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

### Work Underway **On Rebuilding** Highways 83, 53

The Texas Highway Department has announced a construction project on U.S. Highway 83, from F. M. 53 south of Winters to Hatchel, a distance of approximately 7.0 miles, and on F. M. Highway 53, from Crews to the Coleman County line, a distance of approximately 5.0 miles. The construction consists of grading, structures, base and surfacing.


The Texas Highway Department and the contractor, J. H. Strain and Sons, Inc. and T. M Brown and Sons. Inc. of Tve. stated that construction began March 21, 1967 and will be completed by April 1968.

W. B. Hoppe, Senior Resident Engineer, in charge of construction on this project, stated that traffic will be routed through construction. There will be adequate barricades and warning

signs prominently displayed, but the motorists should be extremely cautious when passing through the area as it will be heavily traveled by large construction equipment.


