

## HOME TOWN Talk

People hit Lake Winters Saturday like a gaggle of geese on a bunch of Junebugs. That was the day they poured the fish poison on the water... and fish fries were common throughout the week-end.

Little boats, big boats, good boats and leaky boats were used in retrieving the game fish which came to the top after the poison was dumped into the water. Men, women, children and boys were on hand to get every pound of fish they could while the getting was good. There is no way of knowing how many fish were taken from the lake, but a good guess would be several thousand pounds. Enough to furnish everyone in the area with a Friday meal for a long time to come.

The big ones captured all the glory, however. If a man netted a ten-pounder, he was in the bush league. The publicity went to those who captured the 35-, 40-, 50-, and 60-pounders... and larger. We saw one which had been "field dressed," and he tipped the scales at 50-lbs.

There wouldn't seem to be much sport in just dipping fish out of the water... but meat on the table is another matter. It was every man for himself, too, it seemed. If you were in a boat and saw a big one surface, you were immediately in a horse race... if anyone else saw the same fish. Boats collided, people got wet... but a good time was had by all. And much good resulted from the project.

Crews from the Parks & Wildlife Service captured some of the good fish in the big lake last week prior to poisoning. They dumped them out in the old lake north of town. And then the fishing got good for a while up there.

One good yellow cat—44½-lbs.—was dumped in the old lake, along with some smaller ones, and a little while later it was reported that Joel Butts snagged a big one of about that same size. There probably are a few of the good catchable ones left up there.

Kathryn Duff, in her "Front Page" column in the Abilene Reporter-News, made mention Wednesday of an ad placed by the classified advertising manager of that newspaper, who was trying to locate a "garbenstangle."

Immediately upon reading the column our ears perked up... those unusual things get our attention always. But then we calmed down, remembering else which we got involved in a few years ago, and decided not to get caught in that kind of snipe hunt again. Some fellow started advertising for a "forbesider," and we went forbesider hunting. Ended up that the bottom dropped out of the forbesider market, and we were left with a garbage full of forbesiders.

So we won't get involved in this hunt for a garbenstangle... won't even bother to look for wheels for one. Which doesn't mean, however, that we won't latch onto one if we see it rolling down the street. Those things are not easy to come by, and if a man has a good garbenstangle, the world's his oyster.

## Water Use Tables Compared With Local Rainfall For Last Five Years

Consumption of water and rainfall received in Winters during the past six years seem to go hand in hand, when use tables and rainfall records are compared. Daily temperatures would have an important bearing on water usage, also, but temperature records are not available for the period.

Records would indicate that when rainfall figures go down the water usage figures increase. This may not always be true, however, when figuring the entire months and the time of the months the water was used or the rains fell. Previous months' rainfall records give some bearing on water usage for some months, too.

W. D. Waggoner, superintendent of Winters' City Water Department reports that water usage for this summer is about normal, even in the face of the light rainfalls. Usage climbed to almost 30 million gallons in July, after having been below 20 million gallons for the first six months of this year. Total rainfall for the first seven months of 1964 is pegged at 15.1 inches.

Waggoner said that although the water level at the Winters City Lake, the city's water reservoir, is low at the present time, there is no reason for immediate alarm. This is borne out by estimates made by qualified engineers who surveyed the lake about the first of December last year, when the water level was about the same as it is now. They said there would be no reason to worry about the supply of water "for a good many months." This would indicate that the present water supply is sufficient for several months.

In looking at the accompanying tables, it can be seen that water usage for the city of Winters reaches its peak during the three summer months. Also, August seems to be the month in which the most water is used. In one year, 1960, June claimed the honor, when 27,309,000 gallons were used. Rainfall for

that particular month was also low, according to the tables, with only 0.9 of an inch received. The previous month also had been a "dry" one, with only 1.5 inch received.

Also, as seen in the tables, August of 1959 was a "high use" month, and also a dry one, with only 0.4 inch of rain recorded; this rainfall was recorded on the last day of the month, too.

August of 1962 again led the field in water usage, with only 1.3 inch rain received. This was recorded on Aug. 2 and 30 that year. However, the month preceding saw 8.7 inches of rain recorded.

July was the high month for usage in 1963, with 27,768,000 gallons metered. No rain was received during that month, and only 2.2 inches was recorded for June. Usage dropped to 18,582,000 gallons for August, after the rains were received during the first half of the month.

July, 1964, was a dry month, with only 1.0 inch of rain recorded, and was the month of highest usage, 28,281,000 gallons. If the dry weather continues, it can be expected that August water usage will climb higher. The water department superintendent reports that usage climbed to 1,098,000 gallons on Aug. 4, to set a record for daily usage for this summer.

The accompanying water usage tables are official reports from the city water department. The rainfall figures are unofficial.

## Fire Damages Local Garage, Furniture Store

Fire of undetermined origin did considerable damage to automobiles and equipment in the Crenshaw Garage in the 100 block of East Tinkle Street Wednesday evening, and caused an additional estimated \$20,000 in smoke and water damage to merchandise in the adjoining Roach Furniture and Electric Co.

The fire started about 6:50 p. m., and three trucks of the Winters Fire Department were called out.

No burn damage was noted in the furniture store, which fronts South Main Street, but owners reported the loss due to water and smoke damage will amount to at least \$20,000. This loss is partially covered by insurance, it was said.

The garage premises were not insured, it was reported.

Fire Chief Marvin Bedford said the cause of the blaze will be hard to determine because most of the evidence was destroyed. The fire started in the back of the building, in the garage part.

Value of the equipment in the garage was not known, but the fire chief estimated "at least a couple of thousand dollars worth of damages" to the property.

## Lake Closed To Fishing, Boating

The City Council Monday night adopted a resolution closing the new City Lake to boating, fishing, skiing, or any other water activity until further notice.

An ordinance further clarifying the provisions of the resolution will be considered at the next regular meeting, it was stated.

Also, councilmen said, there is a need to let the water settle.

The main reason for closing the lake to skiing, it was stated, is that the State Health Department frowns on people swimming or boating within a given distance of the water intake power. Several warnings have been received from the Health Department, and city officials said that their only alternative at this time was to close the lake. They said that even though signs are posted near the intake tower warning boaters and fishing parties to keep away from that area, these signs were ignored and sometimes fishermen were even "tying up to the tower itself."

As to how long the lake will be closed has not been determined. However, it was stated, the ordinance which will be proposed at the next meeting of the council will make the closing permanent, with opening "at the discretion of the council." This indicates, it was stated, that the council may see fit to open the lake to boating and skiing if and when the lake is filled. All councilmen indicated the opinion that the lake should not be closed for good, but that some kind of control be established before it is again opened. There was talk of putting boundary buoys in the water near the intake tower to keep fishermen and boats from that area. This probably will be done after the lake is again filled, it was indicated.

There was only one dissenting vote on the closing of the lake at Monday night's meeting of the council. Councilmen voting for closing were W. M. Hays, Homer Hodge, J. C. Jarrell and R. C. Thomas. James C. Colburn voted against the action.

Hundreds of people were on hand to retrieve the edible fish after the poison was dumped into the lake water Saturday.

City officials and members of the Parks and Wildlife crew hesitated on estimating the amount of fish taken from the lake by people on the banks and in boats, but they did say it would run into "hundreds of pounds." As to the number of trash fish destroyed, it was estimated that "many tons" were removed from the lake.

A crew has been working all week on clearing the lake and the area of the fish which were destroyed during the kill Saturday. Large pits have been dug into which the fish are dumped, to be covered over with dirt.

The lake will be restocked by the Parks and Wildlife Department within the next few weeks but it will be 18 months to two years before fishing is any good at the lake, it was said.

State agency personnel who did the poisoning at the lake said they figured that they obtained a "100 per cent kill." They indicated that this Winters project had been the most successful such project they had ever participated in.

Prior to the kill, the state (Continued on page 8)

following the fish "kill" project which was completed last weekend. Councilmen said the closing of the lake was considered because of the low water level, and the lack of fish in the lake after the kill.





## Supreme Court Continues To Usurp Power

By Congressman O. C. Fisher

Chances for submission of a constitutional amendment confirming the right of the states to reapportion one branch of their state legislatures on a basis not solely related to population, have improved recently.

The need for this amendment developed when the Supreme Court on last June 15 ruled that both the House and Senate in each state must be apportioned on the basis of population alone.

The Texas Plan, introduced on behalf of the entire Texas delegation in Congress, would allow only one branch to be apportioned solely on a population basis. In other words, it would continue the present system in Texas—that is, of having the House of Representatives based on population and the Senate on population and other factors.

Under the Constitution of Texas no one county can have more than one state Senator. But if the Supreme Court has its way that provision would be thrown out of the window. That would mean that 5 counties, the more populous ones, would have 12 of the state's Senators.

The Supreme Court decision was capricious and was not actually authorized by the U. S. Constitution. It marked another and dangerous usurpation of the power by that tribunal under Chief Justice Warren. Justice Potter Stewart, who dissented, said the Court's decision gives "support to a current mistaken view of the Constitution and constitutional function" of the Supreme Court. "This view," he said, "... is that every major social ill in this country can find its cure in some constitutional 'principle', and that this Court should 'take lead' in promoting reform when other branches of Government fail to act."

Mr. Stewart was right. He hit the nail on the head. But the only way to correct misinterpretations by the Supreme Court is by amendment, spelling out in unmistakable terms, what the Court cannot possibly misinterpret. That is what we are trying to do with respect to this problem.





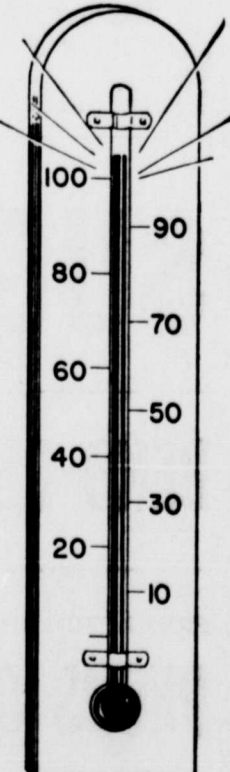

#### PUBLIC NOTICE

##### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

##### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows: "(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district." Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts." Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

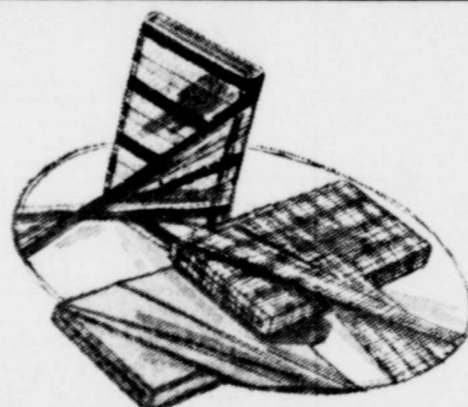

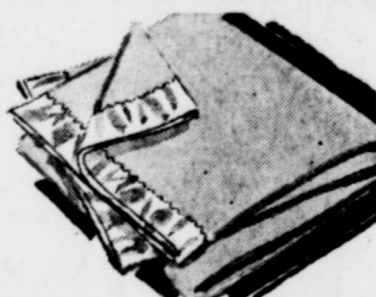
