HOME TOWN Talk

The Speaker's Day celebration and barbecue Saturday at Proctor Dam near Comanche, honoring Speaker of the House Ben Barnes, was reminiscent of the many celebrations and get-togethers which were so much a part of community life in most sections of the country only a few short years ago. Of course this particular celebration was on a grand scale, with people present from all parts of the state, but the atmosphere was such that it could have been staged in another time, an earlier time. Despite the fact that the speeches were radioed across the country, and filmed scenes were prepared for flashing on tv screens served by many stations in the state.

As big as it was and as important as it was to the political knit-work of the state, it was really a "shirt-sleeve" affair—informal and "home grown" to the nth degree. Everybody was out for a good time; to stand in line to be served a plate of real barbecue; to rub elbows with hundreds of fellow-Texans; to mix and mingle with the scads of politicians present! Because of the thousands in attendance from all over the state, chances were about 8000 (or more) to 1 that the person standing next to you at the barbecue or sitting next to you at the "speaking" was a complete stranger. But this was of no consequence.

The nature and informality of the affair could be described only as "a small town barbecue with about 10,000 people present!" The only difference in this celebration and those which were so popular and looked-forward-to of earlier years was that many of the people there had come hundreds of miles, some by automobile, some by bus, and many by airplane. If the hundreds of modern automobiles filling the parking areas could have been transformed into horses and wagons, buggies, with a sprinkling of Model Ts, the picture would have been the same—crowds of "let's-have-a-good-time Texans" come to say hello to their political leaders!

Maybe we need more such celebrations — as was the custom in years gone by—but on a much smaller, community scale. Times when we could let our hair down, slow up a little and be ourselves for a change. Perhaps if we could do that, we could just possibly release a little our hold on the rocket we seem tied to and cop a ride on a slower-moving ice wagon, and get a chance to more thoroughly observe this old world we're living in.

There was an ugly rumor afloat down at the celebration that a bunch of punks were planning to "demonstrate," while so many state notables were gathered together, and lie down in front of cars and buses. This didn't materialize—and it probably was a good thing it did not, because the people out for a good time were in no mood to have their day ruined. Reaction would have been the same as if a bunch of toughs had tried to break up a camp meeting.

FFA-4-H Judging Contest Saturday

A judging contest for members of the Future Farmers of America and 4-H Clubs of the county has been scheduled for Saturday, April 22, in Winters. The Winters FFA chapter is sponsoring the contest, which will be held at the FFA livestock barns. Judging will begin at 7:30 a. m., according to Jimmy Smith, local vo-ag advisor. Howard Davis, head of the agriculture department of Howard Payne College, Brownwood,

will be the official judge of the contest. FFA and 4-H members from Ballinger, Norton, Miles and Novice, and other sections of Runnels County, will compete in the contests. Members of the Winters Livestock Association will assist in the contests. The young livestock judges will be divided into nine classes, three each for sheep, cattle and hogs.

Mayor, Two Aldermen Into Office, Employees Get Service Certificates

Winters' new mayor and two aldermen were given oaths of office Monday night, and several City employees received certificates for service to the City. Wade White, incoming mayor, and aldermen, E. E. Vaughan and Nolan Bahlman were administered the oath of office by outgoing Mayor W. M. Hays. Mayor White has completed a two-year term as an alderman, and J. C. Jarrell had completed two terms on the city council. Vaughan and Bahlman fill the vacancies on the council.

Other aldermen with another year to serve on present terms are W. L. Bean, Homer Hodge and Ray Alderman.

About 50 persons attended the installation ceremonies, during which City employees received service certificates. Mrs. Lillie Baldwin, an employee at Winters Municipal Hospital, was given a certificate for 25 years service to the City.

Twenty-year certificates were presented to W. D. Waggoner, superintendent of the water department; Monroe Dodd, employed in the water department and Mose Melendez, employed at the hospital.

N. D. Waggoner, superintendent of the city light plant, received a 15-year award, along with C. C. Paske of the light plant; Eunice Polk, administration department; and John Gann, street department.

Two year award certificates went to Frank Gore, water department; Elmer Yates, sanitation; and Geraldine Traylor, hospital. Receiving five-year awards were Albert Meyers, light plant; Doc Smith, police; Joe Stevens, police; A. Z. Wright, sanitation; T. W. Norman, light plant; Van Whittenburg, street department superintendent; Mrs. Ila Afferbach, hospital; Mrs. Walker Tatum, assistant city secretary; Mrs. W. D. Waggoner, hospital; Johnnie Weems, light plant; and Mrs. Tommy Rougas, superintendent of the municipal hospital.

Before the formal installation of the new city officials, Mayor Hays presented plaques to J. C. Jarrell and Wade White in appreciation for their service on the city council. The outgoing mayor was in turn presented a plaque by members of the city council, each of whom expressed

pleasure in having served with him.

Mayor White told the group of city employees and other city residents that he was appreciative of the confidence shown in him by the people of the town, and pledged continued efforts on the part of himself and the city council to promote the progress of Winters. He said that meetings of the city council would be open to the public at all times, and that everyone is welcome to attend these meetings and make suggestions regarding the administration of the city's business.

Work Underway On Rebuilding Highways 83, 53

The Texas Highway Department has announced a construction project on U. S. Highway 83, from F. M. 53 south of Winters to Hatchel, a distance of approximately 7.0 miles, and on F. M. Highway 53, from Crews to the Coleman County line, a distance of approximately 5.0 miles. The construction consists of grading, structures, base and surfacing.

The Texas Highway Department and the contractor, J. H. Strain and Sons, Inc. and T. M. Brown and Sons, Inc. of Tye, stated that construction began March 21, 1967 and will be completed by April 1968.

W. B. Hoppe, Senior Resident Engineer, in charge of construction on this project, stated that traffic will be routed through construction. There will be adequate barricades and warning signs prominently displayed, but motorists should be extremely cautious when passing through the area as it will be heavily traveled by large construction equipment.

A temporary speed zone of 45 m.p.h. will be established the entire length of both sections of the project. Cooperation of the public is requested in obeying all traffic signals and warning signs.

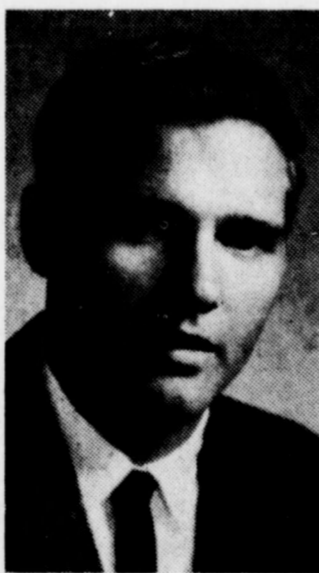

New City Council In First Meeting

Following installation ceremonies Monday night, the new Winters City Council, with a new mayor and two new aldermen, met for a business session and organized.

Mayor Wade White presided and the council elected Alderman Ray Alderman mayor pro tem for the next year, and made department assignments. The Winters council of government is not a commission type and aldermen are not elected to specified seats, but each man is assigned to act as liaison between the council and the several departments of the city. Without individual authority, the councilmen act only in an advisory capacity to the council as a body and work with department superintendents in operation of the departments.

Acting as liaison in the several departments will be Homer Hodge, street department; W. L. Bean, parks, cemeteries and sanitation; Ray Alderman, electric department; Nolan Bahlman, hospital; and E. E. Vaughan, water department. Working closely with their department heads, these aldermen will report to the council and make recommendations on operation of the departments.

One of the first items of business before the new council was authorization of final payment to Anderson Construction Co. for the construction of the City's new water clarifier. The mayor was authorized to pay \$10,944.48 to the construction company, which is the final payment. Council also authorized final payment in amount of \$293.89 to Bryant-Curington Engineers of Austin, for engineering fees on the water plant construction.

The council also authorized appropriation of not more than \$300 to be used in building the new Little League baseball field north of the City Park. Much of the work and materials to be used at the field is being donated by individuals and companies. It is expected that this work will be completed within a few weeks, and ready for Little League summer activities.

Other business included reappointment of Charlie Roberts as building inspector, and Mord Tucker as judge of the City's Corporation Court.

The council also authorized building of an archery range at the Winters Lake by the recently organized archery club.

Robert Shoemaker To Train In Summer For Journeyman Overseas Service

Robert Shoemaker, a school-teacher in Culpeper, Va., is among 61 young people invited by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board to train this summer for journeyman service overseas. He hopes to work in a dormitory for missionary children who attend school in Tokyo, Japan.

"This will be one more exciting link in the wonderful chain of Christian experiences that binds me to God," says the 23-year-old teacher, who is the son of a Baptist minister.

Southern Baptist journeymen are single college graduates under 27 years of age who spend two years overseas sharing their Christian faith while performing certain skills under the supervision of career missionaries. The young people employed on April 12, during a three-day meeting of the Foreign Mission Board, will, if they complete requirements, become the third generation of journeymen. The first group, sent out in 1965, will return home this summer.

Mr. Shoemaker grew up in Winters, a west Texas farming community, and graduated from Winters High School in 1962. His parents, Rev. and Mrs. B. T. Shoemaker, recently moved to Spearman, Tex., where his father is pastor of the First Baptist Church.

He received the bachelor of arts degree from Baylor University, Waco, Texas, last year, directed youth work for Memorial Baptist Church, Arlington, Va., during the summer, and began teaching mathematics in Culpeper County High School last fall. He also works with young people in Culpeper Baptist Church. (He lives at 704 Commerce, Culpeper.)

"My future is in God's hands," says Mr. Shoemaker. "He may want me to continue teaching, for certainly that is a Christian calling. He may want me to be a preacher, a church music director, a religious education worker, or a missionary. But no matter what or where it may be, I want to follow Him and give Him the best I have to offer."

He and other prospective journeymen will enter training at Virginia Intermont College, Bristol, on June 17. Their curriculum will include Christian doctrine, Bible, missions, evangelism, area studies and world affairs, language study, training for special skills, health and personal development, and physical education.

Good Records Save Tax Dollars At Income Filing Time

Good record keeping throughout the year can save tax dollars at income tax filing time.

Taxpayers who keep good records are less likely to overlook deductions to which they are entitled, says Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue in northern Texas.

Those who itemize their deductions on page 2, Form 1040, should keep cancelled checks, receipts, statements and other data to support them.

One way to keep records is to get a supply of large envelopes or folders, label them according to the types of income and deductions you have, and accumulate the information, Mr. Campbell said.

If you keep good records, preparing your 1967 tax return will be a much easier task, the Internal Revenue Service official said.

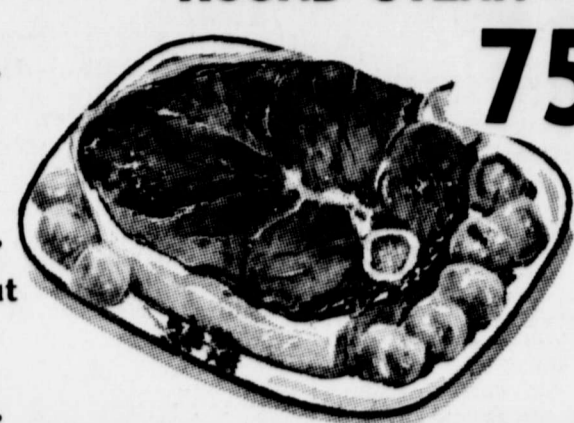

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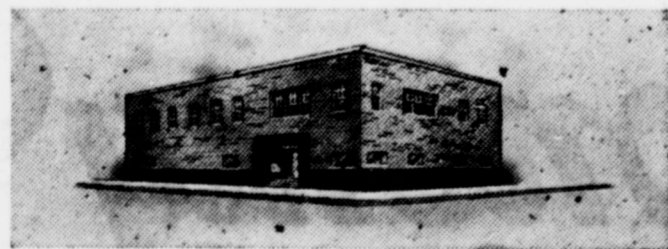

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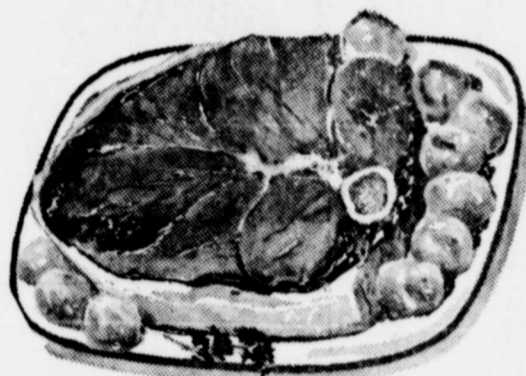
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Former Bradshaw Resident Died In Irving Wednesday
