## Talk

Reportedly, rural communities are not so closely knit as they once were. So it is gratifying to know there are exceptions to this accepted rule; notably, the Norton Community southwest of Winters.

Faced with a lack of equipment to fight fires in the community, and the long distance trucks from Winters or Ballinger have to travel to reach a reported fire in the community, the Norton Lions Club decided to do something about it. They organized a Volunteer Fire Department.

What to do about some equipment? Without monetary means to purchase a truck, the group cast about for a solution. . . and then Winters stepped up to help fill the breach of defense against fires.

The City of Winters has loaned the Norton Lions Club a fire truck. Of course the truck is of ancient vintage—a 1924 American LaFrance—but it's a fire truck, nonetheless.

The truck needs a lot of work to put it in serviceable condition—such as patching a leak in the water tank, and some new hose. But it runs good, and has a good siren.

The Norton group took delivery on the truck last Friday and turned down a bid by some Winters men who offered to drive the truck to Norton. Never-youth-mind, they said. . . we'll get our "New" fire truck home. And away they went, prouder than a group of boys with a brand new toy.

But it is not a toy to those men of Norton. They'll get that truck in good operating condition and will be ready to answer any and all calls. They could have stood aside and expected others to do their fire fighting for them—but they exhibited a strain of "do-it-yourself-itis," which is becoming rarer as the years go by.

The truck remains the property of the City of Winters, of course. But it will be put to good use at Norton and will not suffer the indignity of just sitting and rotting away, unused.

Someone asked us this week what our old Bluff Creek friend thinks about the weather, the lack of rain, etcetra, so we put the question to him. His reply, punctuated here and there with expletives, was to the effect that he had "just finished with a thorough analysis of the Republican National Convention, and was getting ready for the Democratic National Convention, that he had no time for trivial matters such as the weather." Anyway, it was too dry to talk about it, he said.

The longer the dry spell, the shorter a canoe trip planned by Winters' Explorer Scout will be.

Local Explorers have been planning a canoe trip for some time with hopes of dropping in to the Colorado and paddling to Buchanan Dam. But as each day passes without rain in the Colorado River basin, more and more dry river bed shows up.

Wes Hays, advisor to the local explorer post, who is planning to go along with the boys, decided to make an aerial reconnaissance of the river, from Ballinger to the dam, in order to make plans for the trip. Oscar Funderberg offered the use of his Beech Bonanza, and the two made an aerial inspection of the river all the way to the dam. They reported that if a canoe trip is carried out, the drop-in will have to be below Richland Springs. There are a few stretches of water up the river from that point, they said, but there would be more walking and portaging than paddling.

If we should get rain in this section of the state, and the river rises just a little, you can expect that trip to begin immediately after the rain stops.

### All Garbage Cans Must Be Regulation Size and Type Effective August 1st

Winters city officials this week re-emphasized the warning that beginning August 1 all garbage containers to be serviced by the City Department of Sanitation must be of regulation size and construction.

An ordinance presently in effect requires that garbage cans be of galvanized iron, tin or other suitable metal, and be equipped with a tight fitting cover. Capacity must not be less than five gallons nor over 32 gallons, as described in the ordinance.

Strict enforcement of the ordinance, which was approved by the city council Oct. 26, 1961, was delayed so that all residents would have an opportunity to obtain the regulation size and type garbage cans. However, city officials pointed out, there has been enough time for everyone to become acquainted with the regulations and to make provisions for compliance.

Effective August 1, garbage or trash which has been deposited in big barrels will not be picked up, the city said. Also, it was stressed, dry refuse such as papers, magazines, grass clippings and other things must be in a compact bundle or deposited in

### Lake Dropped Only Two Inches In Week's Time

Water level at Winters' lake dropped only two inches during one week's time, W. D. Waggoner, city water superintendent, said this week.

Waggoner said the water level, now about four feet below the spillway, dropped only two inches from Monday, July 20, to Monday, July 27. Cause for this drop in water level is laid to water usage by the city, evaporation and natural seepage. It is estimated that evaporation consumes almost as much water during long, hot dry spells, as is used by consumers. Waggoner said that the current water supply is estimated at 1249 acre feet.

Publication of a complete water-usage record for Winters, is planned for the near future.

Mike Patterson, senior in Winters High School, won first in the discus throw, tossing 149 feet 1 3/4 inches for a new state record for the meet.

Richard Shade won fifth in the shot put. Other boys competing were Larry Awalt, Chester Puckett, Jerry Awalt and David Burnett.

Local boys were in competition with boys from all over the state and from all high school classifications.

### Emergency Use Of CB Radio Reported At Meeting July 25

The police also were notified and the car was given a clear path to the hospital, it was reported.

## Trash Fish Kill Is Planned At Lake

Poisoning of the Winters City Lake east of town to kill the trash fish and perhaps to help clear up the city's water supply, has been planned for Saturday.

In a special meeting Tuesday afternoon, Winters City Council voted to purchase 5,000 pounds of rotenone poison to be dumped into the lake to eliminate the trash fish.

The special meeting was called by Mayor Harvey D. Jones after he had received a preliminary report from a representa-

### Count Shows Big Percentage Of Trash Fish in Lake

A deciding factor in guiding the City Council to make a decision to poison the city lake was a report made by Mames Wilcox, aquatic biologist of San Angelo, a representative of the Parks and Wildlife Commission.

In two reports made by his crews, one in June and another this week, the count of trash fish in Winters' lake far outnumbered the game fish. Also, the size of some of the game fish indicated that conditions are not so good for fishing at the lake.

Wilcox said that a large number of crappie were netted in the course of the survey, but these fish were stunted and would not likely become very large in any event.

Of a total of 589 fish netted in one count, there were 134 shad, 115 suckers, many carp and other trash fish. Also, Wilcox said, about 100 crappie were netted which were considered as undesirable because of their stunted growth.

The first fish count was taken in June, with the following count: 22 shad, 21 buffalo, 74 suckers, 14 carp, 18 channel cat, 2 polywogs, 2 yellow cat, 3 large mouth bass, 7 bluegill, 65 crappie, 10 drum.

These were all caught in a gill net. In a seining operation, the following count was taken in June: 15 bass, 49 bluegill, 63 crappie, 340 shad, 2 carp, 7 suckers and 1 channel cat.

Gill-netting this week showed the following fish count: 112 shad, 11 buffalo, 39 suckers, 5 carp, 19 channel cat, 2 yellow cat, 1 large mouth bass, 6 bluegill, 115 crappie and 44 drum. No seining report was available at the time the report was given to the city council.

State agency employees put out nets Tuesday night, to make another fish count and try to save some of the game fish to restock the lake. Several large fish were caught, among them a drum which weighed 20 pounds and 13 ounces, which was retrieved by Herman Baker.

tive of the Parks and Wildlife Commission.

The poison will be dumped into the lake Saturday, by employees of the Parks and Wildlife Commission. All work connected with the lake poisoning will be performed by the state agency personnel, with the City of Winters paying for the rotenone poison. Approximate cost of the poison supply is \$165.00, city officials said.

The poison will in no way affect the city's water supply, health-wise, it was pointed out. In fact, state agency representatives said, ridding the lake of large number of big carp and other trash fish should help to clear up the water in the lake to a great extent.

Commission representatives said that game fish killed by the poison will be edible if they are retrieved from the surface of the lake. In most places where lakes are poisoned to kill trash fish, the game fish are taken by residents. This will probably be done during Saturday's poisoning.

People who plan to retrieve game fish during the kill Saturday are asked to cooperate with city officials and state agency employees in helping fish off the surface of the lake. When boats are used, it has been suggested that a large container or garbage can be taken along in which the dead fish can be deposited, to be dumped later at a designated place on the shore of the lake. Taking of game fish only and leaving the other fish will only intensify the problem, it was pointed out.

Employees of the Parks and Wildlife Commission have been working at the lake almost all week, netting fish for a count, and catching as many of the game fish as possible before the poisoning. All game fish caught prior to the kill Saturday will be kept and put back in the lake at a later date.

The kill of fish at the lake should be complete, agency representatives said. However, restocking of the lake with good will be done sometime within the next two months, they said, at no cost to the city.

They also said that this is an ideal time for a trash fish kill, because the lake is low and a more thorough kill job can be done.

Deep pits will be dug at the lake, and all dead fish will be deposited there and covered over with dirt. An effort will be made by the city to dispose of all fish in order to prevent an offensive situation. The water will not be affected in any way by the poisoning of the fish, it was emphasized.

### Scout Activity Discontinued For Summer

All Boy Scouts activities have been suspended for the rest of the summer, according to A. W. Hilck, troop committee chairman.

Beginning in September, the Winters Boy Scouts, Troop No. 49, will begin a new schedule of activities.

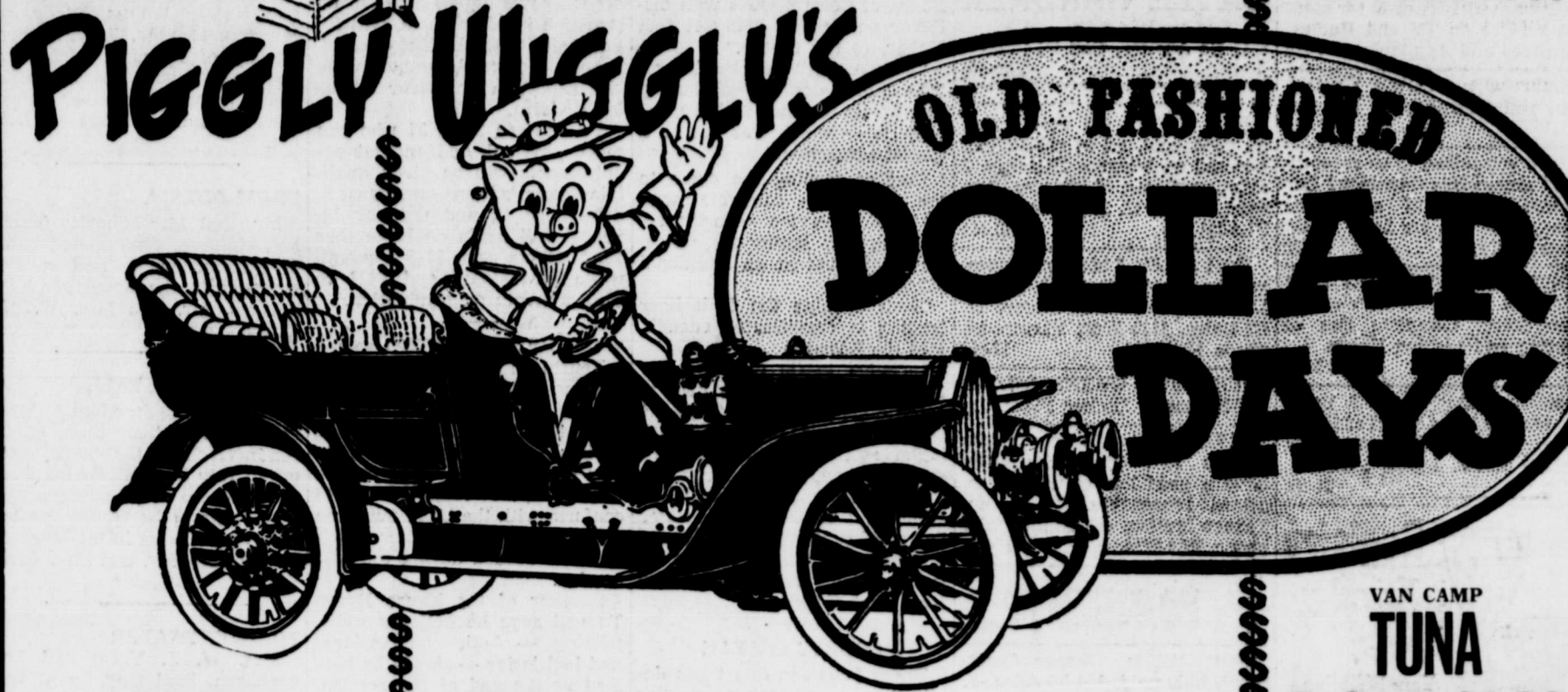

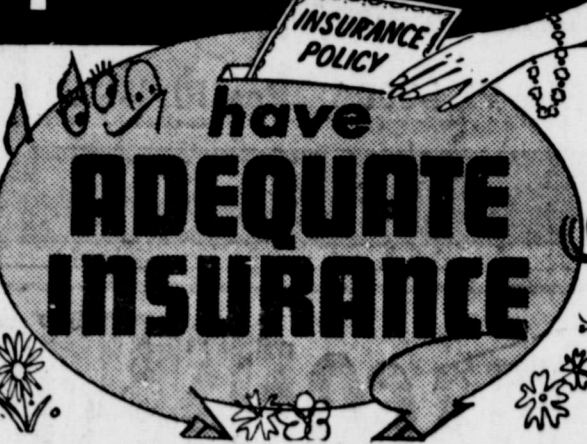

## State Capital Highlights—

### Opening of Dome of State's Capitol Would Be Costly, Says Board

State Board of Control is willing to go only halfway in the drive to take energetic tourists to the top of the capitol dome.

State purchasing and house-keeping agency asked for \$16,950 to open the dome to the fifth floor. Sightseers now must stop at the fourth floor landing.

Board of Control looks with disfavor on tourists going 41 feet higher, to the tip-top.

"Structurally," said the Board, "the capitol dome is thoroughly safe for its intended and original purpose — which was not as a tourist attraction."

Cost of opening the dome to the public — complete with guide service, security, repainting and janitorial service, was estimated at an additional \$52,000.

Even opening the fifth floor landing is complicated enough, said the Board.

Included in its recommendations were \$4,000 for a grill to catch objects dropped from the lofty landing; \$3,000 for a ventilation system in the stairwell areas "to keep people from dropping out from exhaustion while climbing"; \$2,000 to run a water line and install a fountain; \$2,500 for annual repainting to hide the work of sloop-writers; and \$350 for a first aid kit.

**COURT SPEAK**  
Texas Supreme Court has declined to reconsider an earlier decision holding off pipe shipping rates set by the Railroad Commission in 1962 while they are in contest. High court refused to hear the Commission's request for rehearing. Oil field truckers called for suspension of the new rates, claiming the railroads an unfair advantage.

In another case heard by the Supreme Court, a Railroad Commission production formula for Farway Field in East Texas, largest U. S. oil discovery in the last eight years, is under attack. W. L. Pickens brought the action to void the formulas for the field in Anderson and Henderson Counties. Pickens claims the formulas would allow neighboring leases to drain oil from under his property. Under the Commission order, allowables would be based 50 per cent on tract size and 50 per cent on acre feet of oil-bearing sand beneath. District court here has upheld the order.

Finance companies won a major battle with the State when the Third Court of Civil Appeals in Austin refused Regulatory Loan Commissioner Frank Miskell's motion for rehearing on, on the State's case against Terplan, Texas, Public Finance Beneficial Finance and Consolidated Credit.

Court affirmed the opinion of the 53rd District Court in Austin that the 1963 Texas Loan Act section which says a loan company cannot be licensed unless 51 per cent of its stock is owned by Texans is unconstitutional.

## FOOD STAMP PLAN

William M. Herndon, who administers the commodities distribution program for the State Department of Public Welfare, says the Federal Food Stamp Program just passed by Congress, will take at least five years to filter down into all counties which otherwise would participate in the surplus commodities distribution program.

Under the proposed program, low-income and no-income families may trade federally-supplied stamps for food at any grocery store, instead of limiting their supplies to those items declared surplus commodities and distributed on a county-agent basis. Luxury and imported items will be exempt from the plan. Barred from the stamp "shopping" list are bananas, coffee, cocoa and tea.

But the switch must be gradual because current surpluses must be used up, and it has not been determined yet how much Congress will appropriate for the program.

## WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER:

### Commies Said To Be Mixed Up In Racial Riots

By Congressman O. C. FISHER

Amid screams of "They hate us" and "kill or be killed", 600 Negroes raced through Harlem and Brooklyn for five nights in a row last week, looting and attacking whites where they could find them. One Negro was killed, two others shot, 150 injured, and 700 properties were damaged and most of them looted by the vandals.

Cause of this violence stems from agitation for civil rights legislation, and the racial atmosphere that has been enveloping the nation for almost two years. The past two years has been called "the age of the agitators", during which time scores of organized groups have sprung up, all fanning the flame of racial tensions.

The Harlem riot was spearheaded by Negro James Farmer, head of CORE, who screamed defiance of police when he spoke to a mob of followers. There are 52 Negro organizations in Harlem, which creates competition for leadership in the fanning of racial tensions. The Communists are mixed in them according to the Mayor of New York.

Civil Rights Legislation is at the bottom of this outburst. Politicians and do-gooders have told Negroes they are being exploited by the whites, and must do something to assert their "equality". Already, in less than 30 days, since the passage of the civil rights bill, crime among Negroes has increased in many areas, and resistance to law and order has been stepped up.

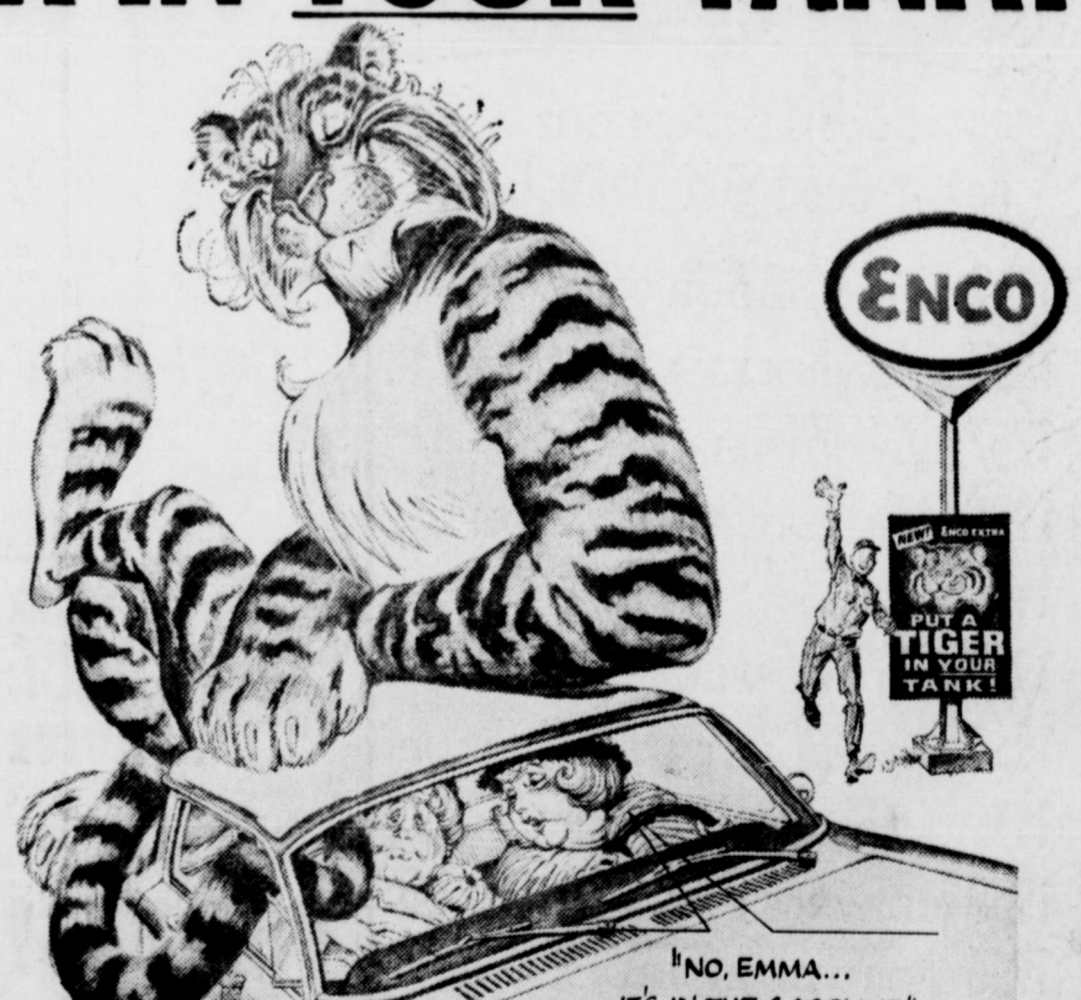

**Scribe Shows Snake System**

A veteran newspaper photographer, noted for his strange hobby of collecting poisonous snakes, is written up in the August issue of Texas Game and Fish magazine.

The man is Hal Swiggett, of the San Antonio Express-News, who shares his family food budget with his assorted reptiles. This sometimes comes to a tidy sum since the serpents prefer white mice which are available at so much per copy.

Swiggett, who is secretary of the Texas Outdoor Writers' Association, made news recently when he demonstrated scribes attending the Outdoor Writers' Association of America convention at McAllen how a journalist herpetologist performs.

Editor Curtis Carpenter of the magazine, himself the daring type, described Swiggett's first encounter with a rattler on a night foray:

"The rattler beside the tank was asleep, or it was trying to be hospitable, too. Not one rattle did it make as Hal pinned its head to the ground with the hook and reached down with his hand. He slid his fingers under the snake's lower jaw and clamped down on its upper right between the eyes with his finger. With an instant motion, Hal dropped the stick with the hook on it and grabbed the snake by the tail.

"With a worried smile, he said: 'Now shoot your pictures but hurry up, this guy may wake up any time, and believe me he's plenty strong.' About this time the snake decided outdoor writers are just like all the rest, and flexed its muscles. Hal held on, finally bringing the snake up against his chest and hugging it to keep it from working free.

A trio of Swiggett, Carpenter and Jim Thomas, outdoor editor of the Amarillo Globe News, captured three more rattlers that night. All of which probably helped hasten Hal's mightiest triumph — when he expects to pick up one of his poisonous pets with his bare hands.

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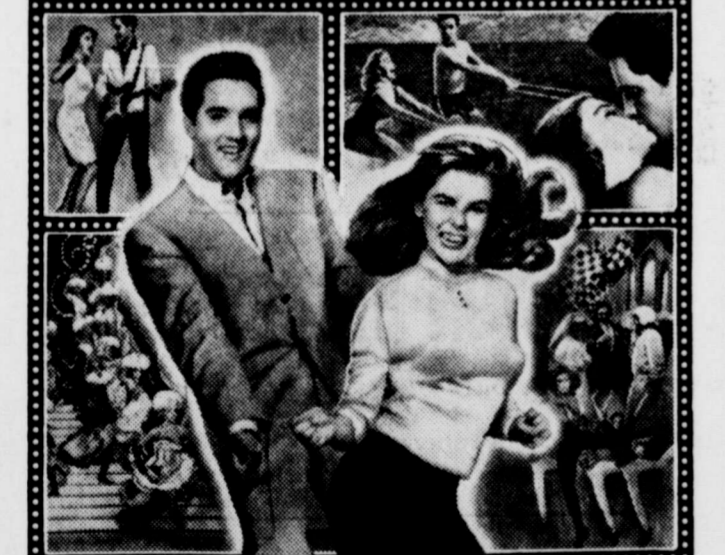

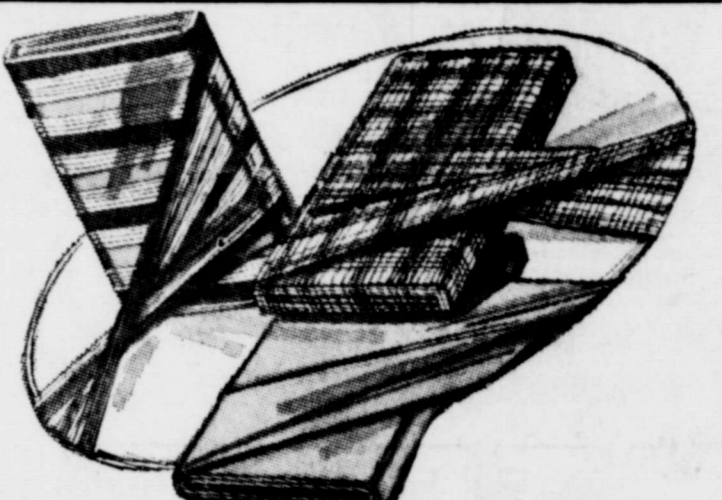

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.  
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."  
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

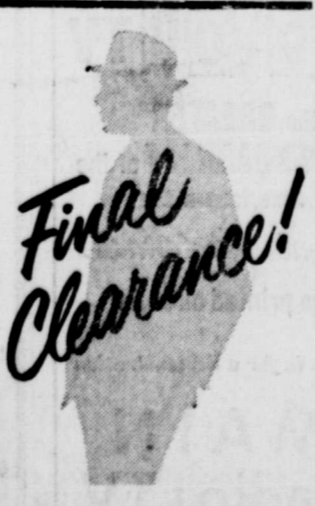

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
