Thousands Expected To Help Ben Barnes Celebrate Birthday Saturday

Thousands of folks—including hundreds from distant points—are expected to gather at noon Saturday for the Ben Barnes Speaker's Day barbecue at Copperas Creek Park on Lake Proctor.

Governor John Connally will head the delegation of top-ranking state dignitaries who will attend and speak.

The park is located on Farm-to-market Road 2861. The Park Road intersects Highways 67 and 377 between Dublin and Comanche and Highway 16 between De Leon and Comanche.

Tickets to the noon meal are \$1.50 and may be purchased at the site. Everyone is invited to witness the presentation program in the afternoon after the barbecue.

At least a dozen charter buses will bring visitors from Austin and Dallas. Private planes will bring people from other points.

State officeholders, Senators, Representatives and former Speakers of the House have been invited and will be introduced.

The barbecue and program at the park will be the sole events of the day.

Previously, events had been planned at other points in Barnes' district, but the difficult feat of moving hundreds of people from one place to the other caused the district steering committee to concentrate on only one site so that the large crowd could be easily accommodated.

Because a huge gathering is anticipated, planning officials urged folks to come early. The park is ideal for swimming, skiing, boating and fishing.

Speaker Barnes will be presented with a variety of gifts, all home-produced in his district. One of his gifts will be one he can't keep yet—a memorial quilt being embroidered by the ladies of De Leon, his home-

New Water Clarifier Now Completed; To Add Million Gallons To Capacity

Approximately a million gallon capacity has been added to the City's water treatment plant with completion of the new water clarifier (settling basin). Construction has been completed on the unit, with only a few minor details to be worked out before formal acceptance by the City.

Addition of the new clarifier unit to the water system increases the total capacity of the City's water plant to more than a million and a quarter gallons. Water Superintendent W. D. Waggoner explained that this would mean that in periods of high consumption, these facilities would allow a million and a quarter gallons of raw water a 24-hour settling time before being pumped into the filters and then into the distribution system. Even at peak periods, when daily demand reaches 1.5 million gallons, water would be allowed to stand and settle for at least 16 hours. This is much greater than the previous capacity when water was used faster than the old clarifier could handle it.

Waggoner said that with the addition of the new clarifier unit to the water system, and recent cleaning-out of the south water tower, the water department will go into the late spring and summer months better prepared than ever before to pro-

Some of the top track stars who will be taking part in this contest between champions will include Puddin Jones of Brady, and George Cox of Ozona. These two boys are entered in the 100-yard and 220-yard dash events, and fans can expect a spirited contest.

Blizzard entries will include Jerry Awalt and Terry Rives in the middle distance events.

Billy Hale and Sammy McLarty of Ballinger will compete in the hurdles event.

One of the finest shot put and discus fields in one group will perform during the "Meet of Champions"—Gary Sutton of Ozona, figured as the third or fourth best discus competitor in the state in his classification, and David Holubec of Paint Rock and Larry Van Loon of Rotan.

All-around athlete Ricky Paris of Wylie will be in the pole vault, high jump and broad jump events. He has marks of 12 feet 3 inches, 6 feet, and 21

feet 3 inches, respectively, in these events.

All boys participating in the track and field meet here Saturday have won at least first or second places in their respective districts and classifications and will go on to regional meets.

Finals in pole vault, shot put and broad jump events will be held at 9 a. m. Saturday.

Preliminaries in running events will be held at 10 a. m., with finals in field events, discus and high jump, at 1 p. m.

Council Okays Adjustment Of Local Gas Rate

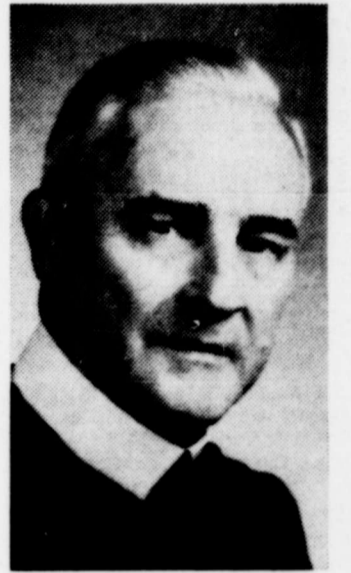
The Winters City Council, in a special meeting Monday night, approved a request by Lone Star Gas Company for an adjustment in the base rates charged gas consumers in the City of Winters.

A slight increase was authorized in the minimum per-month charge, along with an increase in the cubic feet minimum, with stipulation that no consumer would be charged the minimum rate when no gas is consumed during any monthly billing period. This means that if no gas is used during a specified period, such as during a vacation month, no charge would be made.

The ordinance fixing the general service rate, as passed by the Council, specifies that charges shall be as follows: "First 1,000 cubic feet or fraction thereof, \$1.67 gross; \$1.50 net. All over 1,000 cubic feet at \$1.833 gross per thousand cubic feet; \$1.75 net per thousand cubic feet."

In the previous ordinance which set the rates which have been charged for the past several years, the rate was \$1.50 net per thousand cubic feet.

Veterans To Sponsor "Miss VFW" Contest In Winters On May First

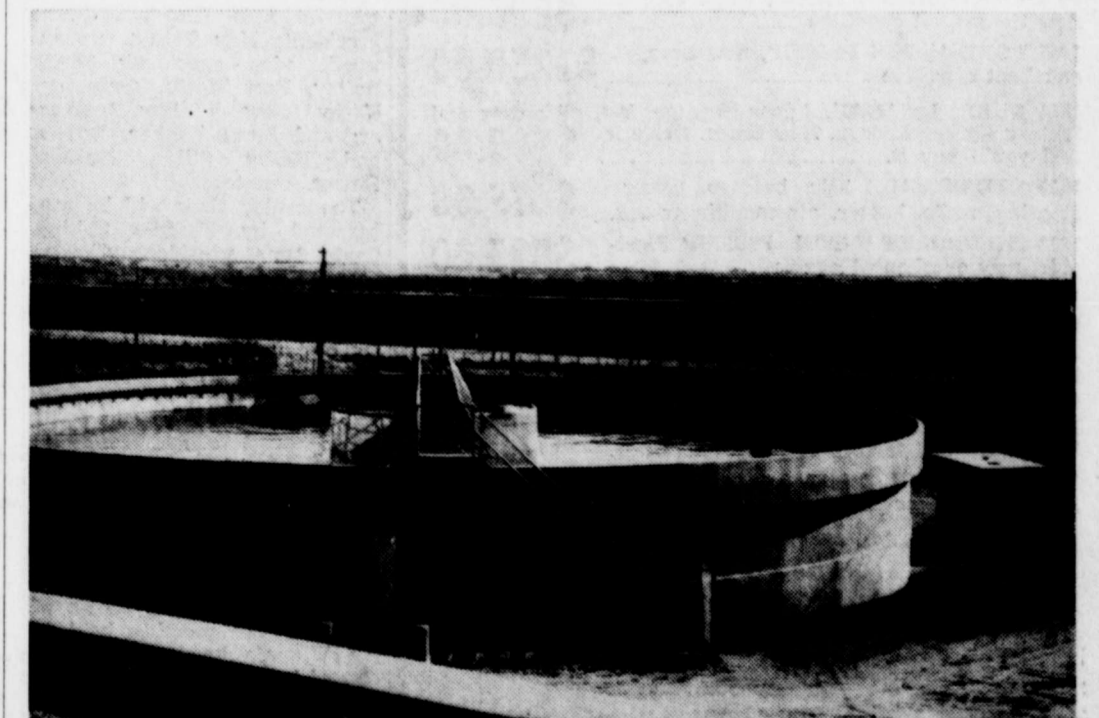
Winters Post 9193 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the VFW Ladies Auxiliary will sponsor a "Miss VFW" contest to be held on "Loyalty Day," May 1, according to W. L. Collins, chairman of Loyalty Day activities for the local veterans' group.

The winner of the local contest will go to San Angelo Saturday or Sunday, May 6 or 7, and will be entered in the District "Miss VFW" contest. Winner of the district contest will receive an expense paid trip to the State contests to be held in Corpus Christi in June.

Rules for the contests are specified by the State committee for the contest. To be eligible, young ladies must be 16

through 19 years of age; their fathers must be members of the VFW with 1967 dues paid, or be daughters of widows of veterans, who are paid-up members of the Auxiliary. Water District Bill Has Gone To Committee

Rep. Grant Jones of Abilene has introduced in the House the bill to create the Elm Creek Water Control District, encompassing most of the east section of Runnels County and a southern portion of Taylor County.

Runnels County is in the district of Speaker Ben Barnes, who referred HB 1250 to the House Committee on Conservation and Reclamation.

The district's job, as set out in the bill, would be to "conduct preliminary surveys and develop a plan for the control and use of the waters of Elm Creek to the end that improvements upon any one part of the watershed will be mechanically and economically related to the improvements of the entire watershed."

HB 1250 would give the district all powers and duties given to water control districts by the Constitution and, in addition, the authority to contract with the federal government in the pursuit of its duties.

Winters Library Notes National Library Week

The week of April 16-22 has been designated as National Library Week in Texas, and Miss Myra Glover, librarian, said that the main project of observance of the special week for the local library is a continuation of attempts to remind the people of the community of the better-than-ordinary facilities available at the Winters Public Library, and the campaign to get more people to read more.

The slogans for this year's observance of National Library Week are "Explore Inner Space—Read," and "Reading Is What's Happening."

Miss Glover also said a continuing project of the local library is "trying to convince (State library representatives and others) that a town the size of Winters bought a building for a library, installed equipment and is supported by donations," and yet checks out "more books than many larger towns."

She said that "recently one man told me it just wasn't possible for people in as small a town as Winters to have done what they have done for the library."

The facts of existence of the local library are a "mystery" to many, she indicated, but have been brought about by the "high interest of local residence in their own library."

The librarian said that plans have been made to have new books for adults put on the shelves for National Library Week.

Miss Glover also said that books for children have arrived and will be ready for circulation when the summer reading program begins. Plans have been in the making for this program for several weeks, and this year's program will be different in some respects, she said.

Special art work has been prepared for the summer reading program by Martha Armbricht, a junior in Winters High School. Miss Armbricht has worked about 300 hours in volunteer service in the Winters library, and has designed the theme around which the summer reading program for children will be built.

This year's program will be a "Treasure Hunt," and every school-age child will be invited to join and have fun while they read. The "Treasure Hunt" will begin June 1, and as children read they will visit many places and when 12 books are read, they will find the treasure.

Books for the summer reading program have been purchased with donations from interested individuals and clubs, Miss Glover said.

Six junior high students have been named as Library Aids and are completing plans and work in preparation for the summer reading program.

Winters Public Library is open Wednesday, Friday and Saturday afternoons. Miss Glover said that everyone using the library regularly is given special attention by the librarians and aids. She said that it is soon learned what type of book each library member enjoys and when new books arrive members are notified about their favorite type of book as they visit the library.

LEGAL NOTICE

An ordinance fixing and determining the general service rate to be charged for sales of natural gas to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Winters, Runnels County, Texas, and providing for the manner in which such rate may be changed, adjusted and amended and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF WINTERS:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered on or after the 10th day of April, 1967, the general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Winters by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 1,000 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$1.67 gross; \$1.50 net. All over 1,000 cu. ft. at \$.8433 gross per MCF; \$.759 net per MCF.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENT
The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustment: Plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to January 1, 1966, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of this adjustment; however, failure of Company to apply such adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make such adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date. In addition to the aforesaid rates, company shall have the right to collect reasonable and necessary charges to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations that are in effect, but no additional charge shall be made for the sale of and the furnishing of gas to its consumers.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. The fact that there is an imperative public need for an ordinance fixing and determining the rate for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency.

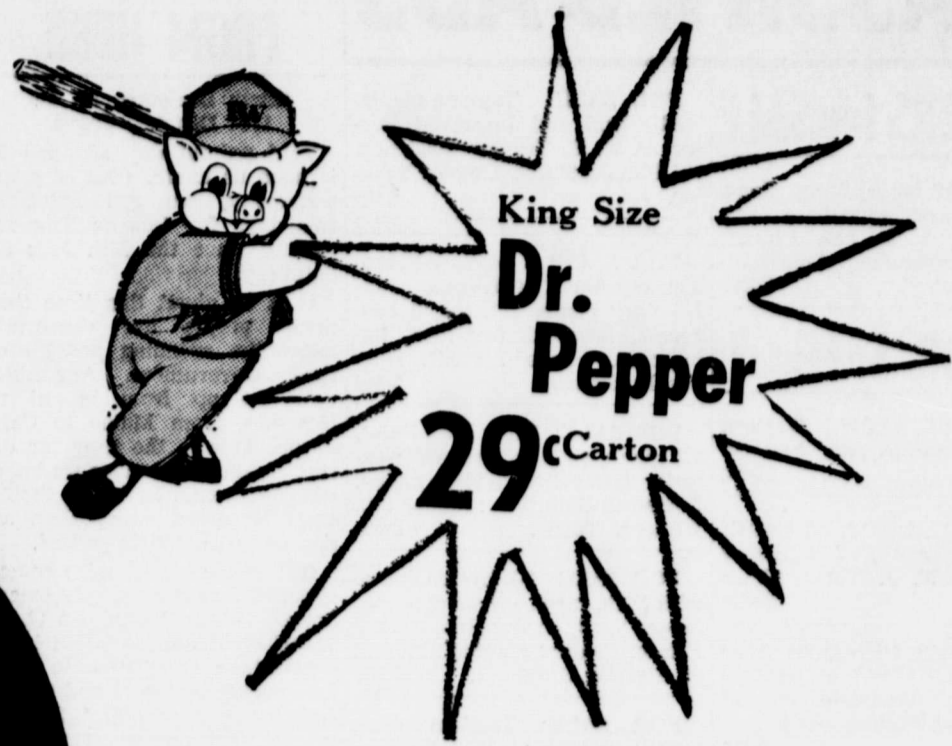

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

That painful day of April 15 is upon us again. (Out of great generosity, we are extended two days for Income Tax reporting since the 15th falls on Saturday.)

It is at about this time that many people are concerned about the spending policies of their Government. Anguished cries go up from Miami to Honolulu, from Maine to California. This is the time for direct complaint because we know where the pain is, but it should come at about every time an appropriation bill is passed.

One of the big troubles comes about by reason of piecemeal appropriations. There are about 12 principal appropriation bills, plus others from time to time for specific purposes and others called "supplemental." Supplemental appropriations simply mean additional money to run to the end of the Fiscal Year. Each Department, Agency, Commission and Bureau has its friends and supporters. To these supporters of projects and activities, it is the most important and, hence, it is difficult to see it all as a total except in the President's Budget, which is always misleading. But actually, there are three budgets and great misunderstanding of all of them.

The fact is that budgets have not been balanced but a very few times in the last three decades.

Fiscal sanity can only be brought about by a rising tide of public opinion. Individuals, organizations and areas of the Country favor certain spending programs. In fact, it is obvious that every expenditure is favored by large parts of some segment of our population, or it would not be enacted. This certain segment feels that this is the most important expenditure, and by each separate appropriation having its support, all of them are passed. Here, again, no one sees the total.

Already this year the Congress has increased the National Debt Limit by \$6 billion. In the months just ahead, it is likely that a request from the Executive will be made to increase the Debt by another \$2 billion to \$4 billion. Somewhere, sometime, there has got to be a stop. The assets of the Federal Government are sufficient to maintain its faith and credit, but if the time ever comes when faith and confidence are shaken in the Government's ability to pay, it will be a time of real trouble.

There are those who say that the obligations of the Federal Government are meaningless because we owe the debt to ourselves. This may be a good theory, but there is not very much which the Government would want to buy, even with the inflated money itself creates. In reality, it comes down to the proposition of confidence in the ability of the Government to make its credit good.

Meanwhile, domestic spending not being adjusted to bring the Budget into balance. The cost of the war in Viet Nam places a burden upon the financial resources of our Country. This is an expense which must and can be met, but should require sacrifices of some other things which may, in themselves, be good, but should be put off until we can better afford them. We do this as individuals, and our Government is the people.

Since 1961, defense expenditures have risen by almost \$30 billion. During the same period, non-defense spending has risen by more than \$43 billion. The many demands upon the treasury of the United States, and consequently, upon the American taxpayer, require that an order of priorities be established on spending.

Aikin indicated he will move for Senate passage after the general appropriations bill is passed. He has sufficient votes to send it to the House.

Texas State Teachers Association President Sam M. Anderson of Big Spring told the Committee that this school year opened with an actual shortage of 1,200 teachers. Furthermore, some 5,000 of those now employed would not be working if capable replacements were available. By fall the teacher shortage is expected to grow

eral years, the minimum had been 600 cubic feet with a minimum payment of \$1.00 for the first 600 cubic feet or fraction; this was raised to 1,000 cubic feet by the new ordinance. Therefore, according to City officials and the gas company, the minimum billing would be increased only about 25 cents, because of the raising of the minimum cubic feet from 600 to 1,000.

The ordinance and new rate adjustment goes into effect with the billing period beginning April 10, 1967.

The previous ordinance under which the gas company had been operating had been passed May 1, 1960.

LEASE CITY FARM

In other business, the City Council approved leasing of the City Farm to Frank Carter, who had submitted the highest bid in call for bids some time ago. The lease is for one year, with option for four years, at \$1,012.00 per year. Completion of the lease contract is contingent on acceptance of all terms by both parties to the contract, Buford Baldwin, city secretary.

METER STUDY

An audit of parking meter receipts during a recent week was made by the Council at the Monday night meeting, and plans were made to make another survey within the next few days.

The survey of receipts is being made to determine what areas served by parking meters should receive new meters which have been ordered, city officials said.

The survey period for which receipts were audited was from March 30 to April 6. Audit revealed that meters on South Main Street, from Dale south, accounted for \$24.23 during the survey period. About two blocks are covered by meters on South Main Street, which cover only one block in the business district, accounted for \$22.84 for the period. The 100 block of East Dale, a comparatively short distance, accounted for \$5.17.

The rest of the area covered by parking meters, including two blocks of West Dale, the parking spaces in front of the post office on State Street, one side of the street on the 100 block of South Church Street, and a half block of North Church Street, accounted for \$20.80, the city secretary said.

HOUSING AUTHORITY

The Council also passed a resolution finalizing creation of a Housing Authority for Winters. First action was taken on this matter some time ago, but requirements are that final action could not be taken until 60 days after the first motion, in order to allow residents time to study the proposal. No objection was received by the council on forming the Housing Authority, the city secretary said.

At the time of the first action taken by the Council to create a Housing Authority for Winters, a board was appointed to handle all business of the Authority. Those named to the board were Nelan Bahlman, Neal Oakes and Gattis Neelv, all for two-year terms; and B. J. (Jake) Joyce and Ralph Loyd, for one-year terms. Because Nelan Bahlman was recently elected an alderman for the City of Winters, and cannot hold the two positions, a vacancy exists on the appointive board, which will be filled by the new City administration.

The Winters Housing Authority will study the feasibility of applying for Federally-funded housing for the elderly.
