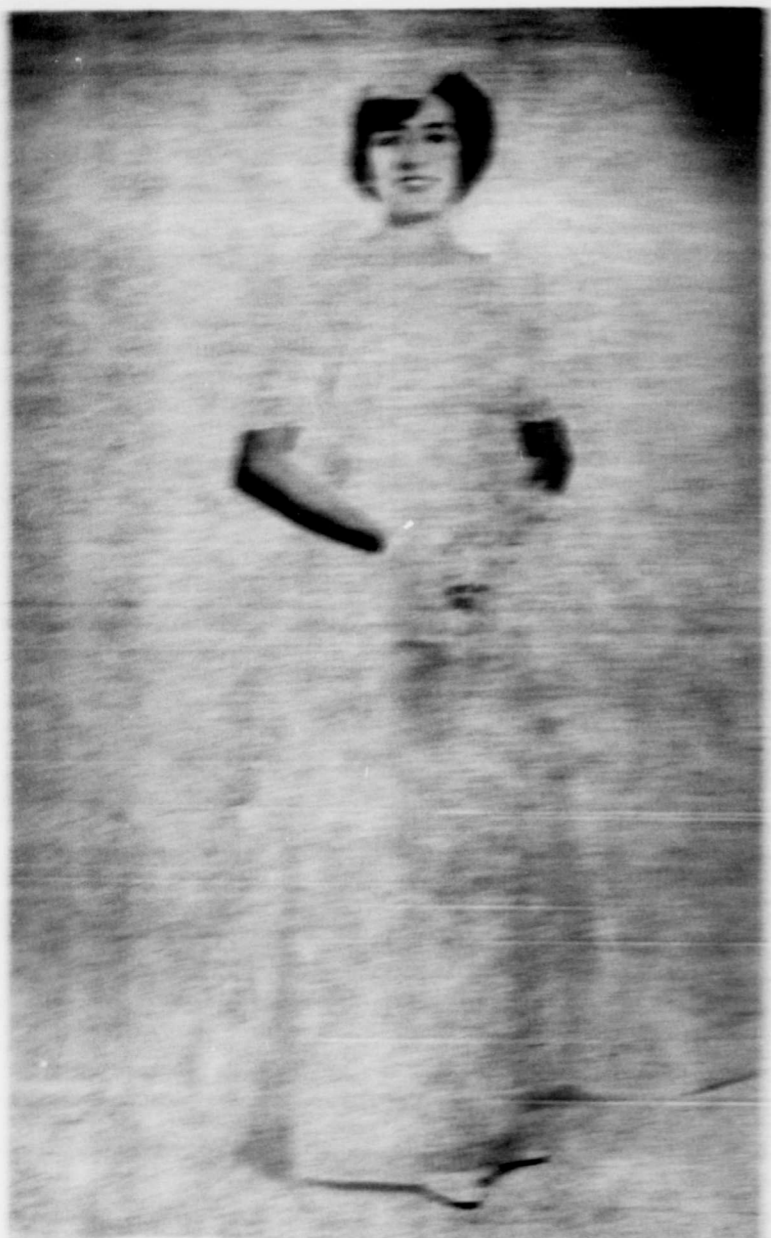

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
