Winters voters were as interested in this General Election as their brothers and sisters across the nation, as evidenced by the number of voters who turned out Tuesday. A total of 1086 voters seems to be the record: the next best would appear to be the Presidential Election in 1960, when 1032 voters cast a combined total for John F. Kennedy and Richard Nixon.

Something new was added for this election: For the first time in the memory of some who have been here for many elections, "poll watchers" were on duty at the two local voting places. This is a common practice in areas of the nation where two different political parties are active, but for areas where one party has been traditionally

dominant, it was something new. One election official commented that the practice of having 'poll watchers" was not at all bad; that they can be of some help to the election officials in determining qualifications of prospective voters in many in-



True, they won't catch as ma ny fish or bring home many of the lunker size, but they enjoy their fishing more.

Anglers who use eight or 10pound line are in the majority They enjoy a scrap. But they want a better chance at bring ing home something for the skillet. And usually they do. Numer ically, more of the finny tribe end up on their tables.

Then there's the lunker bass fisherman. He fishes, fishes, fishes, fishes . . . nothing but a trophy bass in mind.

He thinks big! A three-pound black is a minnow in his eye He won't even mention having taken anything smaller. A four pounder is more to his liking. But he's not after either of those. He's fishing all day and all night - every time he gets a chance - with nothing but five, six or seven pound black in mind. He thinks big and he

catches them big. He's the guy who thumbs a bait - casting, spool - type reel with perfection. He's an expert at casting. He's the Ambassadour of fishing. He's the fellow who uses 15 to 20 pound line and no swivels.




