As has been said before, but perhaps should be re-emphasized from time to time. We're talking about the work performed by unpaid members of our public service departments.

A friend came into the office last week and said that he had seen more or less taken the fire department for granted. He knew the department existed, because when called, all one had to do was pick up a telephone. However, he said, the tragic fire in the community last Saturday morning brought into direct dramatic focus the value of the department and the extent of which members of the volunteer organization will go to be service to their fellowman.

When called about the fire, Winters Volunteer Fire Department responded immediately. They worked for a long time fighting the blaze and where they could. There was anything but pleasant roads were slick, and there were patches of ice and about. Sub-freezing winds tried to hamper fire-fighting. But in the face of all this, the firemen worked without complaint and until the situation was under control.

This friend, who lives in the community, could not express enough in his praise for the department, and wanted to express his thanks and that of the entire community.

On Tuesday evening of last week, with fog lying like a blanket on the countryside, a heavy crash and fire north of Winters routed the firemen. In the hands of a newcomer to the community, a public meeting was held the same evening. "The Winters firemen arrived on the scene knowing exactly what to do, and how to do it." He said he had never known a fire department with as much ability and desire to be of service to the community.

There are but two examples of the services performed by Winters Volunteer Fire Department members. . . there have been many more. They work without pay, they sometimes ruin clothing in the performance of their duties, and their private and business ventures often are interrupted. . . they are deserving of all the praise possible.

Dry Manufacturing Co. To Open Coleman Plant

A branch plant of Dry Manufacturing Co. of Winters will be built in Coleman, according to an announcement made this week.

The announcement comes on the heels of a series of meetings between representatives of the company and interested residents of Coleman, including Coleman Industrial Foundation President Wade Hemphill, City Manager Walter Garland and Chamber of Commerce Manager Jim Ferguson.

The branch plant in Coleman will utilize American Legion property near the Coleman airport, and it is understood that two new metal buildings, totaling 18,000 square feet of floor space, will be built there in the near future.

Dry Manufacturing Co. now employs 140 people in the main plant in Winters, primarily in production of registers, grilles and diffusers. The company manufactures several types of these items, besides the Porta-Heat camp stove, which was put into production last year and is now being marketed nationwide. It was not known just

which items would be produced in the Coleman branch.

Products manufactured by the Dry company are distributed in a 13-state area. A large warehouse in Sacramento, Calif. is used to service that area; and a truck makes a run to that area each week. In addition, trucks also run weekly to major distribution points in other areas. Some items are exported.

President and founder of Dry Manufacturing Co. is J. P. Dry. H. S. Dry is vice president, and C. A. Dry is secretary-treasurer.

Several years ago the Dry family developed the evaporative air conditioner plant in Winters, and sold the plant in 1957. About two years later they established another plant in Winters for the manufacture of cigarette vending machines, and then moved into the field of registers, grilles and diffusers. In 1959 they were employing 40 people; now they employ 140.

Rapid growth helped by the development of new products brought on the necessity of a

416 Runnels Co. Farmers Voted In Referendum

A total of 416 Runnels County farmers voted in the cotton quota referendum Tuesday, Dec. 10, according to W. R. Gray Jr., office manager of the Runnels County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Of this total, 261 voted in favor of the quotas, with 154 against. One vote was challenged.

The Winters box saw the biggest turnout of voting farmers in the county, with 108 ballots cast. Of these, 70 were for the quotas, and 38 against.

Ballinger box had the second strongest turnout in the county, with a total of 91; 58 for, and 33 against.

Results of the voting in other boxes in the county were: Crews, 15, 11 for, 4 against; Wingate, 33, 25 for, 8 against; Miles, 34, 14 for, 20 against; Rowena, 68, 42 for, 25 against; 1 challenged ballot; Norton, 67, 41 for, 26 against.

Was given the rank of Major (Provost Marshall Sec. of Texas State Guard) 1951, and in 1958, was promoted to Lt. Col. in Texas State Guard and still holds that position. 1st Vice President of Texas Sheriff's Association 1956 to 1957; 2nd Vice President of Texas Sheriff's Assn. 1955 to 1956; 3rd Vice President of Texas Sheriff's Assn. 1954 to 1955. He was a member of the Legislative committee for the Sheriff's Assn. from 1953 to 1959.

He was a member of the board of the Texas Safety Assn. from 1952 through 1963, 1957 through 1959, Director of the Texas Safety Association.

Mr. Michaelis had been staying at the Rannels County ranch for the past week. Mrs. Michaelis was at the couple's ranch home near Fayetteville.

Born Feb. 4, 1891, at Round Top, Mr. Michaelis first moved to Rannels County in 1895 with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Paul Michaelis who engaged in ranching in the Hatchel community. He moved to Wingate in 1913.

In 1936, he and Labelle Barker were married at San Angelo. They lived on the Wingate ranch until 1952 when they purchased another ranch near Fayetteville. Since then, they had divided time between the two places.

Mr. Michaelis was an Army veteran of World War I and was a member of the Wingate Masonic Lodge, the American Hereford Association, Polled Hereford Association, Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, and the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. He also was a member of the American Legion

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post at Fayetteville. He was an annual donor to the West Texas Rehabilitation Center's Cattleman's Roundup and also contributed to Boys Ranches at Amarillo and San Angelo and to many other organizations.

Surviving are Mrs. Michaelis; one son, Paul Elo Michaelis of Sherman; three sisters, Mrs. G. E. Schneider of Georgetown, Mrs. V. E. Phillip of San Angelo, and Mrs. C. C. Davis of Jackson, Miss.; and several nieces and nephews.

State Capital Highlights—Governor Connally Now Back In Austin "Officing" In the Mansion

Gov. John Connally is "back home" in Austin, after a 13-day stay in Parkland Hospital in Dallas. He has had what he termed "amazing" recovery from critical wounds inflicted by President John Kennedy's assassin. As everyone knows, the governor didn't spend much time being purely a patient. Within a few days he had converted the hospital into a "Little Capitol". Now the Governor is "officing" in the Mansion, across the street from the big state-government complex. His staff is working out of his business office in the Capitol.

People around the Statehouse say that Connally seems to enjoy working under stress. The month he came into office, he was forced to undergo a hernia operation. He ran the executive department from a hospital room then, too, and later from the Mansion. It will be six months before doctors know for sure whether Connally will regain full use of his bullet-shattered right arm. It must remain in a heavy cast for 90 days. He will be unable to see visitors for several weeks.

SMITH PRAISES JOHNSON In commenting on Governor Connally's return to Austin Lt. Gov. Preston Smith said "... in

grief, we can be thankful for two things: The life of our own governor was spared, and our new president is probably the one man in the country who could have taken hold of the reins of our national government so quickly and firmly."

Smith said he had been assured that President Johnson "will respect the rights and responsibilities of state and local government." He added, "This is a favorable situation in Texas and other states where states' rights are still valued."

WATER-FUN HEARINGS SET Governor Connally's Study Committee on Water Recreation has set public hearings in four parts of the state.

They will be held in Abilene on February 3; Dallas, February 4; Houston, February 10; and San Antonio, February 11.

Vice-Chairman John Babcock, research and development supervisor for the Lower Colorado River Authority said, "Nine men sitting around a table can't really know what the people want, so we want to hear from the people of Texas." He said sportsmen's groups, as well as private citizens, are invited to testify.

At present about 100 local water authorities—municipalities, water districts and river authorities—have jurisdiction over reservoirs in Texas of 5,000 acre feet or more, but lack legal authority to prescribe water recreation facilities.

Nine state agencies and nine federal agencies play some part in water recreation programing, but there is no central plan. Many have policies which conflict with those of cooperating agencies.

Babcock said, "The Governor's committee will endeavor to pull all efforts into the uniform state plan which can be operated by state agencies." Minnesota has incorporated all efforts under one agency, and the U. S. Congress is making a move in this direction on the federal level.

SULPHUR RIVER APPOINTMENTS At the suggestion of the Texas Water Commission, Governor Connally reappointed Lynn Chapman of Sulphur Springs to the Sulphur River Conservation and Reclamation District, and named five new members.

They are Dr. Gaza Janes of Cooper, Fennell Johnson of Cooper, Truett Peck of Commerce, Jack Coker of Naples and R. J. Miesch of Clarksville.

GAS-RATE HEARING POSTPONED Five cities near Port Arthur, which have turned down Southern Union Gas Company's request for a rate hike, won a postponement of the hearing of the gas firm's appeal to the Railroad Commission.

Hearing ran for three days. Then attorneys for the cities of Port Neches, Groves, Lakeview, Nederland and Pear Ridge complained they had not received copies of Southern Union's appeal exhibits in time to question witnesses about them. Hearings will resume on January 7. All five cities refused the request to raise gas rates approxi-

Christmas Card Postage Same As Century Ago

"People sending Christmas cards today at the five cent first class rate pay the same to mail Christmas greetings as Americans did well over a century ago," Assistant Postmaster Mrs. Rankin Pace noted this week.

Research shows that in 1847, the Post Office Department issued its first stamps, including a nickel stamp for the basic prepaid letter rate.

"And, of course, in those days a nickel could buy a meal where it usually can't even buy a cup of coffee today," Mrs. Pace pointed out.

"Since 1932," Mrs. Pace observed, "while living costs for the American family have skyrocketed considerably more than 100 percent, the cost of mailing a first class letter has only increased by two cents, or two-thirds."

The five cent rate permits forwarding or return of the letter where necessary, allows the use of a handwritten message on the card—adding a personal touch—and also provides speedier handling and faster delivery, particularly for cards going out of town.

"In recent years, people have been buying better and more expensive greeting cards, and it seems a shame when only four cent third class postage is paid and the addressee has moved that we normally cannot even forward the card," Mrs. Pace commented. "It is poor economy to try to save a few pennies and lose several dollars worth of cards in the bargain."

Reports from the greeting card industry indicate it is not uncommon for an average family to send more than 100 cards during the holiday season. "To avoid trouble and waiting in line, I suggest that two full sheets of Christmas stamps—100 to the sheet—be picked up when at the post office," Mrs. Pace said. "Then there is no last minute panic about getting stamps to put on cards to send to those who have been overlooked or added to the list."

"Christmas stamps, of course, are usable for postage at any time," Mrs. Pace emphasized.

When the request was made last year, Port Arthur and Griffin Park agreed. They instituted a monthly hike of about 19 cents per minimum bill. If the Railroad Commission instructs the other five to approve an increase, the cities may have to absorb the cost of the appeal. Then gas customers will pay about 29 cents more per monthly minimum.

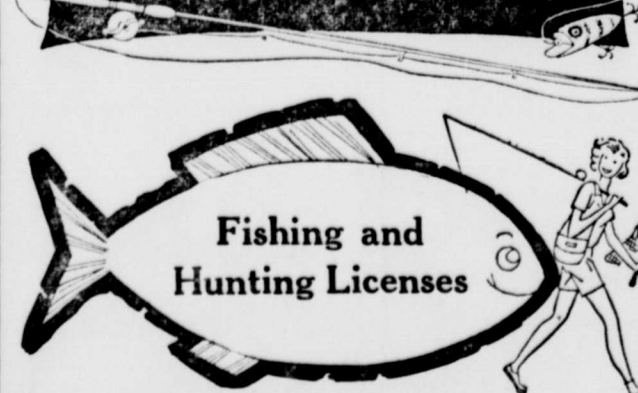

What Caused Oswald To Commit History's Most Heinous Crime?

By Congressman O. C. Fisher What motivated Lee Oswald to commit one of history's most heinous crimes?

Left-wingers, using tortuous reasoning, want to connect it with racial bigotry and conservative movements, but thus far they have been able to use only their fertile imaginations.

Old Drew Pearson, the key-hole columnist, associates the murderer's motivation with opposition in Dallas to the late President, TASS, the official Russian news service, after first blaming the killing on right-wing followers and racists, flopped over after the Communist brand was put indelibly upon Oswald, and decided the latter was a Trotskyite—a type of Communist not in good favor among Communists who are followers of Lenin.

Fidel Castro, one of the world's leading Communist murderers, faced with the fact that Oswald was a pro-Castro crusader, blurted out a tirade about racial bigotry and right-wing crusades being responsible for the assassination.

Even Chief Justice Warren got into the act. He issued a statement associating the President's tragic death with "racial bigotry".

The fact is that Oswald acted as chairman of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, a well known Communist organization in New Orleans until late August when he moved to Dallas. Following that he made a trip to Mexico City, visited the Cuban embassy there, and sought a visa to Russia via Havana, but it was either delayed or denied. Oswald was without funds and it may be that Castro's embassy didn't want to put up the money for the trip. Or the embassy may have decided they could make better use of him in the states.

The murderer spent three years in Russia, returning to the U.S.A. in 1962, in New Orleans boasted of being a Marxist-Leninist and a found follower of Fidel Castro. Before the murder Oswald applied for membership in the Dallas chapter of the left American Civil Liberties Union. After his arrest he said he wanted a Mr. Abt, a New York attorney, to represent him. It is notorious for having represented many Communists in the past.

All of this mounting evidence is embarrassing to the Communist and left-wing crowd, are faced with the fact that of their own gang pulled fatal trigger. Not that they too good to commit murder, they don't want to be exposed to the rays of the mid-day. Indeed, all Communist does justifies murder, espionage, treason, perjury, and any crime that tends to serve ends.

That training in the philosophy of lawlessness and crime which marked the career of Oswald, probably made murder-minded and fatally on mischief.

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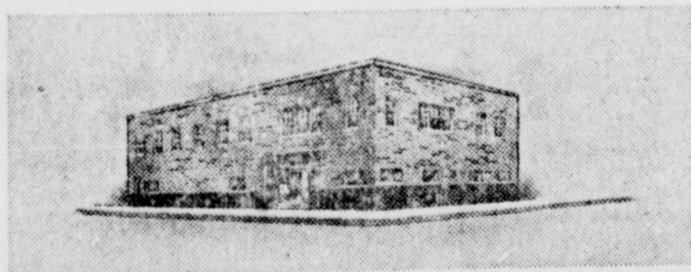

Score for the B team was 39-18. High scorer, Ida Martin, who netted Winters, and Paula with 9 for Coleman.

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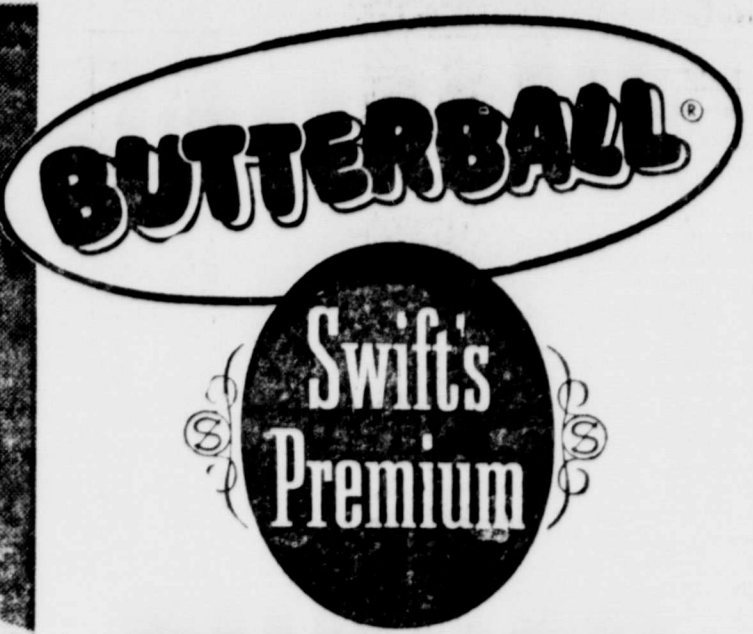
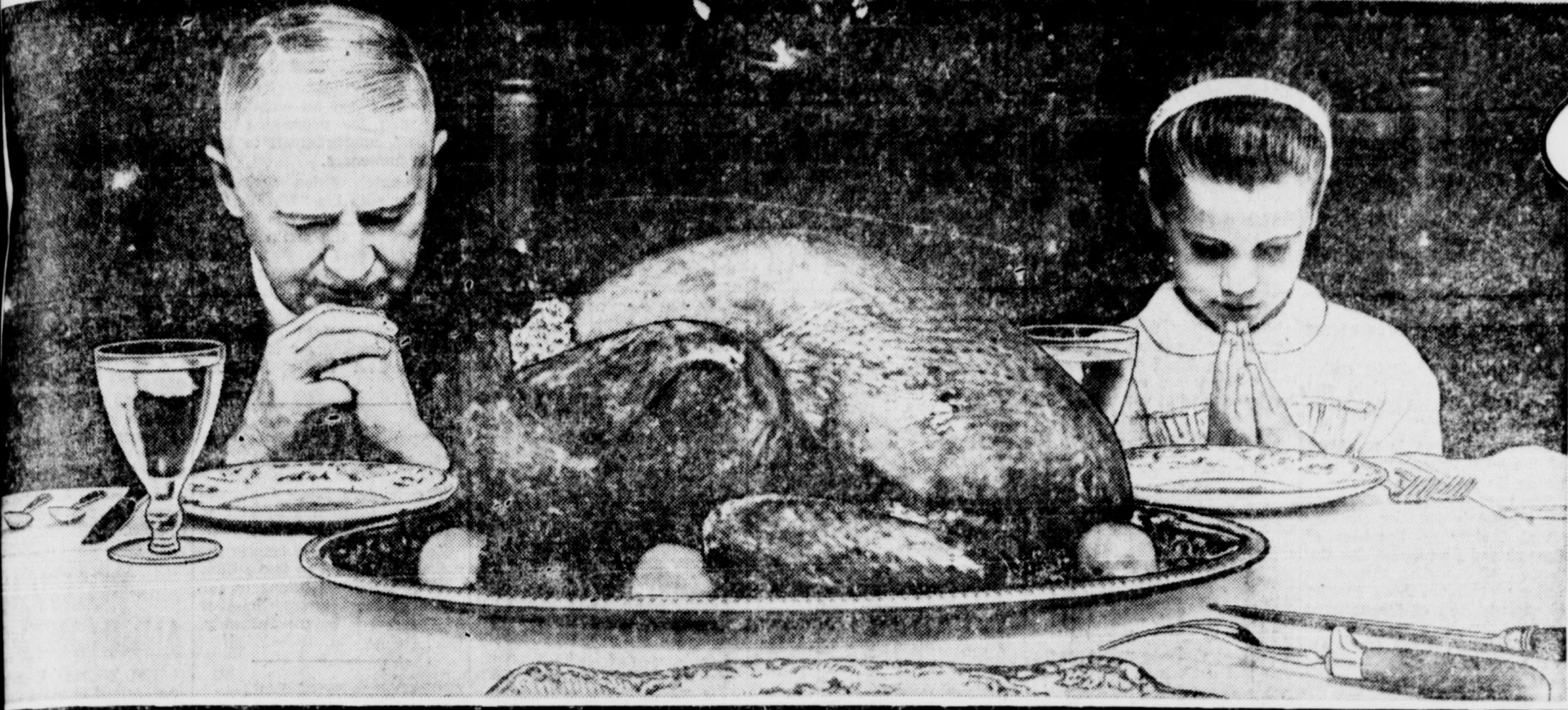

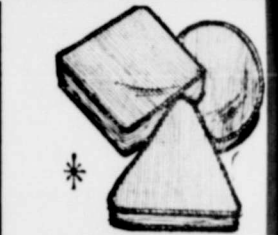
