January starts a new year. Why not start this new year with a new look? A change is always exciting — for you and those around you. Many times we can improve our looks by carefully appraising our appearance in the mirror, being completely honest with ourselves. The best way to improve our personalities is to look into the looking glass of our mind, learning to see ourselves as others see us. Many of us are surprised at the ugliness we see. STATE AND NATION PIG CROP CONSIDERABLY BETTER IN 1954

AUSTIN, Dec. 30. — The 1954 Texas pig crop totaled 1,576,000 head, according to the Crop Reporting Board of the Agricultural Marketing Service. This is 33 percent more than last year's record-low crop of 1,187,000 pigs but still much below the 1943-52 annual average of 2,419,000 pigs.

Relatively high hog prices during the spring and summer have stimulated renewed interest in hog production even though the intense summer drought sharply reduced grain production in the important blackland, central and eastern hog producing counties.

Fall farrowings, estimated at 126,000 sows, were 30 percent above last year's record low number. Fall farrowing exceeded intentions to farrow as indicated last June by about 9 percent. Litters averaged 6.5 pigs.

If breeding intentions are realized, farrowings in the spring of 1955 will total 130,000 sows. This number is 15 percent above farrowing last spring but still 37 percent below the 1943-52 average spring farrow.

The 1954 pig crop in the United

States totaled 92.5 million head, an increase of 13 percent from a year ago. The spring pig crop at 55.7 million head was up 12 percent and the fall crop at 36.8 million head was 16 percent larger. The number of sows farrowing this fall was 14 percent larger than last year. The number of pigs saved per litter for the fall crop at 6.78 pigs is the highest on record. The fall pig crop was the largest since 1951.

For the 1955 spring pig crop, reports on breeding intentions indicate a total of 8,469,000 sows to farrow, 5 percent above the number farrowing last spring.

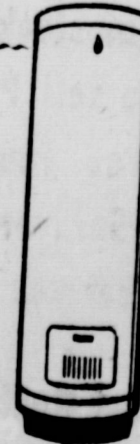

 tain is left in a flat piece which will be much easier to clean or launder. The natural color of the ring is white, however, we find they can be made to match any curtain color by boiling them in ordinary household dye for a few minutes.

January is an excellent time for a party — from New Year's Day until the end of the month. It is the perfect time to forecast the future while the year is still young. This party could be quite simple with decorations consisting of an abundance of evergreens with balloons of all colors and sizes. We attended a party recently where each guest had a balloon attached to the ceiling. Before the balloon was blown up, a small piece of paper with a prediction for the future was placed inside. Before the party was over, each guest cut down their balloon, popped them, and read their fortune to the group. This is simple, yet it is something people of all ages will enjoy.

Speaking of parties brings another thought to our minds. Homemaking is a family affair. One person cannot make a good home. The entire family must pull together in one harmonious group for successful family living. Parties planned especially for the family group can be fun for all concerned. Some families turn this family fun time into a family hobby time; others make it a real party. The type of fun night your family has will depend on the individual family. The important thing to remember is that the family should spend some time playing together, in addition to their working together. You'd be surprised how much spice this can add to the art of family living.

Those of you who received Poinsettias for Christmas can have beautiful plants for a long time with the proper care. These can be set out in the open ground in early spring when the danger of frost is over. They will grow in most soils, however, they tend to grow better in alkaline rather than acid soils. Full sunshine is needed, and they should be fertilized sparingly until the flower bracts begin to grow. An application of 4-12-4 fertilizer will help produce large flowers. We recommend that you use 1/2 to 1 cup of 4-12-4 for each 25 square feet

of soil. The amount used will depend upon the size of the plant.

Fruits are extremely important in the daily diet the whole year around. During the winter months, especially, we want to be sure to include fruits — fresh, dried, canned or frozen — in our

daily menus. Recently we tried soaking prunes in fruit juice instead of plain water. We allowed them to stand, as usual, until plump and soft and then cooked them. This gives them flavor, which is interesting as well as delicious. Try it sometimes, won't you? Your family will like them.
