HOME TOWN Talk

You could have two football games going on at the same time, have a big concession stand, room enough for bands, cheer sections and a good many spectators, in the new factory building now almost completed by Dry Manufacturing Co. on the western edge of Winters.

And if it were wintertime, you could turn up the hanging heaters in the building and be nice and cozy. Those heaters, when all of them are going, are capable of producing 1,750,000 BTU per hour!

That's just a brief description of the huge steel building into which Dry Manufacturing will move part of their operation in a big expansion program. Then there is a pretty good size building right in the center of the main building—as big as a good many homes. Two story, at that, is this "little" building. It will house superintendents' offices, lounges and storage space, and will be the hub around which the assembly and fabrication facilities of the new factory will be built.

The second story of the "building within a building" will be used for a rest area, equipped with vending machines for cold drinks and coffee, and tables and chairs—a sort of lunch room. A half-wall will permit a clear vision of the entire plant.

Pan American Industries of Winters, one of the top evaporative air conditioner manufacturers in the country, will build what perhaps could be called the biggest evap air conditioner in Texas. The excelsior-filled water pads on this air conditioner will be approximately 6 feet high by 300 feet long! Giant fans will pull the air through these coolant pads to cool and change the air in an area more than twice the size of a football field!

This will be the system of air conditioning used in the new Dry Manufacturing Co. building. A space about six feet deep on the south side of the block-long building has been left open; into this space will be placed large water pads, which will be constantly soaked with water when the system is in operation. Across on the north side of the big steel building will be mounted several giant exhaust fans. When the switches are pulled, these fans will make possible a rapid change of air in the entire building, making for more comfort for workers in the plant and thereby keeping efficiency and working conditions at a high standard.

We were privileged, a few days ago, to hear—in installments—accounts of an interesting fishing trip to Falcon Lake down on the Rio, made by two Winters citizens recently.

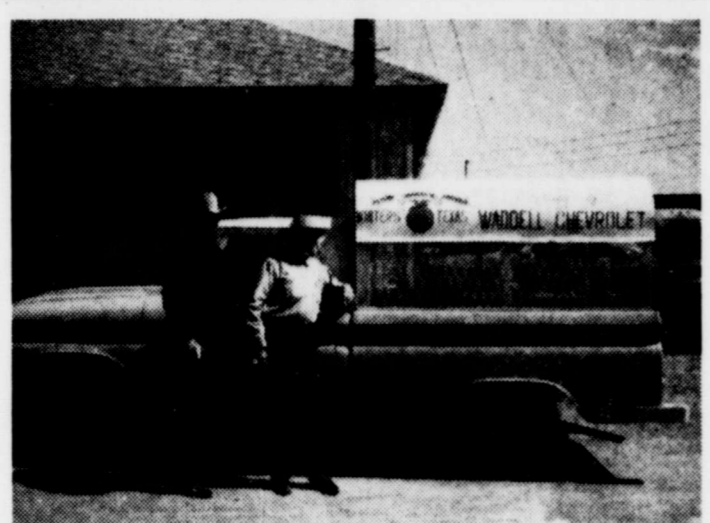
We heard the first installment—the beginning—on a morning from one of the participants, and then in the afternoon heard the second installment—the ending—from the other. Paired back-to-back, the stories jibed pretty well, give or take a few pounds of fish and considering the time-honored prerogative of all fishermen to tell stories in their own way, without fear of cross-examination.

Pete Speer and Harry Herman were the fishermen representing Winters on that outing. And they brought back proof of their abilities. And Harry brought back a healthy respect for mud-suck lake shores. While cleaning fish, he turned to point out a few tricks of the trade to a novice fisherman nearby. He lost his footing, and started sliding toward the water—a distance which was estimated at about six or eight feet, but which seemed to Harry to be two miles. He ended up with his feet sticking in the water, while he carefully held aloft a scaling knife in one hand and a partly-scaled fish in the other. The novice remarked that that was a peculiar way to go to the water's edge to wash a fish, and right then and there the fisherman probably lost an addict.

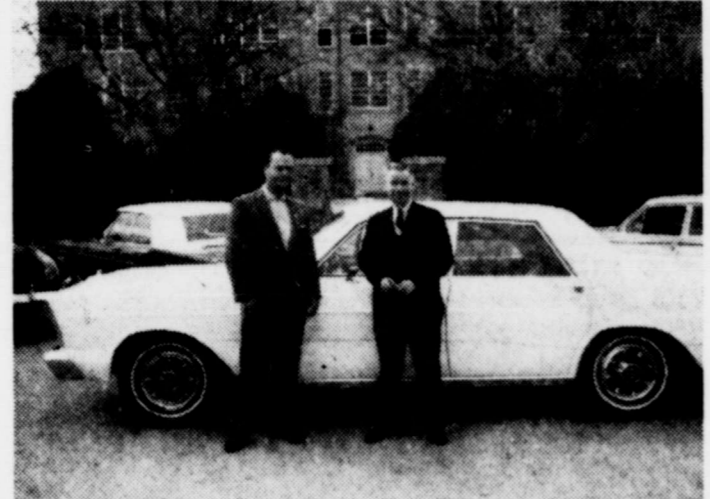

Sign-Up Deadline For Medicare Is Drawing Near

Social Security representatives will be in the Winters Chamber of Commerce office from 10 a. m. until 3 p. m. Wednesday, March 30, to make last-minute sign-up for the Medicare program.

This last period will be devoted to answering questions concerning the Medicare program and to sign up, if eligible persons so desire.

Every person 65 or over must sign up before March 31 to be eligible for the program when it becomes effective July 1, 1966. Failure to sign up before the deadline will mean that otherwise eligible persons must wait until 1967 to enroll in the program.

Social Security representatives will also be in Ballinger March 30 in the FHA office on the third floor of the courthouse, from 10 a. m. until 3 p. m.

City To Ask For Bids On Water Treatment Plant

If all goes well, Winters will have a brand new and adequate water treatment plant by summer's end — perhaps before.

The City Council, in regular session Monday night of this week, decided to ask engineers who have been drawing up plans for a new water treatment system to meet with the Council next Monday night, March 28, at which time the engineers are to have the complete plans and specifications ready.

Mayor W. M. Hays announced that providing plans and specifications meet with the approval of the Council, the first advertisement for bids will be published next week. Preliminary plans have already been informally approved by the Council. This was done some weeks ago, with provisions that a few minor details would be worked out before final approval and release.

The City Council has been working several months in an attempt to get the water treatment plant project underway before the summer months of 1966. But, according to Council members, the many fine points entailed in a project of this size prevented a definite start before this time. There has been a strong determination on the part of all council members to get the project going and, as one councilman put it, "we're going to get started on this water plant within the next few weeks if we have to start digging with spoons!"

Preliminary plans for the project call for construction of a settling basin 90 feet in diameter, additional filters, clear well storage, and other facilities. Final plans will depend on the cost of the overall project as determined by returned bids, the mayor said.

All new settling basins and filters will be in addition to present facilities, thus increasing water treatment capabilities. During the hot summer months the present treatment plant cannot meet the demand for water, which reaches 1,200,000 plus gallons per day, it was pointed out. Already this spring, according to Water Superintendent W. D. Waggoner, demand for water has begun to overtax the present system. There have been several days within the past two weeks when demand has exceeded 500,000 gallons per day, and Waggoner expected it to reach 700,000 gallons daily some day this week.

Special equipment was installed on the vessel to facilitate handling of the spacecraft during recovery operations if the capsule had landed in the destroyer's area of the Pacific. Since the ship was selected as an alternate recovery vessel, her crew underwent extensive training in spacecraft recovery techniques.

"Dateline: Tanzania" Touches of Home Decorate Walls of Peace Corps Worker's Home, Africa

(Editor's Note: Billy Pumphrey, of Winters, is a teacher for the Peace Corps in Chunya, Tanzania, a new nation on the East Coast of Africa. This is the third of a series of articles he has written on life in that country and of his work in the Peace Corps. This week he writes of his home and the students he teaches. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Pumphrey of Winters.)

The homes of Peace Corps Volunteers have been greatly romanticized. They are often thought to be either thatched huts beneath swaying palms on a coral sand beach or sturdy wooden houses high in the Andes or Himalayas where every dawn and dusk is a spectacular event as it colors the valley below in brilliant hues. My home is neither of these.

Nyumba yangu (my home) is a brick three-room house. It has an enclosed backyard and an adjoining building which houses the kitchen, storage room, and bath. It is neither luxury nor poverty. It is built on a solid rock-cement foundation but the brick walls are joined with mud then the mud is covered with a light coating of cement to keep it from washing out.

The roof is corrugated tin and in the rainy season I enjoy the soothing sound of raindrops pattering on a tin roof. I have, however, installed masonite ceilings so I don't get the full volume of the rain, or the heat either on hot days.

The interior walls are plaster and large travel posters of Texas give the rooms a homelike atmosphere. A bronco-riding at the Stamford Cowboy Reunion and the Alamo at sunset greet me at every meal in my "dining room." Big Bend, Padre Island, Lake Austin, and an East Texas forest brighten up my bedroom.

The third room, my library-studyroom, is filled with postcards of Texas and maps. Students never tire of hearing about cowboys and Texas and the travel posters always interest them. My library includes several hundred paperback books ranging from "Aly Hope for America" by Lyndon Johnson to "You Can't Go Home Again" by Thomas Wolfe. These books were provided by the Peace Corps for reference use and to help us to continue our education during our service. I have read more books since I arrived here than in any other equal period of time in my life.

The Peace Corps provides the basic furnishings—tables, bed, chairs, closet, etc.—but other luxuries such as book cases and cabinets are built during spare time. Most Volunteers are surprised at their abilities when they build a bookcase or something else. I have built one large kitchen cabinet, some bookcases, a gate for my backyard, and some screens and a screen door. I am quite proud of my carpentry talents.

My backyard and flowerbeds are kept by 11 year-old Samson, whom I send to school and pay a monthly salary of 15 shillings (\$2.14). Enclosed in the backyard by a 3 foot high rock wall are numerous flowers — iris, marigolds, poinsettias, daisies — and banana plants and papaya trees. The banana trees have not borne fruit yet but there are

He ranks with the top 12 percent of the members of the House in seniority, and is third ranking member of the powerful House Foreign Affairs Committee and is vice chairman of two joint Senate-House Committees.

Cong. Burleson is being opposed in this year's Democratic Primary by Eldon Mahon of Abilene.

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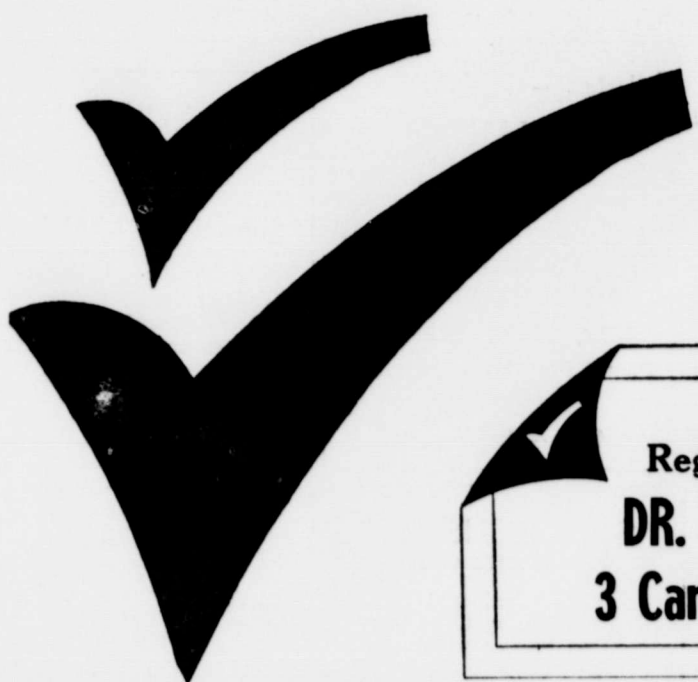
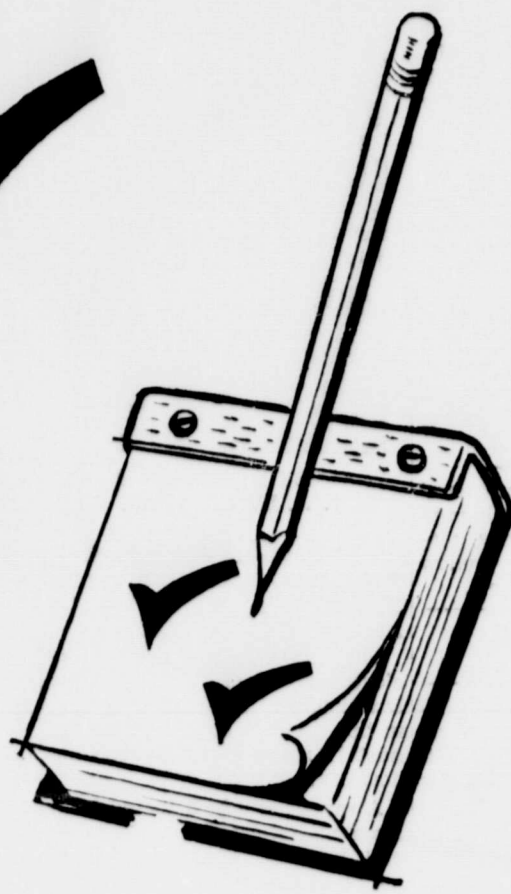

Students, Faculty Members Hear FBI Counterspy

Several students and faculty members of Winters High School heard an address Tuesday night by Herbert A. Philbrick, citizen "communist" and counterspy, at Catchings Cafeteria, Abilene Christian College in Abilene.

Attending the lecture from Winters were students, Danny Killough, Mike Wagner, Ricky Cummings, Rex Harrison, Glenn Hall, Terry Rives, Jay Davidson, Walter Morrow, Skippy Sheppard, Maria Shaw, Marsha Hays, Suzanne Parks, Cheryl Beard and Jeri Guy. Faculty members included Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Christian, Miss Reagan, Mrs. Wagner, Mrs. Kruse and Aaron Cranford.

The lecture was sponsored by the West Texas Schools American Heritage Project.

Philbrick, author of the book "I Led Three Lives," is a man who, according to TIME Magazine, "Postponed his own life, liberty and pursuit of happiness, to get to the bottom of the great communist conspiracy in the U. S." For nine years he was an FBI counterspy working within the ranks of the U. S. communists, and continues to battle their insidious influence today, traveling thousands of miles as the nation's leading lecture attraction on the subject of communism.

The decision to go underground as a communist while working as an FBI counterspy was a difficult one for Philbrick to make back in 1940. He was a young advertising executive on the threshold of a fine career. But he accepted the responsibility because he knew he could be of immeasurable service to his country in working from within the ranks of the communists.

Because of his position, he knew that at any moment, his communist affiliation might be detected and that he could be arrested for "subversive" activities, and could expect no recognition or help from the FBI if it did happen. On the other hand, he was constantly being spied on by the communists, and his house was frequently under surveillance. If the communists

discovered his contacts with the FBI, he was certain his life would be in danger.

"I know what the communists are out to do in the United States," Philbrick says. "Knowing how they operate, as well as the techniques they use to spread their influence through the ranks of American citizenry, I want to warn that anyone, no matter how innocent, can unwittingly become a dupe of the communists. Quietly, imperceptibly, they infiltrate the most worthy organizations, involving innocent men and women in their schemes and they have never been busier than they are today."

In his talk, Philbrick described how he was innocently drawn into a communist front organization and how he saw other "fronts" set up, involving reputable and innocent Americans. He told how to distinguish between worthy groups and "fakes" and what to do when such a situation is detected.

"We must be careful, but not hysterical," Philbrick said. "We can be alerted to recognize the communists, and all of us can do our best to protect ourselves and our neighbors from the insidious menace. But we must be careful to do so without ourselves harming innocent persons."

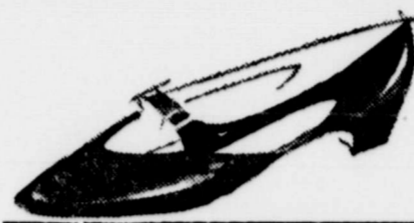

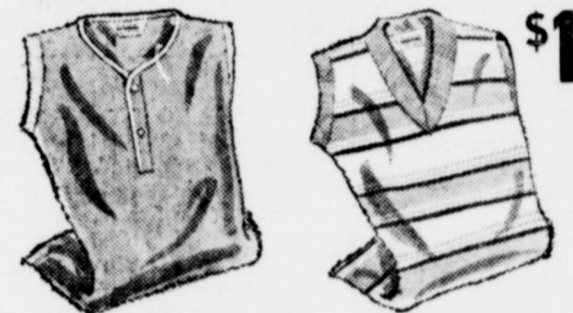
