Because, as we heard a farmer-friend remark Wednesday morning, "every time you get ready to start cutting wheat, it comes a rain.

Wednesday morning's rain wasn't much, but it helps out in the dry spots. And it kept the combines out of the grain fields at least for a while. Various amount reports were received here Wednesday, from a tenth of an inch to six-tenths of an inch. In Winters proper, four - tenths of an inch was measured up to noon Wednesday, bringing the total rainfall for the month to eight-tenths, and the year's total to 9.9

Wheat has started coming in to local elevators in increasing quantities, although the peak of the harvest season will not be reached for a few days yet. Reports indicate that this year's crop will be above average, with the quality of the grain reported as "good." Many farmers, however, are finding it hard to be elated over an "above average" crop, or crestfallen because of low yield, because they

haven't been able to figure out all the small print and details of the government's new wheat program. So, so far as their pocketbooks are concerned, they don't know where a "good" crop is bad, or a "bad" crop is good!

Our old friend who plows red dirt of Bluff Creek says he's been watching developments on the so-called war against poverty with added interest. Says that one facet of the proposed program, a mini- mum wage of \$1.25 per hour for 40 hour weeks for farm labor, has caught his fancy . . and that he's all for it. The reason, he explains, is that if the bureaucrats keep messing around making people guarantee a minimum income for everyone, they'll eventually slip up and pass a law that says even a farmer must not work more than so many hours a week and be guaranteed a minimum income. Laws, once passed, are seldom un-passed, he says. . and that'll be the day!

pest of stored grain, the Khapra beetle, is believed to be completely wiped out in Texas as well as the rest of the United States and Mexico.

The beetle's appearance in the El Paso area was great cause for alarm about five years ago. Texas Department of Agriculture inspectors, along with U.S.D.A. officials and grain storage owners waged a hardfought and expensive campaign to wipe out the initial infesta tions. The insect is an extremely "dirty" eater, destroying 90 per cent more grain than it actually consumes and a very light infestation quickly grows, ruining grain in an entire ele vator or storage bin in a remarkably short time.

The last known evidence of the Khapra beetle in the U.S. was found on July 11, 1962. In Mexico, no new infestations have been discovered since mid-

Control officials point out. however, that even though no beetles are now known to exist is still a possibility of a local infestation being found from time to time. During the past few months, some 28,000 probeen surveyed.







Again, here is a PATTERN FOR PROGRESS.
