Why were these remarks made? We usually take for granted any attitude of average behavior; it's the opposite attitude we all usually notice, and make comments about. The mediocre or average attitude has become "acceptable." "Good" behavior, by its very nature, seems to stand out. And this seems to be the picture presented at Fort Worth and those other places. These are conclusions, of course, but what other answers can there be?

These references to the behavior of students and young people from Winters are not rare. They have become commonplace. In fact, it is a rare moment when, after a group of our kids has been away to some other section of the state, no comment of this kind is heard.

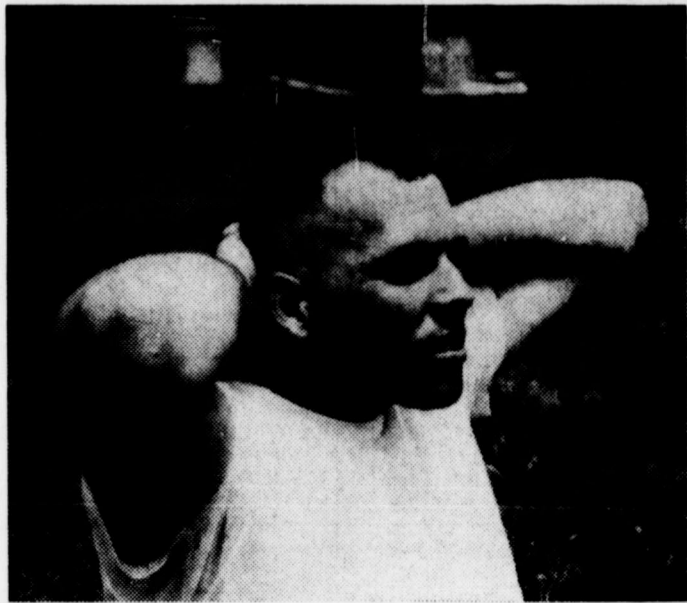
Why? We all like to think that it is a result of the "raising" these kids have received—and they come from families of all walks of life. But there is another reason, and a very important one—and don't let's forget it: It is because of the character and leadership of those persons who have been picked (who really volunteer for the sheer joy of it) to work with our kids, to teach them, to coach them and to be with them. They are the team managers, the coaches, the school teachers, the Sunday School teachers; the many unsung others who have gone out of their way to help the young people. THEY are the ones we should stand up and salute.

A friend of ours says we have hereabouts a person well qualified to take U. Thant's place in the UN. This friend has worn, for many years, size 34 pants. Then one day he was trying on a pair of 34's, and they fit too quick. He remarked that he probably was gaining weight and would have to take 36's. "No," said this diplomat. "These 36's are really the same size as the 34's—it's just the cut of the cloth."

Our old friend who scratches the red dirt of Bluff Creek for a bare existence is disappointed; he says he's missed the boat for many years (all his life). Says he was always taught that meanness caused riots and looting and other criminal actions, but now he's not so sure. Says now he's being told that if he doesn't have as much as his neighbor—and doesn't have the inclination to work for it—and he goes over and burns down the neighbor's barn and loots his home, it's really not his fault, it's the fault of "society." Says he was never inclined to be mean, but has been poor all his life; if poorness is really an excuse he could have been rioting and looting all his life—and maybe could have been living higher on the hog all these years.

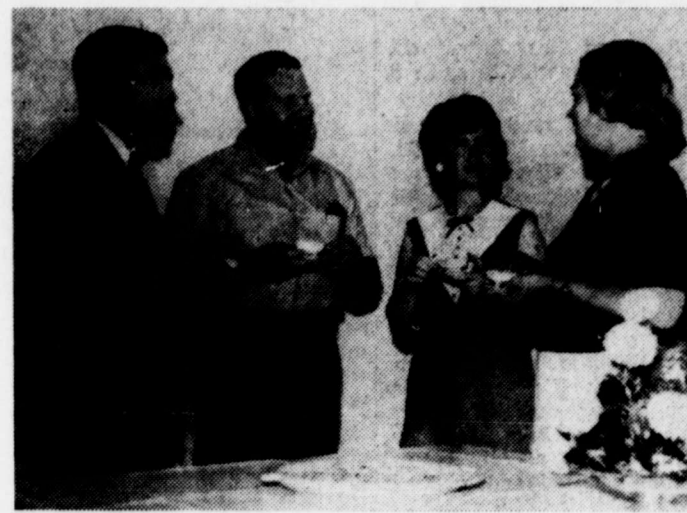

"Dateline: Tanzania"—PC Volunteer Says Time Has Passed Rapidly, Proud of US Work In Africa

When I arrived in Tanzania in September, 1965, the 24 month assignment ahead of me seemed like an almost unbearable length of time to be away from my family and friends. Now, there are only seven weeks until I leave my adopted home. What have these two years meant to me?

First, I guess the Peace Corps, like the Army, helps one to mature. Being in an alien land without family or fellow countrymen to fall back upon, I had to develop some self reliance. I was pleased to discover the things I could accomplish by myself when the need arose.

Pride in my country and its countless blessings was another realization during my Peace Corps experience. What a magnificent country we have!

The hawks and the doves on Vietnam, the race riots and the other shortcomings of our country may cloud this pride a little but I realize the problems in our country are no greater than anywhere else and we are working to correct them. I am sure most of us Volunteers will return home with a renewed desire to help make America still a better place in which to live.

Material comforts aren't the only blessings we have but they are perhaps the most obvious. When our new Sears catalogue arrived last year Jim and I spent several evenings looking through it, discussing the ingenuity of our people. During a violent rainstorm this year, I stopped my lessons, walked to the door and flipped a non-existent light switch. The students didn't know what I did but I felt quite foolish. We Americans take our blessings for granted and have a difficult time getting adapted to their absence. Electricity, and pure drinking water, paved roads, newspapers, telephones, televisions... the list is endless. And are we Americans selfish? No!

These two years have been the most wonderful and adventurous of my life. I thank you taxpayers for making it possible and I look forward to sharing again some of these adventures with you when I get home.

John Glyn Key, a 1959 graduate of Winters High School and a 1967 graduate of Texas Technological College, was employed as a teacher of English.

Philip Colehour of Knox City was employed as high school librarian.

Key served in the U. S. Air Force four years, and on discharge in January, 1965, enrolled in Texas Tech. He has been a student since that time, and will complete work for his degree this month.

Colehour holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Wisconsin, a master's degree from Harvard, and a master of science degree in library science from George Peabody College. He has served on the faculty of East Texas State College, Chico State College, and Vanderbilt University. Since 1963 he has made his home in Knox City, and worked in the library of the Knox City schools and other surrounding schools. He will move to Winters late this month.

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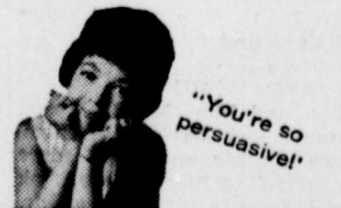
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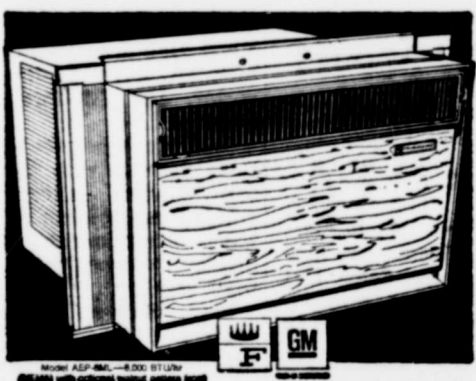

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State Capital Highlights—

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer Retires, Top Highway Man 27 Years

One day after receiving a 40-year service award from the Texas Highway Commission, State Highway Engineer Dewitt C. Greer announced his retirement.

Greer reached the mandatory retirement age of 65 on July 27; but he agreed, at the behest of the Commission, to stay in the job until the end of the year.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, acting as governor while Connally hunts in Africa, called on Greer at his office to present him with a framed copy of a proclamation making August 4 "Dewitt C. Greer Day" in Texas.

A celebration commemorating the Highway Department's 50 years is slated for September 26. A highlight of the celebration will be presentation to Greer of funds donated to endow in his honor a lectureship at the Texas A&M Civil Engineering Department.

Greer, a graduate of A&M,

went to work for the Highway Department in 1929 and became its top administrator in 1940. During his tenure as chief engineer, Greer has supervised the investment of more than \$4,000,000 in a highway system that's grown from 20,359 miles to more than 68,000 during the past 27 years.

A former president of the American Association of State Highway Officials, Greer now serves on the organization's executive and legislative committees and has received its two highest honors for contributions to highway progress. In 1965, Texas A&M University made him an honorary Doctor of Laws. Texas A&M gave him its Distinguished Alumni Award in 1966.

SUCCESSOR NAMED

Succeeding Greer on January 1 will be Asst. State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall who has been with the Department of Engineers and four years he spent as Engineer-Manager of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers and four years he spent as Engineer-Manager of the Texas Turnpike Authority, supervising the financing, design and construction of the \$58,000,000 Dallas-Fort Turnpike.

Dingwall served as the Department's supervising urban engineer in Houston, overseeing construction of the Gulf Freeway—the first major freeway built in Texas. He has been assistant state highway engineer since 1958.

In other Highway Department activity, Hal Woodward of Coleman was sworn in as chairman of the Highway Commission, and Herbert C. Pety Jr. of Carrizo Springs took the oath to begin an unprecedented third six-year term on the Commission.

Woodward, who succeeds Pety as chairman, was first named to the Commission in 1955.

A dead has been signed by the School Land Board giving the United States the minerals under 47,895 acres in Guadalupe

Mountains National Park. Two days of hearings, October 17-18, have been scheduled by the Texas Water Rights Commission on proposed cancellations of unused water rights for diversion of water from the Rio Grande, indicating that the Commission will apply the newly passed Water Rights Adjudication Act to Rio Grande rights first.

Water Rights Commission has found that directors of Brazoria County Water Control and Improvement District No. 8 have failed to comply with the law by appointing directors by no unexpired term of office; by not holding annual elections for directors; by assessing taxes which are not equal and uniform; by not appointing a board of equalization; by collecting too much from the District for services and expenses; and by not calling a special election to fill vacancies.

Board of Insurance put the new driver penalty point system into effect on August 1. By levying \$6,439,362 in penalties on drivers who had wrecks or serious traffic offenses during the year just ended, the Board was able to cut average rates by one per cent.

Texas Employment Commission reports that a total of \$8,200,000 in unemployment insurance was paid to eligible claimants in Texas during the April-June quarter.

PRICE-FIXING SUIT
State of Texas has filed a price-fixing suit against five big drug firms.

Suit, entered in federal court at Dallas by Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin, seeks triple damages totaling about \$12,000,000 from the producers of aureo-

mycin, terramycin and tetracycline products. Drugs involved are used to treat both human and animal diseases and as animal feed supplements.

According to Martin, the federal government already has an anti-trust suit pending against the same firms: Charles Pfizer and Co., Inc.; American Cyanamid Co.; Bristol-Myers Co.; Olin Mathieson Chemical Corp.; and the Upjohn Co.

Martin alleges that the drug manufacturers charged state and local governments "unreasonably high" prices for the antibiotics through a conspiracy to limit their manufacture and sale.

Furthermore, the attorney general contends, the firms' actions inflated prices to retail druggists, wholesalers, private hospitals and the consumer.

Martin estimated more than \$3,000,000 has been spent by state and local governments alone between November, 1953, and November, 1966, to buy antibiotics for use in public-supported hospitals, schools and other institutions and health or welfare programs.

Other states are contemplating similar suits, Martin said, and state attorneys general will discuss the case at their conference in Portland, Ore. on August 29.

HEALTH GRANTS SOUGHT

Seventy eight health facilities have applied for federal Hill-Burton construction grants of more than \$34,500,000, about twice as much as is expected to be available for Texas.

New 1968 Texas State Plan for Construction and Modernization of Hospitals and Related Medical Facilities now is available for review at the State Department of Health.

Alex de la Cruz's Morale Is High, Did Some Walking

Alex de la Cruz's morale has been reported as "magnificent," in spite of the fact he has to lie on his stomach and watch television with the aid of a mirror. But he took four steps last Friday—one for each month he's been confined to a special bed while recovering from a fractured spine suffered in an automobile accident described as one of the worst in Texas history.

Alex's parents, the Rev. and Mrs. Juan de la Cruz, two brothers and a sister died in the crash in San Antonio March 24. Two other sisters and a brother survived. Another minister, his wife and three of their children also died in the de la Cruz car. Driver of the other car involved in the head-on collision that took the lives of 11 persons, also died.

Alex's brothers and a sister are now living with his uncle and aunt in Winters. The late Rev. de la Cruz was the brother of Joe De la Cruz of Winters.

Alex is in Santa Rosa Medical center in San Antonio. He lies strapped to a wheel eight feet in diameter, sandwiched between two boards.

Every several hours the wheel-like contraption, resembling a ferris wheel, is rotated so he lies on his stomach or back. With the aid of a mirror, he can watch television.

Jack Coughlin, an official of Santa Rosa Medical Center, says "His morale is magnifi-

cent. He doesn't have too many visitors, and like everyone else, he gets depressed at times."

But he looks forward to visits by his brothers and sisters, and his uncle and aunt from Winters, who go down every Sunday to visit with him. He would like to have more visitors.

Some have said "he'll never walk again," but Alex is showing a lot of determination. In his first attempt to walk last Friday, Alex took the steps with the help of a body support walker. Then Saturday, he took about 15 steps for his uncle, Joe de la Cruz of Winters.

The boy's father was pastor of the First Baptist Church of Pleasanton. It is a small church in a small town, and hospital expenses for Alex mount. The Mexican Baptist Bible Institute in San Antonio is helping with expenses. The hospital is a Catholic institution with a great deal of charity care, Coughlin said, so expenses are not as great as they could be.

Alex spends the days working crossword puzzles and he also draws—waiting for the day he can leave the hospital. That may be weeks or perhaps months, and he might leave in a wheelchair or he might be bedridden.

"A very poor little church has underwritten his hospital care and will educate him when he does get out of the hospital," Coughlin said.

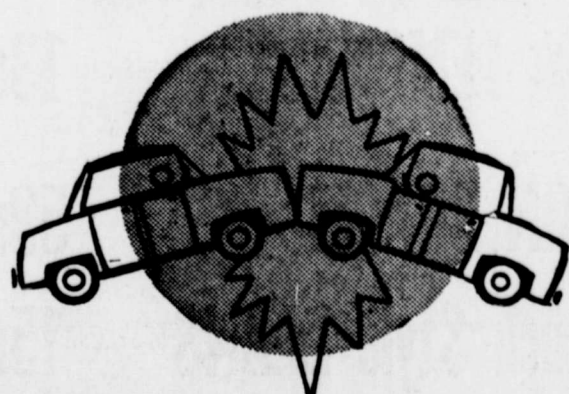

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the officers or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the officers or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the officers or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

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LEGAL NOTICE

An ordinance creating and defining Parking Meter Zone in the City of Winters, Texas; providing for the installation, operation and maintenance of mechanical devices to regulate parking in said parking meter zone; providing for the collection of regulatory and inspection fees for the use of such devices; providing for the deposit of such fees by the city treasurer in a special fund; providing for the method and purposes of disbursement of said fund; making it unlawful to use the streets or portions of the streets so designated for parking, except through the use of parking meters; providing for parking adjacent to United States Post Office; defining what acts will be unlawful, and fixing penalties for the violation of the provisions of this ordinance; and repealing certain sections of ordinances and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF WINTERS, TEXAS:

Section 1. DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of this ordinance,

(a) The word "vehicle" shall mean any device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be transported upon a street or highway.

(b) The word "street" shall mean any public street or avenue located in the City of Winters and established for the use of vehicles.

(c) The word "person" shall mean and include any individual, firm, partnership or corporation.

(d) The word "operator" shall mean and include every individual who shall operate a vehicle as the owner thereof or as the agent, employee, or permittee of the owner.

(e) The words "park" or "parking" when used herein shall mean the standing of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, otherwise than temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading passengers or merchandise.

(f) The words "loading zone," when used herein shall mean a space or section of the curb and adjacent street, set aside for the exclusive use of loading or unloading of persons, merchandise, supplies and materials.

(g) Standard of Time. All hours of time mentioned in this ordinance refer to and shall be determined by "Central Standard Time," as commonly known, except, (1) during the continuance of the current period of officially designated and known as "Daylight Saving Time," all such hours shall be determined by such "Daylight Saving Time" so long as same remains in effect, and, (2) during any future time, any standard of time established or proclaimed by the United States for an area including Winters, Texas, all such hours shall be determined by such officially proclaimed standard, so long as same remains in effect.

Section 2. SECTIONS APPLICABLE WHEN. The regulations provided for in this ordinance apply on all days other than Sunday, and any other days designated by City Council as legal holidays, but only between the hours of 8:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M., and apply to all things covered or included in this ordinance, except as to (1) use of loading zones, as provided in Section 15 hereof; (2) use of parking spaces for loading and unloading, as provided in Section 16 hereof; (3) parking over-length vehicles and vehicles with trailers attached thereto, as provided in Section 21 hereof; and (4) parking of vehicles adjacent to the United States Post Office, as provided in Section 22 hereof, which sections 15, 16, 21, and 22 apply as set forth in them respectively.

Section 3. PARKING METER ZONE DEFINED. The following described parts of streets in the City of Winters, Texas, are hereby established as "Parking Meter Zone":

(a) that part of Main Street which lies between Parsonage and Tinkle Streets, which includes 4 parking spaces on West side of 200 Blk. of South Main adjacent to State Street.

(b) that part of Dale Street which lies between Grant Street and Church Street.

(c) that part of Church Street

which lies between Dale Street and State Street; East one-half of Blk. adjacent to Dale Street.

(d) that part of State Street which lies between Main Street and Church Street; north one-half of Block immediately adjacent to Church Street.

Section 4. CITY COUNCIL TO DESIGNATE PARKING METER SPACES AND LOADING ZONES. In said Parking Meter Zone, the City Council is authorized to cause parking spaces and loading zones to be designated and maintained in and on such part and parts of said Parking Meter Zone which may be authorized by the City Council from time to time, in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance. All spaces for parking vehicles shall be laid out parallel to the curb, and shall be designated by lines or marks painted on the surface of the streets, and shall be so laid out that there shall be one parking space for and at or near each installed parking meter.

Loading zones for handling of passengers and heavy or bulky merchandise, supplies and materials shall be laid out and designated by orange colored lines or marks on surface of street and/or curb, with the words "Loading Zone" painted thereon. No parking meter shall be installed in or adjacent to a loading zone.

SECTION 5. LENGTHS OF TIME AND RATES CHARGED FOR PARKING. The following lengths of time for parking a vehicle in a parking space, and the amounts of money charged for such lengths of time, respectively, for so using parking spaces are hereby established:

Twelve (12) minutes for one cent (1c);

Twenty-four (24) minutes for two cents (2c);

Thirty-six (36) minutes for three cents (3c);

Forty-eight (48) minutes for four cents (4c);

Sixty minutes (60) for five cents (5c). (One nickel or five pennies).

One hundred twenty minutes (120) for ten cents (10c). (Two nickels or ten pennies).

Section 6. INSTALLATION, OPERATION, ETC., OF PARKING METERS. The City Council, or such other officers or employees of the City of Winters as they may select, is hereby authorized to install and maintain, or cause to be installed and maintained parking meters in and on such part and parts of said Parking Meter Zone, the installation and maintenance of which meters are or may be authorized by the City Council from time to time; and Chief of Police shall provide for the regulation, control, operation and maintenance of such parking meters in good workable condition. One parking meter shall be placed or set upon the curb alongside of or next to the parking spaces designated, as herein provided, and shall be so set as to show or display a signal showing whether the parking space alongside of or next to the same is or is not legally in use. Each parking meter shall be installed and set to display, upon the deposit of a five cent (5c) coin, or one or more one cent (1c) coins, or ten cent (10c) coin of the United States, therein, a signal indicating legal parking for that period of time conforming to a limit of parking time and charge therefor which is established by this ordinance which signal shall continue to operate from the time of deposit of such coin or coins therein until the expiration of the time fixed for which such deposited coin or coins is payment. Each parking meter shall also be so arranged that upon expiration of such legal parking time, it will indicate by a mechanical operation and dropping or appearance of proper signal, that the lawful parking period fixed by this ordinance has expired.

Section 7. DEPOSIT OF COINS. When any vehicle shall be parked in any place alongside of or next to which there is located, under this ordinance, a parking meter, the operator of said vehicle shall, upon entering said marked parking space, immediately deposit either a five cent (5c) coin, one or more one cent (1c) coins or a ten cent (10c) coin, of the United States, in the slot made therefor, in the parking meter alongside of or next to said parking space, and the said parking space may then be used by such

vehicle during the parking time limit for which such deposited coin or coins is payment, as provided by this ordinance. If the said vehicle shall remain parked in any such parking space beyond the parking time limit, for which such deposited coin or coins is payment, the parking meter shall display a sign showing illegal parking, and in that event such vehicle shall be considered as parked over-time and beyond the period of time fixed by this ordinance, and such parking of a vehicle over-time shall be a violation of this ordinance and punished as hereinafter set out.

Section 8. UNLAWFUL TO PARK OVERTIME. It shall be unlawful for any operator of a vehicle to cause, allow, permit, or suffer any vehicle in his possession or under his control to be or remain in any parking space alongside of or next to which any parking meter is placed while the meter is displaying a signal showing that such vehicle shall have already been parked beyond the period of time fixed by this ordinance, for which payment has been made by deposit of a coin or coins in the parking meter alongside of or next to such parking space. The display of a sign showing illegal parking by any parking meter, while a vehicle is parked in a parking space adjoining said parking meter, shall be a prima facie evidence that said vehicle has been parked overtime and beyond the period of time fixed by this ordinance, for which payment has been made by deposit of a coin or coins in the parking meter alongside of or next to such parking space.

Section 9. POLICE OFFICERS TO REPORT VIOLATION. It shall be the duty of the police officers of the City of Winters to report:

(a) The number of each parking meter which indicates that the vehicle occupying the parking space adjacent to such parking meter is or has been parked in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance;

(b) The name of the State and number on the license plate, if any, attached to such vehicle;

(c) The length of time during which such vehicle is parked in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, if and to the extent the meter shows the time of over-parking; and

(d) Any other fact, a knowledge of which is necessary to a thorough understanding of the circumstances attending such violation.

Each such police officer shall also attach to such vehicle a notice to the owner thereof that such vehicle has been parked in violation of the provisions of this ordinance, and instructing such owner to deposit in envelope affixed to vehicle an assessment of 25c for overparking and for each hour thereafter an additional 25c per hour to be deposited in fine-o-meter boxes or at City Hall within 10 days or an enforcement warrant will be issued, whereby a charge of \$1.00 will be assessed. After enforcement warrant or citation has been issued and subject cited fails to appear as required, he or she will be served with a Failure to Appear Warrant punishable of a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200.00.

Section 10. MANNER OF PARKING. Any vehicle parked in any parking space in the Parking Meter Zone shall be parked parallel to the curb, with the right side of vehicle not over 18 inches from curb with the front end at the parking meter next to such parking space and shall be parked wholly within the lines marked on the street for such parking space, as provided herein.

Section 11. UNLAWFUL TO PARK OTHER THAN WHOLLY WITHIN LINES OR MARKS ON STREET SURFACE. It shall be unlawful and an offense to park any vehicle across any such lines or marks or to park said vehicle in such way that the same shall not be wholly within the area so designated by such lines or marks on the street surface.

Section 12. UNLAWFUL TO DEFACE METERS. It shall be unlawful and an offense for any person to deface, injure, tamper with, open or willfully break, destroy or impair the usefulness of any parking meter installed under the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 13. UNLAWFUL TO DEPOSIT SLUG. It shall be unlawful and an offense to deposit or cause to be deposited in any parking meter any slug, device or substitute for a five cent (5c) coin, one cent (1c) coin or ten cent (10c) coin of the United States.

Section 14. FEES TO COVER REGULATION, SUPERVISION, ETC. The United States coins required to be deposited, as provided herein, are hereby charged as police regulation, supervision and inspection fees to cover the cost of the installation, maintenance, operation, control and use of parking spaces and parking meters described herein, and of checking up and regulating the parking of vehicles in the Parking Meter Zone created hereby.

Section 15. USE OF LOADING ZONES FOR LOADING AND UNLOADING. It shall be unlawful for any operator to stand

or park a vehicle in a loading zone for the purpose of loading or unloading passengers for a period in excess of fifteen (15) minutes.

The use of loading zones for the loading and unloading of merchandise, etc., shall be for handling of heavy or bulky merchandise, supplies and materials. All such loading and unloading must be performed in an expeditious manner and no vehicle may remain in a loading zone either for a period of time longer than necessary to expeditiously load or unload the same, or while the operator thereof is soliciting or engaged otherwise than the loading and unloading of the vehicle, except that a reasonable time shall be allowed for giving or securing a delivery receipt.

UNLAWFUL TO OVER-PARK IN LOADING ZONE. It shall be unlawful for any operator of a vehicle to stop or permit any vehicle in his possession or under his control to be or remain in any loading zone either for the purpose of loading and/or unloading passengers for a period of time longer than fifteen minutes, or for the purpose of loading and/or unloading merchandise, supplies, and materials for a longer period of time than necessary to expeditiously load and/or unload such merchandise, supplies and materials and give or secure a delivery receipt therefor.

The provisions of this section apply on all days and all hours, except that the City Council is authorized to cause to be painted on the curb and/or adjacent street surface of any loading zone or zones, the words:

"Loading Zone. Reserved —A. M. to —P. M." and insert therein the numbers indicating the hours so reserved, and then such regulations shall apply to such loading zone and zones, respectively during such reserved hours only, only so long as the figures, etc., indicating the hours of reservation are legible.

Section 16. UNLAWFUL TO USE PARKING SPACES FOR LOADING AND UNLOADING, WITH CERTAIN EXCEPTIONS. It shall be unlawful for any operator of a vehicle to stop or park same in a parking space for the purpose of loading and/or unloading of merchandise, supplies, and materials, except where the place of business, where such merchandise, etc., is to be loaded or unloaded, does not have either (1) a usable entrance from an adjoining alley, or (2) an officially designated loading zone on that part of the street adjacent to such place of business; and where there is neither a usable entrance to a place of business from an alley, nor an officially designated loading zone on that part of the street adjacent to such place of business, the operator of a vehicle may, without making deposit in meter or meters, use not to exceed two parking places for loading or unloading at such place of business, for the length of time necessary to expeditiously load and/or unload such merchandise, etc., and give or secure delivery receipt therefor; but it shall be unlawful for any operator to use more than two parking spaces for such loading or unloading or for a longer time than necessary to expeditiously load or unload such merchandise, etc., and give or secure delivery receipt therefor.

Section 17. CITATION AFFIXED TO VEHICLES. In the event any vehicle shall be found standing or parked in or upon any regularly designated parking meter space, or in or upon any street within the Parking Meter Zone established by this ordinance, in violation of and contrary to any of the provisions of this ordinance, a citation shall be affixed to such vehicle found parked in violation of the provisions of this ordinance, and instructing such owner to deposit in envelope affixed to vehicle an assessment of 25c for overparking and for each hour thereafter an additional 25c per hour to be deposited in fine-o-meter boxes or at City Hall within 10 days or an enforcement warrant will be issued, whereby a charge of \$1.00 will be assessed. After enforcement warrant or citation has been issued and subject cited fails to appear as required, he or she will be served with a Failure to Appear Warrant punishable of a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200.00.

Section 18. FEES AND COSTS TO BE CUMULATIVE. Fee and costs provided for in this ordinance, shall be cumulative of any and all other penalties provided by ordinances of the City.

Section 19. COLLECTION OF MONEY FROM METERS, ETC. It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police, with the approval of the City Council, to designate some member or members of his department to make regular collections of the money deposited in said meters. In this connection, it shall be the duty of such person or persons so designated to pick up the sealed cylinders containing the coins as deposited in the meters, and deliver said cylinders, with the seals unbroken, to the City Comptroller, as soon as practicable after removal from meter. It shall be the duty of the City Comptroller to break the seals and count the funds and

deposit same to the credit of the City of Winters in the City General Fund, which said fund shall be disbursed on order of the City Council. The duties prescribed to the officer and/or officers of the City of Winters, under the terms of this section, shall be in addition to their regular duties.

Each person so designated to collect such cylinders from meters and deliver same to Comptroller shall, if directed by the City Council to do so, execute a fiduciary bond in the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) payable to the City of Winters, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties in collecting and delivering all such sealed cylinders and monies, which bond shall be executed by a corporate surety which has been duly authorized under the laws of Texas to execute such bonds. The premium for such bond shall be paid by the City.

Section 20. ORDINANCE CUMULATIVE, ETC. This ordinance shall be and is hereby declared to be cumulative of all other ordinances of the City of Winters affecting traffic, and shall not operate to repeal any such ordinance or ordinances, except (a) insofar as the provisions of such other ordinance or ordinances are inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 21. PROHIBITING PARKING MOTOR VEHICLES WITH TRAILERS, long trucks, etc., in Parking Meter Zone. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any operator in charge or control of any vehicle which has an over-all length of nineteen (19) feet or more, or of any vehicle having a trailer attached thereto, to park the same in any parking meter space in the Parking Meter Zone established by this ordinance; provided, this section shall not prohibit the parking of a motor truck for the purpose of loading or unloading.

ORDINANCE 5 5 FIVE 5 5 which is expressly permitted under Section 16 hereof.

The provisions of this section apply on all days on all hours both daytime and nighttime.

Section 22. REGULATING PARKING BY UNITED STATES POST OFFICE. It shall be unlawful for any operator to stop or park any vehicle in his possession or under his control on that half of any street adjacent to the lot on which the United States Post Office is located that part of State Street which lies between Main Street and Church Street; for a longer period of time than twelve (12) minutes between the hours of 8:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. of any day.

Section 23. INVALID SECTION NOT TO INVALIDATE OTHER SECTIONS, ETC. If any section or provision or part thereof, in this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional by any court of com-

petent jurisdiction, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any section or provisions therefore not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 24. PENALTY FOR VIOLATION. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of an offense and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

Section 25. ORDINANCE EFFECTIVE WHEN. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after the date of its publication.

Section 26. EMERGENCY. The facts that traffic in the City of Winters is so congested

as to impede traffic and make it difficult for operators of motor and other vehicles to find parking spaces, that the City has contracted for installation of parking meters and the installation of such parking meters is almost complete and same are almost ready for operation, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity for the immediate preservation of the public welfare, and safety which requires the suspension of the rule requiring ordinances to be read on three separate days before the final passage thereof; wherefore, such rules are hereby suspended and this ordinance shall be effective from and after its final passage, and it is so ordained.
