

The second story of the "building within a building" will be used for a rest area, equipped with vending machines for cold drinks and coffee, and tables and chairs-a sort of lunch room. A half-wall will permit a clear vision of the entire plant.



Mayor W. M. Hays announced that providing plans and specifications meet with the approval of the Council, the first advertisement for bids will be published next week. Preliminary plans have already been informally approvby the Council. This was done some weeks ago, with provisions that a few minor details would be worked out before final approval and release.
