the college of his choice.

Another type of information which the Guidance Program attempts to relay is information concerning training and further education after high school. The Counselor has college, vocational and technical school information, requirements and catalogs, on every college in the state, plus quite a few out of state. A great part of her time is spent in working with seniors along this line. She points out that the day of just deciding what college you want to attend and then showing up there in September is all over. She said there are very few schools not requiring entrance examinations; students must make certain he can qualify for the college of his choice. She has this information at hand, ready to pass on to the student. Preliminary college exams are given in the junior year so the student can have some idea about what he'll make, which information is very important in deciding what college he will attend. Senior students took their college entrance examination boards on December 3.

If the high school student does not plan to go on to college, the Guidance Program is designed for him. The Counselor has much information on vocational condition; handbooks from the U. S. Department of Labor and from the U. S. Employment Office, which can be passed on to the student. Mrs. Harrison explains that, "it is not that we want to force the student into an early decision as to what they want their life's work to

be—sometimes I personally feel that a premature decision can be very dangerous." But they do need to start "shopping around"—reading about occupations that interest them and finding out what training they need, qualifications, advantages and disadvantages, she said.

In addition to the Kuder Interest Survey given the eighth grader, Mrs. Harrison supervises the Kuder Vocational Interest Survey test given junior and senior students who want to take it.

### INDIVIDUAL INVENTORY

Mrs. Harrison said that the testing program in Winters High School is good. "I do not feel that we over-test, but we do have enough tests to help us adequately evaluate a student and get a picture of his abilities and his achievement from year to year," she said. Mental ability tests (or IQ tests as they are called) are given every other year all the way through the school system. Then some type of achievement test is given every year, with the exception of the senior year, when students are busy with college boards. This year, the 1966-67 school year, some students of Winters High School will take

the General Aptitude Test Battery which is administered by the U. S. Employment Service.

In some instances individual tests are administered both in high school and in the lower grades.

"In the individual inventory service category, I would probably place the file I keep of personal data information," Mrs. Harrison said. A folder is kept on each student in high school with information which helps the Counselor to know the student in high school with information which helps the Counselor to know the student better. Each student fills out a personal data sheet with information about his family, other schools he has attended, health information, likes, dislikes, and other information the student might want to give. This information is confidential and is treated in a professional way, she said. "Often the personal folder will help us to know and understand the individual—thus help the student," the Counselor said. It is also used to help the student evaluate himself, or get to know himself better.

Mrs. Harrison calls the counseling the "heart" of the Guidance Program—the "being available to assist students in seeking solutions to education, vocational, social, or personal problems." It is not "advice giving," but "if I can assist a student to reach a decision of a solution to a problem, then I feel I can be of real value. By listening to him, and discussing it with him and then helping him to make the decision, I am saying to him that I have faith in him and appreciate his worth as an individual. I do pledge to the students that information and all they say is confidential. I feel this is of utmost importance to a counselor, and I guard the confidence they place in me. Often there is nothing one can do except just show concern and listen." The students do have problems and questions, she said, some of which cannot be answered, but in the Guidance Program, the Counselor states the student is told, "We are concerned about you as an individual; we want you to develop to your maximum; we have confidence and respect the right you have to solve your own problems; but if you need us or we can be of help to you in making and reaching your goals in life—then we want you to come to us."

Along with the individual and group counseling, the audio-visual program are presented periodically, varying with the particular groups. Plans are to include programs on "Moral Values of Teenagers" in the near future for group participation, along with panel discussions.

Students in Winters High School are responding very well to the Guidance Program, Mrs. Harrison said. This is echoed by other teachers and administrators in the school.

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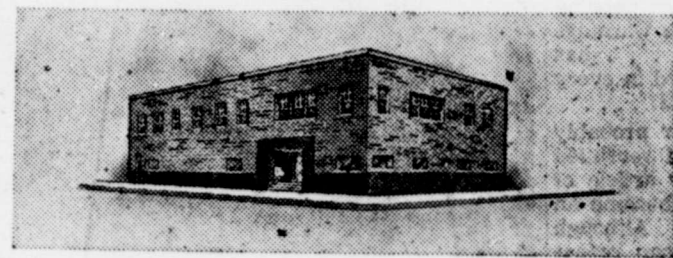

the United States from his native Ireland, and has lived in and around the area since, because, he says, he likes this part of Texas and the "informality of living" in the area. 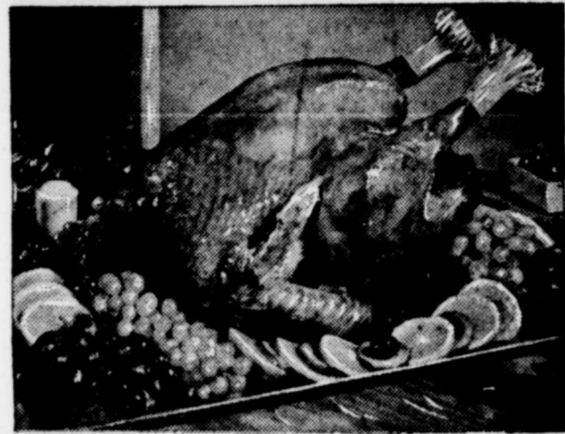

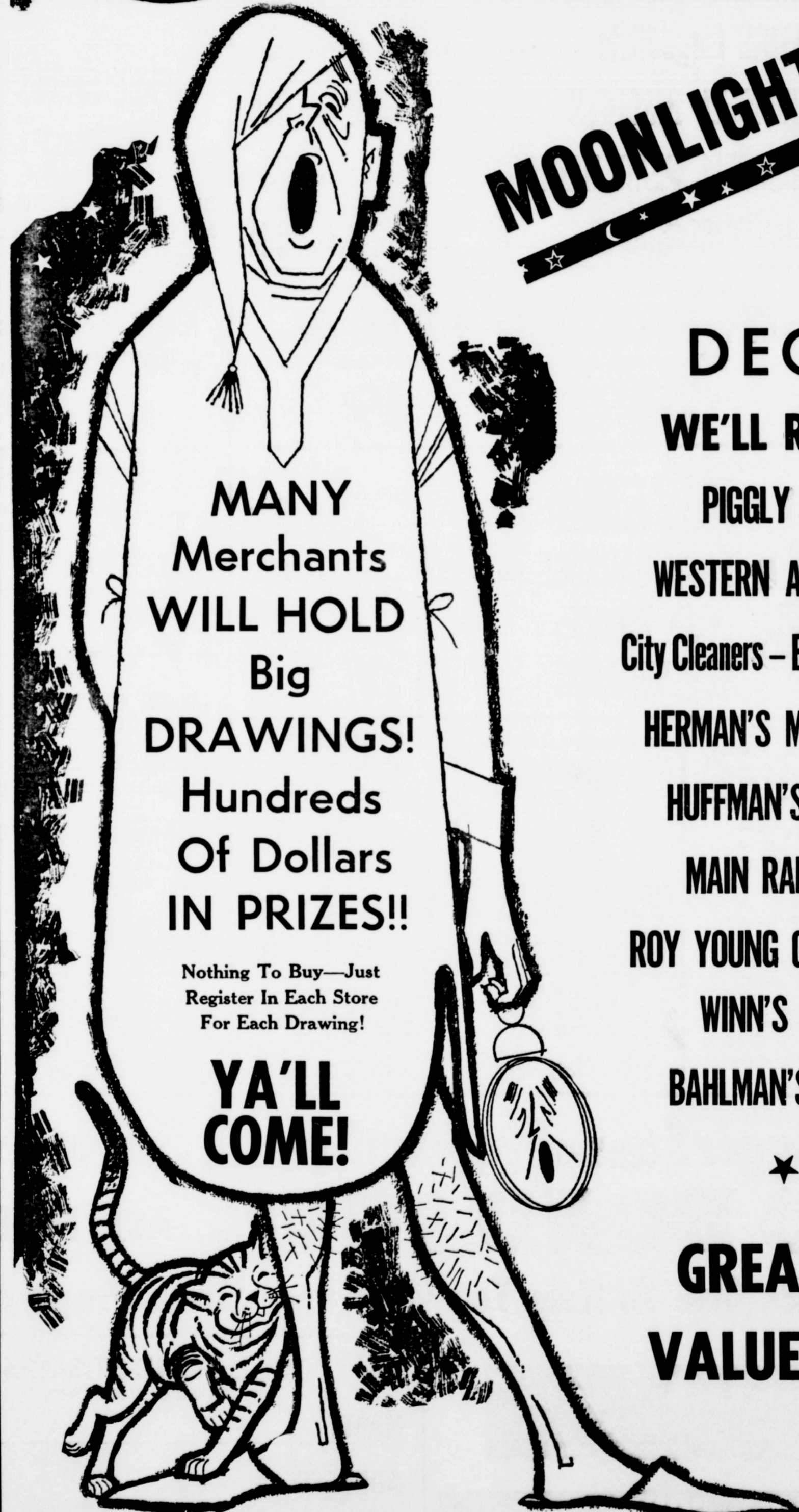

## Faulty Wiring Can Cause Fire In Christmas Tree

Tree or torch? It's your tree, so take your choice. But, before you do, the Texas Safety Association has this warning:

Each year Christmas trees ignite, causing death, serious injury and property damage in hundreds of homes across the nation.

"Dry trees, combustible ornaments and faulty electrical equipment are the culprits in most cases," J. O. Musick, TSA General Manager, says.

Here are several suggestions to help reduce the possibility of a Christmas tree fire in your home.

Choose a tree with springy,

rather than dry brittle branches. When you get it home, keep the trunk in water to help prevent drying out. Keep outside as long as possible.

Before setting up your tree inside, saw off the trunk at an angle at least one inch above the original cut. Place the tree in a sturdy, water-filled stand away from heat. Keep the tree standing in water while it is in the house, and be sure the fresh cut is always under water.

Locate the tree away from exits and traffic areas within the house. Do not put near a fireplace. Remove the tree as soon as possible after the holidays—and that means before its needles begin to drop.

Do not use wax candles on or near the tree. Keep all combustible decorations, such as paper away from candles or fireplaces.

When trimming your tree, use only lighting sets bearing the label of an independent testing laboratory, such as the Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc. (UL). Check for the label on all parts—not just the cords. Use lights only for their intended purpose. Check old sets each year—

before stringing on the tree—for frayed or bare wires.

Unplug the lights when not in the house or when retiring for the night.

Don't overload electrical circuits. Never use a fuse larger than 15 amps. If the fuse blows, cut down on the number of displays or split the load between two or more circuits.

Keep trains, road racing sets and other electrical toys from beneath or near the tree.

Do not decorate metallic trees with lights. Instead, use off-the-tree spot or flood lighting.

Musick also warns that spray-

ed-on retardant treatments by homeowners generally are not practical due to the difficulty of effective application.

"If not flame retardant, flock also can greatly increase an already serious fire hazard on any natural tree and can make a noncombustible or 'slow burning' tree a serious fire hazard," Musick said.

The National Safety Council also cautions that putting a flame retardant flock on a natural tree will not make the tree flame resistant.

In addition to natural and metal trees on the market to-

day, there are many plastic and metalized plastic trees available. Purchasers should ask for evidence that trees of this type are made of materials that burn slowly and—if decorated with lights—the branches do not conduct electricity. Select only those which have a testing laboratory label.

## DPS Will Try To Prevent 47 Deaths During Holidays

Forty-seven persons in Texas will be the focus of one of the most intensive traffic safety efforts ever to be expanded during the Christmas holiday weekend, according to Department of Public Safety Director Col. Homer Garrison, Jr.

"The DPS will be concentrating its efforts more than ever in an attempt to make sure that the indicated death toll of 47 persons is not reached," said Garrison. "This year has been the most terrible in Texas history in terms of lives lost and property damage, and we are working with other state agencies and organizations interested in safety in order to hold down this toll as much as possible."

"We are issuing a personal invitation to each motorist, asking every individual to join the battle, and it must be considered a battle, for traffic has claimed more lives than have been lost in all the wars in which we have been engaged."

"Operation Deathwatch" will be conducted from 6 p. m., Friday, December 23 through 11:30 p. m., Monday, December 26, to focus attention on dangers involved in holiday travel. The present traffic trend indicates that 47 persons will die in traffic during this period.

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The "Deathwatch" will resume for the New Year's weekend, beginning at 6 p. m., Friday, December 30, and continuing through 11:59 p. m., Monday, January 2. Indications for the New Year's period are that 36 persons will die in traffic accidents.

To supplement its enforcement activities, the DPS will place approximately 150 additional men from its other uniformed services on highway patrol duty. Every effort will be made to remove dangerous or irresponsible drivers from the highways for the safety of law-abiding motorists.

Traffic deaths will be tabulated at DPS headquarters in Austin, and reports will be issued to news media sources three times daily to show just how the "Countdown" stands, and "Countdown boards" will be distributed to news media so that the public may stay informed on the traffic situation.

Joining the DPS in its traffic safety efforts are several other organizations and state agencies: The Texas Safety Association is distributing a kit of "Holiday Safety Materials" and is stressing the need for courtesy and caution during the holiday period.

The Texas Highway Department is distributing reminders on danger spots, construction areas, and information on signs and markers to help keep drivers informed and alert.

The Texas Association of Broadcasters and the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission are cooperating in the distribution and use of radio announcements concerning safe driving practices. And the Texas Motor Transportation Association and the Council of Safety Supervisors are working with members of the trucking industry to promote safe driving practices and alertness during the holiday period.







### Roger Babson Says

## Each Man Must Be "Economist" If He Makes Best of His Abilities

Babson Park, Mass. There was once a day when only specialists paid much attention to national economic trends. That was a time when life was more casual, more "local." There was no jet-plane transportation, no swift-as-light communication. But now the pace of change has quickened and deepened in business, finance, social developments, international relations, and family life. If a man is to make the best of his abilities, his assets, and his domestic situation, he must be pretty much of an "economist" himself.

### Preparing For Socio-Economic Changes

Today an individual (and, of course, his family) is more of a cog in the wheel of our total society than ever before. For top success a man must be truly flexible, quick to sense new tendencies and get ready for their emergencies. No matter what field a worker is in, he ought to keep an acute eye on the probable prospects for his occupation. Automation and other dynamic — innovations cause the phasing out or the narrowing of many jobs.

A man caught in the upswing of technology should recognize the dwindling opportunity in his job. New areas are opening up constantly, and a study of basic economic trends will reveal where the best positions will be and where wages and salaries will be highest. It is up to an

ambitious family head to decide whether he should shoot for further experience and training in his present field, or move immediately into a more promising pursuit. The one who makes up his mind intelligently and takes the appropriate steps toward betterment is most likely to end up on the top of the heap.

### Investment Knowledge A Must

Once a young husband or father has established a home, assumed a fair degree of insurance protection, and has a reasonable nest egg in the bank, he should think about building his estate. Part of a well-balanced holding would usually consist of carefully selected stocks, bonds and eventually some real estate. Here again each man will find that he must become more or less an "economist" himself in order to proceed safely and wisely.

He will want to know what businesses and industries will benefit most from the direction our economy and our society are taking. A higher standard of living and a more sophisticated attitude on the part of consumers will alter the needs and preferences of the general public. Automation is turning into an ever-greater business, while computers are steadily changing the landscape of our service and industrial fields. The foresighted man will determine the liveliest fields, — for investment, for job chances for himself, and for giving direction to his children's education.

### Child Education And Retirement

A father must play the part of the economist in planning for the education of his children. In our ever-expanding economy, costs of schooling will be going up like other living expenditures. What might appear to be an adequate education fund right now may prove pitifully inadequate in a few years. Hence, economic trends must be projected so that a family education fund will be sufficient when needed, even though it may mean some temporary "austerity" on the home front.

Every man should think about plans for retirement while he is still young, not wait until he is pushing 50 or citizenship. Chances are strong that retirement living at the level of his choice will be substantially more costly in the years ahead than it is now. True, there have been dramatic gains in provisions for retirement payments, medical care, and other personal benefits. But the fact remains that a man must be versed in economics if he is going to aim for the highest possible standard of living for his wife and himself in retirement. He must know where the economy is heading and how rapidly, where he is heading and how efficiently. He must learn as he goes along and take advantage of every opportunity to better his leverage and increase the estate on which he can finally retire, — and probably eventually leave to his family. He must be his own "economist."
