## HOME TOWN Talk

By R. C. THOMAS

Paul Harvey, ABC news analyst and commentator, in reporting on certain worthwhile accomplishments of teenagers over the nation, has a habit of closing such reports with the remark, "They're not ALL delinquent!"

Harvey, who visited Winters in June, 1965, and spoke during the Diamond Jubilee, probably is closer to what is called the "grassroots" of the American stream than are so many of his nationally-known colleagues; he recognizes the dangerous trend which seems to have saturated certain elements of our youth, and deplores it; he knows of the danger of public acceptance of irresponsibility and non-conformity with decency on the part of these elements as just a "phase" they are going through, and he warns against this danger; and apart from many of his colleagues, he does not accept this element as truly representative of the youth of America.

At the same time, he recognizes that there still exists, especially in the smaller and inland communities, a current of respectability among the young people, the teenagers; but, because of the non-sensationalism of their lives, they seldom get the credit due them. So Harvey attempts at times to let the nation know of their choice for decency.

So... if Paul Harvey knew about the actions and good works of the youngsters of the Winters community, he would be quick to point out that "They're not ALL delinquent!" On their own, within the past few days, these Winters youngsters saw a chance to help a fellow student. It was a natural thing for them... they responded in a manner which has always been accepted as normal and healthy. Perhaps we, their elders, products of an earlier and slower-paced time, haven't noticed the importance of their attitudes, because we EXPECT them to respond in this manner. But... it is all the more important because of the pressures (Continued on page 5)

## Gayle Gardner Completes Basic Training, To OCS

Army Private E-2 Gayle W. Gardner Jr., 23, is visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gayle W. Gardner Sr., here, after having completed basic training at Fort Bliss, El Paso. He has been accepted for Officer Training School and will report to Fort Ord, Calif., Dec. 3.

Pvt. Gardner received an early promotion to Army pay grade private E-2 on completion of basic combat training at Fort Bliss, Nov. 10. He was awarded the promotion two months earlier than is customary because of his score in firing the M-14 rifle, high score on the physical combat proficiency test and his military bearing and leadership abilities. The early promotion program is an Army policy providing incentive for outstanding trainees.

Upon report to Fort Ord, Pvt. Gardner will undergo two weeks leadership training and 12 weeks of advanced individual training prior to entering actual Officer Candidate School work in administration.

He is a graduate of Winters High School, and completed four years at Hardin-Simmons University prior to volunteering for Army service in September.

## Robert Guevara Fund Reaches Thousand Dollars

The Robert Guevara Fund, being collected by members of the student body of Winters High School, under the sponsorship of the Student Council, has reached \$1,000.

The fund is being made up to help defray doctor and hospital expenses for Robert Guevara, a WHS student who is in an Abilene hospital following a hunting accident almost two weeks ago.

Students have been doing odd jobs — weed cutting, plowing, car washing, house cleaning, leaf raking, etc. — individually and in groups to raise money for the special fund.

In addition to the work being performed by the students, individuals, businesses and organizations have given money into the fund. The Winters Lions Club Tuesday voted to give \$25.00 to the fund. Also, the Ballinger Junior Chamber of Commerce gave \$25.00.

Guevara, who was a member of the 1966 Blizzard football team and a junior student in Winters High School, remains in Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene in a serious condition. He was shot in the head when a .22 caliber rifle was accidentally discharged during a hunting excursion two weeks ago.

## Phone Co. To Cut Long Distance Rates January 1

Reduced long distance rates for most station-to-station calls within Texas will become effective Jan. 1, 1967 for customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, Southwestern States Telephone and Four States Telephone Companies, according to E. H. Danner, president of the three companies.

State-wide reductions on three minute calls vary from five to fifteen cents on most station-to-station calls over 56 miles in distance within Texas. Reductions for calls over three minutes are even greater, according to Danner. The reductions apply to calls made during the time when "day rates" are in effect as well as to all intrastate (within Texas) station-to-station calls made during the "night rate" hours after 8 p. m. and all day Sunday.

The new tariffs reflecting the reduced rates will be distributed to all offices handling long distance calls at the earliest possible date, Danner stated.

## Christmas Parade Is Set For 3:00 P. M. Saturday

The big Christmas parade, sponsored by the Winters Chamber of Commerce, will be held in downtown Winters at 3 p. m. Saturday, December 3.

Several organizations and commercial firms will have floats in the parade.

The parade will form on the parking lot on East Dale Street across from Huffman House. Parade directors have asked that floats and entries to be in the parade be at the forming area no later than 2:15 Saturday afternoon so that parade position assignments can be made.

From the forming area, the parade will move west on East Dale to Main Street, then turn south on South Main to Broadway, west one block to South Church Street. From there, the parade will move north to West Dale Street, turn right to Main Street, and then left one block and disperse in the 200 block of North Main Street.

The Winters High School Blizzard marching band will lead the parade.

Already signed up to enter floats in the organization division of the parade are the WHS Student Council, Cub Scouts, Future Teachers of America, Goal Diggers Club, Authors Anonymous of Winters High School, Future Homemakers, and the Sub Deb Club. Mrs. Emma Marks, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, said there still are some vacancies for the organizational division.

The sponsors of the parade have indicated they expect more entries to be received before parade day. There will be no "Kiddie Parade" as such this year, with small children marching in the parade. However, Santa Claus will be in Winters and will meet with the children immediately following the parade.

The Chamber of Commerce this year is providing \$25 to each organization to be used in building floats to enter in the parade. Cash awards will be given to the winning floats.

A big \$50 cash award also is being offered to the winning float in the Community Float division.

Winners in the Commercial float section will receive plaques or trophies.

**DECORATE WINDOWS**  
In order to decorate the town for the Christmas season, the Chamber of Commerce has asked organizations to trim windows of vacant buildings in the downtown area. Three church groups have taken this project, and include the ladies of the Presbyterian Church, the ladies of the Lutheran Church and the Girls Auxiliary of the First Baptist Church. Other groups desiring to help in this program are asked to contact the chamber of commerce office.

The Christmas parade is only one of several events sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce for this Yuletide season. The first was the Moonlight Sale November 17. Another Moonlight Sale will be held December 22.

Also, the Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a home decorating contest, and will offer big cash prizes to the winners in this event, which will be divided into Home Decoration, Door Decoration, and Window Decoration.

The Winters High School concert band will present the annual Christmas season concert next Thursday evening, beginning at 7:30, in the high school auditorium.

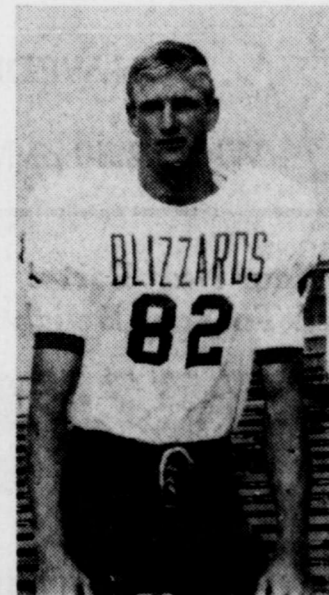
The band will present some traditional Christmas music, along with other concert pieces. The concert section will be featured in a special presentation, "Trumpets Oie!"

## Lone Star Gas Co. Plans To Ask For Adjustment In Local Gas Service Rate

Lone Star Gas Company will ask the Winters City Council for an adjustment in local general service gas rates, James M. Wharton, the company's local manager, announced this week.

Representatives of the gas company will meet with the City Council at the next regular meeting, Dec. 5, to discuss the request for adjustment.

The requested adjustment, Wharton said, would provide for an increase in the cost for the first 1,000 cubic feet of gas used during any monthly billing period. All additional gas used over the first 1,000 cubic feet would be billed at the existing rate of 75.9 cents per thousand, he said.

In addition, Lone Star is requesting a "cost adjustment clause" to be included in the ordinance which will permit them to make future upward or downward adjustments in the general service rate dependent upon changes in certain specific operating costs. This means, the local manager explained, the service rate would be tied to the government's "cost-of-living" index.

The company will ask for passage of an ordinance permitting the company to charge \$1.50 net (compared to the current \$1.25) for the first 1,000 cubic feet, or any portion thereof, with the provision that when no gas is used no minimum bill be rendered.

Wharton said the adjustment, if approved by the City Council would increase the average customer's bill 25 cents per month, or \$3.00 yearly. He also said that the added revenue from this proposed increase would be partially offset by a loss of revenue from non-consumption minimum bills and reconnect charges.

## Junior Culture Club Will Hold Bazaar Saturday, Dec. 3

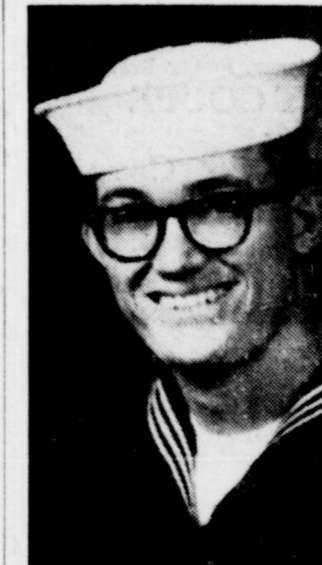
A Christmas Bazaar, sponsored by the Junior Culture Club, will be held Saturday, Dec. 3, from 9 to 5, in the Tinkle building on South Main Street. The club is sponsoring the bazaar for the purpose of raising funds for various projects of the club.

Items to be found at the bazaar will be Christmas decorations, baked goods, small gifts, and white elephants.

Mrs. Tommy Russell, president of the club, said the main projects of the club this year are support of the special education class of Winters Elementary School, support of the Winters Public Library; and sponsorship of the Junior Miss Culture Club.

Approval of the request, the local manager said, would permit the gas company to offer continuous year-around availability of service as it would no longer be necessary for customers to have service discontinued to avoid non-consumption minimum bills.

Lone Star representatives said the last general service rate increase in Winters occurred in 1960, when the City Council passed an ordinance permitting the company to increase its rates 5.4 cents per thousand cubic feet. This increase was based on a State Railroad Commission order increasing the cost of gas at the city gate.

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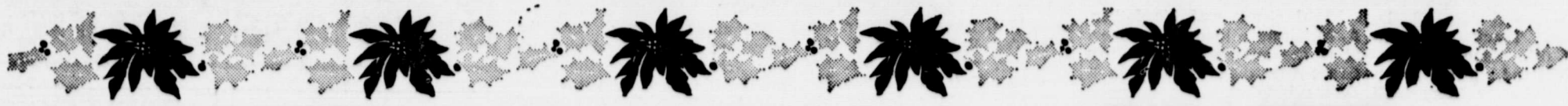

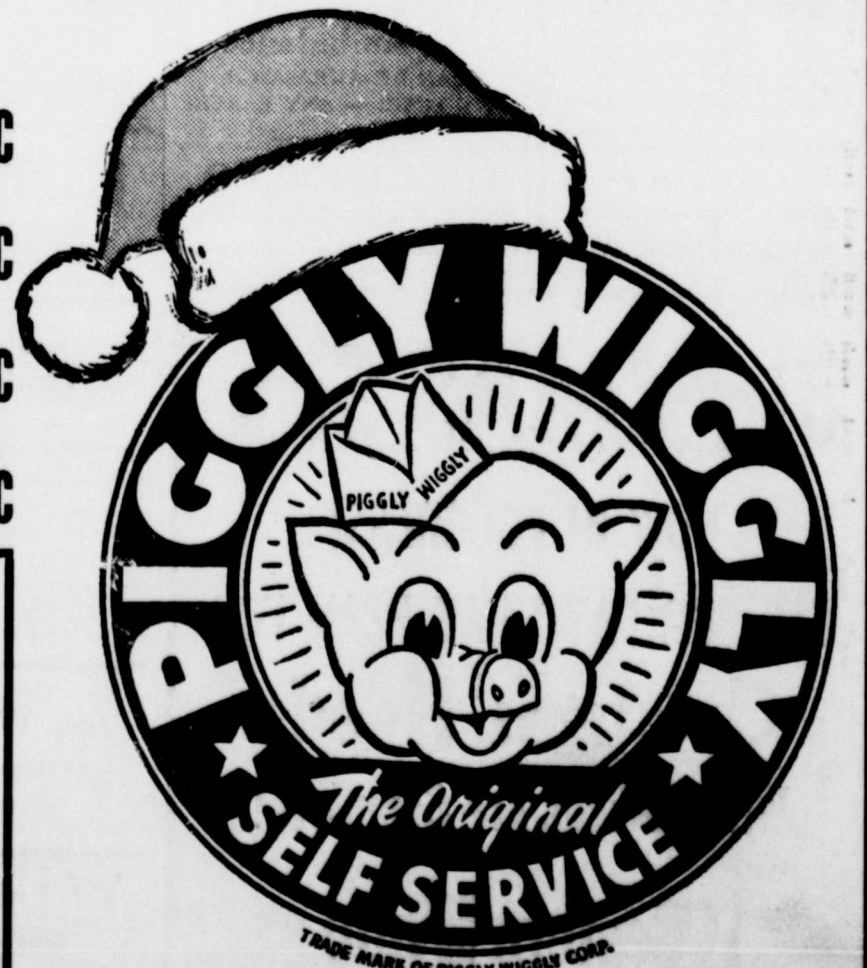

**Cotton Farmers To Vote On Proposed "Check-Off" Plan**

During the week of December 5-9, cotton farmers will have the opportunity to decide, in referendum, whether to put up a dollar a bale to finance a big expansion in research and promotion.

The Cotton Research and Promotion Act was passed by the last session of the Congress, and signed into law by the President. It provides for a referendum by cotton farmers, to approve or disapprove of a "check-off" program whereby farmers pay \$1.00 per bale of cotton produced to be used in research and promotion of cotton products. It also provides for selection of a Cotton Board to administer the program. The Secretary of Agriculture would supervise the work of the Cotton Board to insure that the funds are spent as intended under the law. It has been stated, also, that the Act provides for refunds to those farmers desiring a refund.

In speaking of the controversial Act, calling for the referendum, Marion Hays, president of the Rannels County Farm Bureau, said, "Everyone agrees on the need for research and promotion in cotton. The only issue is whether to use the power of the federal government to collect funds from producers for a research and promotion program over which the producers have no control."

Charles Stenholm, executive vice president of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., said that "Whatever decision may be made) it should be based on the facts and on a full understanding of the stakes that are involved." He said that opposition to the Act which will be voted on next week "concerns two main points: 1. That it is a compulsory check-off program, and 2., that it will be controlled and run by the Secretary of Agriculture." "These are not factually upheld but are interpretations," he said.

Hays, of the Rannels County Farm Bureau, said that "the Act would give the Secretary of Agriculture complete veto power over any and all plans developed under the program, complete control over the budget, and complete authority over whom shall serve on the Cotton Board, complete authority to select the cooperating group that would carry out research and promotion projects, and authority to censor advertising that might be developed to promote cotton." He also said that such a check-off program for cotton "would set a dangerous precedent for other commodities." He said there already is "available, machinery for such a program in the National Cotton Council and the Cotton Producers Institute."

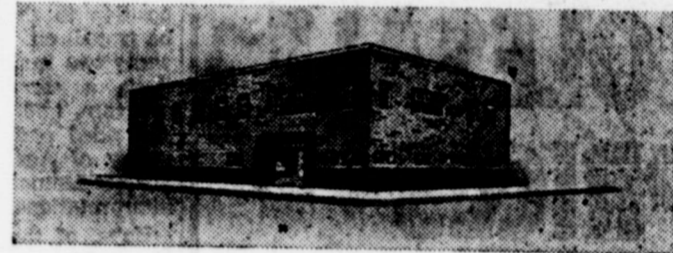

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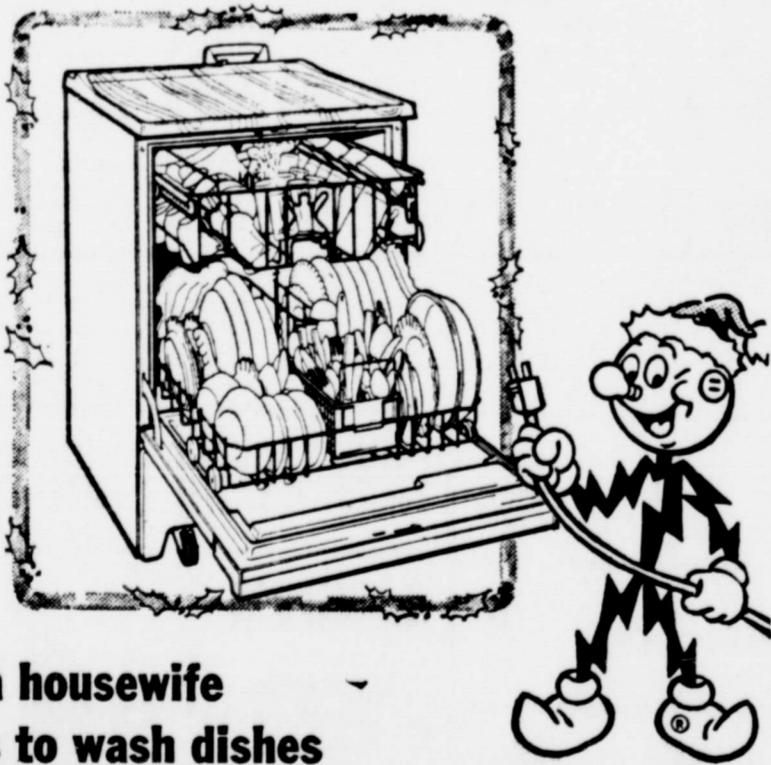
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### Rites Saturday For Mrs. McCartney Who Died Thurs.
