### Interest Low On City's Cemetery **Water Proposal**

to determine public opinion on a proposal to provide water to lot owners at Lakeview Cemetery has been "disappointing," according to city officials.

Only 132 cards have been returned in the survey; 368 were sent out. Of those returned, only 98 approved of the plan, with 34 against.

Because no provisions have ever been made to provide close access to water at the only cityowned cemetery, the Council has proposed that lines be installed to within 75 feet of each lot, and lot owners asked to pay 25 cen's per month for the water, with billing made each January 1. There is water available at the cemetery, but in many instances faucets are a long distance from lots.

Letters were mailed to lot owners outlining the proposal and asking opinion. Return cards were enclosed in the letters, and lot owners were asked to return them not later than May 15, so the council would have a concrete opinion.
