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

416 Runnels Co. **Farmers Voted In Referendum**

A total of 416 Runnels County farmers voted in the cotton quota referendum Tuesday, Dec. 10, according to W. R Gray Jr., office manager of the Runnels County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Of this total, 261 voted in favor of the quotas, with 154 against. One vote was challenged

The Winters box saw the biggest turnout of voting farmers in the county, with 108 ballots cast. Of these, 70 were for the quotas, and 38 against.

Ballinger box had the second strongest turnout in the county. with a total of 91; 58 for, and 33 against.
