Winters Athletes Make Showing In Junior Olympics

Boys from Winters competed Saturday with teams from Fort Worth, Odessa, Lubbock and Amarillo, and other area towns, in the Junior Olympics and brought home a good record for their efforts.

Coached by High School Coach L. G. Wilson, the team won several places in the events.

Jerry Awalt, in the 12-13 Junior Division, won first place in the 220, fifth place in 100 yard dash and broad jump, and fourth place in high jump events. He also ran in the 440 relay event.

David Burnett, in the junior division, was third in high jump, and was a member of the 440 relay team for fourth.

Jim Nevins, Randy Boles were also members of the fourth place 440 relay team.

In the division for boys 11 years old and under, the 440 relay team made up of Tommy Jones, Bo Griffin, Bruce Walling and Jim Walling placed sixth. Jones also took part in the 50 yard dash, and Bruce Walling was in the 75 and 50 yard dash.

Others in the 11 and under division included Bill Baldwin, broad jump, 50 and 75 yard dash; Wesley Crouch, 50 yard dash; Jerry Nevins, broad jump, 50 and 75 yard dash; and Stan Wilson, broad jump and 50.

In the junior division, Danny Kellogg participated in the high jump event.

In the intermediate division were Mike Holloway, broad jump and hurdles, and Paul Jones, 880 yard dash.

Senior division competitors were Gary Young, broad jump and triple jump; and Douglas Hart, 100 yard dash.

FB Will Help Send Firemen To School Under New Program

The Runnels County Farm Bureau is participating in a program to assist volunteer fire departments in fire prevention and protection in rural areas, according to Hugo Vogelsang of Winters, president of the Farm organization.

The local FB leader said the Farm Bureau will help defray expenses for sending a limited number of volunteer firemen to a firemen's Training School to be held July 21-26 at Texas A. and M. College. The FB will pay \$45 of the \$50 registration fee for members of local volunteer fire departments to attend the school, which furnishes up-to-date information on fire protection and fire prevention as well as fire fighting techniques. The \$50 registration fee also covers lodging and meals, he explained.

The county FB president said local fire departments are being urged to cooperate in the plan to reduce fire losses in rural areas of the county. Any volunteer fire department agreeing to serve rural areas will be eligible to submit an applicant for fire training at the school. However, the total number of persons attending is limited, and only one member from each fire department can be accepted, it was pointed out.

The Farm Bureau will also pay any locally organized fire department for answering fire calls outside city limits to fight fires involving property of FB members carrying fire insurance with the FB insurance Company, Vogelsang said. The amount of payment will be \$75 per call, he explained.

Week of July 21-27 Proclaimed As Farm Safety Week

County Judge W. H. Rampy has officially proclaimed July 21-27 as Farm Safety Week in Runnels County, according to Hugo Vogelsang, Winters, president of the Runnels County Farm Bureau.

President Kennedy and Governor Connally have previously designated that week on national and state levels as a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce disabling injuries and death.

The county farm leader said that farm accidents have been reduced in the past few years; however, farmers cannot afford to let down their guard against accidents. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in America today.

In his official proclamation, Judge Rampy said, "All the citizens of Runnels County are concerned about the safety and well-being of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities.

"Farm accidents result in more than 150 deaths and thousands of disabling injuries in Texas each year.

"Farm accidents are responsible for needless suffering and incapacity, and greatly effect the economic well-being and progress of our agricultural population in our county, state and nation.

"Throughout this special week, a statewide farm accident prevention and educational program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the Texas Safety Association and the Runnels County Farm Bureau with the theme "Inspection plus Correction Equals protection."

Winters Mfg. Fire Loss Undetermined

It has been impossible at this early date to get an exact amount on the loss experienced by the Winters Manufacturing Co. in the fire which destroyed a warehouse last Thursday, but one representative of the company said the loss would be "at least \$35,000, and perhaps much more when the final figures are in."

The warehouse, filled with motors, corrugated shipping containers and other materials, was completely destroyed by the fire, origin of which has not been determined. The blaze was discovered about 1:15 last Thursday afternoon, and all units of the Winters Volunteer Fire Department answered the call. Also, one unit of the Ballinger fire department was summoned to lend aid in fighting the fire.

A fire wall between the destroyed building and another warehouse prevented the blaze from doing a great amount of damage to the other building, which also is used for warehousing electric motors and pumps.

Fire did penetrate into the adjoining building, and firemen were called Sunday night to extinguish a blaze which suddenly broke out from smoldering debris.

Fire Chief Marvin Bedford and Fireman H. L. Crowe were called about 1 a. m. Sunday to extinguish the blazes which had sprung up in the fire-wrecked building. A high wind caused corrugated packing boxes, which had been smoldering since Thursday afternoon, to begin blazing again. Chief Bedford and Crowe also wet down a smoldering cotton burr pile at Glenn Gin to prevent further fire in that area, caused by the high winds.

Bedford and Crowe spent most of the night watching over the two fires.

Fireman J. T. Sprinkle, who was overcome by smoke and heat during Thursday's fire, was admitted to Winters Municipal Hospital for overnight observation. He has been released from the hospital.

City Makes Revision In Electric Rate For Heating



Eddie Little On National Group For Photo Meet

Eddie Little, Winters photographer, is one of four people named to serve on the national committee in charge of special breakfasts, luncheons, dinners, and the awards banquet for the National Convention of Professional Photographers of America to be held in Dallas next week. Others on the committee include Mrs. Little, John Rose of San Antonio, and Durwood Griffin, Master of Photography, of Monroe, Louisiana.

Little has also been renamed to the board of directors of the Texas Professional Photographers Association. He will be serving his 9th term in that capacity.

A graduate of Rice University and of Winona School of Photography, Winona Lake, Indiana, he has been engaged in photography here since 1950. He is a charter member and past president of the Central and West Texas Professional Photographers Society.

In 1962 he was presented the National Award for Texas at the state convention. The National association allows this award presented yearly to the man selected by Texas Photographers for outstanding work and service in photography. Little has a number of merits toward his Master of Photography degree. He has served on numerous committees at state, area, and regional conventions. More than 100 of his portraits have been selected for display at state, regional, and national exhibits.

Little has also been active in local affairs since he came to Winters in 1939. He is a past president and a past member of the board of directors of the Winters Country Club. The high school chapters of Future Homemakers of America and of Quill and Scroll have named him to honorary membership in appreciation for services rendered. He has also served on various civic committees in past years.

Winters City Council Tuesday night approved an amendment to the electric service rate, permitting a lower charge for customers who use electricity for heating during certain months of the year.

The amendment provides for charging 1 cent per kilowatt hour for electricity used in excess of 500 kilowatt hours billed on residential service rates. The present rate is 2 cents per kilowatt hour.

The new heating service rate will be effective with December 1 billings and ending with April 1 billings, it was pointed out.

To be eligible for this low heating service rate, customer must have connected and in regular use an electric reverse cycle heat pump or permanently installed space heating devices of not less than five kilowatts.

N. D. Waggoner, City Light Plant superintendent, said the new rate would permit residents building or remodeling homes to permanently install electric heating units of not less than five kilowatts, and would come at a time of the year when demand for electricity is comparatively low.

All other electric service rates will remain the same, it was pointed out.

The City Council also approved the purchase of a refrigerated air conditioning unit to be placed in the delivery room at the Winters Municipal Hospital.

In other action, the council approved the leasing of a city-owned electric generating engine to the Municipal Light Plant. Under the agreement, the light plant will pay \$1,000 per month lease on the engine, which was purchased by the City of Winters in 1959; the engine has been in operation since that time.

The engine which is being leased by the light plant was purchased in 1959 with time warrants, for \$129,000. The time warrants subsequently were converted to tax bonds on May 1, 1960. The engine is actually the property of the tax fund and not the light plant, city officials pointed out. Under the agreement, the light plant will be paying for the machinery, and the tax fund will not be burdened with the entire cost. Tax bonds will mature in 1979, it was said.

The city light plant has five generating engines, two of 200 kilowatt capacity, and three of 900 kilowatt capacity, a total of 3100 kilowatt.

A representative of a company which manufactures trash and garbage truck units appeared before the council and submitted a bid on pick up unit. No action has been taken on purchasing a new unit to replace one which was purchased about seven years ago; the council has called for bids from various companies.

Representative of the Winters Volunteer Fire Department also appeared before the council to request that a study be made toward purchasing a new fire truck. Another truck is needed, it was explained, to supplement present equipment. Council agreed to make a study of the need, and to investigate the possibilities of obtaining another fire truck.

The Winters Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary has received recognition for special work with veterans hospitals from the Veterans Hospital at Big Spring, in the form of a certificate of merit.

Mrs. W. L. Collins, community service chairman, presented the certificate to the local Auxiliary in behalf of the Big Spring Hospital during a meeting this week. The certificate is awarded for "Five Years of continuous and outstanding service to patients through the Veterans Administration Voluntary Service Program, in recognition of volunteer service to veterans," and is signed by V. J. Belda, director.

At the meeting Monday night, plans for the coming VFW year were discussed, with Community Service to be the main program for the year. Mrs. Collins reported on a recent meeting of the board of directors of the Winters Library.

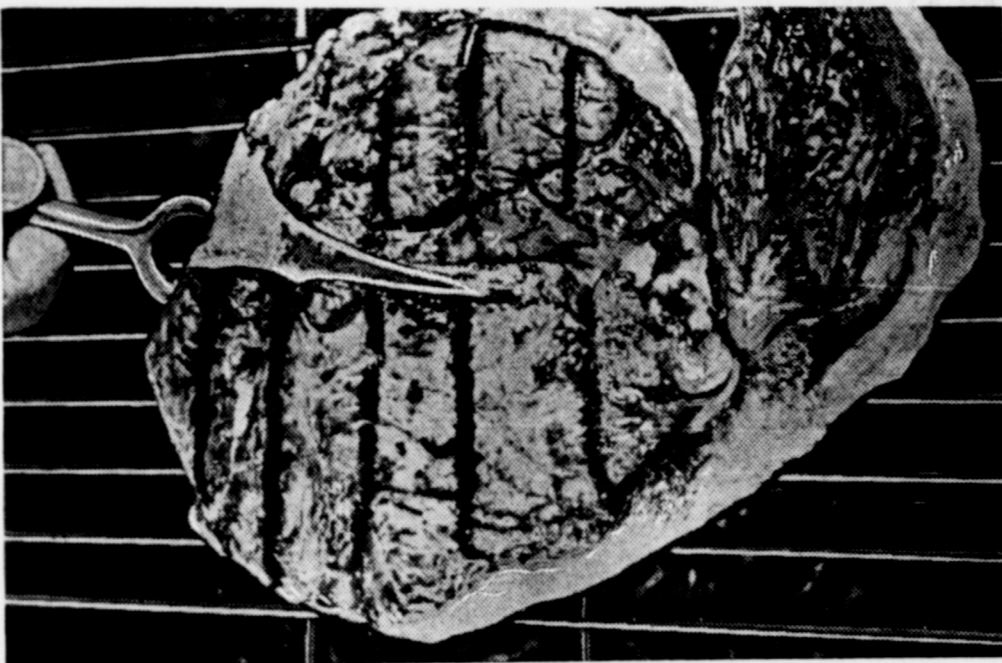

Civil Rights Bill Causing Tussle Behind the Scenes

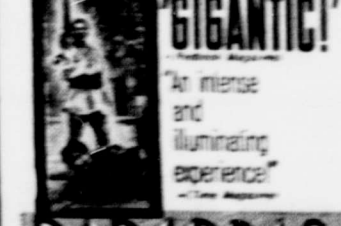


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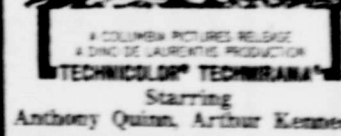
