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HOME TOWN Talk

Great strides were taken to protect motorists on Texas highways May 30 when Governor John Connally signed his traffic safety program into law.

The first of the series of bills, the Traffic Safety Act of 1967, provides for authority of the Governor to establish a state-wide traffic safety program which provides for research and developmental projects and direct cooperation of state agencies. The Act also provides for a Traffic Safety Fund into which all funds received for the purpose of implementing the Act will be placed. Establishment of this Act will enable Texas to receive federal aid under the Federal Highway Safety Act of 1966 which requires all state governments to establish governor-administered highway safety programs or lose 10 percent of the federal money.

Texas drivers' licenses will soon take on a new look by the addition of a picture of the licensee on laminated cards. Drivers' licenses for persons under 21 years of age will be provisional and a different color than those issued to adults. The color of the license and the picture will help liquor store operators determine whether or not a customer is a minor.

Drivers' licenses applied for on or after January 1, 1968, will be renewable every four years on the birth date of the applicant at the rate of \$6 rather than the present \$3 fee. A fee of \$1 will be charged for duplicate licenses.

The Department of Public Safety may in its discretion require an examination for the renewal of a license. Mandatory license suspension for the first moving traffic violation has been increased from six to 12 months and subject to orders of state courts, up to 18 months for subsequent violations. Drivers whose licenses have been suspended or revoked are subject to suspension or revocation will have to attend rehabilitation schools which will be established and developed by the Department of Public Safety.

In order for an applicant to get a drivers' license he must be 18 years old unless he has completed a driver education course approved by the Department and is 16 years of age. Those who take driver education however, will as in the past, be granted a 10 percent discount on their bodily injury, property damage-medical payments and collision insurance by all insurance companies in the state who follow the prescribed rates set by the State Board of Insurance.

The only exceptions under which a license may be issued at the age of 15 are hardship cases and where the driver has completed the classroom portion of a driver education course and drives only with a licensed adult driver in the front seat with him. Previously the minimum age for obtaining a driver's license was 14.

Effective January 1, 1968, all motorcycle operators and passengers will be required to wear protective headgear which meets the minimum safety standards set by the Department of Public Safety. Any person violating the law is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction, may be punished by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50.

Another bill requires the State Department of Health to recommend, study and investigate policies relating to the medical aspects of driver licensing, traffic safety, and accident investigation.

The fee for inspection of motor vehicles will be raised to \$1.75 rather than \$1.50. Now on the mandatory inspection—checklists are front seatbelts where seatbelt anchorages are part of the manufacturers' original equipment, wheels, rims, and steering.

Commercial Driver Training School and Instructor Licensing Act requires state police to regulate and license driver training schools and their operators.

"Head Start" Program To Begin Monday, June 12th

The summer "Head Start" program for pre-school children will begin at the Winters Primary School Monday, June 12. The school will continue for eight weeks, through August 4.

George M. Beard, principal of Winters Elementary School, is project director for the Winters schools.

The "Head Start" program is being financed by a federal grant, with a total of \$11,461.00 received for the project this year. Classes will be on a five-day per week basis, beginning at 8:30 a. m. and lasting until about 1:30 p. m., Beard said. Children will be served a mid-morning snack and a hot lunch at noon.

Requirements are that 90 percent of the children are to be from families in the low income brackets, Beard said, between five and six years of age, and not necessarily starting to school in September.

Parents of children who have been notified and authorized for enrollment in this summer's program have been asked to bring their children to the school at 8:30 a. m. on the opening day. A reception will be held in the school cafeteria at which time the program will be explained to the parents.

Parents of children who are eligible for enrollment, and who have not done so, are asked to contact the project director at the Winters Elementary School.

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County Road To Be Included In FM Road Program

The Texas Highway Commission has announced approved development of 6.1 miles of Farm to Market Road construction in Runnels County as part of the 1967 Texas Farm to Market program.

District Engineer J. A. Snell of the Highway Department said estimated cost of the work is \$190,000, and provides for the construction of a farm to market road from State Highway 158, 2.0 miles east of Maverick, southwest to FM 2333. The work will be under the supervision of W. B. Hoppe, senior resident engineer of Ballinger.

The work authorized for this county is part of 949.3 miles of Texas Farm and Ranch to Market Roads earmarked for development in the new program. The program lists 228 projects in 166 counties. Estimated cost is \$24.6 million. New mileage included in the program totals 623 miles. Other mileage was previously designated or is being constructed in stages. The additional mileage brings designated Farm and Ranch to Market Roads in Texas to 38.7 thousand miles. This is greater than the entire state-maintained highway mileage of many other states.

Plans call for an eventual FM-RM system of 50 thousand miles. Originally conceived to move agricultural products to market, the FM system has contributed both to the social and economic well-being of the rural areas. For example, 69 percent of the new mileage included in the program is on school bus routes.

According to the Texas Education Agency, 7,800 school buses travel almost 450 thousand miles daily to transport 473 thousand students to school and back home. Many of these students make all or part of their daily trips to school over FM roads.

It is estimated that rural mail carriers travel almost 50 thousand miles a day over FM roads.

Many new reservoirs and other recreational areas are located along the FM-RM system, bringing a new role for the network. The roads afford the recreational traveler an opportunity to get off the beaten track, while continuing to use a modern highway facility.

Cost of construction of FM roads has almost doubled in the last 15 years due to increased traffic and the necessity for designing facilities to accommodate heavier vehicles. Average maintenance costs have climbed more than 80 percent in the same period.

Council Approves Budget For '67-8

Winters' City Council within the past two weeks made final approval on a proposed budget for the City of Winters for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, 1967 and ending Sept. 30, 1968.

The budget was approved following a public budget hearing at the City Hall May 25. The Council announced that it was anticipated that the "proposed budget will be met with no increase in taxes."

No great amount of change was noted in the new budget

over those of previous years. One item was added to the Street Department section of the budget which had not been included in previous budgets: \$2500 was included to be "reserved for airport land." The Council has been studying ways and means of establishing a landing strip.

GENERAL FUND
The General Fund, which includes administrative activities, police department, fire department, street department, sewer and sanitary department, accounts for the largest amounts listed in the budget for the next fiscal year.

Current tax collections are estimated at \$93,672, with \$4,600 and \$3,000 added for collection of delinquent taxes and penalty and interest, respectively. Other income for the General Fund has been estimated at \$87,113, to bring the total estimated revenue for the department to \$186,385.

Operating expenses have been estimated at \$155,574, with non-operating expenses (bond principal and interest payments) totaling \$30,775.

ELECTRIC DEPT.
Revenue from all sources for the next fiscal year is estimated at \$142,950, with \$133,500 for sale of electricity.

Operating expenses for this department for the year is estimated at \$91,552, while bonds and interest and engine lease payments will be \$40,855. Also included in the expense column is an estimated \$10,000 for capital improvements for the department during the year.

MUNICIPAL HOSPITAL
The Municipal Hospital is the only department within the City given a chance to show a deficit in the next fiscal year. This may not materialize, it was pointed out, but because of the nature of the department there is a greater likelihood of a deficit. Much of the expected deficit (if events run true to form) can be attributed to charity cases in which no collections can be made, it was explained.

Estimated revenue for the year for the hospital is \$86,600—after deduction of \$5,000 for bad debts. Estimated expenses are listed at \$89,405.

WATER DEPARTMENT
If the anticipated happens, the water department will take in \$75,000 in water sales during the next fiscal year, according to the budget. Revenue from other sources is expected to bring total revenue to \$78,850 for the year.

Operating expenses is expected to total \$61,926 for the year, which will include an estimated \$15,000 in capital improvements such as new lines, fire plugs, etc. Also, plans are to spend \$5,000 for switches, pipe fittings and other miscellaneous items for the new water plant during the next fiscal year. Non-operating expenses for the water department is estimated at \$10,800, for transfer to waterworks sinking fund, to pay off bonded indebtedness.

The Assembly of God ministers, together with one lay delegate from each church, compose the voting constituency of the North Texas District Council. The North Texas Council is the largest district in the movement.

Mrs. James will serve as a delegate from the Winters church.

The Rev. James has been pastor of the Assembly of God Church in Winters for the past five years. He has been affiliated with the Assemblies of God since 1953.
