August Rains Bring Year's Total To 19.2

Heavy rains on the last two days of August upped the total rainfall for Winters to 19.2 inches for the year. Winters proper received 0.9 inch on Aug. 30, and 0.7 inch on Aug. 31, for a total of 5.2 inches for August.

Other sections of North Runnels County received upwards of three inches on rainfall in the two-day period, with scattered showers reported over most of the area. On Sept. 2, water still was standing in ditches and in low-lying fields between Winters and Wingate, in an area which received about three inches of moisture.

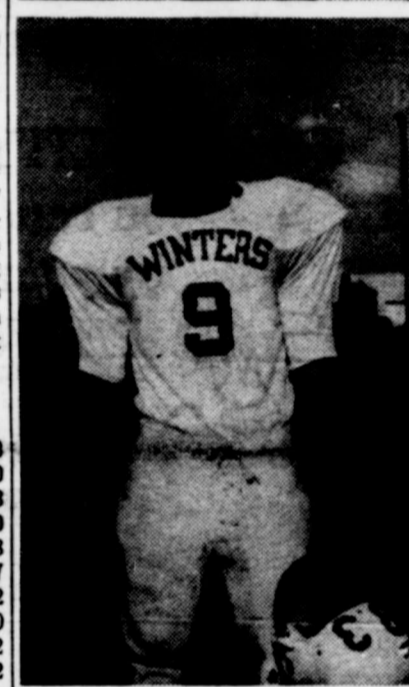
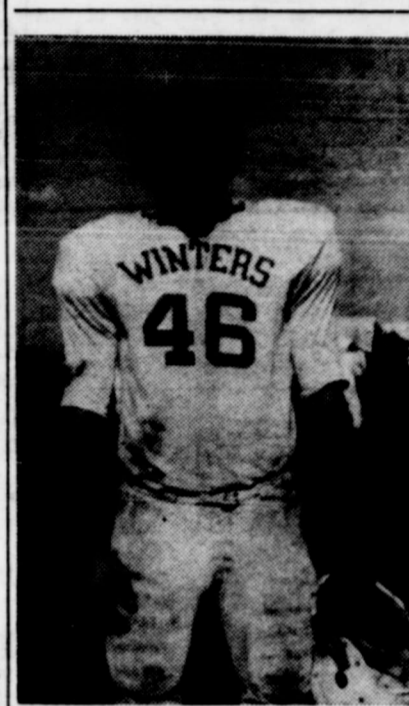

Blizzards Open '63 Season Saturday

The Winters High School Blizzards, after scrimmaging the Cisco Lobos last Friday night, pry the lid off the 1963 football season Saturday night when they go wolf hunting in earnest against the Colorado City Wolves. Kickoff time is 8 p. m., on Blizzard Field.

AROUND THE 6-AA FOOTBALL LOOP

Five of the six teams making up District 6-AA, now in its second year since the reorganization last year, will open the season against out-of-district teams Friday night. The sixth team, the Winters Blizzards, wait until Saturday night to begin season play.

The Ballinger Bearcats, with an 8-2 1962 record, and with nine returning lettermen, go to Brady. Last year the Bearcats defeated the Bulldogs 18-0.

The Pied Pipers of Hamlin visit Rotan for a pre-district tilt, taking with them 10 returning lettermen. Their 1962 record was 6-4. Hamlin defeated Rotan 12-10 last year.

Haskell also goes out of town, taking on Seymour at Seymour. Twelve returning lettermen grace the Indian lineup. Their '62 record was 7-3. The Haskell gridsters chopped Seymour 44-6 last year.

Anson, low team on the totem pole in 1962, with a record of 1-8-1, plays host to the Bluecats from Coleman Friday night. They split a ticket with Coleman last year, 6-6. They have 10 returning lettermen.

Stamford, with five returnees, and a 7-3 1962 record, hosts Quanah Friday night. They zeroed Quanah 34-0 last year.

The Winters Blizzards, defending their 1962 6-AA championship, will meet the Colorado City Wolves on Blizzard field Saturday night. With a 13-1 record for 1962, the Champions have several returning lettermen who were on the All-District and honorable mention teams last year.

The Abilene Reporter-News 6-AA standings are Winters, Ballinger, Stamford, Haskell, Anson and Hamlin, in that order.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram High Rankings for Class AA, pulls two out of District 6-AA, Winters and Ballinger, as No. 4 and 5, in that order, in the state.

The Blizzards, picked as District 6-AA favorites this year following their trip to the semi-finals last December, go into this season in excellent condition, following three weeks of thorough training. Pre-season knocks have been kept at a minimum, with only one man definitely out of the game Saturday. Hank McCreight, 171-pound junior, an end, suffered an injured knee in the Cisco scrimmage, and will be out of action for two or three games, Coach L. G. Wilson said. Otherwise, the Big Blue team is ready to go.

Graduation whittled away some of the material which carried the Winters reps through 13 wins and a close semi-final loss to Jacksboro last year, but remaining members of that Cinderella team, and upcomers, will make a formidable obstacle for pre-conference foes and district opponents.

Winters team members took eight slots on last year's 27-man 6-AA All-District team last year, and many honorable mentions. And several of those players are back this year. Steve Grissom, 166-pound senior, who is aiming for his fourth letter, was an All-District offense fullback selection last year, and also received honorable mention as a corner linebacker on the defensive team, returns to the football wars this year with an eye cocked toward the 15th game.

Also, Denny Aldridge, in the halfback slot and honorable mention on last year's All-District offensive team, has returned, moving up to the down-under position at quarterback. He is a two-year letterman. He also received honorable mention on last year's 6-AA defensive team.

Mike Mitchell, receiving honorable mention as an end on the offense, and also as a linebacker last year, returns this year for a go at his third football letter in the end position.

Johnny Mathis, tipping the scales at 202 as a guard, was an honorable mention center in last year's tough All-District offensive team. He's a junior, with one letter.

Mike Patterson, 195-pound tackle, a junior, was on 1962's honorable mention 6-AA defensive team, and a critical point kicker, is on the roster for the tackle spot this year, but probably will not play until later in the season because of serious burns he received in a July 2 explosion and fire.

Much of the material in this year's lineup comes up from a crackerjack 1962 B team, with plenty of experience under their belts. There are nine seniors on the roster; 13 juniors; and five sophomores. In total tonnage, these 1963 Blizzards tip the scales at 4526 pounds, an average of about 167 pounds.

A dreadnaught line — Richard Shade 238, Roger O'Neal 212, Johnny Mathis 202, Ronald Kraatz 165 — coupled with fast moving ends and backfield, promise much misery for opposing offensive teams. Experience in the backfield on offense, protected by a heavy line—Bob Foster 188, Mathis, Alan Benson 186, and Kraatz, Chester Puckett 175—is typical of the teams in 6-AA, dubbed by many as the Little Southwest Conference.

In last year's opener, the Blizzards chopped the Colorado City Wolves to pieces 18-6, at Colorado City.

Coaching the Blizzards this year are Head Coach Wilson, Bill Bryant, and two new staff members, Jerry Cunningham and Bob Forbess.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

Indication Apparent Toward Trend of In Refusing Federal Aid for Schools

Texas' new Parks-Wildlife Commission has reclassified its personnel in keeping with the \$3,500,000 budget set by the Legislature. Reclassification will result in an additional \$10,000 in salary expenses.

Commissioners voted to keep all personnel from the old Parks Board and the Game and Fish Commission on the payroll.

Howard Dodgen, former executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission, will be retained as a Consultant to the Board until January.

Commission also approved Executive Director Weldon Watson's recommendation that the state parks system be managed through the five regional offices used by game officials. Regional headquarters are located in La Porte, Rockport, San Angelo, Tyler and Waco.

NEW TREND?

There seems to be a new trend toward refusing federal aid. The Irving School Board spurned an offer of an \$11,000 grant because "of the growing danger of federal control of the school curriculum."

But most school systems still accept educational assistance from the U. S. government. Texas Education Agency, looking at preliminary figures for the 1962-1963 school year, found \$33,700,000 was paid to Texas schools by federal programs.

In some cases, however, acceptance is selective: Both Houston and Dallas, which have local programs geared to prevent student drop-outs refused cash grants for a similar federal program.

Houston and Dallas also are among the Texas towns which reject federal funds for school lunch programs. Others include Odessa, Goose Creek, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth, Henderson, Longview, Borger and Alvin.

U. S. AID

Abilene turned down a \$446,730 offer of aid for a \$3,000,000 sewer treatment plant from the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Federal grants for \$3,000,000 worth of sewer treatment improvements in Texas are recommended and administered by State Department of Health officials.

Funds refused by Abilene were distributed among the following towns: Fritch, Gonzales, Grafard, Hidalgo, Markum, Mineral Wells, Richland Springs, Smiley, West Columbia and Window.

TEXAS' TAX TAKE

Although the Lone Star State accepted less federal money than many other states during the fiscal year that ended on June 30, it received slightly more than it paid out, according to a survey by Congressional Quarterly.

Texans paid about 4.26 per cent of all taxes received by the federal government. It reaped 4.81 per cent of the \$10,000,000-plus federal grant total, or \$500,295,000.

National average of federal aid received was \$56 per capita. In Texas, the assistance averaged \$49 per citizen. Alaskans were high with a per capita average of \$226. Low was New Jersey with \$34 per capita.

Schools and sewage systems were just a few targets of federal aid. In fiscal 1962, this state received \$128,734,600 for highway construction; \$31,120,182 for unemployment insurance; \$62,832,854 for agricultural conservation; \$139,252,153 for welfare assistance, and \$13,350,583 for the national guard, as well as aid in other fields.

Pressure On To Increase Present Immigration Quota

By Congressman O. C. Fisher

PRESSURES TO INCREASE immigration to this country have been shaping up in recent weeks. President Kennedy sent a special message to Congress which, if enacted, would enable more than a half-million more to be admitted annually from southern and eastern European and Afro-Asian countries. The President's request calls for abolition of the National

Immigration Act of 1952. Showing Friday, Saturday and Sunday at the Fiesta Drive-In.

Origin System, which for forty years has been the basis for our quota limitation laws. After five years, under the President's proposal, the total increase per year could approximate one million.

Last June the President promised the American Committee on Italian Migration that he planned to ask Congress to liberalize our immigration laws, and his special message followed.

Despite our present restrictions, which do not apply to the Western Hemisphere, total immigration runs about one million per year now. The line against pressures to liberalize admissions has been held, largely due to the efforts of the late Congressman Francis Walter, Chairman of the Committee Handling Immigration Laws in the House. Walter's death two months ago has caused proponents of more liberal immigration laws to step up their efforts.

This move is unfortunate for many reasons. In the first place, the increase would add to unemployment and housing problems.

And, it is believed by many observers that with the scrapping of our National Origins System on the average a more undesirable class of people would be admitted.

Pressures for abolishing present restrictions stems from many foreign-born organizations in this

country. These groups are often referred to as blocs, and their votes are often sought by politicians.

In any event, the Congress may have to come to grips with this proposal soon.

It is difficult for a group such as the Council of Abilene to resist the temptation to pitch their financial responsibilities into the laps of a centralized government, especially in the face of demands on the part of many who have refused to see the danger in relinquishing control. But so long as one community refuses to be stamped, the spark of hope remains, perhaps to finally break into a blaze of indignation at encroachment by the Federal bureaucracy, and return control of local affairs to where it belongs, with the people themselves.

As members of the Girl Scouts grow up and leave the organization, younger girls begin at the bottom of the Girl Scout ladder. This is a never-ending process, and in a given number of years, the entire roster of the troop is changed.

This also is true of the leaders of the Girl Scout movement. Mothers, as their daughters progress in Scouting, keep abreast of the change, and, naturally, when their daughters reach the end of their membership, drop out of the leadership ranks. This is not true in every respect, because many women see the need and are more than happy to fill the vacancies which occur, whether or not they have daughters in the organization.

However, steady attrition peels away many of the leaders until there comes a time when there is a dire need for leadership. This is the case locally. Girl Scout leaders are needed if the Winters organization is to survive this attrition. There are many women in the community who would gladly lend their support to this movement if only they are informed that the need exists. Those interested in the continuance of Girl Scouting in Winters are asked to contact Mrs. Hubert Crenshaw, Mrs. Weldon Collins.

There probably is someone in this area who has a small desk which could be used by instructors in the new school being organized to train Licensed Vocational Nurses at the Winters Municipal Hospital. School Board Okays Student Insurance

Winters School Board has approved an offer by Standard Life and Accident Insurance Co. for insurance policies covering members of athletic teams and other students in the school.

Policy approved is a limited policy and will be offered to students at the rate of \$3.50 for the nine-month school term. Some of the limitations, according to school officials, include: to pay hospital, student must be in hospital for at least 24 hours; injuries on two-wheel motor vehicles are not covered, but bicycles are covered; adult maximums are cut to one-half that of students; and injuries in automobile accidents are not paid in excess of other insurance carried; if no other insurance is carried, they will be covered.

Brochures will be handed to students who will show them to parents, Thursday, Sept. 5. The program will close on Thursday, Sept. 12.

In making announcement of the approval of the insurance for school students, the School Board emphasized that the school is not in the insurance business, makes no profit from this service, and offers the policy through demand and in order to secure athletic coverage. It was also emphasized that no school employee receives compensation for any effort in record keeping or any part of the insurance program, and that the Board does not recommend that the policy be purchased, but leaves the choice strictly to the parents. However, it was explained, before any company will carry insurance on a football team, all students to be covered must purchase the basic policy.

HEALTH LETTER

The old man had been high on a ladder, pruning a pecan tree. Suddenly he was lying helpless on the ground, vulnerable to the ladder as it crashed down on his head.

He's still hospitalized. The price he paid for his back yard tree-pruning venture: both heels crushed, a broken vertebra, and a deep gash in his head. What prompted him to undertake so difficult a task when he was so obviously ill-equipped to handle it?

There is no firm answer to the question. The incident is just one of thousands which kill and maim and cripple people throughout Texas and the rest of the nation each year. Accidents, as of this moment, stand as the fourth leading cause of death among all age groups in Texas and the United States as a whole.

Even more grim is the fact that of the 5655 accidental deaths of all types registered in Texas last year, one-fourth occurred in the most cherished of all places—the victim's home.

Thorough studies into the nature of accidents show that very few happen by pure chance. They occur because a stairway was improperly lighted... because an electrical circuit was overloaded... because a threshold strip wasn't tacked down tight... because the rung of a ladder was loose... because an insecticide was carelessly stored... because someone was smoking in bed... because of an endless variety of human failings.

The National Safety Council defines accident statistics as "a single human tragedy multiplied to the point of indifference." The definition is an apt one, since accidents have become commonplace in the pattern of modern life.

Children and older people are most susceptible. Current national statistics show that 5,000 children are killed and 16,500,000 are injured each year. Persons 65 years old and over compose nine percent of the population; yet this age group experiences 74 percent of all fatal falls and 28 percent of all deaths from fire and explosion.

There is no reason to believe the pattern of fatal home accidents this year will vary greatly from the 1962 pattern when 1384 Texans met untimely death thusly:
