

HOME TOWN Talk

It could be called "Roulette, Texas Highway Style!" We mean the gambling which will take place on the State's highways during the 11-day Christmas-New Year's holidays, beginning Dec. 24.

And it will be a gamble, make no mistake about it! At least that's the way the Department of Public Safety figures it. We don't know how many thousands of cars are expected to converge on the highways, by-ways and streets during that 11-day period, but of the many thousands of people who will be driving them and riding in them, the DPS has estimated that 105 will lose their lives in accidents! That figures that at least 10 people will die in crashes each day of the long holiday season!

And it all seems so useless and wasteful! Without cause or reason! Webster defines "accident" as "an event that takes place without one's foresight or expectation, especially one of an afflictive or unfortunate character." But it has become generally accepted that most accidents just don't "happen"—they are caused. Caused perhaps because of the lack of some of that "foresight" and thoughtfulness... and consideration.

Consideration, probably, is one of the prime factors involved in most highway accidents. A prime factor because so many of us, when we get behind the wheel, forget take with us a little consideration for the other fellow. It is not enough to pull our automobile down the highway with everything under control; it is also our obligation to extend a little consideration to the other drivers; that is, we can give them room to pass; we can dim our lights; we can give the proper signals; we can stay well back of the car in front (many drivers become nervous when another car pulls up behind, too close and a nervous driver is a dangerous driver); we can anticipate the movements of every car which meets us or which passes us, and be prepared to give right-of-way—even if the law says we have the right-of-way.

All these things, and many others, are important in driving. If we fail to heed the necessity for "consideration," then we are headed for trouble.

So, if you have to enter the game during this holiday season, give a little thought to the other players... if you don't, the cards are already stacked against you in this highway gamble!

Can Christmas really be dangerous? It certainly can.

The Christmas tree—focal point of festivities—can be a serious hazard. Every year you hear about a holiday "accident" when a tree is ignited and someone is burned.

Help protect your family by taking some precautions when you set up your tree.

If you live where you can cut your own, choose a growing tree—not a dead one. If you purchase your tree, select one which has not been allowed to dry out by prolonged storage.

When you take it home, stand the tree in water until you are ready to use it. Bring the tree indoors just before Christmas and remove it as soon as it has served its purpose.

The larger the tree, the greater the hazard, so avoid selecting one any larger than you need.

Just before setting up the tree, saw off the trunk at an angle at least one inch above the original cut. Support the tree well with a sturdy, broad base.

On the market are some fire-proof aluminum foil trees. Unfortunately these have their potential hazards, too. If you choose one of these trees, light them from a distance. Use colored spot lights or some similar lighting. Avoid putting regular ornamental lights on this type tree. The foil is an excellent conductor of electricity. If there is the slightest short or fraying of insulation, the tree itself becomes charged with a full current of electricity.

All residents within a two-mile radius of Winters will be eligible for entry in the contest. A Christmas theme must be used in decorations.

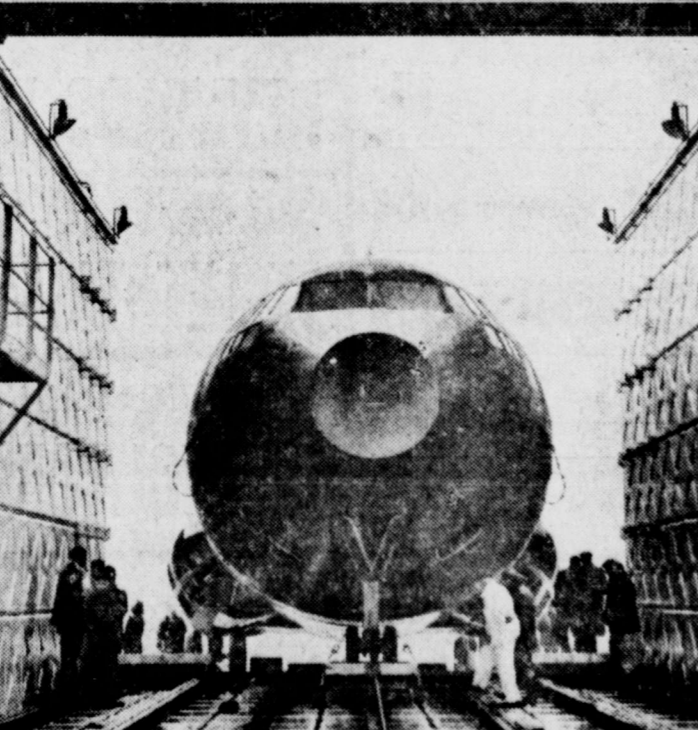
Residents wishing to enter the Home Decoration contests are asked to register at the office of the Chamber of Commerce.

Assisting the officials of the show will be Jake Joyce, Winters agriculture teacher, C. T. Parker and Sam Helmers, Runnels County agents, and members of the Winters Livestock and Agricultural Association.

Members of the association have been working to prepare the show barn for the event, which is expected to draw visitors from a wide area.

Auditors Finish Exam of City of Winters' Books

Auditors have completed an examination of the books and records of the City of Winters, and will make their findings public within the next few days, it was learned this week.

Fiscal year for the City of Winters ended Sept. 30, and the auditors began their look into the records of the city shortly thereafter.

No information has been received from the auditing firm doing the annual checking in connection with the financial position of the City of Winters or in what shape the records are in. This will be forwarded in a regular report shortly.

Texas Department of Public Safety Estimates 105 Holiday Traffic Deaths

The Texas Department of Public Safety estimated today that 190 persons will meet violent death during the coming Christmas-New Year's holiday season, including 105 traffic fatalities.

In addition to the traffic toll, it is estimated there will be 40 suicides and homicides and 45 accidental deaths other than traffic.

Col. Homer Garrison, Public Safety Director, said that the estimate is compiled by the DPS Statistical Services on the basis of past experience and the current traffic trend.

"The deaths that occur in traffic during the 11-day holiday period will be the tragic last additions to the worst year in Texas history for traffic fatalities," he said.

"The DPS is carrying out its annual special emphasis program called 'Operation Deathwatch,'" Garrison reported. "From 12:01 a. m. December 24 until 11:59 p. m. January 3, 1965, we will use every available means to keep accidents at a minimum by promoting strict law observance."

"During this period the Department will tabulate all violent deaths and the totals will be officially announced three times daily as a means of keeping safety uppermost in the minds of the traveling public."

"Throughout the entire holiday period extra patrolmen will be on duty to keep traffic moving safely. Many of our men will be giving up their own holiday in order to assure the safety and well-being of holiday motorists, but the most effective work in cutting down on death and injuries must be done by the drivers themselves."

According to Garrison, other state agencies and private organizations are cooperating in the safety drive. The Texas Highway Department is

Postmaster Says "Mail Now" ... It's Much Too Late To Be Early!

"It's too late to mail early, so please mail now," Postmaster Rankin Pace said this week.

"The biggest mail explosion in history is upon us and we need the cooperation of everyone to make sure that the holiday mail is all delivered before Christmas," the postmaster said.

He suggested the use of air mail and special delivery to guarantee pre-Christmas delivery, especially for out-of-state mail.

In all instances, the use of ZIP codes will be helpful, Pace said. The codes generally mean that mail moves in a more direct route and is handled fewer times. Parcels with ZIPED addresses may be delivered 24 hours or more before others going to the same destinations which do not include the five digit code, he said.

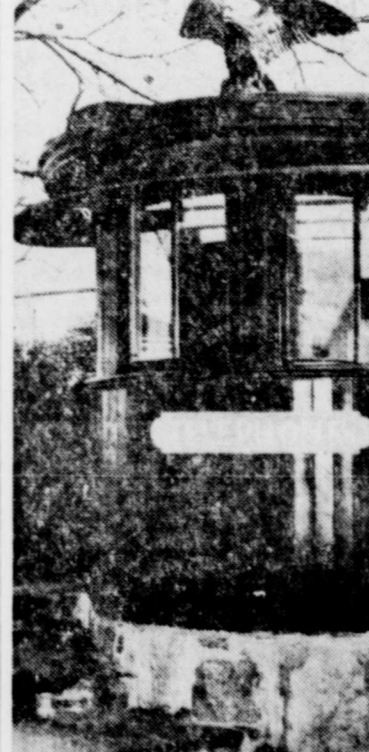

8850 Bales Of Cotton Into Winters Whse.

By Wednesday noon of this week, a total of 8850 bales of cotton from the 1964 crop had been brought to the Winters warehouse from two gins in Winters, and from Wingate.

It was expected that the total harvest this year would be about 9500 bales.

Most of the cotton in the area has been picked, it was observed. Also, most of the cotton coming in now has been mechanically stripped. There are very few bales coming in which have been pulled by hand, according to most sources.

According to the Cotton Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, in Abilene, sample receipts continued to increase last week at the USDA Cotton Classing Office. The quality of cotton declined slightly. Grades were about the same except in the area south of Abilene where harvesting was near completion. A slight decline was noted in staple lengths and Micronaire readings throughout the area.

District 2 accounted for about 19,500 of the 28,538 samples classed during the week ending Dec. 11. The season classing totals reached 156,492 compared to 326,117 at the corresponding date last season.

Month's Rainfall Behind That Of Previous Years

Light showers on Dec. 9 dropped a total of 0.6 of an inch of water on Winters proper, and has been the only moisture received locally during the month of December.

This total is lower than that received for December in recent years. However, with a front reported to be headed in this direction the middle of the week, there was a slight possibility that the month's total would be increased.

Applicant seeks a permit to divert and use 69 acre-feet of water annually for the irrigation of 105 acres of land in Section 177, Block 64, H & T C RR Co. Survey, Abstract 162, Taylor County, Texas. The water will be diverted from an existing 69 acre-foot capacity Soil Conservation Service flood retaining structure, designated as Site No. 3, Valley Creek Watershed, on an unnamed stream, tributary of Fish Creek, tributary of Valley Creek, tributary of the Colorado River, all being more fully set out in said application.

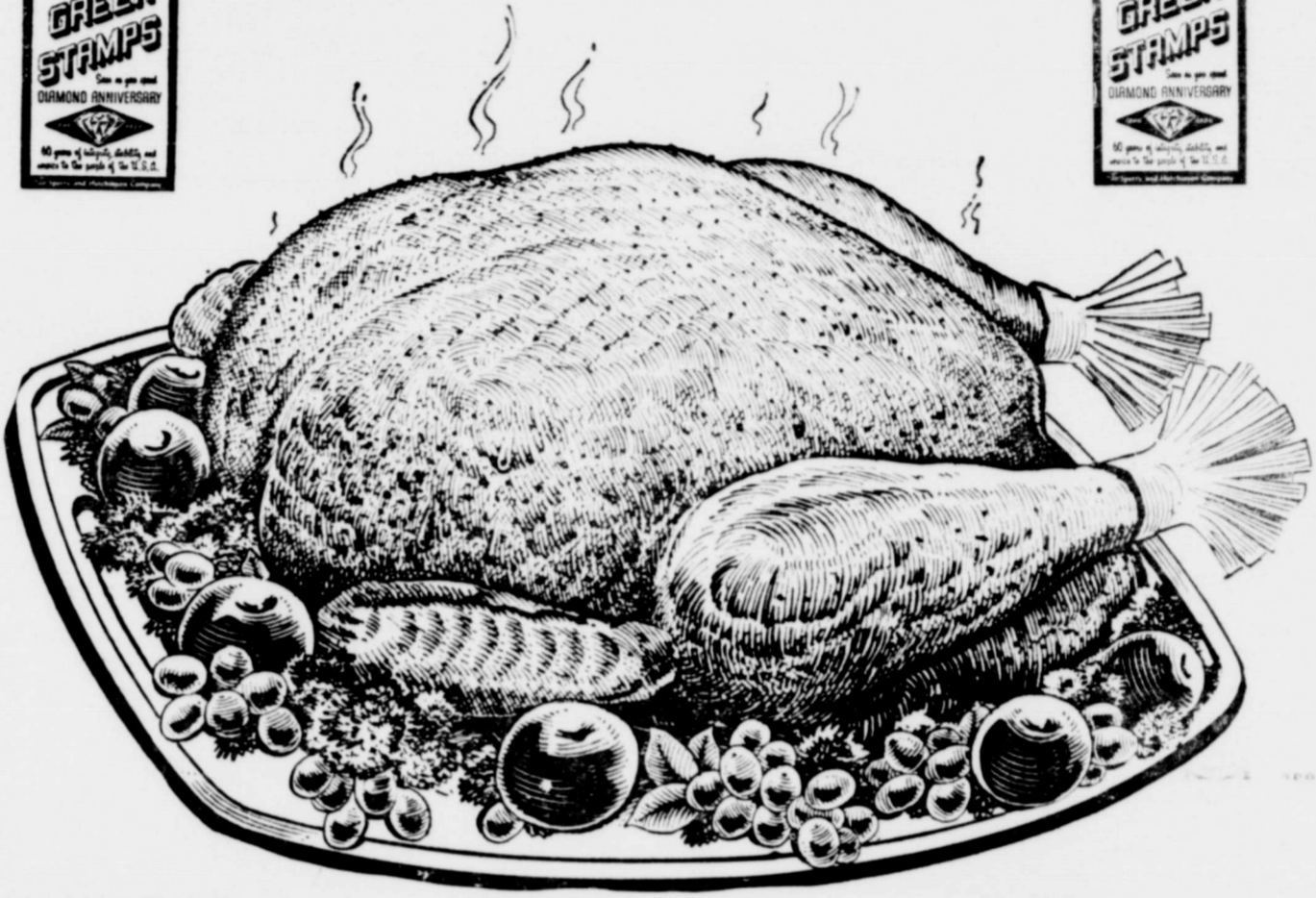

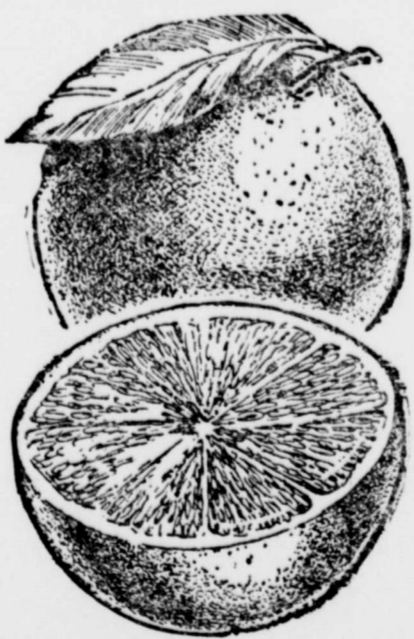

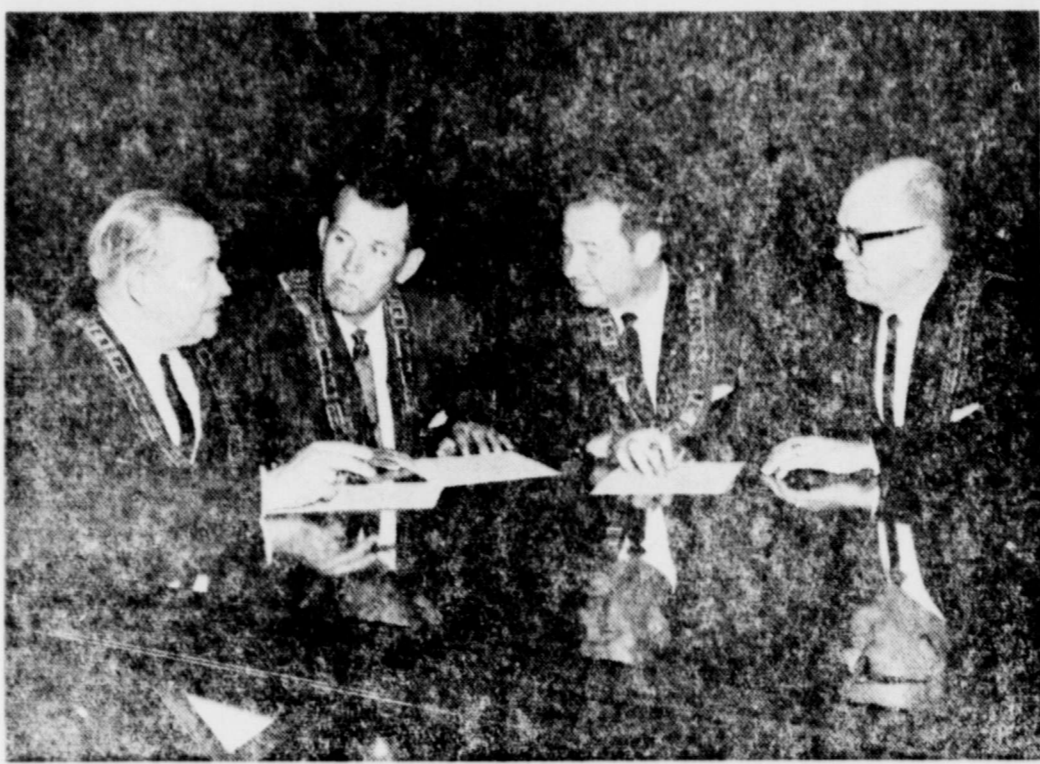

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The Story Of The First Christmas

"And it came to pass in those days, that there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus, that all the world should be taxed. (And this taxing was first made when Cyrenius was governor of Syria.) And all went to be taxed, every one into his own city. And Joseph also went up from Galilee, out of the city of Nazareth, into Judaea, unto the city of David, which is called Bethlehem; (because he was of the house and lineage of David, To be taxed with Mary his espoused wife, being great with child. And so it was, that, while they were there, the days were accomplished that she should be delivered. And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger; because there was no room for them in the inn. And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men. And it came to pass, as the angels were gone away from them into heaven, the shepherds said one to another, Let us now go unto Bethlehem, and see this thing which is come to pass, which the Lord hath made known to us. And they came with haste, and found Mary and Joseph, and the babe lying in a manger. And when they had seen it, they made known abroad the saying which was told them concerning this child. And all they that heard it wondered at those things which were told them by the shepherds."

Almost 2,000 years have passed since the occurrence of the events described by Luke in his Gospel narrative, yet man still listens in wonder at "those things which were told them by the shepherds."

That wondrous message given to us by the humble shepherds through the Scriptures is not merely the account of the birth of a Child to an obscure carpenter's wife in a remote little Judaeen village; it is the message of a hope fulfilled, a promise kept, and the culmination of years of faithful waiting by the children of Israel.

With the angels' chorus upon that starry night came the joyful news that a Saviour had indeed been born, as foretold by the prophets, one whose name would be called Wonderful, Counsellor, the mighty God, the everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace.

But even more than being the announcement of a long-awaited historical event, the message of that Christmas was one of love — a love that transcends our human understanding and reaches into every heart that will receive it.

For it was love that was born into this world on that very first Christmas.

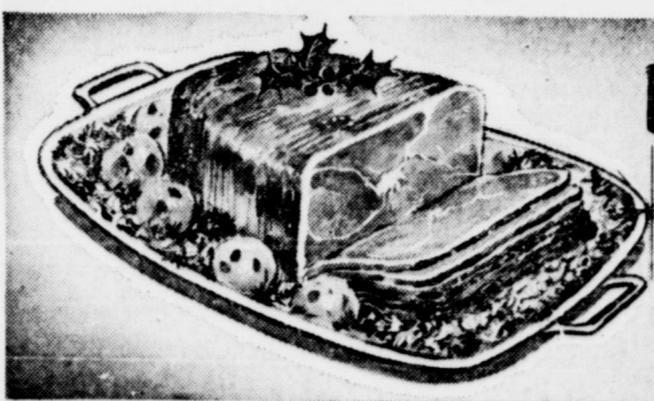

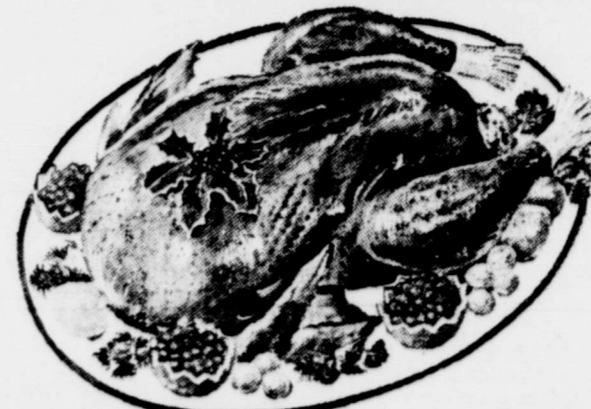

Deer Hunt Gain Seen By Expert

From here on in, Texas big game hunters not only should have better shooting but also may enjoy the luxury of having their prize hung up to cool out in camp for the world to see.

Such is the optimistic Parks and Wildlife Department appraisal of the deer season to date by E. A. Walker, assistant director for wildlife.

He said the heavy frosts of recent days, which blanketed the major deer range on the Edwards Plateau, will shed vegetation, providing greater visibility for the hunter and accordingly less concealment for the game.

"Furthermore," said Walker, "the belated frosts will reduce the available food supply and cause the game to prowl in search of food."

The Department's assistant wildlife specialist said all field reports agree that the unseasonably warm fall weather seriously handicapped deer hunting in most areas.

He added that many places, including some in both central and east Texas, have had pockets of unusually good deer hunting.

"It's not just that cooler weather adds to the zest of the hunt from a personal comfort viewpoint," said Walker, "but traditionally it means all-around improved conditions. We do know that the deer population is great and that sustained hunting pressure is needed in some sections from now on to gain a legitimate harvest of the surplus, which otherwise may be wasted from a hard winter and restricted food."

From other hunting fronts, Walker said reports have varied. Wild turkey hunting has been good in many sections.

Squirrel hunting has been favorable generally. The duck season is the best in years. Early reports on quail luck have been spotted. Texas just concluded a long and successful dove shoot.

Seizure Halts Hunters' Pact

Not all is excitement and success on the deer ranges, according to three state game wardens who participated in a search for a missing hunter with a tragic ending. They were summoned when a Brady man failed to keep a rough-country rendezvous with two companions. Finally, by using an airplane, searchers next day found the man. Stricken with a heart attack while tracking a deer in rocky land, the man had fallen face down, his rifle at his side. The wardens were C. H. Johnson, Brady, Elton Bajer, Oenard, and N. T. Ethredge, Junction.

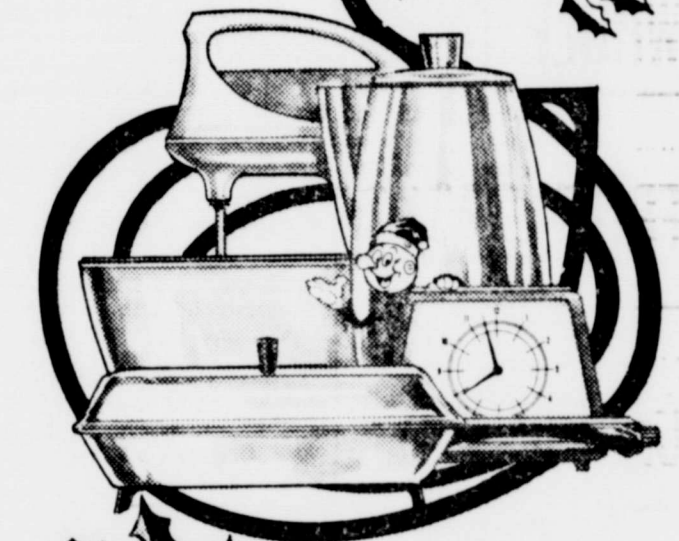

"In Austria, Czechoslovakia,

Poland and Germany," explains Mrs. Pearsall, "selection of this choice fish is a most important part of the Yuletide preparations." The lady of the house searches out the finest fish available, and one with the roe intact. For, to those who acknowledge superstitions, the roe "will ensure good luck for the family."

The fish is "kept alive" right up to the moment it is prepared for the pot.

The method used in preparing the carp varies according to the custom in each country.

However, the process is considered worthy of observation by the entire family.

In Austria, the carp is fried; in Czechoslovakia, it is baked and served with a dark sauce. It is preferred with a gingersnap in Poland and Germany.

52 Points! Man, That's Texas Buck

Two astonishing prizes have been reported to the Parks and Wildlife Department from the deep East Texas deer hunting area, said E. A. Walker, wildlife specialist.

Among the estimated 600 bucks harvested in Polk County by the first week in December were these, as described by Game Warden Wayne D. Chappell of Lufkin:

A 26-pointer which field dressed 220 pounds, shot by John Amortiny of Houston, in the Cold Spring area of Northwest Polk County.

A 52 pointer which field dressed 163 pounds, bagged by J. A. Hensley of Onalaska on Sandy Creek in the west part of Polk County.

Warden Chappell said many "above average" bucks having from 13 to 22 points and weighing 150-190 pounds have been bagged.
