## HOME TOWN Talk

A group of men broke jail here last week! In fact, they broke it up into small chunks and carted it away! They even smoothed up the spot where the jail had been sitting so that there now remains no evidence that a calaboose had ever occupied the lot.

But it was all legal. The lot where the old jail was located along with the old City Hall and the old fire station, is being converted to a parking lot for the First Methodist Church, and all buildings and even trees had to go.

The old City Hall building and the old fire station were torn down a few days ago. Then bulldozers and loaders and other giant earth-moving and digging equipment moved in to make short work of the trees. In pulling the trees out, a big loader was used to dig out a bit around the base and roots of the trees—then with a powerful shove would push the tree to the ground.

Then came demolition of the old two-cell calaboose! They tried hooking a cable around a corner (through a window and a hole in the wall) to pull it over. No go! Then they moved in a big bulldozer and started eating away—and in about an hour the jail was in chunks, and being hauled off.

This jail, which was abandoned several years ago when the new City Hall and jail building were erected on South Main Street was built of concrete and reinforced—literally laced—with steel. One observer, a follower or tv westerns, said all that was really needed to demolish the old building was a cowboy-hero to throw a loop around a window bar and have his horse pull it over, just like in the movies!

If the history of the old jail was available—and writeable—it probably would make a right lively chapter in the history of Winters. It was used, during World War II, to temporarily house a couple of runaway German POWs, before they were sent back to their main camp.

The First Methodist Church recently purchased the lot occupied by the old City Hall and fire station and calaboose. The area is being cleared, and will be paved and marked for parking. Like many other worthwhile projects in the community, much of the work required to clear the lot and make it ready for parking was donated. Helping to tear down the old buildings were Milt Bridwell, D. W. Williams, Elmo Mayhew, J. D. Vinson, and Bobby Hatcher. Sam Jones Construction Co. furnished the bulldozer and operator which helped to demolish the old jail. And Melvin Mapes' workers from Precinct No. 2 rolled in equipment to clear the lot and do the leveling. Such action helps to keep the community in the "above average" ranks.

## Winters Lake Level Up 18 In.

Rainfall on the headwaters of Elm Creek in North Runnels County and South Taylor County has raised the level of impounded water in the Winters City Lake, it was reported Wednesday of this week.

Monroe Dodd, assistant superintendent of the City Water Department, reported that the lake had caught about 18 inches of water, but the creek had gone down considerably Wednesday morning, following the rains Sunday and Monday.

The water level still is about 12 inches below the spillway at the lake, Dodd reported.

Sources say that water has gone over the spillway at the lake most every spring or early summer since the lake was built more than 20 years ago.

is up in the area. There already is a good bit of cotton up and growing, and the rains, even in the sections receiving only small amounts, will go a long way toward making it continue growth.

Rainfall in the area was measured from a little over three inches in some sections to about half an inch in others. In Winters proper (on the west side) 2.5 inches were received Sunday and Monday of this week. About half an inch was received in the early morning hours of Sunday, and two good rains Monday brought the total up.

Just west of Winters, it was reported that only about half an inch of rainfall was recorded, while further west, in the Wingo and Wilmet communities, upwards of 3.5 inches was received over the weekend. To the north of Winters, over in South Taylor County, 2.3 inches was reported for Sunday morning, with more falling Monday.

Rainfall to the east of Winters was recorded from half an inch to about 2 inches. On the Noble Fabian place in the Crews community, 1.3 inch was reported. Glen Cove, east of Crews, was reported to have received 2.5 inches of rain. In the Hatchell community, south of Winters, from 1.5 to 2.5 inches was reported.

As can be seen in the accompanying rainfall record chart, which is an unofficial report, total amount of rainfall received to date for Winters proper for 1967 is below the totals listed for the first six months in each of the five previous years. However, the month is only half gone, and the totals shown for previous years include the entire first six months.

## Head Start Program Going, Still Room For More Pupils

The federally-financed Head Start program for pre-school age children began Monday in the Winters school, with 42 pupils enrolled, George M. Beard, principal of the Elementary School and director of the program, said this week.

But there is room for three or four more pupils under the eligibility classification, the director said.

The Head Start program is being financed by a federal grant, with a total of \$11,461.00 received for the project this summer. Requirements for enrollment are that 90 percent of the children are to be from families in the low income brackets, between five and six years of age, and not necessarily starting to school in September.

Several members of the staff of the summer project attended an orientation session sponsored by Texas Technological College in Lubbock last week. Attending the Monday through Friday sessions were Mrs. Velma Hart, Mrs. Jo Olive Hancock, Mrs. Billie Whitlow, Mrs. Myrl Young, Miss Nicki Eoff and Miss Lynell Gray. Other members of the staff had attended previous orientation sessions.

Completing the staff are Mrs. Lera Henniger, Mrs. Margaret Anderson, Mrs. Betty Jo Brown and Mrs. Louise Johnson.

Director Beard said that parents with eligible children interested in enrolling them in the summer classes should contact him for additional information. The director said that there is need for several volunteers

to assist the teachers and staff in administration of the summer program. Volunteers can be from junior high level up, he said.

Beard also said that there is a need for games, puzzles and toys for use of pre-school age children. Anyone wishing to give any of these items may do so by contacting the director or any member of the staff.

Health interviews are being arranged with parents of children enrolled in the project. These parents have been notified and will have interview sessions with the director and staff beginning next Monday, it was said.

Children are being served a snack at 9 a. m. each day, with a hot meal served at 12 noon. The project will continue for eight weeks, through August 4.

Pallbearers were B. B. Campbell, Ralph Parker, J. P. Knight, Earl Hamilton, Douglas Bryan and Harve Bradley.

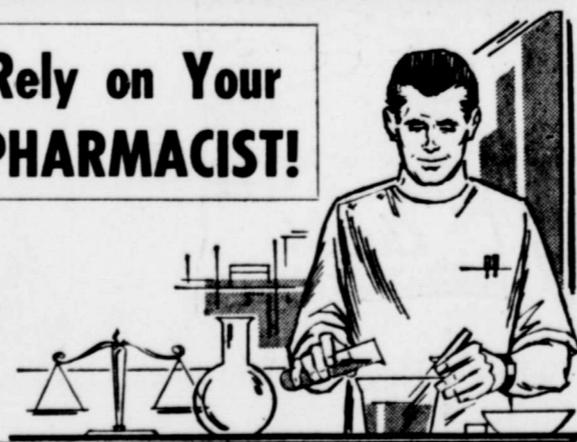

## AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington, D. C. — "A funny thing happened on the way to the Forum" — the subject of a Broadway theatrical a few years ago—based on certain facets of Roman political life.

A funny thing happened last week in the House of Representatives when legislation to again raise the National Debt Limit was defeated by 17 votes. The peculiar aspect was the fact that some of the most liberal and the most conservative voted together, but for different reasons.

During the last 13 years the debt limit has been raised 19 times, but this is the first time for defeat.

The more conservative of the congress have usually voted against the increase in the Debt Limit by reason of the inner satisfaction that they were not responsible for the necessity of raising the Debt Ceiling. If expenditures had been kept within the bounds as voted for by those who felt we should live reasonably within our means, the Government would not have to continue to borrow huge sums for its operation.

The more liberal element has voted against the increase in the Debt Limit — not consistently but recently — because they say it enables our Government to borrow money to finance its national defense and the Viet Nam War.

From the standpoint of fiscal responsibility, both theories are somewhat short of being on solid ground.

This is one issue on which some of us have been on both sides over the years, but for good and sufficient reasons. As mentioned, when one feels he is not responsible for necessity of giving the Government greater borrowing power, there is personal satisfaction in opposing raising the ceiling on what the Government can borrow. William Randolph Hurst II, wrote a number of years ago, "I always feel that it is not as important to be consistent as it is to be correct. A man who is completely consistent never learns anything. Conditions change and he does not."

We are at war, and not to have Governmental authority to finance what it may take to win could be calamitous. For the Government not to be able to manage its Public Debt could, on down the line, cause chaotic conditions at a time when it could ill afford to do so. The Debt ceiling is simply the limit to which the Treasury can borrow money to meet the Government's obligations. It comes down to the simple fact that when the Government's obligations reach a point where shortly they total more than the Debt Ceiling, Congress must give a latitude for the issuance of more Government securities.

On every occasion when the Congress has had this issue under debate, some very fine economy speeches are made by just about everyone. Those who support raising the Debt Limit talk about fiscal responsibility and, of course, they are correct. They usually urge that the authority be granted "this time" and it will not be necessary in the future. Usually, they say that we must watch our actions in authorizations and appropriations in order that future raises will not be necessary. The place and time to practice

tice economy and fiscal responsibility is when each appropriation bill is first considered. Once appropriations are made the obligation must be met and, of course, that is what causes the Debt—spending money beyond and above our income.

It is too late to practice economy when the necessity arises for raising the Debt Limit. In fact, raising the limit has nothing to do with economy at all. Unless the Congress puts first things first, we will be going through this exercise time and time again.

**State Capital Highlights—**

**'Communications' Between State And Federal Officials Said 'Poor'**

A task force of federal officials, here for a conference on federal-state relations, got an earful from disgruntled state agency officials who complained of poor communication between Austin and Washington.

Gov. John Connally opened conference by telling the men from D. C. that the federal grant system is characterized "by misunderstanding, disharmony and, in some instances, utter confusion."

Other state officials got down to specifics when the conference broke up into small groups to discuss intergovernmental coordination, health and welfare, education, water development, outdoor recreation, economic opportunity and manpower development.

They said they want to be consulted in advance about proposed programs; they want federal agencies to work through state agencies on local programs; they want block grants which would give state agencies greater latitude in tailoring federal programs to fit local needs; and they want specific, unconflicting instructions from Washington as to what is expected of them.

Since the federal officials had been through similar sessions in 39 other states, they took the criticism without flinching.

**ENOUGH OIL?**

Texas Railroad Commission is keeping an eye peeled on the Middle East Crisis in case it becomes necessary for Texas to help make up for crude oil shortages growing out of the hostilities between the Israelis and the Arab nations.

Commission Chairman Jim C. Langdon said Texas has enough reserves to meet any emergency; but while increasing oil allowances is easy, overcoming the logistical problems would require ingenuity.

**INSTITUTE OF TEXAN CULTURES**

Newest office to open in Austin is the Institute of Texan Cultures. Its task is to assemble educational exhibit material for the ITC building at the HemisFair in San Antonio.

After HemisFair closes its six months' run, the educational program by the State of Texas will be continued there as a permanent feature.

Institute is under the direction of H. Henderson Shuffler, former West Texas newspaperman

who has been heading the UT Texana programs for the past five years. Exhibits will portray the colorful history of Texas in terms of the people who made that history.

**COURTS SPEAK**

Supreme Court will hear arguments July 19 on whether parents can collect damages for premature birth and subsequent death of a child due to injury of the mother in an accident.

In other questions the high court:

Agreed to review the \$200,000 judgment favoring a workman who was burned when his bulldozer burst an underground pipeline in Brazoria County.

Upheld a trial court decision awarding damages to a woman who lost her hair from application of a lanolin bath on bleached hair) extending doctrine of strict liability to cases other than foodstuff).

Found parents of injured child who poured kerosene on smouldering stick are not barred from suit against an oil company which allegedly adulterated fuel with gasoline.

**AGRICULTURE AND THE URBAN LEGISLATURE**

Although the lawmakers turned down a proposal for creation of a coordinating board to study problems in agriculture, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White was given the job—and the money—to make the sort of studies envisioned for the proposed super-board.

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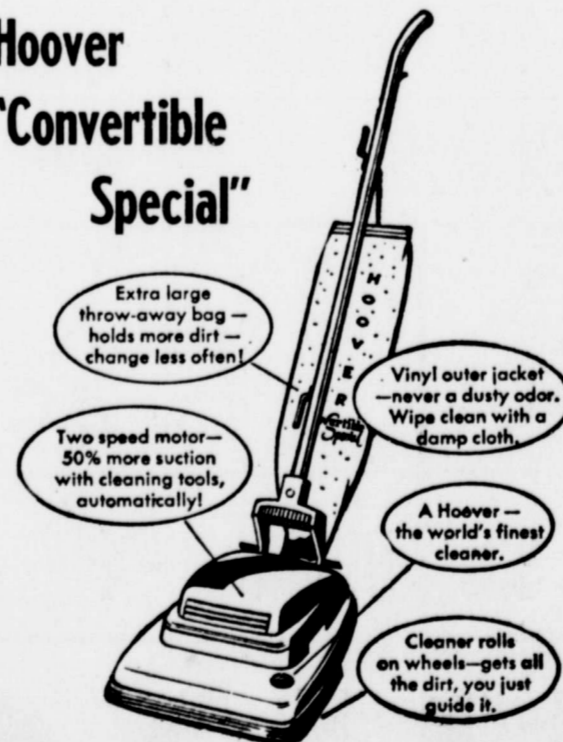
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
