Post Office Announces New Schedule Mrs. W. L. Collins of Winters, For Incoming and Outgoing Mail

A new and added schedule for incoming and outgoing mail has been announced by Winters Postmaster Rankin Pace. The new schedules will serve to expedite the mail and to some sections of the nation on air mail.

The postmaster said the local post office has started receiving a pouch daily at 2:30 p. m. (except Saturday, Sunday and holidays) from Abilene, containing air mail and regular mail from Dallas, Houston, Austin and out of state. This service started April 24, he said.

A new 11 a. m. daily schedule also has been originated, with outgoing mail dispatched by bus to Abilene, giving next day delivery of first class mail to almost any place in the United States. This service will be daily except Saturday, Sunday and holidays. The closing time for this dispatch of mail is 10:30 a. m.

At 2:30 p. m. daily (except Saturday, Sunday and Holi-days), mail will be dispatched by bus to Ballinger, giving next day delivery on letters to Austin, Houston, San Antonio and the Rio Grande Valley. Closing time for this dispatch is 2 p. m.

Last mail dispatch daily (except Sundays and holidays) is at 5:45 p. m. Mail must be in the post office by 5:30 p. m. to insure making this dispatch, the postmaster







desire to "punch 'em in the is the attitude of U. S. servicemen fighting in Vietnam toward the so-called vietniks, peaceniks, draft card burners and other dissenters who pull their wild demonstrations periodically in the United States.

But upon returning to the United States after their tours of duty in Vietnam, these soldiers, sailors and marines look upon these "loud-mouthed" dissenters as misfits, not worth the effort required for recognition. They have just been "raised wrong," the fighting men say.

This, too, is the opinion of a Winters man who has just returned from a tour of fighting duty in Vietnam, bringing with him a Purple Heart and an Army Commendation Medal for

Army Private First Class Dick V. Bellis arrived in Winters late Sunday night after having been flown from Southeast Asia to Oakland, Calif. and then to Abilene.
