In a project of unprecedented Winters property proportions, owners and the City of have teamed to spend approximately \$7540 in paving almost 16 blocks of city streets, and the drive is continuing to add many more blocks of paving.

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In addition, the City has spent 2614.50 in seal-coating many blocks of already paved streets. Many blocks of city streets have already been paved in this program, and contractors this week re working on additional streets. While this work is going on, property owners on streets which re in need of paving are working behind the scenes, collecting money and making plans to add many more blocks to the network of paved streets. About eight blocks will be added to the paving, in addition to those already paved, or being worked on. Contracts have not been completed on these eight blocks, but it was expected that all details would be taken care of within the next day or two.

Property owners are paying for the paving of the streets adjacent to their property, with the City evening, August 8, in Ballinger paying for work at intersections. In addition, the City has done some work in preparing streets

A total of \$7153.00 has been paid by property owners for completed paving, or streets in the process of being paved this week. The city has paid contractors \$387.00 for intersection work, in addition to some preparation work.
