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## HOME TOWN Talk

Along with hundreds of other towns and cities over the country—and especially those with diversified economies—Winters is faced with a demand. The manner in which this demand is met will be, to a great extent, a deciding factor in whether Winters will continue to be accessible by automobile only or whether we will in effect join the "air age" and be readily accessible to the growing fleets of private and commercially-owned airplanes.

Winters not only is an important link in the agricultural and livestock chain of the state. (Winters is the home of one of the largest livestock feed processors in this section of the state). It is the center of activity in oil and gas exploration and production. Of great—and growing—importance, Winters plays a realistic role in the industrial development of the state.

Because of this diversified position, Winters is faced with a demand for better transportation facilities. Not only by highways, but by air. In this age of greater competition and expanding commercialization, time is of great importance. More and more businesses are "taking to the air" in an effort to meet competition and to conserve costly time.

Many of the companies and individuals doing business with Winters industries—of all nature—are using non-commercial airplanes in an effort to save time and money. But when a salesman or a supplier from Oklahoma City—or Dallas, or Houston, or Chicago, or Los Angeles—heads for Winters on business, in a company-owned airplane, he has to land in Abilene and continue the journey by automobile—because there is no landing facility at Winters. He may only plan to be in Winters for an hour or two, but the time he spends driving to and from the airport in Abilene really doubles his time for this one call. (It's like hauling freight in a modern truck for so many miles, and then making the last leg by pack mule.)

In order to satisfy the demands of customers and suppliers, to meet competition and to continue to grow, Winters' businessmen and industrialists point out that we need a landing strip for airplanes. The people now using airplanes for business travel would use it to advantage, and as the word got around use would increase.

The Winters City Council and other interested individuals are studying the proposal, and are going to try to do something about it.

These people are not talking about a big airport complex, with giant hangars, a control tower and service facilities. For the moment they are talking about a LANDING STRIP—adequately surfaced to accept airplanes of the twin engine type; say about 3600 feet long, within a short drive of town. That is all that is needed at the present time, they say.

Neither are they talking about an airport facility with the main object of providing a place for the "weekend" or pleasure flyer. They are talking about a facility which would add to the economy of this area—or perhaps make the present economy more stable.

This is not a giant project; it will take some work and some planning, but it is easily within reach, and would not prove to be a burden. It is needed.

### Mike Belitz Sets New Track Record For High Hurdles

Mike Belitz, a student at Texas School for the Deaf in Austin, has set a new school track record for the 120 yard high hurdles. His time of 15.7 beat the old record of 16.4 set in 1953.

Mike has won, or placed, in the four track meets the Rangers have participated in this year. He picked up a first in the hurdles and a third in the high jump in the Thorndale Relays which had thirty-nine schools entered in competition. He was also a member of the 440 yard relay team which set a new 45.4 record in the Thorndale relays.

### Archery Club Hunting For Play Equipment

### Elm Creek Water Bill Thru House

The legislative bill to create the Elm Creek Water Control District, was passed by the House Wednesday afternoon.

Sponsored by Rep. Grant Jones of Abilene, the bill, H. B. 1250, will be piloted through the Senate by Sen. David Ratliff of Stamford.

The bill will create the water control district to encompass most of the eastern half of Runnels County and a portion of South Taylor County, and provide means for a water and flood control for the Elm Creek watershed. The District will work in conjunction with the U. S. Soil Conservation Service.

## Council Studying Air Strip For City

"An 'air access' facility is one of the top items on the list of 'needs' for Winters at the present time."

This is the opinion of a large number of businessmen, oilmen, industrialists, farmers and ranchers in the area.

In an attempt to meet this demand for "air access facilities," the Winters City Council and several other interested individuals and businesses, are now studying plans to provide at least a landing strip in the vicinity of Winters.

The project is in the study stage at this time, with no definite plans made as to location.

Although there is a lot of desire for a complete airport complex, those advocating the project are, as one of them stated, "taking only one step at a time." Therefore, present concern is toward providing only a landing strip, and to study the needs for more complete facilities in the future.

Mayor Wade White said this week that interest in such a project is growing daily, and the City Council is taking a large and active interest in studying the proposal. An "air strip study committee" was appointed several months ago by the then-mayor, W. M. Hays, and will work with the City Council in promoting the project.

Motivating factor behind this stepped-up interest in a landing strip to serve Winters is the ever-increasing use of small aircraft by businessmen throughout the county, and the fact that the local industrial, oil, agricultural, and business community is being served by and is selling to, companies and individuals who use non-commercial airplanes for business trips because of the time saved.

Spokesmen for Winters' industrial concerns report that many of their customers and suppliers use non-commercial airplanes, but because there are no landing facilities at Winters these people are forced to land at Abilene, then travel on to Winters by automobile.

Pan American Industries and Dry Manufacturing Co., each doing business over a wide area of the country, report that they are visited by flying customers and suppliers several times each month. James Spill of Spill Machine Shop, which now is manufacturing certain types of equipment for the Air Force, said his plant is visited several times each month by government inspectors who fly as far as Abilene and then continue the trip by car.

Oscar Funderburg, vice president and general manager of Pan American Industries, uses a company-owned airplane to make trips to distant parts of the country. Because there are no facilities at Winters, the airplane is kept in another town.

Mayor White has emphasized the point that the present interest in obtaining a landing strip for Winters is not so much toward providing facilities for "weekend" or pleasure flying, but for providing an adequately surfaced landing strip for airplanes used in business. However, it has been noted that once facilities are provided interest in pleasure flying would be expected to increase.

The greatest need, the mayor indicated, is for a suitable site which can be converted into a well-surfaced strip to accommodate most any business-type airplane up to two-engine. To meet specifications the strip would have to be at least 3600 feet in length, with hard surface, and aligned to take advantage of prevailing winds in the area. No plans are being made at the present time for construction of any type of hangar or service facilities, it was pointed out.

## As It Looks From Here

The so-called "Conservative Democrat - Republican Coalition," as it has existed to some degree or other for many years, has been greatly misunderstood.

Some newspaper reporters have the idea that conservative Democrats and Republicans meet in secret session to plan opposition to the Administration. This simply is not the case.

The Conservative Democrats have over the years gravitated together as men of a like mind. They come together to discuss pending legislation, whether in support or opposition. If it is in opposition, discussions are held to devise strategy and tactics. This includes offering certain amendments which would improve or alter a given measure coming up for debate. If it is a matter of total opposition, then the discussion centers around how the greatest support and opposition can be mustered and from what sources.

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If it appears there is a chance of amending or defeating a certain bill, then efforts are made to determine the strength of opposition among the Republicans.

This is essentially the method of the so-called "coalition."

No effort is made to bind or commit an individual to a specific course of action. The only purpose is to determine opinions and sentiments and the chances of success. Meetings of the two parties are not held jointly.

Beginning with the first session of the 89th Congress in 1965, House Republicans made changes in their leadership. Congressman Gerald Ford of Michigan came in as Minority Leader, with Representative Melvin Laird of Wisconsin, as head of the Republican Conference.

In an interview with the new leaders, the U. S. News and World Report in its January 18, 1965 issue, reported several of the Republicans, including Representative Robert P. Griffin of Michigan, as saying of his party. "It has appeared that our previous strategy has too often been oriented toward obstruction, and coalition with the Southern Democrats, and this has failed us."

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## Education Service Centers To Help Local Schools

Education Service Centers—a new development in Texas education—will move a step closer to establishment this month with a series of organizational meetings in 20 regions across the State.

The first of these Joint Committee meetings was held April 13, reports Dr. J. W. Edgar, Texas Commissioner of Education.

When established, these Education Service Centers will (1) provide for the establishment of the Regional Media Centers authorized by the Fifty-ninth Legislature (2) coordinate and encourage developmental services and centers under Title III of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 in accordance with State law and policies of the United States Office of Education and (3) provide a locally-oriented base for statewide educational planning.

Through the media services, these regional centers will provide participating school districts with such visual aids as motion pictures and slides, a magnetic tape duplicating service for audio and video tapes, and a visual duplication service to reproduce transparencies and filmstrips.

In addition to providing schools in a region with instructional media services, a center will provide an opportunity for resources of the region—metropolitan and rural—to contribute to educational planning.

Still additional services will be developed by each center in answer to regional needs. And as needs vary from region to region, so will services. Through participating on the Joint Committee, local schools will help to determine what those services should be.

The Fifty-ninth Legislature with its enactment of Senate Bill 408, paved the way for these media services of the Education Service Centers. This bill provided for a State program for educational media for Texas

schools and authorized the State Board of education to establish needed plans and procedures to facilitate media services.

Under provisions of this law, the State should be ready to implement such centers by September 1, 1967, says Dr. Edgar.

As a first step toward establishment of the centers, the State Board of Education last month approved the State Plan for the Establishment of Education Service Centers Including Regional Education Media Centers authorizing the 20 regions. In taking this action, the State Board of Education took into account such factors as pupil population, geographic area, and educational and cultural resources.

Although the 20 regions have been identified and approved, location of the Education Service Center within a region has not been designated, Dr. Edgar says.

During the early months of operation, the Boards of Directors of the Education Service Centers will have as one of their major tasks deciding on the locations of the centers within their respective regions.

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**State Capital Highlights—**

**State Legislature Entering Wind-Up Of Current Session**

Crucial, make-or-break decisions on state spending confront legislators this week as they enter the windup of their 1967 session.  
Senators have submitted a \$437,700,000 budget for 1968. This was followed by a bill providing \$55,500,000 for teacher pay raises (an average of \$640 a year).

House action was delayed by printing problems, but representatives were due to take up the Senate bill and substitute their own appropriations measure calling for \$449,400,000 in general fund outlays. House bill would leave about \$35,000,000 for such add-on spending as teacher pay raises.

Big unanswered question is whether the House will be able to convince a majority of senators to accept the House appropriations measure without a conference committee.

Speaker Ben Barnes and Gov. John Connally have been working for Senate support of the House bill.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and Senate leadership feel differences between House and Senate bills should be worked out as usual—in a joint conference of five senators and five representatives.

Senate's more-generous figure for teacher pay makes the selling job somewhat harder for the House. But the fact that its bill runs some \$12,000,000 over the latest general revenue forecast of Comptroller Robert S. Calvert weakens the Senate argument for the bigger pay raise.

Outcome will determine whether the Legislature must go into special session this year to finish writing even a one-year budget.  
Still on the unfinished business list: congressional, legislative and judicial redistricting bills.

**STATE PROPERTY TAX NEAR END?**  
The proposed constitutional amendment to phase out bulk of the state's 47 cents per \$100 valuation property tax levy by 1977 is near legislative approval.

Senate has passed it and the House Constitutional Amendment Committee has recommended it. Proposal would go to the voters in November, 1968. If measure is approved, all but 10 cents of the state ad valorem tax (that which is earmarked for state college construction) would be wiped out by December 31, 1976.

While this may be cheering news to property owners, it must be noted that the \$47,900,000 in revenue must be made up from other sources.

**VOTER REGISTRATION PLAN IN TROUBLE**  
A new voter registration plan, product of a long study, came out of committee for Senate consideration. It immediately ran into criticism.

Bill would require personal registration with tax assessor-collector or authorized deputy at a public place sometime next year. Voters could register by mail for the big 1968 elections. Once registered in the 1968-69 sign-up, they could renew eligibility by simply signing and

mailing back to tax offices a form card between October 1 and January 31 each year. A special supplementary registration period would be held August 15-September 15 during general election years.

Sen. Barbara Jordan of Houston assailed the bill as more restrictive than the present law. She hit sections prohibiting roving deputies and outlawing husbands registering for wives and vice versa. Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells acknowledged he will have a problem passing his measure in the Senate as it stands.

**WATER QUALITY BOARD APPROVED**  
Bill to establish a Texas Water Quality Board to replace the Water Pollution Control Board has been approved.  
Governor Connally recommended the measure as an aid to strengthening water pollution control. Bill will create a seven-member board with its own professional staff and provide for local enforcement of water quality standards.

**TRINITY BILL PASSES**  
Both houses have passed the bill giving the 17-county Trinity River Authority navigation powers and additional tax leeway to further their longtime goal of barge traffic.

Bill by Sen. Charles Wilson of Lufkin and Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine increases tax exemption for long-lines trucks and busses. Railroads earlier got an exemption as direct competitors of barges.

Counties of TRA are Anderson, Chambers, Dallas, Ellis, Freestone, Henderson, Houston, Kaufman, Liberty, Leon, Madison, Navarro, Polk, San Jacinto, Tarrant, Trinity and Walker.

**SAFETY BILL SIGNED**  
Texas' first major occupational safety bill, designed to cut the soaring industrial accident toll, has been signed into law.  
It creates within the State Department of Health a division of occupational safety to be administered by a three-member board, assisted by a safety engineer and an advisory committee. Board would conduct a continuing educational, promotional and enforcement campaign.

**AG OPINIONS**  
Bill creating appraisal service districts and boards for tax appraisal and assessment of property for taxations is unconstitutional, as it eliminates county tax assessor-collector from duties. So ruled Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin.

In a variety of other recent opinions, Martin held that:  
In writing a single-year budget, the Legislature can spend only funds in sight during that year.

Starr County cannot pay telephone bills for a U. S. tick inspector.  
"Texas Treasure Hunt" a soft drink promotion (featuring "lucky" pictures under bottle cap corks) is not a lottery.

Texas Education Agency can allocate money to political subdivisions to carry out the state plan for vocational rehabilitation if they have power to provide vocational training. (Amarillo Hospital District can spend money for medical and hospital care under vocational rehabilitation districts or school districts to administer program.)

Proposal transfer to two voting precincts from one justice precinct to another in Bexar County will not create vacancy in either of the offices.  
Harris County cannot retain payment of fine assessed in felony case transferred from Harris County to Brazos County on change of venue.

Disability benefits under teacher retirement system may be reduced when person receiving them becomes engaged in gainful occupation.

**SHORT SNOTS**  
The proposed constitutional amendment to give equal legal rights to women cleared the Senate and is ready for final House vote.

Bill to increase maximum unemployment compensation—from \$37 to \$45 a week (for those who earn \$85 or more) and hike minimum from \$10 to \$15 has cleared the Legislature.

After early faltering, the Open Meetings Bill to require all governmental agencies to meet in public gathered steam and won final legislative approval.

A resolution calling for the appointment of an interim committee to study air and water pollution, noise and land use is being studied by a sub-committee of the House Committee on State Affairs.

Governor John Connally signed "medicaid" implementing legislation (effective September 1) which will bring an estimated \$130,000,000 in medical benefits to 350,000 Texans on welfare rolls during the next year.

House has passed a bill permitting experimental 10-month school programs involving 50,000 Texas students in selected districts.  
A resolution establishing an interim committee to study pricing and marketing prices in Texas has been favorably re-

A quiet Senate committee meeting saw the death, on a 6-6 tie vote, of the House bill that would have let people sue the state or local units of government for injury done by public employees of all kinds.

Interim committee on faculty compensation — which made some recommendations to the current Legislature — will get another two years of existence, under a resolution adopted by the Senate and sent to the House.

Governor Connally delivered his first veto of the 60th Legislature when he killed the bill to give West Texas State University its own Board of Regents, removing it from the control of the Board of Regents, State Senior Colleges.

Pampa rancher Jim Campbell and farmer-rancher John A. Smith of Cameron were named heads of new Republican "task force" on agriculture.

District Judge E. E. Jordan of Amarillo was named judge of the Ninth Administrative Judicial District by Governor Connally.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has set 10 a. m. August 1 for an oil-and-gas lease sale of the School Land Board and other state boards; School Land Board will hold a sulphur lease sale at the same time.

**APPOINTMENTS**  
Governor Connally named Carlos Castillon of Laredo as 49th district attorney to replace Oscar M. Laurel who recently accepted a federal post in Washington.

Connally named to the Dallas-Tarrant board of park commissioners W. T. Overton, Jack Evans, David Bruton Jr., O. B. English, George A. Nicoud Jr., Vernon S. Smith and T. W. Norsworthy of Dallas. Also Ernest J. Wilemon of Arlington and Murray Kyger, David O. Belew Jr., John L. Lewis, James C. Fuller and Dick Lowe of Fort Worth.

Dr. Bevington A. Reed, formerly of Cisco and Alpine, now of chancellor of the Board of Minnesota State College, was named assistant commissioner of Texas Higher Education for Senior Colleges and Universities.

**OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY**  
House and Senate both have passed the compromise occupational safety bill. It now awaits Gov. John Connally's signature.  
As finally passed, the bill is a compromise among labor, management and the governor. It would create a Division of Occupational Safety as a part of the State Department of Health.

DOS would have the power to make and enforce rules and regulations on safety, plus authority to inspect places of employment. A qualified safety engineer would be hired to administer the program.

**REGULATE RAINMAKERS**  
Senate has passed and sent to the House a licensing bill to regulate weather modifiers—or would-be modifiers—under the Texas Water Development Board.

Apparently the bill is aimed more at encouraging research and development in the field of legitimate weather modifying than at bogus rainmakers.  
Board would be given full control over the entire field of water modifying including annual licensing and permits.

**POLLUTION MEASURES CLEARED**

House passed the Senate bill to strengthen water pollution control and establish a new Texas Water Quality Board as a separate agency. Amendments will send the bill back to the Senate.

Meanwhile, the Senate has approved a bill to provide the mechanism for enforcing air pollution control measures. An amendment would allow the Air Control Board to set different standards for agricultural processors (including cotton gins) than are set for industries.
