Winters Women See Work Done At Job Corps Center

Dear Editor:

Last week while attending the Texas School Food Service Convention in Austin, it was my privilege to visit Camp Gary, the largest of the Job Corps Centers in the United States near San Marcos, Texas.

Since this is my third year to be associated with the Head Start Program in our community, it seems that I caught a glimpse of what The Poverty Program is really trying to accomplish.

3100 school drop-outs, or boys with problems, are being offered training in 37 vocations. This will prepare them to earn a living, rather than being supported by our tax dollar.

Mrs. W. E. Brown, Mrs. Bernice Cervenkova from Ballinger, and I ate lunch at the same

table with some of the boys. This enabled us to get the viewpoint from the boys, rather than the program directors. These boys appear grateful for the opportunity to learn a trade. One boy was being trained in heavy equipment, another automobile parts and another in electricity. We toured their training centers where they were learning to become butchers, cooks, and head waiters, etc. A special dining room has been set up where the boys train to lay tables and serve properly and efficiently.

Not all students are college material, not all can be leaders, so we are thankful for someone with a vision, who can see what can be done to help this group find their way to earn a living.

I only wish from my observation more vocational training could be offered to our young boys and girls.
