## Blizzards Play In Anson Friday

The league-leading Winters Blizzards, intent on keeping their conference record intact, have been undergoing intense training this week in preparation for their encounter against Anson Friday night.

Their defeat of Stamford 22-16 last week on home grounds served to bolster their position in District 6-AA, and kept them out front with a 3-0 record. Closest other teams are Ballinger and Haskell, with tallies of 2-1 each.

Coach L. G. Wilson said this week that although this week's opponents are in the district cellar with an 0-3 record, this game is of no less importance than any of the rest. He said that the Blizzards will be going against a team which has played strong all season, even though their efforts have not shown up on the scoreboard. The Tigers remain a tough ball-team, he said, and are good all the time. They play a power-type game, and can be dangerous if opponents let down their guard for one instant.

Men to watch on the Tiger

lineup include 190-pound Danny Lane, one of the top backfield men in the league, and Pineda, 185-back who has given some trouble to opposing teams this year.

The Tigers can and do throw quite a bit. In their 0-6 loss to Haskell last week, they racked up 46 yards in the air to Haskell's 65; they also counted 73 pass yards against the Ballinger Bearcats earlier. In their game against Ballinger, the Tigers, even though defeated 16-8, held the Bearcats to only 43 yards rushing while making 202 for themselves. Statistics show that the Tigers had 13 downs to Ballinger's 9 in that game. Against the Haskell Indians, the Tigers marched 123 yards on the ground, to Haskell's 114.

Points have been close for most every game Anson has played this season, with their loss to Albany 0-30 being the blackest mark of the season. In the district, Stamford has been the only team to outshine the Tigers to any great extent, beating them 14-6, and holding them to only 90 yards on the ground and 124 in the air.

Some changes have been made in the probable Winters starting lineup for the game with Anson, but basically the offense and defense will be the same. Mike Patterson, who was out of action for many weeks due to an oil field fire accident early in the summer, will be a starter this week as a guard on defense. Some other shifts have been made in the line, too.

## City of Winters Studying New Code To Cover Electrical Wiring Installations

Winters City Council Tuesday night studied and heard a first reading of a proposed ordinance adopting an electrical code for the City of Winters. The code, if adopted at a later meeting, will become a part of the building code which was passed several weeks ago.

Several electrical contractors and businessmen attended the meeting, and offered suggestions regarding adoption of the electrical code.

As proposed, the ordinance would set up an electrical code to be followed on all new construction and renovations and rebuilding of electrical installations within the city limits. The ordinance would call for licensing of all electricians doing work for the public, and call for permits for installations and for inspections of work done.

It was pointed out at Tuesday night's meeting that the adoption, and subsequent enforcement, of such an ordinance would mean a 2 percent saving on insurance premiums within the city limits. This means, proponents said, that about \$8,000 per year would be saved in insurance during a year.

Second reading and action on the proposed ordinance will be at the regular December meeting of the council. The council also instructed the

mayor to inform two oil companies taking water from the city lake that this service will be temporarily discontinued. Sun Ray Oil Co. and Pan American Oil Co. have been purchasing water from the City for the purpose of water flooding work in the oil fields. Council members expressed concern over the supply of water, in face of the drought, and took this measure to prevent an emergency.

It was pointed out that while there still is plenty of water in the city's water reservoir, a continuation of the drought might have serious consequences.

Clifton Davis and Clifford Huffman appeared before the council to discuss possibilities of correcting a drainage problem on Cryer Street. The council agreed to have qualified engineers study the problem and make recommendations. O. B. Raper petitioned the Council to close part of an existing alley adjacent to his property on North Main Street. The alley runs north and south from East Parsonage Street. Bob Loyd appeared before the Council in protest of such action, pointing out that closing of part of the alley would hamper his business. Council took the petition under advisement, and will meet later to discuss and act on the proposition.
