The amendment provides for charging 1 cent per kilowatt hour for electricity used in excess of 500 kilowatt hours billed on residential service rates. The present rate is 2 cents per kilowatt hour.

The new heating service rate will be effective with December 1 billings and ending with April 1 billings, it was pointed out. To be eligible for this low heat-

ing service rate, customer must have connected and in regular use an electric reverse cycle heat pump or permanently installed space heating devices of not less than five kilowatts.

N. D. Waggoner, City Light Plant superintendent, said the new rate would permit residents building or remodeling homes to permanently install electric heating units of not less than five kilowatts, and would come at a time of the year when demand for electricity is comparatively low. All other electric service rates will remain the same, it was pointed out.
