County Ranchers Attended Range Tour At Sonora

Ronald Rugh, Range Conservationist, with the local Soil Conservation Service, reported that a large group of Runnels County ranchmen turned out for the range tour of the Sonora Experiment Station, sponsored by the Runnels Soil and Water Conservation District.

Woodrow Hoffman, Work Unit Conservationist, Harvey Kahlend, Soil Conservationist, and Glen Green, Soil Conservation Technician, represented the Soil Conservation Service.

Dr. Leo Merrill, Range Scientist, at the station, conducted the tour. Merrill is working with several different grazing systems to determine which will give the fastest range improvement, along with the highest net income.

Dr. Merrill has shown that the net income from the rotation deferred grazing systems has more than tripled that of the year-long grazing system.

Rugh said that anyone who has at least two pastures can set up a rotational deferment system. And that anyone who is interested should contact the local Soil Conservation Service office for any help needed along this line.

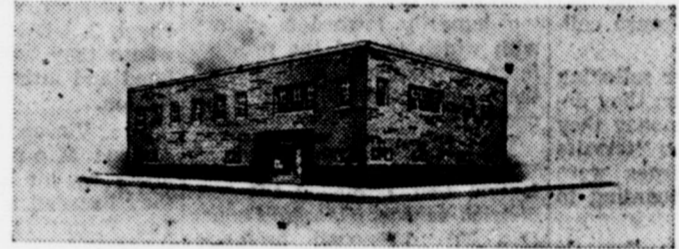

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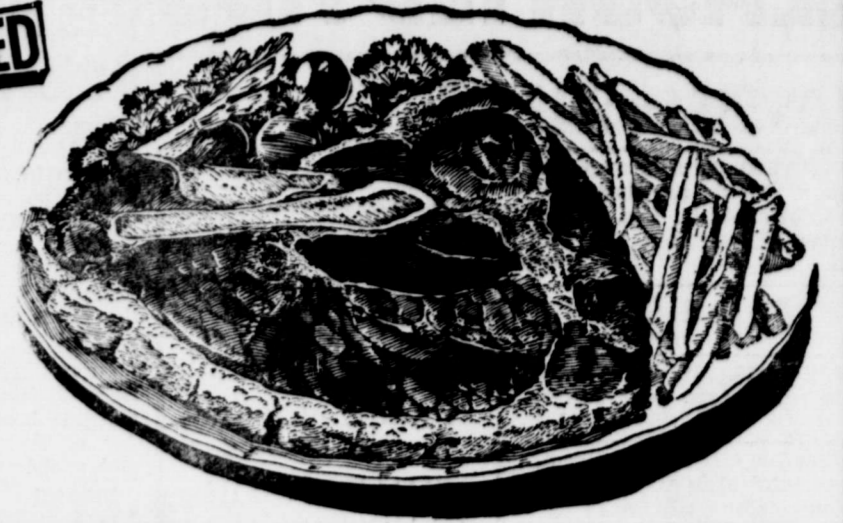
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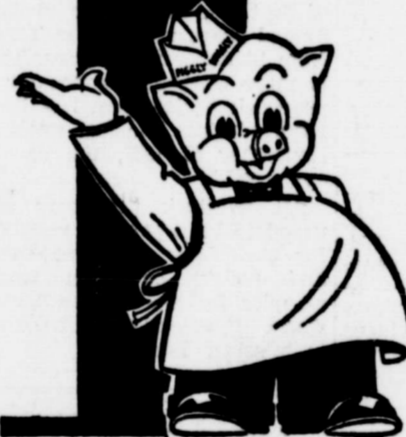

Blizzards Lose Game To Bearcats, 6-0, In High Wind Friday At Ballinger

The Winters Blizzards, as cold as the night itself, and unable to generate any consistent offense, went down to their second defeat Friday night, losing to the Ballinger Bearcats 6-0.

Played before a packed stadium, the game was a defensive stand-off from the beginning. The Blizzards, facing a strong north wind, could not move the ball after receiving the opening kick off and got off a short 20-yard punt into the wind. Ballinger moved to the 10-yard line where the defensive unit of the Blizzards held. The Bearcats' Johnny Keel then missed an attempted field goal and the ball came back to Winters.

Early in the second quarter the Blizzards, with the wind at their backs, stalled a drive at the Ballinger 15-yard line. Fred (Go Go) Gray's field goal attempt was wide to the left.

The Bearcats took over on their own 20 and after making one first down, Phillip Mata broke over left tackle, evaded a couple of secondary men, and outran the rest for a 70-yard scoring jaunt. The point after attempt was no good, and for all practical purposes this was the ball game.

The Blizzards mounted a drive in the third quarter only to see a field goal attempt by Gray once again go wide. Later in the fourth period the Blue team drove to the Ballinger 30, only to have a pass interception stall them.

The Bearcats, not as strong this year as usual, were stopped in the third quarter when Skip Sheppard recovered a fumble.

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on the Winters 35. Again late in the fourth quarter, the Blizzard defensive unit halted a determined Bearcat drive on their own 5-yard line.

The game was close in first downs as Ballinger made 10 and Winters 9.

Jerry Awalt led the Blizzard defenders with 13 tackles. Others who did a good job were Larry Donica and Walter Morrow.

Outstanding offensively was Fred Wilder who led in pass receiving and had three runs for 25 yards.

Defensively the Blizzards played a good game. Offensively they left something to be desired as the spark and zip of the Brady game the previous week was absent. Hopes are that it will return for the Seymour game and continue strong into district play.
